Vertebrae Removed From Back of J C. Adams in Effort to Save



This picture shows some of the big guns used on the new dreadnaughelass of battleships, which will be built for France, Italy and Austro-Hungary. Although the new warships are ranked as "dreadnaughts" they really have gone beyond that class with regard to fighting strength. The boats that are to be built for France will 25,300 tons. The big guns will be set four abreast in the turrets. Each turret will be divided by an armored partition and in each compartment there will be two guns, so that if a shell should strike one pair the other pair could remain in action. The new boats will be seen in 1915.




A. CLOPTON RELEASED ON \$15,000 BOND YESTERDAY
