CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DIRECTORS CONSIDER OFFER FROM MANUFACTURER

LABOR CHIEF PROBLEM

Proposal Finally Referred to a Special Committee of Five Members

Discussion of a proposition to locate a cotton glove and overall factory in this city occupied the directors of the Chamber of Commerce at this morning's session. The offer was submitted by a manufacturer in another Texas city who intends to build and operate a plant here in connection with another one. The question of labor was the chief consideration, and the manufacturer was given assurance that enough girls to operate the plant could be secured here. After some discussion, the matter was referred to a special committee consisting of Messrs. Kemp, Blair, Huey Pennington, and Hines, who will probably take definite action today. Two other cities are bidding for the plant.

The directors decided to change the date of the membership campaign from April 3 to April 4, several of the leading workers having other engagements on the previous date.

Mr. O'Reilly wanted some action taken toward making a larger fund for the Ohio flood sufferers; he said that as Wichita Falls was the best city in the state, she ought to make her donation the best. The directors felt, however, that in view of other liberal responses and the improvement in the conditions, this city had done her share. Those present today were J. M. Bell, Wiley Blair, H. B. Red Letter Day For the Real Fans Chicago, April 1.—This is the day! Let the brass bands lare and the mobs roar for the great double barreled and triple ringed, six months circus of baseball is about to be turned loose in the land.

The crack of the bat and ball in the far West this afternoon ushers in the 1913 season of professional baseball games and before the diamonds are abandoned toward the end of October they will number about 25,000 scheduled contests.

The first pennant race is started as usual by the Pacific Coast League. The two major leagues will get under way on Thursday of next week on which day the American Association, the Southern League and the Texas League also will play their first games.

In quick succession after the beginning of the big league races the International, Western, South Atlantic, Northwestern and Virginia leagues will open, followed by the Central League and the Eastern Association on April 23. The Central Association and the New England and New York State Leagues will begin their schedules on the last day of April. The first ten days in May will see practically all of the remaining minor organizations started or their championship races.

QUEER LEGACIES ON RECORD

Meant Much in the Old Days, Though They Seem Peculiar to the People of Today.

Ancient bequests for having bells rung and beacons lighted for the purpose of guiding travelers by night are quite numerous, which is hardly to be wondered at when one considers the apologies for roads and the absence of fences in the "good old days."

A plot of land, rejoicing in the name of "Petticoat Hole," is held at Stockton-on-the-Forest, in Yorkshire, England, on condition of providing a poor woman of the place with a new petticoat once a year.

In the old days, when rushes were strewn on the floor in lieu of carpets, many persons left bequests of money and land for providing rushes for the floors of churches. Their use, of course, has long been discontinued, but in certain places the church wardens attend to the preservation of their rights by cutting a little grass each year and strewing it on the church floor.

There may have been seen on the benefaction table at Deptford church a record to the effect that "a person unknown gave half a quarter of wheat, to be given in bread on Good Friday, and half a load of rushes at Whitsuntide, and a load of peas-traw at Christmas yearly, for the use of the church."

Bryan, as Secretary of State, is receiving some very fine compliments from some very big men just now, and are not from Democrats. Here is what Oscar S. Straus of New York said of him just before talking his departure for Europe: "Bryan has the vision of Jefferson and the diplomacy of Hay."

The nine hour law passed by the legislature, and also the law that gives to married women the right to handle their own individual property without being hampered by their husbands are good laws, and for this much at least our present law-makers are to be commended.

President Wilson has at last found a man who thinks he is rich enough to accept the appointment as ambassador to Great Britain, and strange to relate he is a newspaper man, Walter H. Page, editor of World and Works. Perhaps it would be better to refer to him as a journalist. After a fellow gets rich he is out of the class of newspaper men.

The council meeting of the General Federation of Women's Clubs is to be held in Washington, D. C. April 21-24, which will be the 23rd anniversary of the organization which has grown to remarkable proportions, and now has more than one million members.

Today is city election day, and if you have not by the time you read this reminder in today's paper, which is issued at least two hours before the time for closing the polls up, go to the city hall and vote. There are six candidates to be voted on and three to be elected. The matter of politics is cutting no figure in the election, though there are three Democrats and three Republicans on the ticket.

The final passage into law of the married women's rights bill is a monument to the good work, the energy and the discretion of Mrs. Hortense Ward of Houston, who worked hard and faithfully in behalf of the bill. The new law gives to married women absolute control and disposal of all her personal property and the control and management of her separate real property, as well as absolute control and disposal of her personal earnings. She cannot, however, sell her realty or incur debt without joining on the part of her husband unless she can show to the satisfaction of a district court that it is to her best interest so to do. Her earnings, rentals and interest from money, dividends from stock, etc., are not subject to her husband's debts. In Texas there have not been many instances, we are glad for our sex's sake to say, in which this law was particularly needed. But there have been enough cases of worthless husbands taking their wives' earnings for their own selfish purposes, even in this chivalrous commonwealth, to make the law necessary. It's a good law, and it gives married women the right to control and use the property that has always really belonged to them. —Denton Record and Chronicle.

His Silence. (New York World) These unctuous and edifying words appear in an editorial printed in the current issue of our plous contemporary, the Outlook:

"Every American, therefore, wishes—or ought to wish—well to the new administration. Success to this administration will mean success to the country and what is no less important, a new justification for the principle of self-government. Every citizen can wish this administration well the more heartily because it is going to be tested by certain unusually difficult problems."

While its mind is occupied with the subject, perhaps the Outlook can tell us just how much success its contributing editor has wished to the new administration.

It is possible that Theodore Roosevelt has issued an appeal for popular support of the great principles not seen it anywhere in print. A great many persons who voted against Mr. Wilson, republicans and progressives alike, have expressed sentiments similar to those of the Outlook. Mr. Taft himself cordially wished Mr. Wilson success. But not a word has come from the man who in the last twelve years has talked more about more different things

than any other politician that ever lived. Nothing ever said by Mr. Roosevelt was more significant than his silence at this time. Can the Outlook explain it?

About April Fools Day

The custom of setting aside one day in the year for playing pranks upon one's neighbors is pretty general throughout the civilized world, and, indeed, is so ancient that its origin is pretty well lost in the mists of antiquity.

One authority bids us go back to Noah and the dove, which he sent out of the Ark on a fool's errand before the waters of the great deluge had subsided. Hoary tradition asserts that the day Noah chose as April 1.

Most plausible of all theories about the day ever offered is that which refers its origin to France. It was the first nation in Christendom to alter the arrangement of the calendar so that the year began with January 1. Instead of March 25, as of yore. When, therefore, January 1 became New Year's Day, or as the French call it le jour de'trennes, the day of gifts, the custom of presenting gifts on March 25 was established in favor of the new festival. But a memory of the old festivities which loomed up on April 1 was still retained by the old fashioned and conservative. They still gave gifts and made visits on April 1.

It was in order to ridicule this moss-grown custom that the younger spirits began to make mock visits and pretended gifts on the abandoned festival. The custom was kept up long after its origin had been forgotten and its continuance will always

be assured, for it appeals to the same fundamental need as the carnival or Christmas itself, the human craving for a little nonsense now and then.

The April fool custom was known to eighteenth century England for Addison denounced it in the Spectator and Dean Swift actually shared in a conspiracy to play an April fool joke upon a publican. From his "Journal to Stella" it appears that he and Dr. Arbuthnot and Lady Masham spent the evening of March 31, 1713 in "contriving a lie for the morrow"—viz, through the servants they would spread a report that a notorious criminal recently executed had come to life again and might be seen in the flesh at the Black Swan in Holborn. They made merry at the thought of hundreds of curious and expectant visitors who would throng into the tavern only to be disappointed. But with the morning it would seem that calm reflection came, for Swift's next record notes that the plan fell through on account of a lack of enthusiasm in his fellow conspirators.

Addison would not have approved what Swift planned to do. In the Spectator, he shows that he had a well founded contempt for all April fooling. A neighbor, he says, a hard-dasher by trade, and a very conceited fellow, had made his boast that for 19 consecutive years he had celebrated the return of April and had

made at least a hundred fools. "My landlady had a falling out with him about a fortnight ago for sending away one of her children upon a sleeveless errand, as she terms it. Her eldest son went to buy a half penny's worth of ink at a shoemaker's and the eldest daughter was dispatched half a mile to see-monster and in short, the whole family of innocent children made April fools. Nay, my landlady herself did not escape him."

The jest of sending people on "sleeveless errands" still survives locally in England on the first of April and fourishes apace in Scotland under the title of "Hunt the Gowk." Gowk is a cant name for the cuckoo and also, by extension, for a fool or a simpleton. The victim is dispatched with a sealed message to some person at a considerable distance from his home. What the envelope contains is simply this familiar couplet:

This is the first of Aprile.
Hunt the gowk another mile.

The person addressed reads the missive, soberly informs the messenger that he is not the right person, or that he can not perform what is asked, but adds that he knows a friend who is able and willing to comply, so he seals up the message in another envelope, which he addresses to somebody still further away. This one in turn goes through the same farce, and in this fashion the poor gowk is hunted from pillar to post until he gives up in despair or begins to suspect the trick or is put wise by some fellow citizen kinder than the others.

It is in allusion to this custom that Poor Robin's Almanac in 1750 asked the pertinent question:

It is a thing to be disputed—
Which is the greatest fool reputed.
That man, who innocently went
Or he that him designedly sept?

Gen. Buckner 90 Years Old.

Munfordville, Ky., April 1.—With a number of relatives and intimate friends as his guests Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner today celebrated his ninetieth birthday anniversary at Glen Lily, his celebrated country home on the Green River, about eight miles from this place. Gen. Buckner has the distinction of being the only remaining corps commander on the Confederate side. He graduated from West Point in 1844 and saw active service in the war with Mexico. In the early part of the civil war, after he had surrendered Forts Henry and Donelson to Gen. Grant, Gen. Buckner was taken prisoner and sent to Fort Warren. In 1862 he was exchanged and placed in command of a division in Hardee's corps, in Bragg's army. He was made a major general and distinguished himself at Murfreesboro and Chickamauga. In 1887 Gen. Buckner was elected governor of Kentucky; and in 1896 he was candidate for vice-president of the United States on the ticket headed by Gen. John M. Palmer of Illinois.

COUNTING MONEY TO BEGIN TODAY

TWO TO FOUR MONTHS WILL BE REQUIRED TO COUNT UNCLE SAM'S HORDE

A BILLION AND A HALF

Paper Money Will be Counted Piece by Piece—Gold and Silver Weighed

Washington, D. C., April 1.—John Burke, former governor of North Dakota, took the oath of office as Treasurer of the United States today and entered upon the duties of his office, succeeding Carmel A. Thompson of Ohio, who had succeeded United States Treasurer Lee McClung in December of 1912. As the law requires that the retiring Treasurer's record of the transfer of funds be verified by actual count of the notes, coin and securities in the Treasury whenever there is a change of Treasurers, the tremendous task of counting the hoard of approximately \$1,500,000,000 contained in the vaults of the National Treasury was begun today. This gigantic task which, it is estimated would take one person about 300 years, will be completed by a small army of trusted employees under the direction and supervision of the committee which Secretary McAdoo has appointed for that purpose, in from two to four months. The work is carried on during office hours only, beginning at 8:30 in the morning and closing at 4:30 in the afternoon. All of the paper money is counted piece by piece, but the gold and silver

coin, usually stored in canvas bags, is counted by weight, unless some error is detected which makes it necessary to open very one of the bags and to count its contents. A test bag, the contents of which have been counted and found correct, is placed upon the scales and balanced against the other bags for verification. Each bag is checked and rechecked before it is returned to the vaults and great precautions are taken to prevent theft. Armed guards stand over the counters and workmen to protect them from interference.

The handling of the coin bags in removing them from the stacks, passing them from hand to hand to the weighing counters and back again to the vaults to be re-stacked is strenuous work requiring considerable physical strength. The counting of the paper money and securities, while not so strenuous, requires great skill and accuracy.

In the course of time there have been many counts of the funds in the United States Treasury, but nearly in every case the actual contents of the vaults correspond exactly with the amounts listed in the books and accounts of the Treasury. In 1885, when the Administration passed into the hands of the Democratic party and a Democratic treasurer succeeded the former Republican incumbent, a deficit of 2 cents was found at the count, but the missing coppers were found behind one of the desks after a few days. A few years ago it was found at one of these counts that one \$1000 bill was missing. The Treasurer made good the amount and was later on reimbursed by Congress.

Upon another occasion, a few years ago, one of the colored men employed at the count to carry coin bags from the vault to the weighing counter and back, stole about 600 silver dollars from the bag, substituting for them lead pieces of the same weight as the silver dollars. He was detected, however, arrested and punished. The detection of the man's dishonesty made it necessary to open every single coin bag in the vaults and to verify their contents by actual count.

The committee entrusted with the task of the count consists of the chief of the public money division, the chief of the loan and currency division and personal representatives of the retiring and the incoming Treasurers. The vaults were turned over to the committee today and carefully closed and sealed. The contents of the vaults will not be disturbed during the count excepting for the purpose of counting the funds. Only enough money to keep the wheels of the government revolving has been kept apart for use while the count is in progress. The vaults will be sealed at the close of every work-

day and will not be removed until the count is completed and the new Treasurer ready to hand his receipt to the predecessor in office. When Carmel Thompson succeeded Lee McClung as Treasurer he received more than \$1,400,000,000. He must account for every cent of that amount, plus the millions he has since received, minus expenditures.

Cardinal at Church Dedication.

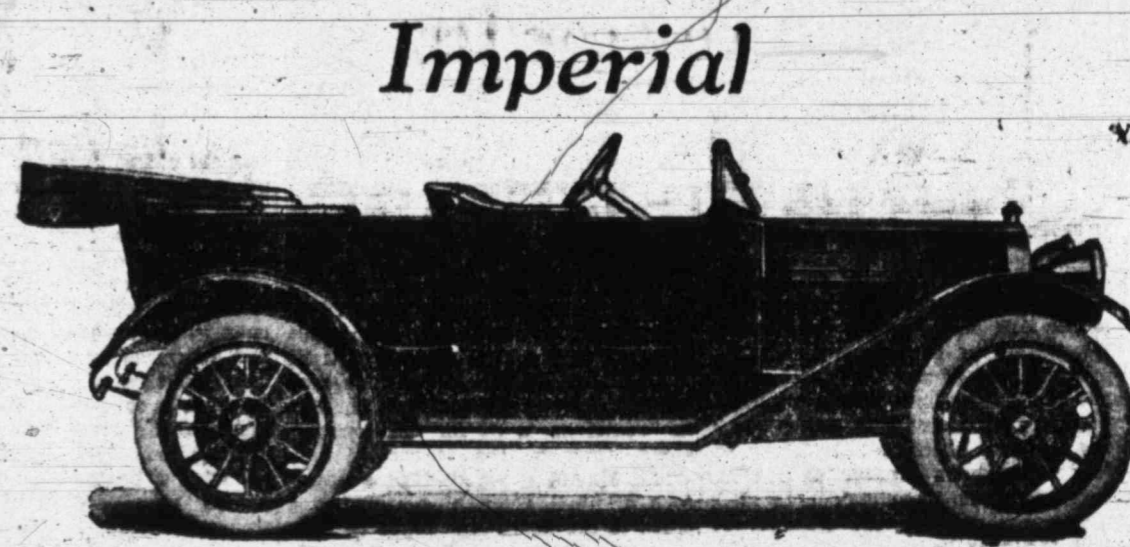
Washington, D. C., April 1.—Rt. Rev. Mgr. Boziano, the apostolic delegate, and Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore took part today in the imposing ceremony attending the dedication of St. Matthew's Church in Rhode Island avenue. The new church is one of the handsomest in Washington, and this, together with the fact that it represents the lifework of its pastor, Rt. Rev. Mgr. Lee, brought about an unusual gathering of church dignitaries. Shortly after 9 o'clock this morning Cardinal Gibbons performed the dedication services. He led the long procession of bishops, priests and acolytes about the exterior walls of the building, sprinkling holy water on the walls and blessing them. Then the procession entered the church, where the Cardinal first blessed the altar and then the interior walls. Pontifical high mass was then celebrated, with Rt. Rev. Mgr. Boziano as the celebrant. The sermon was preached by Archbishop Keane of Dubuque. Other prominent participants in the ceremonies were Bishop Donohue of Wheeling and Bishop O'Connell of Richmond.

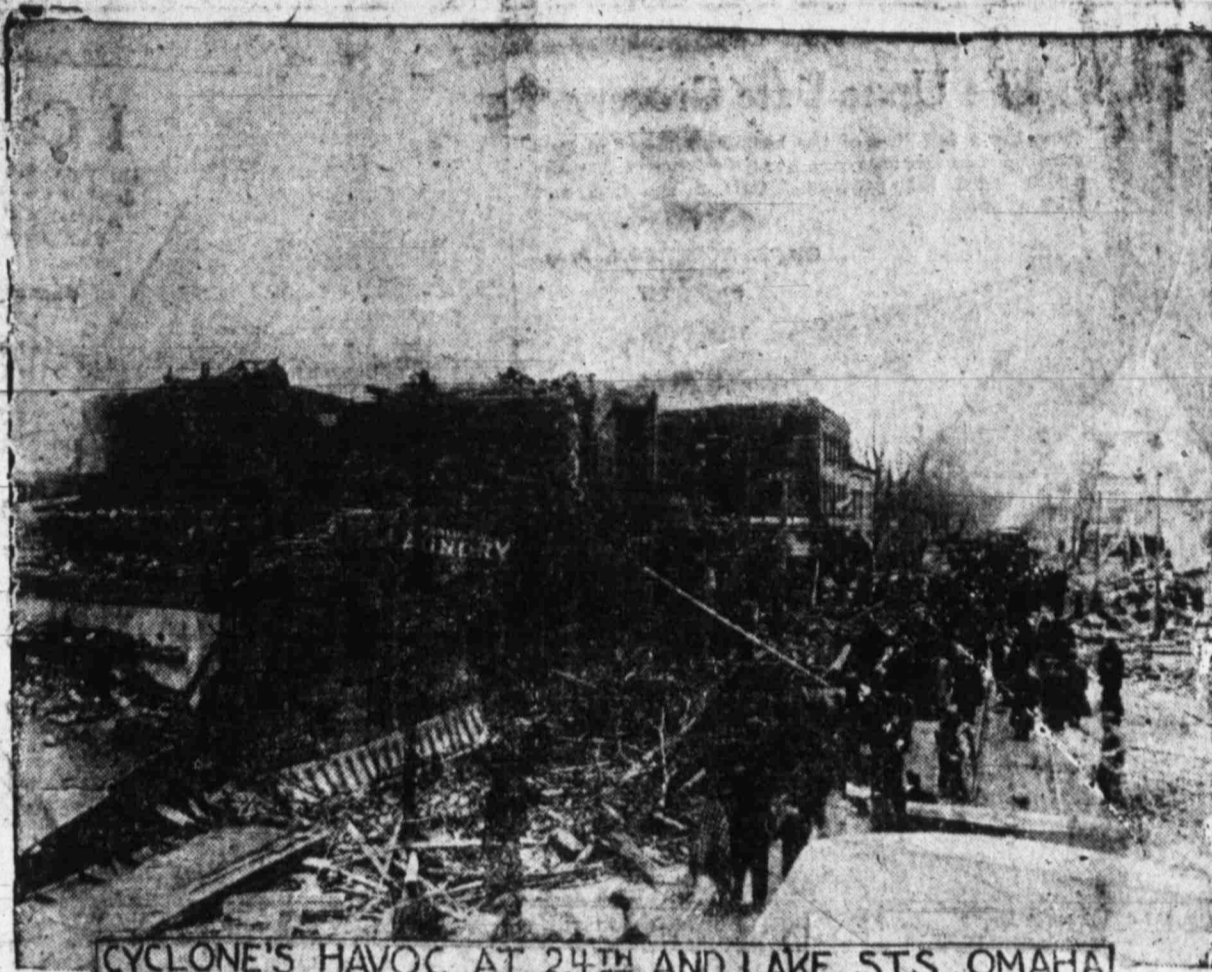

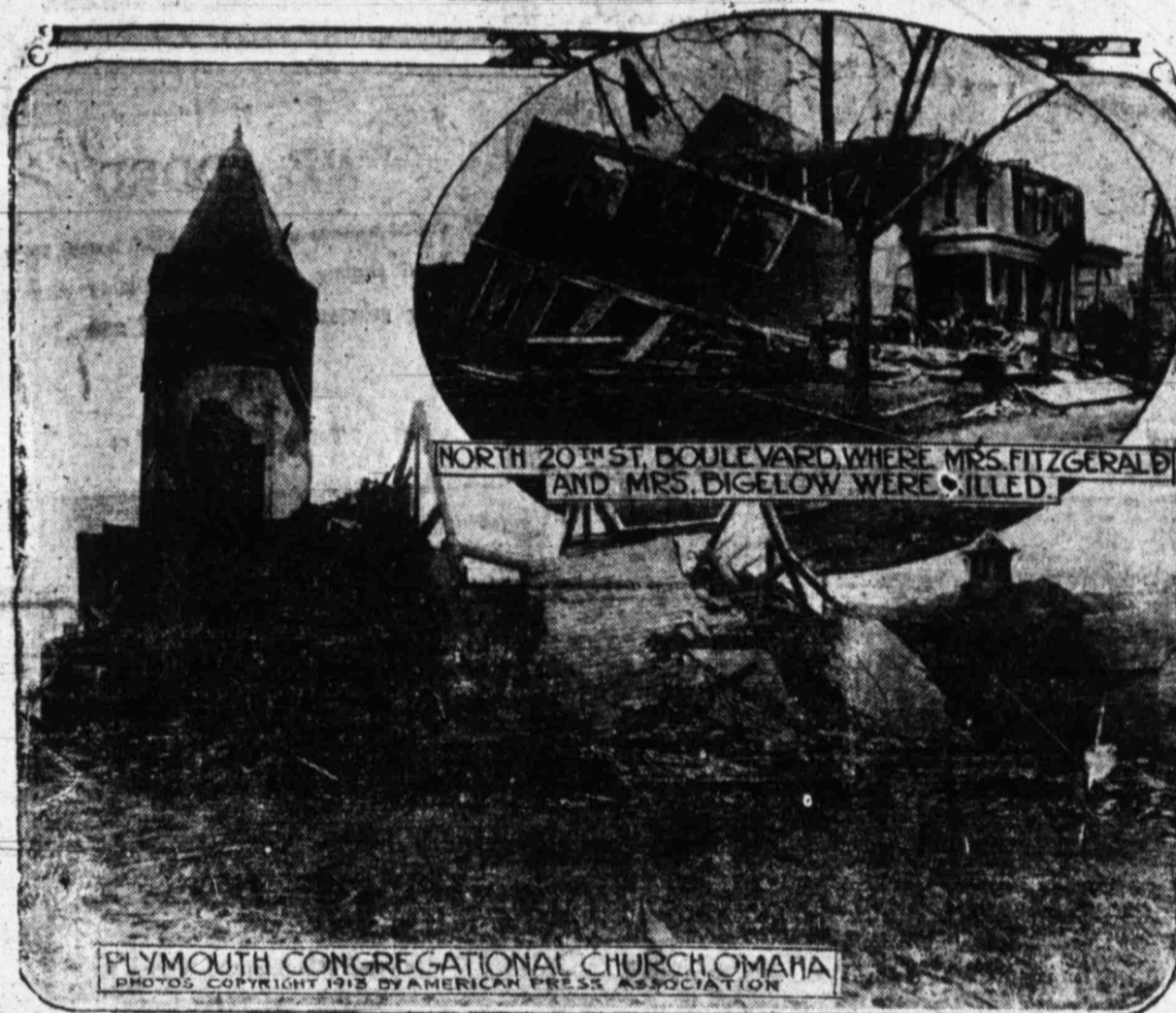

Caswell Ellis of Austin, head of the department of education in the State University and one of the foremost educators in the South, was in the city today to meet with the building-committee of the school board. Dr. Ellis left at noon for Decatur where he will deliver an address tonight.
