GREAT CROWD HEARD PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

SCENE WAS DRAMATIC

WILSON MAKES PROFOUND IM-PRESSION AS HE SPEAKS MAN TO MAN

Revival of Century Old Custon Draws Notable Gathering to Chamber

By Associated Press.
Washington, April 8.—President Wilson stood on the speakers' rostrum in the House today and in person read his first message to Congress. He is the first president since John Adams to exercise that privil-

The revival of a custom abandoned a century ago and viewed with such a wide difference of opinion by members of Congress, attracted a large crowd and the galleries were packed with figures of national prominence. Mrs. Wilson and three daughters and the women of the cabinet being prom inent among these.

The diplomatic galleries contained representatives probably from every country of the world represented by envoys at Washington.

President Avoids Ostentation. Resident Wilson slipped away from the White House after today's cabinet meeting accompanied only by his secretary and one secret service man. Upon reaching the capital he was escorted to the rostrum where Speaker Clark sat at one side and Vice President Marshall at the other.

The president speaking with his usual clarity of tone and notable diction read his message while the com pany, actually packed into the chamber, gave the closest attention. The president was cheered as he mounted dent called attention to the party's the rostrum and shook hands with Speaker Clark and Vice President Marsahll. As he began to speak immediately there was intense silence in the great room.

Every Eye Riveted To Speaker. As the president read on every Eve became riveted to the speaker's stand with its new occupant. Never in the life of any man present had a President of the United States occupied this historic seat. Here was the head of the nation come to assert that he was a person, "a human being come to deal with his fellow men in the control of the nation's destines as a man of force and not as a mere department of the government." It was so unusual to many as to seem almost unreal.

Fellow Feeling Developed. But the president as he spoke a man to man soon developed a fellow feeling among those in the cham-

Throughout his message the president read in a clear voice that carried to every corner of the great hall. Members sat throughout in rapt atention following every word closely A murmur of conversation that sweet over the gallery soon hushed as the tall commanding figure at the clerk's desk read on in commanding but conversational style.

The message referred to no particular schedule, mentioned no rates and included no statistics. It was an enunciation of the President's principles on tariff revision. EXPOSURE AND STARVATION CLAIMS LIEUT. SCHROEDER-STANZ ARTIC PARTY

Four of Them Reach Lands End Telling Fate of Their Companions

Christiana, Norway, April 8 .- Disaster has overtaken the Artic expedition of Lieutenant Schreder-Stanz, and most of the members of his party are believed to have died from exposure and starvation on the ice. Four members of the party succeeded in reaching Lands End today and two others are probably safe at another place. They brought word that the aviator and cook with the party had died of starvation.

Nothing had been heard from Lieut Schroeder Stanz since Aug. 1912.

Robert N. Miller, 213 Lamar, ended his life by shooting himself twice in the breast with a revolver this morning. Death ensued apparently immediately after the shots were fired, although the body was not ound until 1 o'clock this afternoon.

The deceased was 52 years old and has lived in Wichita Falls something over ten years. He owned considerable property in the vicinity of his home and from this and some gardening he made his living. Besides his wife, he leaves one son, Robert by a former marriage who resides at Wellington, Okla., and two daughters, Mabel and Lorena, aged 12 and 14. The body was taken to the Hill undertaking rooms where it will be pre pared for shipment to Bonita, where

SENATORS BY **POPULAR VOTE**

CONNECTICUT COMPLETES ROS-TER OF STATES NECESSARY FOR ITS ADOPTION

Efforts to Secure its Adoption Have Continued More Than Sixty Years

Associated Press. Washington, April 8 .- The propos ed amendment to the federal constitution providing for the popular election of United States senators was ratified by the Connecticut assembly today. It was passed in the House by a vote of 150 to 77 and in the Senate unanimously. It has now been ratified by the requisite number of States and will become effective at

The new amendment to the Constiution, for the popular election of United States senators, is the seven-

teenth to be adopted. It reads: "The Senate of the United Stat shall be composed of two senators from each state, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one yote. The electors in each state shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the

state legislatures. "When vacancies happen in the representation of any state in the Senate, the executive authority of such state shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies, provided that the legislature of any state may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until-

The amendment primarily transfrom the state legislatures to the people at the polls. To effect this change it was necessary to alter the machinery for the filling of vacancies

in the Senate. Sixty Year Fight Ended,

For more than sixty years proposals have been made to change the Constitution so as to provide for the direct election of senators. It was not, however, until June 24, 1911, that the Senate was induced for the first time in its history to give its consent to the change. On that day it voted to submit to the states the proposed amendment. The resolution to submit had already passed the House in a somewhat different form. Before adjournment of the session, both Houses agreed to the language to be employed, and the resolution was deposited with the Secretary of State May 16, 1912 for distribution among

The original theory in establishing the choice of senators was that they represented the states, whereas the members of the House represented the people of their districts. It was because of this theory of the state as a unit that all states, large and small, were given equal representation in the Senate, Rhode Island having the same number as New York or Pennsylvania. In the theory of the Constitution framers this entity of the state was thus made more distinct under the federal system and the state legislature was regarded as the suitable and medium for express ing this state entity. Later it was contended that state entity would still be preserved if the people of the entire state, instead of the legislature, chose the senators, and this view has now been accepted as the basis of the new system.

First Broached In 1826. In 1826 the first action was taken in Congress looking to a change in that year Representative Storrs, of New York, introduced a resolution making senators elective by the peeple. Another resolution of similar import was introduced by Representative Wright of Ohio, in 1829. In 1850 Senator Clemens of Alabama, in troduced the first senatorial direct election resolution in the Senate. Nothing resulted from these move

ments. It was Andrew Johnson who reviewed congressional agitation for the direct election of senators. As a member of the House of Representatives, he introduced two resolutions for the change and in 1860 renewed

WILL GRADE STREETS AND PAVE STREET AND ALLEY, INTER-SECTIONS

PETITION WITH TENTH STREET

Sixty-Seven Property Owners Ask Paving of That Thorough-

A declaration of the city's policy on the paving question, so far as the present council is concerned, was nade last night by the aldermen, who decided that on future requests for paving the city would grade the treet ready for paving, and agree to pave the street and alley intersecions, but that the cost of the paving tself in front of a lot must be borne

by the property owner. The question arose when a petition by 67 property owners on Tenth street, asking for paving of hat thoroughfare, was presented. Mayor Bell said that he wished the city to adopt a definite plan in such cases and the council voted to take the attitude above outlined. When city established the grade, paved the street and alley intersections and then bore a third of the cost of the paving itself. Mayor Bell and the aldermen decided that this would not do for future work.

The Tenth street petition include roperty owners all the way out to Floral Heights and is said to bear he names of 85 per cent of those owning lots on that thoroughfare. It was referred to the street commit tee, which will probably meet with epresentatives of the property owners to decide what material is to be sed, and other details.

With the \$12,000 voted for light which can now be used for street in provements, the city will be able to do its part of the work on Tenti street and the prospect for gettin the street paved is considered bright It is believed that if Tenth street i properly paved, it-will mark the be ginning of a general paving agita ion throughout the residence sec ion; Ninth street property owner. are said to be already making their plans to ask for paving!

GOOD RAIN OVER

PRECIPITATION CAME IN NICK OF TIME FOR THE WHEAT

Oklahoma Covered By Rains

Approximately one and two-thirds inches of rain fell in Wichita Falls last night, coming in the very nick of time for the wheat-erop, putting wa ter into tanks and causing general satisfaction and optimism

The rain appears to have covered all of Northwest Texas and South west Oklahoma and to have benefitted a wide scope of territory, throughou most of which wheat was just begin ning to need moisture. In this county it is doubtful if the crop could have survived another week of dry, windy weather and there was much rejoicing today at the greatly improved outlook.

One way in which the rain helped greatly was in drowning out insects which had begun to make their ap pearance in this section, and it is be lieved that the danger from dage by the pest is greatly reduced. Oats and garden crops were also very greatly helped while the benefit to the cotton farmers is material.

All of Wichita county was visited and while some farmers would have preferred a less driving rain, this i offset by the fact that considerably more water was put into the tank than would have been otherwise.

The rain was heavy from Childres to Fort Worth, on the Benver, and light from Childress north to Amar On the Wichita Falls Route from an inch and a half to two inches fell all the way from Newcastle to Forgan, and from Gainesville on the east to Wellington on the west Along the Wichita Valley there was rain nearly all the way, being light from Peacock to Spur but heavier at the points nearer Wichita Falls. Aside from the duties laid upon articles which we do not, and probably can not, produce, therefore and the duties laid upon luxuries and merely for the sake of the revenues they yield, the object of the tariff duties henceforth laid must be effective competition, the whetting American wits by contest with the with of the rest of the world.

Changes Must Be Well Considered. 



17TH AMENDMENT

FINALLY RATIFIED

(Continued from Page 1)

sent a special message to Congress advocating the measure, and then repeated his recommendations in his annual message.

The subject was revived in 1873, 1876, 1886 and 1888, but without success. In 1893 the House agreed to the proposition, as it did in the succeeding Congress, and still again in 1898, 1900 and 1902. The proposed change on none of these occasions

won a favorable report from committees in the Senate. With the House thus arrayed year after year in favor of the change, the Senate became the battleground. Senator Bristow of Kansas, took the

lead in advocacy of amending the Constitution along this line. In December, 1909, he introduced his first resolution. A year later he obtained a report from the committee, but a feature had been tacked onto his proposal which brought on a fight in the Senate, threatened to kill the entire proposition. This interposed feature was to amend other provisions of the Constitution so as to deprive the federal government of power to supervise the state regulations as to the time, and manner of election. The votes of Southern senators threaten od to defeat the main proposition if the federal government was given this power. Senator Root made a speech in which he criticised the method employed by Southern states in depriving negroes of the right of suffrage. Senator Bacon replied that the federal government was being given the power once more to enact force bills" and send armies and marshals into Southern states to intimidate voters. On February 28, just before the end of the session, the resolution was defeated by four votes.

Senator Bristow reintroduced the resolution in the special session im mediately following. The fight on the preceeding session was refought, but this time the friends of the resolution won by a vote of 64 to 24, or five more than the required two-thirds.

The House had passed a resolution which made it clear the federal gov ernment was not to interfere with senatorial elections in the states. For weeks the measure was in confer ence. Finally the House conferees receded and the House agreed to the Senate measure by a vote of 237 to

Previous to this time, the several states had taken the bit in their teeth by enacting laws which in effect did not wait for a constitutional amendment on the subject. Probably the most successful, of these was adopted in Oregon. It virtually directed the members of the legislature to elect the person who received the majority vote at the regular election, when the placing of the name of a candidate for United States senator upon the tickets was authorized.

The control of legislatures by great

corporations was assigned by Senator

Bristow as one of the main reasons

for the demanded change. "With the development during recent times of the great corporate interests of the country," said he, "and the increased mportance of legislation realting to their affairs, they have tenaciously sought to control the election of senators friendly to their interests. The power of these great financial and industrial institutions can be very ef fectively used in the election of senators by legislators, and they have many times during recent years used that power in a most reprehensible and scandalous manner. They have spent enormous amounts of money in corrupting legislatures to elect to the Senate men of their own choosing." One of the first speeches made in the Senate during the twenty-year crusade for the change in favor of the direct election was by . Senator Turple of Indiana. In that speech he declared that the election of senators by legislatures was the one blemish on the democracy which was embod ied in the American government. One of the most notable speeches

ever made in opposition to the change was that of Senator Hoar of Massa chusetts, in 1893. He stated the ob ject of the election of senators by legislatures instead of by the people had been to remove one of the two bodies of legislation" from the operation of the fleeting passions of the hour, to lay its foundation below the frost, and to remove the appointment of the men who are to compose it, as far as may be, from the temporary excitements which so often move the "I am not afraid to say to the Am

of senators going on the regualr ballots. Should any state fail to do so it has been suggested that Congress might exercise its power of supervising that state's voting regulations so as to require the name to be placed on the ballats.

The first senators to be elected by the new method will be those who take their seats for the term beginning March 4, 1915. They will be



"WHITE WAY" HAS SECOND ALSO BEEN ABANDONED

ARC LIGHTS WILL BE INSTALLED INSTEAD OF ORNAMENTAL

pany and Bond Money Will be Used for Other Purposes

There will be no "white way" in the business district. Instead, a number of arc lights will be installed without cost except for maintenance and the \$12,000 voted will be used to

The council last night, by a vote of 3 to 2, decided against the proposed ornamental system and in favor of the arc lights; the light and power company will put in 33 of the new lights and maintain them for \$198 per month. No part of the \$12,000 will be spent for installation. The lights will be better and brighter than those in use and will be in on Ohio, Indiana, Scott and Lamar from Sixth to Tenth and on Eighth and Ninth as far out as Burnett. The vote of council was

Yeas-Bradley, Reed, Young-3. Nays-Gardner, Richolt-2.

When the lighting proposition came up for discussion, the councilmen, in the absence of any representatives of electrical concerns "came clean" and frankly admitted that they were hope lessly at sea as to the ornamental system. It had been discovered that the posts and lights could not be installed at anywhere near the propos ed cost and that the expense of maintenance would be far in excess of what the city could afford to pay Some of the estimates for the ornamental system were \$10,000 in ex cess of what it had been expected to pay and the very lowest estimate which provided for a very cheap post was \$11,325.

Inability to secure definite inform ation and figuers as to cost of current and maintenance and other difficulties had also served to prevent the alder men's path from being smooth and rosy and the counter proposition by the Wichita Falls Power and Light Company, providing for the arc light system, was given more serious consideration than had been hitherto ac corded it, It was discussed fully at length, with final results as above stated.

It developed in the discussion that Mayor Bell had never been in favor of the ornamental sytsem and also that a number of property owners were not enthused over the idea; this. coupled with the certain knowledge that the expenditure of all the money in the business section would bring vigorous protests from folks in the residence district, prompted the council to-give up, not without a sigh, the plan to install the ornamental

Although the arc light system will be far less ornamental than the other plan, it will not only cover much more territory, but it will mean better lighted streets downtown, in the opinion of the councilmen.

The new plan does not entail the expenditure of any of the \$12,000 voted for "street improvement;" the bonds were voted that way because the general law does not permit voting of bonds for lights. This money can now be used for other street work and in view of the agitation for paving Tenth street, it seems fairly certain that it will be used to do the city's part of the work on that thoroughfare if the plans go through
