GOOD RAIN OVER ENTIRE SECTION

PRECIPITATION CAME IN NICK OF TIME FOR THE WHEAT CROP

NEARLY TWO INCHES HERE

All Northwest Texas and Southwest Oklahoma Covered By Rains

Approximately one and two-thirds inches of rain fell in Wichita Falls last night, coming in the very nick of time for the wheat-crop, putting water into tanks and causing general satisfaction and optimism.

The rain appears to have covered all of Northwest Texas and Southwest Oklahoma and to have benefitted a wide scope of territory, throughout most of which wheat was just beginning to need moisture. In this county it is doubtful if the crop could have survived another week of dry, windy weather and there was much rejoicing today at the greatly improved outlook.

One way in which the rain helped greatly was in drowning out insects which had begun to make their appearance in this section, and it is believed that the danger from damage by the pest is greatly reduced. Oats and garden crops were also very greatly helped while the benefit to the cotton farmers is material.

All of Wichita county was visited and while some farmers would have preferred a less driving rain, this is offset by the fact that considerably more water was put into the tanks than would have been otherwise.

The rain was heavy from Childress to Fort Worth on the Beaver, and high from Childress north to Amarillo. On the Wichita Falls Route, from an inch and a half to two inches fell all the way from Newcastle to Forgan, and from Gainesville on the east to Wellington on the west. Along the Wichita Valley there was rain nearly all the way, being light from Peacock to Spur but heavier at the points nearer Wichita Falls. Byers and Petroff had about the same amount as Wichita Falls, Holliday and Dundee had heavy showers. Seymour had one and a quarter inches, Bonarton and Goree one inch and Monday two inches.

MOTORS INSTALLED IN "TRAILER" CARS

Summer Street Cars Will be Put into Service This Week

Two big summer street cars will be put into service by the traction company this week, being the old long trailers with motors installed. The cars are considered ideal for summer use, being open on both sides and with ample seating space.

These cars have been nick named "hobble skirt cars" by traction company employes, on account of the fact that the high body and steps make it almost impossible for a woman wearing a hobble skirt to get on one of them without assistance. The step is three inches higher than that on ordinary street cars.

With the rolling stock already in service, these new cars will enable the traction company to handle almost any crowds that occasion requires.

MINOR DAMAGE FROM LAST NIGHT'S STORM

The high wind which accompanied last night's rain caused some damage in this city and vicinity, though nothing serious occurred and the damage was confined mostly to chimneys, barns and outhouses.

The most serious damage was to the Lutheran Trinity church at the corner of Fourteenth and Bluff streets; this church is only partially completed and was considerably torn by the wind, the damage being probably \$350. Other damage includes:

Several negro cabins across the railroad tracks were damaged and there was some minor damage in North Wichita. The total in this city will probably not exceed \$1000.

WICHITA COUNTY HAS \$40,000 IN TREASURY

Wichita county now has over \$40,000 in its treasury, as a result of tax collections since the first of the year this being more money than the county has had on hand at one time for some months. The money is distributed as follows: Jury fund, \$1015.11; road and bridge fund, \$29,323.49; old interest and sinking fund, \$3546.28; special interest and sinking fund, \$2959.54; third class fund, \$6977.97; fourth class, \$2730.27; jail interest and sinking fund, \$1810.14; special bridge fund, \$647.34.

United States Senators will now be elected by direct vote of the people. Connecticut was the last state to ratify his amendment to the Constitution, making its adoption by the necessary two-thirds vote of the states as required. This is one of the many political reforms persistently advocated by the National Democratic party.

Nearly always rains in this country just at a time when rain will do the most good. That of last night will be sufficient to carry the wheat and oats crops through this month, and with a few more moderately good ones during the first half of May ought to be all that is needed to mature the crop. There is no doubt, but that the rain was needed badly and the small grain crops would have suffered greatly if not entirely ruined had the rain not fallen at this time. As it is now, there is no reason why an average good crop of both wheat and oats should not be harvested.

It is now certain that the oil well brought in on the Hugh Kelly tract, located about 10 miles north of this city is a better producer than has yet been brought in in the Burk Burnett field. Some say it will produce at least 150 barrels daily. If that estimate proves correct it will mean much for Wichita Falls and Wichita county. The total daily production of the Elberta and Burk Burnett oil fields is now right at 20,000 barrels. One year from now the total for all the oil wells in the county is likely to be two or three times that amount.

The effort to consolidate or merge the A. & M. College with the State University has failed. This was accomplished after the legislators had paid a visit to the A. & M. College. The visit was made a majority of the law-makers were inclined to accept the merger proposition, but on their return a large majority were fully convinced of the necessity of the State of Texas maintaining in a manner it should, both institutions. It was a wrong idea to begin with. Texas is going forward. Not backward. To have closed down the Agricultural and Mechanical College would have been to take a backward step.

order to maintain a practically exclusive market against the rest of the world. Consciously or unconsciously we have built up a set of privileges and exemptions from competition behind which it was easy by any, even the crudest forms of combination to organize monopoly; until at last nothing is normal, nothing is obliged to stand the tests of efficiency and economy, in our world of big business, but everything thrives by concerted arrangement. Only new principles of action will save us from a final hard crystallization of monopoly and a complete loss of the influences that quicken enterprise and keep in dependent energy alive.

Must Abolish Privilege.
"It is plain what those principles must be. We must abolish everything that bears even the semblance of privilege or of any kind of artificial advantage, and put our business men and producers under the stimulation of a constant necessity to be efficient, economical and enterprising, masters of competitive supremacy, better workers and merchants than any in the world. Aside from the duties laid upon articles which we do not, and probably can not, produce, therefore, and the duties laid upon luxuries and merely for the sake of the revenues they yield, the object of the tariff duties henceforth laid must be effective competition, the whetting of American wits by contest with the wits of the rest of the world."
Changes Must Be Well Considered.
"It would be unwise to move toward this end headlong, with reckless haste, or with strokes that cut at the very roots of what has grown up amongst us by long process and at our own invitation. It does not alter a thing to upset it and break it and deprive it of a chance to change. It destroys it. We must make changes in our fiscal laws, in our fiscal system, whose object is development, a more free and wholesome development, not revolution or upset or confusion. We must build up trade especially foreign trade. We

need the outlet and the enlarged field of energy more than we ever did before. We must build up industry as well, and must have freedom in the place of artificial stimulation only so far as it will help, not pull down. In dealing with the tariff the method by which this may be done will be a matter of judgment, exercised item by item. To some not accustomed to the excitements and responsibilities of greater freedom our methods may in some respects and at some points seem heroic, but remedies may be heroic and yet be remedies. It is our business to make sure that they are genuine remedies. Our object is clear. If our motive is above just challenge and paly an occasional error of judgment is chargeable against us, we shall be fortunate.

Responsibility Must Be Met.
"We are called upon to render the country a great service in more matters than one. Our responsibility should be met and our methods should be thorough, as thorough as moderate and well considered, based upon the facts as they are, and not worked out as if we were beginners. We are to deal with the facts of our own day, with the facts of no other, and to make laws which square with those facts. It is best, indeed it is necessary, to begin with the tariff. I will urge nothing upon you now at the opening of your session which can obscure that first object or divert our energies from that clearly defined duty. At a later time I may take the liberty of calling your attention to reforms which should press close upon the heels of the tariff changes, if not accompany them, of which the chief is the reform of our banking and currency laws; but just now I refrain. For the present, I put those matters on one side and think only of this one thing--of the changes in our fiscal system which may best serve to open once more the free channels of prosperity to a great people whom we would serve to the utmost and throughout both rank and file.
