OPPOSITION COMBINES

Democrats of Several States Will Fight for Tax on Raw Wool

By Associated Press Washington, April 16.—"Fifteen percent ad valorem duty on raw wool" was the slogan of the opposition to the free wool clause of the new tariff bill, when the Democratic caucus resumed its session today.

At an early morning conference Democratic members from Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and a number of Western States decided to make a stand for a fifteen per cent duty.

Chairman Underwood was in conference with President Wilson this morning after which he said he believed the tariff bill would be accepted by the caucus and passed to the House within three or four days.

"I wish there was some way to get at steam laundries through the tariff" said a clerk at the session of the democratic caucus this afternoon when the schedule on this class of goods was under discussion.

HENRY M'CAULEY DANGEROUSLY WOUNDED

Bullet Wound Through Stomach and Right Thigh—Officers Searching for Negro

As the result of a bullet wound last night Henry McCauley is lying at the Wichita Sanitarium in a very critical condition.

The shooting took place about 9:30 o'clock in the rear of 1411 Tenth street, near a cabin occupied by a negro named Abbie Bryson.

Just what was the cause of the shooting is not known. McCauley has refused to make any statement other than that the negro shot him and that he himself had no gun.

Upon hearing the shooting Dr. Bell and Dr. Smith went to the scene and found McCauley lying in the alley. He was perfectly conscious and told where he was shot.

Investigations are being made by the officers to discover if possible what led up to the shooting.

BELGIUM GOVERNMENT ALREADY BEGINNING TO FEEL EFFECTS OF SHORTAGE

MORE JOIN THE STRIKE

Government estimates Strikers at 277,000—Socialists Say Number is 400,000

By Associated Press Brussels, April 16.—According to a statement of the secretary of the interior it is estimated that 277,000 have joined the strike of the Belgian workmen as a means of gaining manhood suffrage and the abolition of the law giving wealthy citizens the privilege of plural voting in some instances.

The Socialist leaders claim that more than 400,000 are now in the ranks of the strikers. It is stated that the Belgian government is finding its supply of coal for the operation of its railways running short and that the fuel supply is likely to be exhausted by the end of the week.

Lack of fuel for the electric power and gas plants will also prevent many non-strikers from working. Absence of disorder continues to mark the progress of the strike.

BURKBURNETT TO HAVE MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION.

Secretary Thomas of the Chamber of Commerce and B. J. Bean left Wichita Falls early this afternoon for Burk Burnett where they will assist merchants of that town in organizing a retail merchants' association.

They will make the trip to Burk Burnett, which is about fifteen miles distant from Wichita Falls in Mr. Bean's automobile.

They expect to return this evening after they have completed their work. Burk Burnett is one of the towns which has enjoyed prosperity since the extensive opening up of the oil fields.

CHILD RESCUED ONCE RUNS INTO FLAMES

Paris, Texas, April 16.—Fire this morning destroyed the residence of J. E. Smith at New Boston.

The flames had spread over most of the house when Mr. Smith was awakened. He first carried his three year old daughter, Carrie to a point of safety and then went back into the house for his older children.

COUPLE ARE REMARRIED TO MAKE CERTAIN.

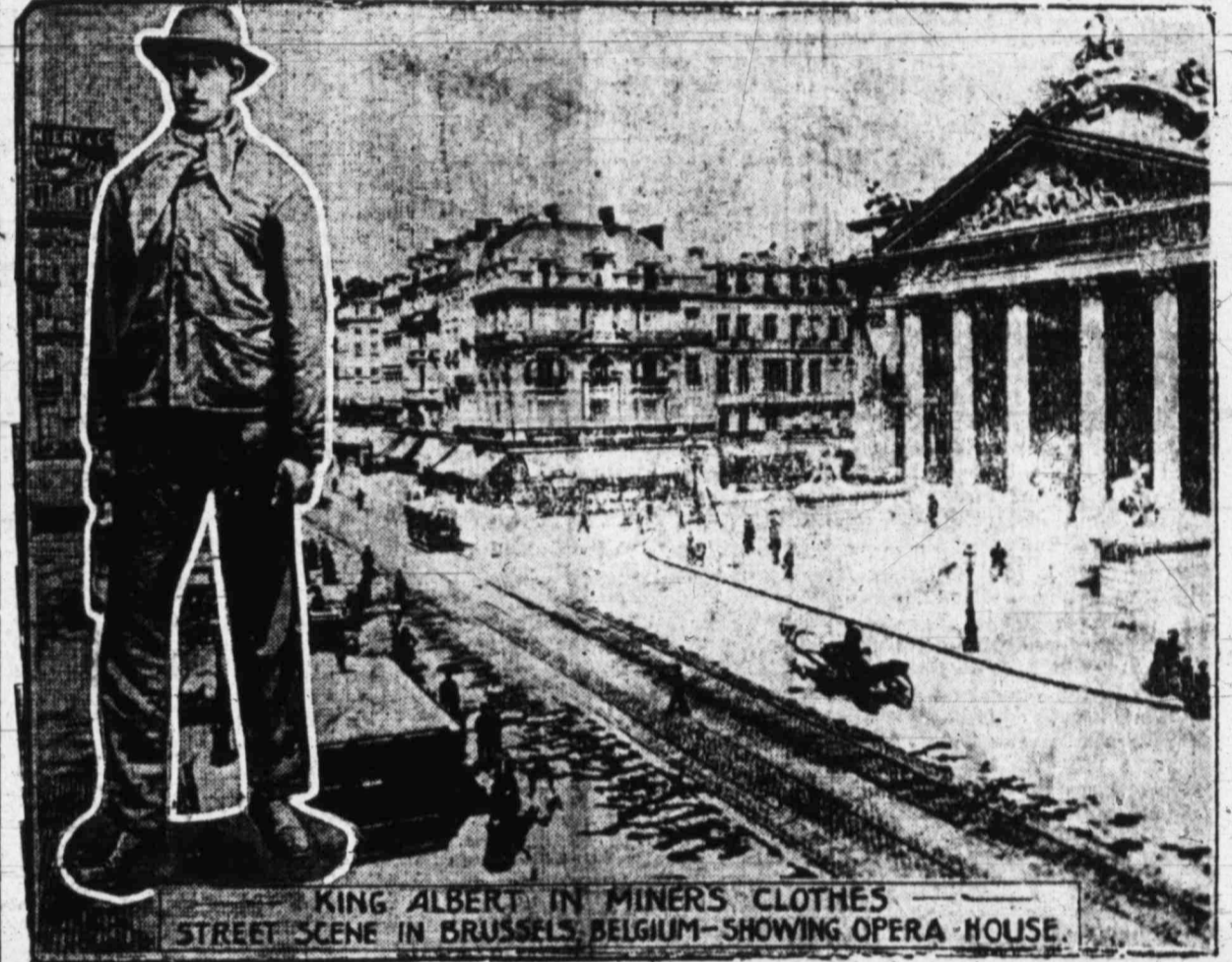
Chicago, April 16.—Remarriage as a method of overcoming possible invalidation of hundreds of marriages in Illinois was suggested by Judge A. D. Pettit today in the circuit court here.

Judge Pettit recently ruled that the divorce suit of William M. Marshall, a horseman, was without merit, as the couple had been married within a year from the time the woman had been divorced from her first husband.

Mrs. Marshall today told the court she was willing to be remarried to Marshall in order to establish the legitimacy of their 2 year old son. Her husband, however, refused to go through another ceremony.

Mrs. Marshall's attorney explained after court that his client's attitude was due to a desire to preserve his rights and status as an alleged injured husband in the case at bar.

TO JAIL FOR YEAR FOR KILLING MAN

Houston Defendant Charged With Murder Convicted for Aggravated Assault

Wright, just before noon today returned a verdict finding the defendant guilty of aggravated assault and fixed his punishment at one year in jail.

The jury evidently gave full credence to Bradley's story that he had killed Wright with his flat after the latter had attacked him, and had then carried his body in an automobile to the bayou and had sunk it in the water.

DENISON TOOK OPENING GAME

INDIFFERENT WORK IN FIELD GAVE VISITORS VICTORY BY A NARROW MARGIN

DRILLERS LACKED "PEP"

Game Witnessed by a Splendid Crowd—Opening Ceremony Amusing

A large gathering of local fans witnessed the defeat of the Drillers yesterday at the City Park in the opening game of the season, when the visiting Denison nine won from the home team by a score of 10 to 9.

The game proved a veritable "comedy of errors." Bobby Myers, twirling for the Drillers, was in excellent form, but was given rotten support. Holding the visitors to six hits, kept well scattered he deserved to win his game, but his support proved unsteady throughout, the local nine making as many errors as their victors did runs. Out of three times at bat Myers got two hits, one going for three bases the latter hit coming in the third inning started a fast feet that piled up six runs for the locals and should have clinched the game as the visitors were hitting poorly, and gained but three tallies, two coming in the first inning and one in the second.

This Lead Should Have Cinched the Game.

With the score six to three in favor of the Drillers at the beginning of the fourth, errors and hits coming together allowed their opponents to garner five more runs which gave them a lead the locals never overcame. The visitors through two more errors and a single gained another pair of counts in the fifth inning. Given better support Myers held them down through the remainder of the game.

Redford started the game twirling for the Denison nine. With excellent support he held the Drillers down through two frames, but in the third inning following a walk and a three bagger by Myers he blew up and the local sluggers got to his delivery for three two baggers and a single, scoring five runs. Redford with two out and a man on second was jerked and replaced by Halslip. Shell at bat grounded out and ended the base parade which had been heartily enjoyed by the enthusiastic rooters.

Another Chance in the Ninth.

In the fourth, fifth and sixth innings the Drillers were held hitless and runless, but rallied in the seventh, two men crossing the platter or a pair of singles and a boot. In the ninth inning with the score standing 10 to 8 in the visitors favor with two men out Brown walked to first Kizzlar followed with a two bagger scoring Brown and Phillips singled advancing Kizzlar to third. The score was now 10 and 9. With a Driller on third it looked like there was still a chance for the locals to tie the game and romp home to victory. Many fans having given up hopes had left the grand stand, but the few remaining were disappointed when Walverde used as a pinch hitter in the emergency by Captain Morris failed to touch the sphere, fanning easily and ending all chance for a victory. The game was lost through Myers' poor support, and through the inability of the Drillers to get by Denison's infield after Halslip entered the box in the third inning.

Denison Fast Fielding.

Two sensational plays were pulled off by two Denison players. In the fifth inning Brown hit a high ball into the crowd at the left of the grand stand. Brooks running from the other side of third and pushing his way through the crowd of kids gathered near the stand caught the sphere, making one of the prettiest plays of the game. Wakefield, center fielder for Denison speared Shell's fly to deep center in the sixth inning, after a strenuous effort on what had already by many been scored as a hit.

With better team work and a little more "pep" the local boys should take the visitors down the line in the next two games. Allowances can be made for their failure yesterday considering the game to be the first of the season. The local nine have four new players in the lineup. When they get together better and begin playing steady ball if the twirling staff proves capable we look for better exhibitions than that of yesterday.

Old Timers Start Game.

Preceding the game, following the automobile parade from town to the park, a little humor was injected into the fans when Mayor Bell stepped up to the pitcher's box and twirled the first ball of the season over the platter. Going through the usual gyrations of a big league twirler the doctor threw the sphere to Nat Henderson, backstopping, who failed to gather the first two which were low and were announced as balls by Mr. Kemp, acting as umpire. Wiley Blair at bat proved a good watter however. The third ball pitched went straight over the plate. Blair fanned the air and Henderson made a perfect stop. Blair was confident that he could hit another one like that, but wasn't given a chance. The mayor after wiggling his fingers hurled a speedy splitter which some say cur-

ed at least two yards. Blair failed to get out of the way and as the splitter was also an inshoot it connected with the heavy weight slugger's anatomy. After recovering he threw his bat at the mayor and the onlookers cheered.

Redford was replaced by Halslip and Shell grounded out to Halslip ending the play.

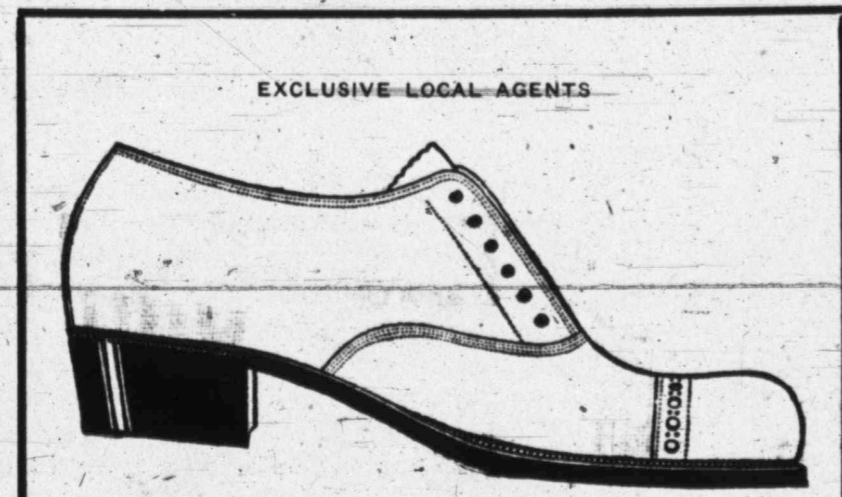
