WOOL INTERESTS IN DEM-OCRATIC CAUCUS

Fight for Tax on Raw

By Associated Press Washington, April 16 .- "Fifteen percent advalorem duty on raw wool' was the slogan of the opposition to the free wool clause of the new tariff bill, when the Democratic caucus resumed its session today. In concert with New England and Southern anti-free wool and cotton members they plan an attack on schedule A. This schedule will probably come before the caucus before the close of the day.

At an early morning conference Democratic members from Indiana, Ohlo, Kentucky and a number of Western States decided to make a stand for a fifteen per cent duty.

Chairman Underwood was in conference with President Wilson this morning after which he said he believed the tariff bill would be accepted by the caucus and passed to the House within three or four days. He predicted there would be no important changes in the bill when adopted by the caucus.

"I wish there was some way to ge at steam laundries through the tariff" said a clerk at the session of the democratic caucus this afternoon when the schedule on this class of goods was under discussion. "A laundry can ruin a perfectly good collar with the greatest ease and there must be some sort of a combination between the laun drymen and the manufacturers."

HENRY M'CAULEY

Bullet Wound Through Stomach and Right Thigh-Officers Search-

As the result of a bullet wound CHILD RESCUED ONCE at the Wichita Sanitarium in a very critical condition. He is shot in the naval, the bullet ranging up through the gall and liver and then down ward, coming out through the right thigh.

The shooting took place about 9:30 o'clock in the rear of 1411 Tenth street, near a cabin occupied by a negress named Abbie Bryson. The Bryson woman is also suffering from a flesh wound in the leg, supposed to have been caused by the spent bullet after it had gone through Mc-Cauley, Sid Thomas, a negro man is supposed to have done the shooting and is being hunted by the officers. Up to noon, however, he had not been found, although the sheriff's department and the city police force have had a drag net; out for him all night and today.

Just what was the cause of the shooting is not known. McCauley has refused to make any statement Tother than that the negro shot him and that he himself had no gun. A 38-calibre automatic revolver was found about ten feet from where Mc-Cauley was picked up. It had three loaded shells and one empty one, and is being kept for identification and as evidence. Neighbors in the vicinity as well as negroes who were present, say there were two shots fired.

Upon hearing the shooting Dr. Bell and Dr. Smith went to the scene and found McCauley lying in the alley. He was perfectly conscious and told where he was shot. He was removed to his home and Dr. Guest, who is the family physician was summoned Dr. Guest decided that an operation would be necessary and had him removed to the sanitarium. Dr. Harris of Fort Worth was then called by phone and upon his arrval on the early morning train the wound was probed and incisions made to discover the extent of the wound. The physicians state that McCauley has a chance for recovery but that it is

RUNNING SHORT

OPPOSITION COMBINES MORE JOIN THE STRIKE

Democrats of Several States Will Government stimates Strikers at 277,000-Socialists Say Number is 400,000

> By Associated Press.
> Brussels, April 16.—According to a statement of the secretary of the interior it is estimated that 277,000 have joined the strike of the Belgian workmen as a means of gaining manhood suffrage and the abolition of the law giving wealthy citizens the privilege of plural voting in some instances.

The Socialist leaders claim that more than 400,000 are now in the ranks of the strikers.

It is stated that the Belgian government, is finding its supply of coal for the operation of its railways running short and that the fuel supply is likely to be exhausted by the end of the week. Practically all of the miners are out.

Lack of fuel for the electric power and gas plants will also prevent many non-strikers from working. Absence of disorder continues to mark the progress of the strike.



Romance is of the actual rather han of ideal, or imagined world. strangeness is essential to romance, and nothing which the imagination creates can be strange or alien. Travel into an unknown region and among peoples with unusual customs brings the surprise and excitement of romance. Fancy is a roamer rather than a creator and may produce the same effect, simulatively, fashion ing and appareling at will its be wildering scene. But fancy does not peed, for such effects, to go into a

Indeed. M. w on the stage in the old Greek comedy. with his fantastic disguises, was of his day, for tragedy, though throws back into the remote past, dwelt up on what was impressively familiar making it still more so to the Greek imagination; it was intimately af fecting rather than romantic.

The wonders of the creative imag ination have always this familiarity. It is not the real but the "fake" ghost that seems alien.
