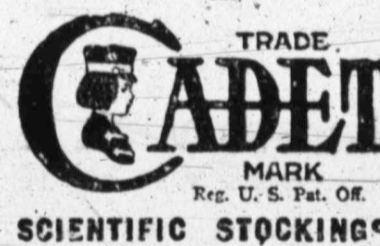

This woman suffrage business, in the judgment of this paper, is a matter that should be left entirely with the women themselves to settle. We confess, however, that it does make us just a little weary to hear some fellows say: "Let the women stay at home and take care of it and the children and keep out of politics." The chances are that the fellow who makes that kind of remark has not been thoughtful enough himself to provide a home for his wife and children. The only real reason that can be urged against extending suffrage to women is that matters politics are dirty, and the men themselves have made conditions that way. What is needed is a clean ballot, and if by granting suffrage to women will have a tendency to make the ballot more sacred and pure, then only those who oppose purifying the ballot can consistently oppose extending suffrage to women. Not many of the women would exercise the privilege if it were extended, but they are more entitled to the right to vote than some men who are severe in their criticism, but have not sense enough to cast an intelligent ballot. They merely look upon and regard their suffrage as something given them by the government to turn into cash, and the fellow who pays the most for it gets it. It is mostly from this class of our citizenship that the greatest opposition to woman's suffrage comes.

Protestants will join in with Catholics in commending and giving praise to Father Heckmann, the Catholic, priest who took upon himself to have arrested a man by the name of Ed Munz a farmer residing near Temple, for whipping unmercifully a boy he had taken to raise in return for the work the little fellow could do for his "vittles and clothes." The name of this boy is Earl Blake, and from photo graphs appearing in the newspapers showing him nude to the waist, the warts left by the quilt are observable. The boy is only eight years old, and Munz flogged him because he told a "lie." This being that the boy was told to water the chickens, and instead of getting the water from a well, he took it from a cistern, because, perhaps, it was handier, and did not make much difference. For this Munz flogged him unmercifully; and the matter was called to the attention of this Catholic priest who got busy immediately by taking charge of the boy and having the brute who flogged him placed under arrest. On his trial, Munz was fined in one case \$1,000, and in another \$500, and given a sentence of two years in the county jail. He is well-to-do and has paid both fines, but the chances are that he will be compelled to serve out every day of his two years sentence on the county roads. The jury gave him the limit of the law, and in this instance, the limit was not enough. The man who will abuse a child is not the kind of citizen any community needs. Suit for damages in the name of the abused child have been instituted, and the chances are that if the case ever goes to trial a verdict will be rendered for all that is asked for. Had it not been for Father Heckmann, it is not likely that Munz would have been molested. Judging from his name, Munz must have been a Catholic in faith, but that fact did not shield him in the eyes of the priest.

CONDEMNNS ATTORNEY GENERAL'S ACTION.

(By Holland S. Reavis, Editor Fuel Oil Journal, Houston), Editor Times: I have read in the Times of April 23rd a letter concerning suit against the Magnolia Petroleum Company and Corsicana Petroleum Company, in which the people of Texas are asked to support the attorney general in the proceeding.

I am one of many persons in no way connected with the Magnolia Petroleum Company who believe that the company has been, and is, a law abiding organization, that its presence in the oil trade has been of benefit both to consumers and producers of oil, and that any effort to harass it, or embarrass it, through persecution or prosecution, is solely in the interest of certain of its competitors.

The campaign to get the Magnolia's "goat" was started by officials of the Texas Company at the pipe line hearing in Houston in September, 1911. At that time, they laid what was intended to be the foundation for agitation

and prosecution. Publicity on behalf of their scheme was invoked on October 1, 1911, in the form of a full page article in a Houston daily newspaper, aimed at the Magnolia. They did not permit themselves to be quoted, but they gave the writer of the article a lot of stuff calculated to prejudice the public of Texas against the Magnolia Company. This story was "pre-arranged" all over Texas. The efforts put forth to have it reproduced in as many newspapers as possible betrayed the purpose behind it. They were working up "sentiment."

Last summer the H. Clay Pierce interests, now on very friendly terms with the Texas Company, took a hand. Through their agents and employees they brought about the indictment of the Magnolia Company, and some of its officeholders and stockholders in the Federal court at Dallas in August. Mr. Wickersham, the then attorney general of the United States, made a careful inquiry, found no evidence to support the charges, located the nigger in the wood-pile, and ordered the indictments dismissed.

But the gentlemen who are out to get the Magnolia's "goat" were industrious. There was no time to be lost. The Magnolia, attending strictly to its business, and not tinkering with politics; was preparing to enter Oklahoma as a purchaser of crude oil and a marketer of refined products. The Texas Company and the Pierce people are buying crude and selling refined in Oklahoma. Additional competition either in the purchase of crude or the sale of refined is not desirable from their standpoint.

The fact that the Magnolia contemplated entering Oklahoma was made public on Friday, February 28th. On March 5th, just five days later, Mr. Looney, the attorney general, rushed over from Austin to his home town, Greenville, clapped an onster and penny suit on the Magnolia; had a receiver appointed for the company without giving the company a chance to raise a hand; had his former law partners, Clark & Leddy, of Greenville, named as attorneys for the receivers and in various ways made the proceedings quite a family affair.

All of which was very rough on the Magnolia Company, but most acceptable to its competitors. Mr. Richard G. Maury, criminal district attorney of Harris county, Texas, upon whose affidavits the suit is based, has made the statement that he worked up the matter on his own initiative, without influence or suggestion from any source, and that he is not affiliated in any way with any company which would be benefited by the crippling of the Magnolia.

Will he kindly give a public a little light on the circumstances related in the following dispatch from St. Louis, which appeared in Texas newspapers on April 9th:

"St. Louis, April 9th.—Oil men from St. Louis and elsewhere are wondering if there is any significance in the visit of W. H. Gray, an attorney in the employ of the Waters, Pierce Oil Company, and Richard G. Maury to St. Louis. They registered at the Planters Hotel simultaneously Saturday and occupied the same room. Attorney General B. P. Looney recently filed out proceedings against the Magnolia Petroleum Company, and the Corsicana Petroleum Company, an affiliated concern, as they were preparing to enter the Oklahoma fields. The Standard Oil Company was also made a party to the suit. Maury, who is criminal district attorney of Harris county is associated with Looney in the suit."

Is Mr. Gray interested with Mr. Maury in the suit? If not, why this intimacy between the representatives of the state and the representative of the H. Clay Pierce interests, business competitors of the Magnolia?

Will Mr. Maury give the public all the details of his dealings and understandings with Mr. Gray in the Magnolia matter? The Dallas News characterizes the tactics employed by Attorney General Looney as "essentially lynch law." Not a fine did Mr. Looney make affidavit to in this suit. He permitted Mr. Maury to do the swearing. We find Mr. Maury intimately associated with Mr. Gray, an H. Clay Pierce agent, and a close friend of the President of the Texas Company. We even find Mr. Maury and Mr. Gray occupying the same room in a St. Louis hotel.

Is the connection and the affiliation sufficiently apparent? It is not only apparent, it is bold. It has the air of "what are you going to do about it?"

Yet we are brought to support "our attorney general and give him our backing by word and action." Any support that comes to him in this instance will come from the partisans of the two interests that are most concerned in putting the Magnolia Company out of business.

Austin—Work has commenced on the construction of a \$10,000 packing plant and oil mill combined. In addition to the cotton oil manufacturing and packing house features of the enterprise, a large factory will also be established and operated for the manufacture of veneer boxes.

Mayor's Annual Report Shows Wichita Falls Progress During Year

A total of \$9177.38 in cash fines with 6120 days of street work sentences, were assessed against city prisoners during the year ending April 1, 1913, according to the annual report just completed and this prompts Mayor Bell, in his annual report to the council, to recommend that the police force be increased to ten men, by the addition of two more patrolmen and two mounted officers.

Commenting upon the fines and sentences, Mayor Bell's report says: "This makes a very fine showing for this department when compared with other cities. To most cities the police department is a financial burden but here it is a source of revenue."

The city's receipts for the year were \$71,534.65 and disbursements \$64,637.29. Bonded indebtedness on April 1, 1913 was \$153,000 not counting the

new bonds. The value of all city property was estimated at \$141,000.

The mayor compliments both the street department and the fire department very highly. Discussing the street work, the mayor's report says:

"The city is fortunate in this department and the work accomplished by Mr. Dobson and his men speaks louder than words. There has been 113,090 feet or 21.4 miles of street graded, 10,470 loads of dirt and 200 loads of gravel hauled, 72 culverts, and 103 bulkheads put in."

During the year 13,340 feet of sewer was laid and 23 man-holes constructed. The fire department answered 44 alarms during the year, laid 4,809 feet of hose and pumped for a total of 17 hours and 45 minutes; the losses are estimated at \$22,980.

Firemen's Carnival Will Open Engagement Tonight

The Negro and Loos White Way Shows, brought here for this week under the auspices of the fire department, arrived Sunday afternoon and this morning were being unloaded and installed at the carnival grounds, corner of Sixth and Indiana.

The show appears to be one of the largest ever brought to this city, occupying a special train. Two cars are required for the wild animal show alone, with its company of lions, leopards and bears. Capt. Scott, one of the country's youngest wild animal trainers, stages an exceptionally wild

animal act in this arena, a feature being the "fight for life" with seven large African lions.

The Negro and Loos shows present a variety of attractions, from the smallest man alive to the big musical comedy, with its beauty chorus. There are eight side shows, with their strange and odd sights, not the least interesting of which is the Malay Prince. The show is an extensive one and promises a week of good entertainment for the Wichitans who visit it.

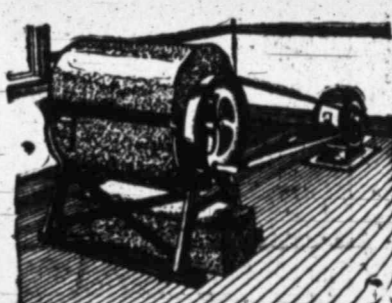

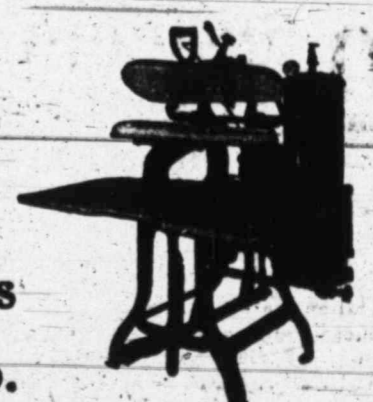
