PERMITS ISSUED IN APRIL SET NEW HIGH RECORD FOR WICHITA FALLS

CITY RANKS HIGH

In Point of Building Activity Wichita Falls Ranks With Largest Cities of State.

PHENOMENAL GAIN IN POSTAL RECEIPTS.

The phenomenal gain of 39 per cent was recorded by Wichita Falls in postal receipts for the month of April, this showing being one of the best this office has ever recorded.

The total for April, 1912 was \$3347.63, while that for last month was \$4649.43, a gain of about \$1300. This unusual increase is taken to indicate much better business conditions at present than prevailed a year ago.

April was the biggest month in building permits since the permit ordinance became effective, a total of \$169,864 being represented by the sixty-two permits issued during the month. This is by far the best month yet and indicates marked activity in local building circles. It has been six and a half months since the issuance of permits began, and in that period the total has reached approximately \$700,000, the average being considerably above \$100,000 per month.

These figures compare favorably with those of the larger cities of the State and it is believed that Wichita Falls ranks easily with the leading five or six cities of the State. The figures do not include the extensive improvements in the factory addition, outside the city limits, where many thousand dollars are being spent by Hall Brothers and on residences.

\$12,000 DEAL INDIANA AVENUE PROPERTY

Marlow & Stone Buy 75x150 Feet at Corner of Eleventh and Indiana

J. B. Marlow and J. W. Stone have closed a deal for the purchase of the Jolne property at the corner of Eleventh and Indiana, the consideration being \$12,000. The property is 75x150 feet and includes two frame buildings, one of which has long been in use as a boarding house. The purchasers have no immediate plans for the improvement of the property, they say, but will hold it as an investment. The price paid is considered a substantial one for property as far distant from the business section.

MUCH BUILDING NOW IN PROGRESS AT CHILDRESS.

Childress is again on a building boom and from present prospects there will be plenty of work to employ many mechanics for several months.

The improvements at the Denver hops will be extensive and several thousand dollars will be spent. The shop improvements call for an enlarged boiler house, the building of a nationer house, which will be started this week. The boiler house calls for two more big brick smokestacks and the erection of two big steel tanks. Other improvements are also in view. The shop improvements will call for an expenditure of about \$25,000.

The erection of the new high school building will give work to a small army of mechanics. The building will be completed by September 1 and a total of \$30,000 will be spent.

The members of the First Baptist church within the next ten or fifteen days will be accepted shortly and work of raising funds has already commenced in fact several hundred dollars has already been collected. The site is opposite the First Methodist church and the building will cost \$20,000. It will be the finest church building in Childress.

Joe Rhea has already begun work of building his new market on Second street. The building will be of brick, steel and concrete. The total sum that Mr. Rhea expects to spend will be near \$10,000. It will be the finest market house in Topeka.

Col. R. E. Montgomery will begin the erection of a one story brick building adjoining Mitchell & Company's store some time during May. The building will be modern and of gray pressed brick. The building will cost about \$5,000.

Ed Hartzell of the LaGrande Theatre, informed the reporter Monday morning that plans for the roof garden will be completed this week and that the opera house company expect to begin work on the building some time during May. This work will cost the theatre company about \$3,500.

L. Witherspoon states that he will begin the erection of his new home shortly. It will be a nice place and will cost about \$2,000.

Several other parties have stated that they contemplated erection of new homes or remodeling of their present homes during the summer. Their plans have not assumed definite shape, consequently are not counted in the work in actual sight. The total amount of work given above falls up near the one hundred thousand dollar mark.—Childress Index.

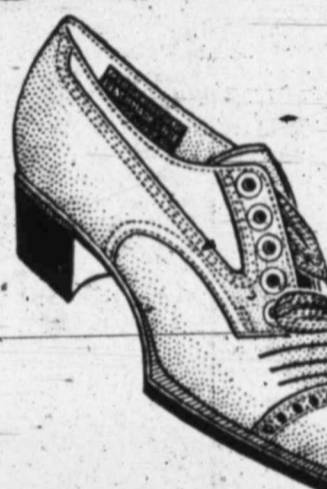

OIL FIELD NEWS

Showing of Oil Near Hobart.
Hobart, Okla., May 1.—Bennett & Tomlinson, who are drilling on the J. W. Prough lease in 29-5-16, fourteen miles southeast of Hobart, struck oil sand at 280 feet last night. The sand appears to be of excellent quality and is nearer the surface than any other sand found in this district, although the site of this well is south of where former operations have been.

Today the depth of the sand had not been pierced, and it is not known what it will produce. Mr. Tomlinson, who was here, said the outlook is encouraging, but his plans went astray in finding the sand at this depth, as he expected to case at 350 feet, in order to keep the water out. He has not determined just what he will do until the drill is through the sand, but thinks perhaps a shot will bring out the full value of the well, which is about a seven-barrel producer. At any rate the well will be cased to stop the flow of water found at a depth of 150 feet and a more minute examination of the sand will be made, as three veins of sand are reported in this field. The entire well may be cased, the drill sent down, and the sand already found shot at a later date.

Ward & Sherman, who are drilling on the Stevens lease, south of Mountainview, are down about 300 feet but have encountered a lot of trouble with the drill. Their hole east of Hobart has been started and oil from a nearby well is furnishing the fuel for operations.

Another Oil Company at Childress.
Last week there was organized in Childress another oil company to be known as the Riverside Oil & Development Co. This company starts with a capital stock of \$10,000, all of which is taken. A charter has been applied for and as soon as it is granted it is expected that operations will begin.

The officers of the new company are as follows: C. E. Crews, president; S. T. Cheatham and Jno. R. Scott, vice presidents; John P. Fleming, secretary-treasurer.

Besides the officers, the following have taken stock in the concern: Milan & Doolen, V. Norris, McClain & Rigby, E. R. Biggs, J. M. Crews, R. A. Bowers, T. A. Ross, M. A. Goodson, J. W. Albert, J. S. Scott, M. O. Hooker, J. K. Crews, H. H. Pennell, B. M. Carter, W. F. Johnson, H. J. King.

Thus, it will be seen that the company has behind it some of the best financiers of the county and they tell us they mean to go after oil in earnest. The first well will be drilled on S. T. T. Cheatham's land some eight miles northwest of the city in the Red River valley, where it is claimed surface indications are most abundant.—Childress Post.

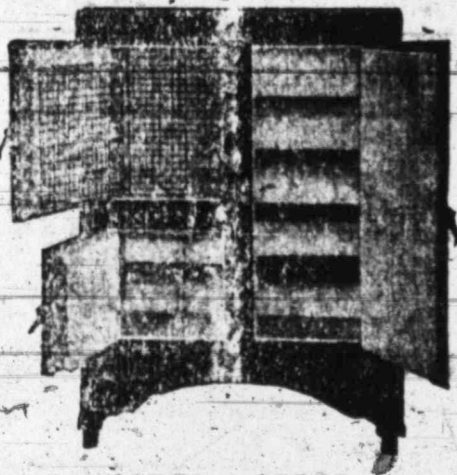

D. Key. Belcher and the other prisoners had gained access to the corridor of the

jail by filing and prying the lock loose. They finally dug a hole large enough to escape from the cells when they heard Sheriff Key coming and ran back.

Belcher was placed in the Vernon jail pending appeal on account of the unsafe condition of the Quannah jail.

PARALYSIS FATAL TO W. EDWARD COBB

Well Known Resident Died Thursday Morning—Funeral at 10 a. m. Friday

W. Edward Cobb, aged 59, for three decades a well known resident of Northwest Texas, died at 5 o'clock this morning following an attack of paralysis. He had been in poor health for several years.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at ten o'clock from the residence, 1102 Indiana, and will be in charge of local Masons, Rev. J. L. McKee officiating. The pall-bearers will be from the membership of the lodge.

The deceased was a native of Mississippi, coming to Texas when a young man, following extensive travels in South America. He moved to Northwest Texas from Degatur about thirty years ago, engaging in the ranching business near Dundee, Archer county. The headquarters of the ranch were in Wichita Falls and he made his home here in the early eighties, having resided here ever since.

Mr. Cobb had been in poor health for some time and yesterday it was known that his condition was very serious. Every effort was made to relieve him, but death came in the early morning hours to end his sufferings.

Surviving and his widow, a brother, John Cobb who resides in Alaska, a nephew, J. F. Cobb, a lumberman of Dallas, and a cousin, Mrs. Trula Martin of Fort Worth.

The deceased was a Knight Templar Mason and the funeral tomorrow morning will be conducted by members of the Masonic order. Burial will be in Riverside cemetery.

Contaminated Vegetables. As water supplies are more carefully inspected and their tendency to spread typhoid more and more lessened, the other factors in the dissemination of the disease are becoming better recognized. Among these one of the most important is the consumption of vegetables without cooking. As they can be washed only in cold water, and as frequently they may have been exposed to dust and dirt of various kinds, they are naturally capable of becoming carriers of disease under certain circumstances. The health departments of many cities now require, very properly, that such vegetables shall not be exposed openly for sale on the streets to be contaminated by street dirt and to be the resting place of flies, but of course it is of no avail to safeguard them during sale if they have been

contaminated previously. Their handling before they come to market and the conditions under which they have been grown are therefore extremely important. In certain portions of the United States it is not uncommon to use sewage as it issues from the sewerage systems of cities or towns for irrigation purposes. In several communities, owners of large vegetable gardens collect night soil, and furnish, clean and change the receptacles, free of charge to the householder. Among the Oriental peoples the custom of using night soil as fertilizer in vegetable gardens has obtained from time immemorial. Certain of the northern nations of Europe also have had this custom, and have brought it with them to this country. The truck farms near our large cities, especially in the East are coming more and more into the hands of foreigners, some of them Syrians; while in the West the Chinese have invaded this branch of farming, and naturally bring with them the customs of the countries in which they have lived. Some of the Oriental peoples of the Near-East, particularly the Greeks and the Armenians, in increasing numbers are growing and handling the fruits and vegetables of our larger cities.

Typhoid bacilli may remain virulent on the leaves and stems of growing vegetables thirty days after the soil is infected; and the same germ has been found in the ground itself still active and virulent thirty-five days after it was infected. We have entirely given up the old maxim that running water purifies itself every three miles, says the Journal of the American Medical Association for we know that specific disease germs will live for days and weeks in running water. It was presumed that in the growth of vegetables sunlight would destroy the bacteria on them. This has been proved not to be true. Rainfall or the watering process necessary for vegetable growth was supposed to be sufficient for cleansing to guarantee the healthfulness of fresh vegetables eaten uncooked, but when specific disease germs are in question this is also not true.

As other infections may be transmitted in the same manner as typhoid, it is evident that precaution should be taken. The question is of much more wide-spread interest than might at first be imagined.

A Banker Who Loaned Money to a Saloon Keeper, But Not to a Farmer.

In an article entitled "Loans for Farm Improvements" in the current issue of Farm and Fireside appears the following: "Some bankers, it has often seemed to me, have been slow to adopt modern ideas. In many cases they

have retarded agricultural development. I have known them to refuse loans to good farmers and upon good security, for the purpose of fencing, silos, lime fertilizer and improved livestock.

"I know of a case where a man has borrowed five hundred dollars for a silo license, and yet by little trouble and little security the same bank advanced the same farmer against investing one hundred dollars in a pure bred bull."

"A certain man has been acres of fair land. He has made improvements as he has been able to make. His land cost him three hundred dollars and is worth the money. He wants to fence the entire farm and to cut it into two fields. He will give him plenty of pasture for the crop upon his farm and

He has two cows and wants to buy three more. He wants part of a car of ground limestone and some ground phosphate rock. He wants a little clover seed and a few hundred good apple trees. He believes in good fences, tillable land and good stock. He says that six hundred dollars would put his farm upon a paying basis. I firmly believe that with the improvements he desires, put upon the place as he would put them there, his farm would be worth over three thousand dollars.

"The local banker does not loan money upon farm lands. He lends entirely upon secured notes and chattel mortgages. He loans for short time only, sixty days being the usual period. My friend, the eighty acre farmer, has good security for six hundred dollars, and if he could

get it for five years at six per cent he could put his farm upon a paying basis.

"This is a typical case and a fair one, for this farmer is a capable and intelligent man, and he needs the money."
