Navy to Test Battleships With Corrugated Hulls



WASHINGTON—Corrugated battleships will be the subject of tests this winter by Naval Constructor David W. Taylor, on duty in the bureau of construction and repair, in the naval testing tank at the Washington yard. Four vessels for the merchant service have been built in England on this plan. Two outward curves, 22 inches deep, run the length of the ships between the load line and the bilge. Between the convex curves is a concave surface of equal depth. This partial application of the principle greatly increases the strength of the hull. No such strength is added that the stringer plates may be dispensed with. This increases the space available for bulk cargo. In addition, however, it is said that the corrugated hull saves fuel and lessens the effect of waves on the steadiness of the ship.

English reports indicate that a corrugated hull will save 16 per cent. in fuel over the cost of driving a smooth hull of equal displacement. Two models, of equal weight and dimensions, each about twenty-foot long, will be

constructed here, one with a corrugated and the other with a plain hull. Each will be attached to the traveling crane which spans the experimental tank at the Washington navy yard, and the resistance of the models to the water when pulled at a given rate of speed will be accurately registered on the delicate gauges attached to the crane. If the corrugated hull presents less resistance to the water the fact will be instantly indicated on the gauges. No vessel of this type has yet been constructed in this country. The first corrugated vessel was built in England in 1909.

Capt. G. S. MacLachlan of the British navy, recently asked the admiralty to make a test of corrugated ships. He spent a month on the Baltic in a ship in which the ordinary stiff bilge keel is replaced by a keel bearing deep horizontal corrugations. His observations convince him that the corrugated ship is vastly superior to the ordinary type in strength, stability, speed and carrying capacity. Captain MacLachlan claimed that the idea of the corrugated ship was worked out by Arthur H. Haver, a naval architect. The seventh vessel of the kind to come into existence is now being built for Norway. The British officer says that a corrugated vessel is carried about twenty per cent. further with the same amount of coal than a plain ship of similar dimensions. This in a warship means either increase in effective range or increase of armor, armament, etc.

Army Officers on Detached Duty to Be Removed



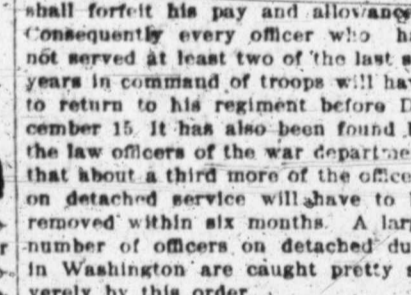
It is now estimated at the war department that more than 50 per cent. of all army officers now on detached service will have to be removed from their present posts at once, owing to legislation by congress during the last session. This means that more than half of the officers now serving as military attaches at American legations and embassies abroad, as instructors in the military academy at West Point, as instructors in the Army Service schools, as instructors of state militia organizations and as instructors in various military academies in foreign military schools will be ordered back to their regiments.

The law, as one officer put it, is "excessively mandatory," inasmuch as it requires that any officer responsible for a failure to obey it to the full shall forfeit his pay and allowances. Consequently every officer who has not served at least two of the last six years in command of troops will have to return to his regiment before December 15. It has also been found by the law officers of the war department that about a third more of the officers on detached service will have to be removed within six months. A large number of officers on detached duty in Washington are caught pretty severely by this order.

It is said that there are officers who have not been with their commands for years, as they have had pull enough to keep them in easy jobs here in Washington, where they can do their stunts and not half try, and fill in the rest of the time doing society acts.

Washington society without its army and navy officers is mighty slow. There has always been feminine influence to keep plenty of the young men on detached duty in Washington. Of course, this order of congress is obligatory.

Postal Deposit Savings Show Average of \$86



POSTMASTER General Frank H. Hitchcock made public the other day the latest available figures showing that the deposits to postal savings depositories have now reached the sum of \$28,000,000. The system was inaugurated January 3, 1911, but most of the deposits have been made within the last year.

The deposits represent 280,000 individuals, making an average of \$86 per depositor. The system is now operated in 12,773 postoffices, in every one of the forty-eight states, including 644 branch postoffices.

According to the figures compiled by the controller of the currency the total amount of the deposits in the savings banks of the country in 1911 was \$4,212,543,598. This amount was deposited in 1,884 banks by 9,794,647 individual depositors, and the average savings bank account for each depositor was \$430.09. Comparison of these statistics shows that the average amount held by each savings bank depositor was about five times the average amount held by each postal savings bank depositor.

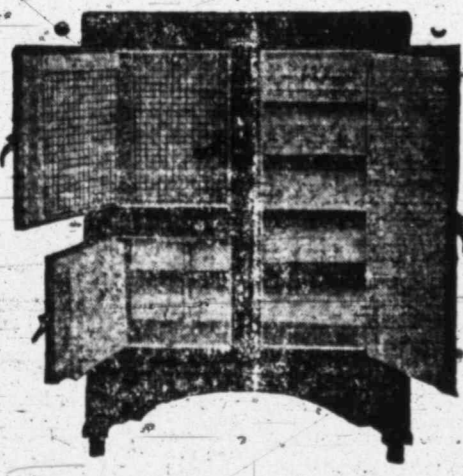

Slave Mart of Morocco

FOR MANY years no slaves have been imported into Morocco by sea. Mediterranean pirates, no longer chase unfortunate vessels that have ventured near the inhospitable coast of Moghreb, but slavery still exists everywhere in Morocco, Mrs. Doctor Legey writes in the Pittsburg Gazette-Times. "Marrakech is still, as it was at the time of which Voltaire wrote, the headquarters of this shameful traffic. In vain France forbids slavery in all her African possessions, but as long as numerous droves of human cattle are driven into Marrakech by caravans from Soudan and Tafielt the slave trade will continue."

The imported slaves are readily sold, either openly in the market or secretly. The slave market is situated in the quarter of the aularines, or druggists. Nothing is more pitiful than to see this slave market, where sales are made in bright daylight under the protection of Allah.

Imagine an enormous open square, surrounded by a large number of boxes. In the center is a covered gallery, under which the vendors stand in rainy weather. A little before the opening time of the market the slave traders bring in their human merchandise, leaving the actual sale to commissioners, dellsals.

Slave Mart Opened With Prayer.

Women, children, youth and grown men are driven promiscuously into the boxes. In most cases they make no attempt at resistance. They know full well that they have nothing to say, and that they will be sold whether they like it or not. Little by little the square is filled up by purchasers. Everybody tries to get the best place to obtain a good view of the slaves. At last the dellsals arrive.

The market is opened with a solemn prayer. Standing near the entrance gate with their hands open to simulate "the book," they place themselves under the protection of Sidi-bel Abbas, the patron of town, and in a loud voice recite the "Fatiha," or first surate of the Koran.

It reads: "Praised be Allah, master of the universe, the lenient, the merciful, the ruler on the day of retribution. It is thee whom we adore, it is thy help we implore."

When the invocation is over, each dellsal takes charge of the lot of slaves entrusted to him. A hasty toilet is made, consisting in removing the most filthy rags and replacing them by neatly clean clothes. This enhances the value of the ware, and the pale begins.

The dellsals run all around the square in all directions, followed by the group of women, children and men they have to sell. If any buyer appears to be interested the gang is stopped and he is given an opportunity to take his choice. He carefully examines the hair, teeth and limbs of the creatures offered for sale.

When a bargain is made it is ratified before the adoul (notary). The price depends on the sex, age and quality of the slave. I have seen a man of twenty-four sold for 16 doursos Hassan, or about \$14 in American money, while a girl of ten or twelve brings 120

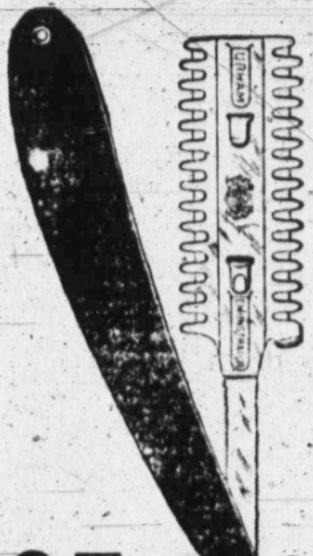

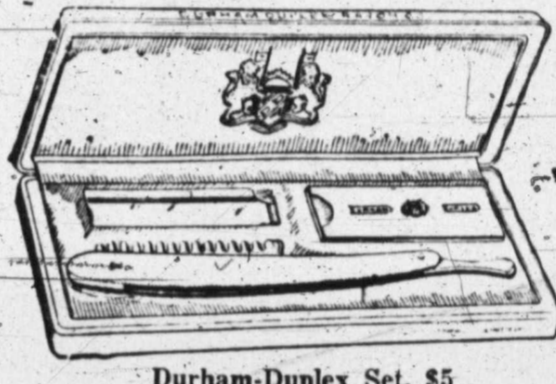

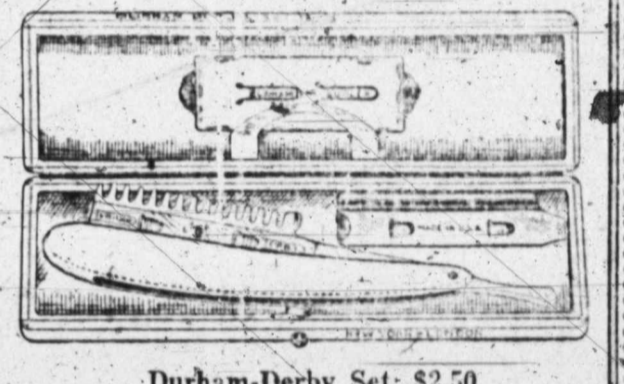

BEHIND THE SCENES of the BIG SHOW



The Elephant Bore Ball Game

It is an old and oft repeated saying that "if you see one circus you see all." Yet as often as we have heard this how ready we are to admit our error once we have been admitted behind the scenes of a really big circus, and see the stupendous work of getting the show in readiness for its season's tour. Then we realize what vast sums of money and gray matter are expended in seeking and perfecting novelties in order to give the public something new.

It can truthfully be said that money is no object in seeking the means to this end, for well trained and highly paid agents are untiringly and relentlessly scouring the four corners of the globe in search of performers with acts that thrill or for some novelty, whether it be of the animal or feathered kingdom, to exploit when the show "hits the road."

To begin with circus life is entirely different from any other show life on earth. It is truthfully said that circus performers are born and not made, and this is borne out by the fact that the star artists, whether they be trapeze, flying ring or bare-back performers, all come from a long line of circus folk, and the best known of these today represent the fourth or fifth generation in the saw dust arena. The gathering of these artists—for they always designate themselves as artists and jealous in the extreme—are they of their art—is like the reunion of a big and affectionate family. They come from all quarters of the globe to which they decamped when the previous season closed. The love of the arena is inherent and so deeply imbedded that they fairly hunger for the work before them—eager for the glare and excitement of the life to come and the plaudits they know they will bring from the millions of spectators before whom they are to perform.

Following its short journey from winter quarters at Bridgeport, Conn., the Biggest Show finds itself comfortably housed in Madison Square Garden. When it awakes the next morning it finds a busy day ahead and so, too, the next day and the day following, or in fact until the doors are thrown open to the public and the blare of the band is heard within.

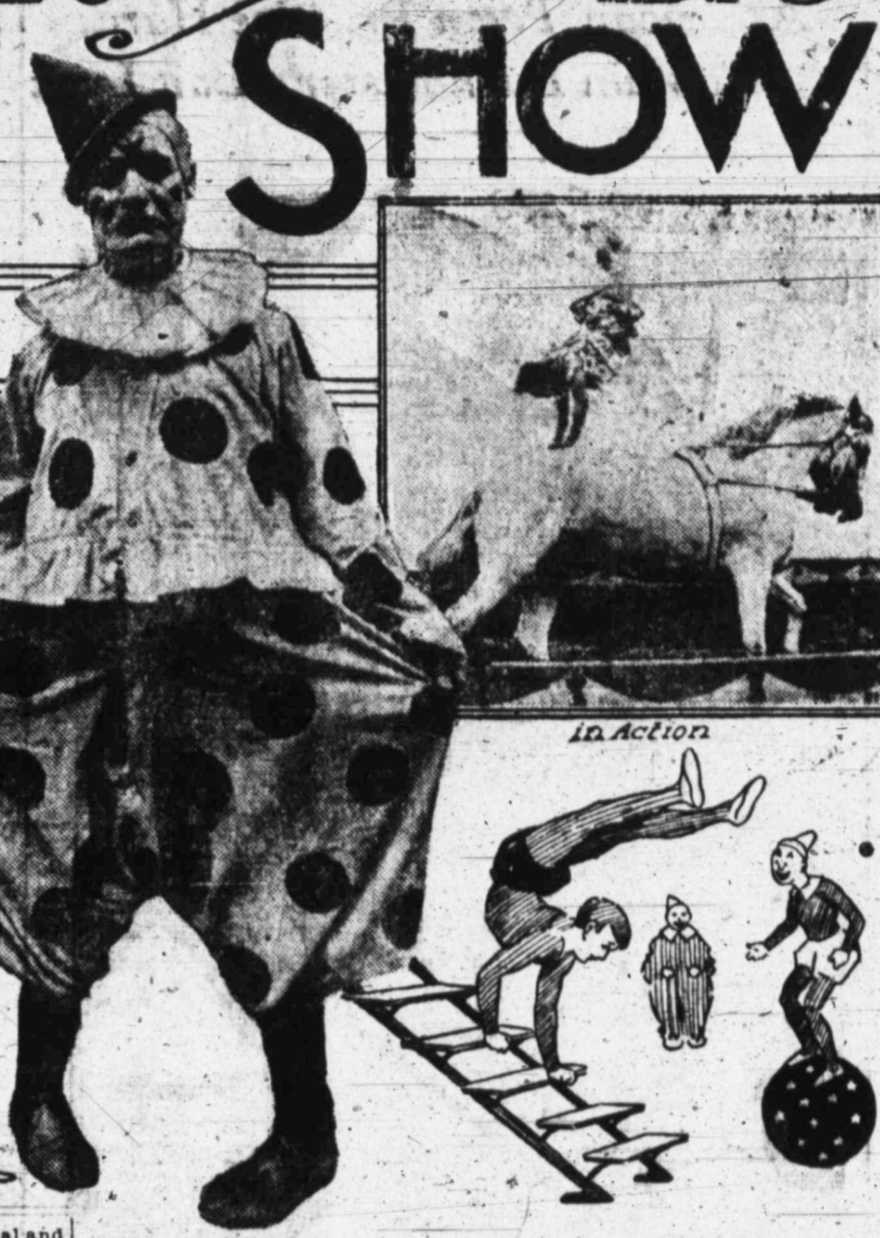

The circus is allowed just a week, or even less, in which to whip itself into shape for the premier. Each feat, stunt, race, and clown prank is rehearsed time and again and when perfected each is timed. Then each of these feats, stunts, races and clown pranks are given their place on the official programme. All must move with clock like precision and there cannot be a hitch for a minute lost here or there might throw the whole programme out of gear and spoil the entire performance.

Then follows a circus performance, the like of which is not seen again until the show returns to New York again on its next annual tour. In many respects there is no other performance to equal it in interest, and yet it is given to an absolutely empty house. Act for act, stunt for stunt, it is the same circus, the public sees, but with this big difference—it is

given in negligence. It is an informal and an undress affair from start to finish, for there is no gauge, no spangles, no tinsel, no glare, no blare and no glitter. The men, women and children who go through the feats that are to thrill millions of spectators set about their work seriously, all with one end in view, and that to so perfect their respective act that no possible slip, or miss can creep in to mar it. There is nothing more humiliating to a performer than to attempt a feat or stunt and fall in its execution. These plain clothes performances are gone through repeatedly day after day until the evening before the big show opens. Then for the first time spangles and tinsel are donned and the full dress rehearsal is given. This one dress rehearsal constitutes the only real try out the show gets, yet so well trained is each and every one in his or her part that they all toddle off to

bed tired, but content, assured that the morrow will bring the plaudits of the public and the first installment of the salaries cited in their contracts.

The faithful recording of its daily life with a big three ring circus, following it in all its vicissitudes, is but the recital of the wonder—products of system and efficiency. Everywhere and at all times they prevail—in the tumult of the busy summer season, in the congenial quiet of winter quarters; from the moment the new and unwelcome sights of city slumber or county seat quiet until the breaking of the white tented city noiselessly and stealthily departs in the night. It works on a schedule that is more hard and fast than the busiest of railroads. Everything is done in its appointed and allotted time, from the peeping up of the first big and gay lithograph in

town or city to the storing away of the last wagon on the train when the show slips away. The clattering chariot races are run on schedule; each mid-air flip flap is done by the clock and even the poor overworked clowns must crack their jokes—and get their laughs—on the schedule the director of the arena sets for them. The time table is iron-bound and there can be no deviation from the schedule. So far as mere numbers are concerned, the biggest theatrical company that ever went on tour would not total the number of canvas men carried with the tented city.

Furthermore theatrical companies depend on hotels and boarding houses for its food and lodging. The circus carries its own commissariat and feeds and lodges itself. More than a thousand employees travel with the circus

and upwards of 4,000 meals a day are served in the cook tent. And do not labor under the impression that circus folks are not well fed and well cared for. Their meals are prepared with the care of the best regulated hotel, and while that for the canvasmen and teamsters is all that any hard working man could desire, that for the performers is served with delicacy and care, for a well trained corps of chefs and waiters are part of this traveling colony.

There are 600 horses to be fed three times a day, also elephants, camels, giraffes, a hippopotamus, a rhinoceros, lions, tigers, yaks, sacred cows, monkeys, seals, and other rare and curious inhabitants of a well populated menagerie.

Whereas the theatrical company finds its play house awaiting it, the circus provides its own, inasmuch as it carries twenty tents representing twelve acres of canvas, the main tent seating 14,000 persons. These tents must be in place before the matinee performance no matter what the weather is, and again they must be taken down folded or rolled, packed in their wagons and loaded aboard the train in an hour or so after the last

spectator leaves his seat. There is a fortune tied up in the horse flesh of a big circus. Of the 600 with the Biggest Show, 400 are high class draught animals and are worth about \$150 each. About 100 of these have to be replaced each year. There are forty-two horses kept solely for parade purposes, thirty Arabian stallions, forty thoroughbreds and jumpers, twenty eight trick horses and fifty ponies. This array of livestock represents an outlay of \$400,000. The menagerie means something like \$750,000. The cost of maintenance of the menagerie is enormous, although every year there are newcomers to the fold, for the most part born in winter quarters, that mean something like \$40,000.

Four weeks before the circus arrives in your town, two contracting agents for the commissary department arrive. They make contracts for the delivery of food for the army of persons and beasts to follow. The two "Twenty-four Hour Men" arrive the day before the circus, and after ratifying the contracts already made they see that the goods contracted for are delivered at the designated hour at the lot where the circus is to erect its tents.

As the design for the tented city has been made and staked out these men show the purveyors the exact spot where each and every article bought is to be delivered. To give some idea of what is daily consumed by a circus outfit here is a memorandum taken from the head chef's diary:

Three hundred pounds of beef; 150 pounds of mutton, 200 pounds of pork, 600 chickens (each Wednesday and Sunday), 200 dozen eggs, 800 loaves of bread, one barrel of maple syrup, ten barrels of apples (alternating with oranges, peaches, pears and other fruits in season). This list does not include condiments, tea and coffee, canned goods and other like staples which are carried in bulk in the cook car.

With this as an idea of what the humans consume each day, it will be easy for the reader to compute the quantity and cost of the provisions eaten by the animals in and out of the menagerie.

1200 TENTS ERECTED ON ENCAMPMENT GROUNDS

Special to the Times.
Chattanooga, Tenn., May 8.—The plans for the entertainment of the twenty-third annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans and Sons of Veterans are practically perfected and all veterans and visitors to Chattanooga May 27-29, the dates of the reunion, are assured of a most enjoyable time.

The biggest task of the Reunion Association was that of building the camp in which the veterans are to be entertained while here. Camp A. P. Stewart, however, is a fact and not a figure of speech. That is to say the 1,200 tents have been erected. The work was done by a troop from Fort Oglethorpe in command of Captain Gillem, a native Tennessean. It is difficult to imagine a more commodious, pleasant and complete camp. Confederate veterans who have seen it pronounce it the best appointed camp ever arranged for a Confederate reunion.

The tents are of the pyramidal type and will accommodate eight cots each, or sleeping room for about 10,000 men. These men will be given their meals in a large mess tent conveniently located. More than 200 people will be employed to wait on the veterans. Lunch stands will be conveniently located also, where light lunches and coffee may be had free of charge between meals. A large platform has been erected at the entrance to the camp for musicians and other entertainers, and the veterans will not suffer for lack of amusement while waiting for their meals.

Camp A. P. Stewart is located in Jackson Park, near the national cemetery, in a beautiful grove of oaks. It is cool and sanitary—as near a delight as one could wish. It is within easy reach of the city by trolley cars. The car service will be increased sufficiently to accommodate the demands. There will be no waiting for cars and no crowding. The greatest care has been observed in planning all of the details of the camp and it will be as fine as perfect as human ingenuity and the expenditure of money can possibly make it.

Three Separate Parades.
It has been officially determined that there shall be three parades instead of one at the Chattanooga reunion. In fact, there will be four. The Eleventh cavalry of the United States army will give an exhibition parade on the morning of May 27, the opening day of the reunion. This is the best cavalry regiment in the regular army, and the spectacle will be one of the best features of the reunion. This will be followed next day, May 28, by the parade of Sons of Veterans, the parade starting at 4 p. m. The United

Confederate Veterans' parade will start at 11 o'clock on the morning of May 29. Arrangements have been made for the accommodation of veterans who may be too feeble to march in the parade. These will be seated in auto trucks. It was decided to put them in auto trucks, because automobiles are too fast for the parade. The parade of the veterans is expected to be a most imposing and interesting event of the week.

\$2000 NEEDED TO ENTERTAIN FIREMEN

Funds to cover the entertainment of the firemen's convention are being collected today by the Chamber of Com-

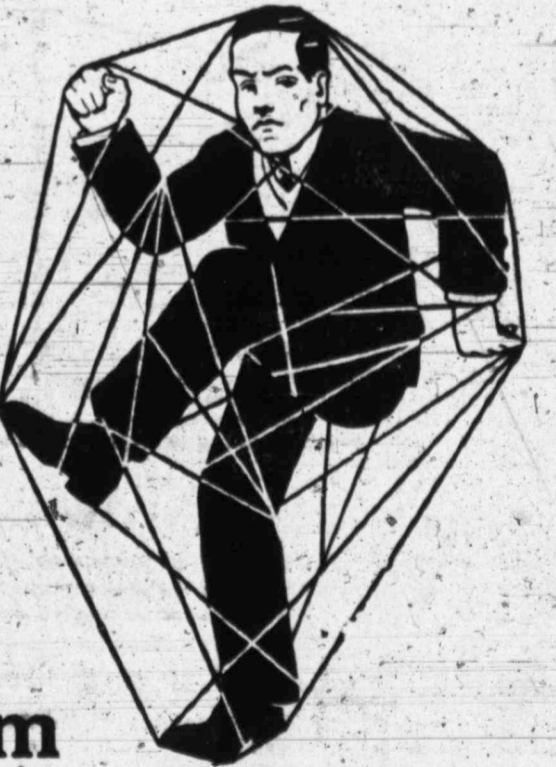

**English Polo Ponies are Coming

New York, May 7.—Interest is growing in the international polo match which will be played at Meadowbrook June 10. The English polo ponies, which are so clever that they often play the game as well as their riders, are expected to arrive shortly, and the American team under Captain Harry Payne Whitney is rounding into shape. According to the latest advices from England, the managers of the polo team that is to invade America to play for the international cup have been much worried because the weather has seriously interfered with the practice of the candidates for the team. With the exception of the first day at Hooton there has been no polo worthy of the name up to a week ago. The grounds at Baton, the seat of the Duke of Westminster, have been unfit for serious polo of the pace required to test the capabilities of ponies and players. Another setback for the Englishmen was the accident of W. S. Buckmaster, the best player in England. He lacerated the muscles of his right shoulder in a fall and was forced to resign his place on the team at a time when every hour is of importance. Mr. Buckmaster was treated by electricity, and there is hope that he will be in condition before the team leaves for America.

**Big Bill Haywood and His Aids
Plan Fight in Case Mill Owners
Reopen Plants with Armed Guards**



Paterson, N. J., May 7.—While "Big Bill" Haywood, leader of the I. W. W., prepared to fight the indictment on which he was arrested charged with disturbing the peace of the owners of the great silk mills here laid plans for reopening their places—with as many strikers as would return and manned with armed guards. This is believed to mean real trouble. The mills are closed now, but as soon as they open the I. W. W. strikers say they will fight to keep the strike breakers and deserters away. The owners figure that many of the strikers are tired of being without money and enough food and will welcome a chance to earn a dollar again. Haywood was aided in his fight against the authorities and in preparing to meet the new move of the mill owners by Miss Elizabeth Gurley Flynn and Carlo Tresca, who were indicted with him and arrested.

Conversation Between a Sarcow Farmer and Uncle Trusty.
In the current issue of Farm and Fireside, Judson C. Welliver, Washington correspondent of that paper, says that the agents of the trusts who are opposed to the reduction of the tariff are already on hand at the National Capital, prepared to tell Congress not to reduce the tariff because of the injury that would be done to farmers. Following is an extract:
"They are fixing up the sarcow farmer right now, stuffing it with straw. Before long the eagle will be pushed out to the center of the congressional stage, and the curtain will go up on the scene that will show the farmer pleading for his life. "The Manikin (vigorously working his jaws as Uncle Trusty pulls the string)—'Aw, Uncle, you say it for me. I don't remember what you told me to say.'
"Uncle Trusty (started at his thoughtless slip)—'No, that isn't what you were to think. Now, try again.'
"The Manikin—'All right, Uncle. What you told me to say was that if they take away my protection, the peasants of Tibet, the Sahara, Kamchatka and Madagascar will rush in their paper raised farm things wrest my market from me and ruin my power to buy your products.'
