PRESIDENT WILL ISSUE EXECU TIVE ORDER REQUIRING COM-PETITIVE EXAMINATIONS ...

## THOUSANDS ARE AFFECTED

Democrats as Well as Republicans Will Have Equal Opportunities For Appointment

By Associated Press. Washington, May 7.—After a con ference with President Wilson this morning Postmuster General Burle son announced that an executive orde would be issued at once requiring al fourth-class postmasters or candidate: for appointment as such to submit to . competitive examination to determine their fitness for office.

The postmaster general later issued a statement explaining the purpose of the new executive order. He said the order of President Taft putting alfourth-class postmasters under civiservice was not sufficient; that the mere placing of a "great horde of persons" in the classified service was not in conformity with the spirit of civil service, as there were no tests to de termine the merit of applicants.

The new order, which substantially amends the Taft executive order, re tains in the classified service all fourth-class postmasters, but require: that those now holding commission. must submit to a special examination with others by postoffice inspector and that the appointment will be-made from the first three eligible applicants making the best showing. ..

The order places the age limit at 6

Mr. Burleson, in his discussion of the situation, indicates that the Wilson ad ministration wishes to take the fourthclass postmasters entirely out of peli tics and that Democrats as well as Republicans will have opportunity under the competitive examination to show their fitness.

It was announced also by the postmaster general that it is the purpose of the President and himself to take into the classified service during the next year all of the postmasters of the second and third classes.

### ARMS CAN BE SHIPPED TO HUERYA GOVERNMENT

U. S. Will Permit Export of Arms When Certain Rebels Won't Get Them



# UP CATHEDRAL

Bomb Discovered Under Seat at Side of Throne in Ancient Edifice

By Associated Press London, May 7 .- An attempt to wreck the ancient St. Paul's cathedral with a bomb early today is attributed

The bomb from the cathedral was xamined by police and government experts. It was painted black and contained detonators attached to an elecric battery filled with slugs resembling coal. This was connected with a clock. There is no doubt, the police say, that the bomb was placed there . by militants or persons in their em-

### Postal Deposit Savings Show Average of \$86

POSTMASTER General Frank H. Hitchcock made public the other day the latest available figures show ing that the deposits in postal savings depositories have now reached the sum of \$28,000,000. The system was inaugusated January 3, 1911, but most of the deposits have been made within the last year.



"Yes, your honor, and I think the en who wrote it did not know to write correct English. The very first sentence is defective.'

"What do you mean?" queried the judge, bewaldered by this foreign attack upon the bulwark of our liberties. "Why," replied the German, "the first sentence says: 'We, the people of the United States, in order to form more perfect Union.' Now, according to the best, or indeed, any authority; the word 'perfect' means something that is by its very nature su-perlative; it cannot be improved upon. How, then, could the people of the United States form a more perfect Union? If it was perfect before, they could add nothing to increase its perfection. It might be made more effecmore perfect!"






