

IMPRESSIVE SERVICES IN MEMORY OF DEAD FIREMEN

Convention Begins Active Work Following Eulogies-Elections Will Take Place Tomorrow.

With all the preliminaries out of the way, the Thirty-Eighth Annual Convention of State Firemen's Association got down to business in real earnest this morning following the memorial session and by the close of the afternoon session today most of the routine business will be disposed of.

The firemen and visitors are mixing business and pleasure in pleasing proportion, with just about enough and not too much of each to balance well. This afternoon the discussion of topic subjects will be continued. There will probably be only one business session tomorrow. This will be in the morning. The election of officers and the selection of the next meeting place will be features of this session. Victoria and Corpus Christi are the two avowed candidates for the convention city for 1914. The Victoria delegation has been very active and will give Corpus Christi a hard fight.

Election Tomorrow. The election of a fourth vice president, who will receive yearly promotions until he becomes president, is attracting more interest even than the next place of meeting. There are three candidates for the honor, W. D. McCully, chief of the Brownwood department; Hon. Roger Byrne of Smithville and C. H. Boedecker, chief of the Bowie department.

Tomorrow afternoon the horse reel contests, for which a cup and \$25 in cash prizes are offered, will take place. Plainview, Brownwood, Stephenville, Austin and Cameron have entered teams. The closing entertainment of the convention will be a special performance at the Ardmore, given by Messrs. Wren and Perry tomorrow night.

Dance and Lunch Tonight. Tonight the Chamber of Commerce will entertain the firemen and the visiting ladies with a Dutch lunch at Lake Wichita, to be followed by a dance at the lake pavilion. Cars will leave for the lake from the theater corner at 7 o'clock.

The visiting ladies were escorted to the factory addition this afternoon, and are being shown through the glass, automobile and pottery plants.

Morning Session. Most of the morning session was taken up with a memorial service for the twenty-seven members of the association who died during the past few months. Eulogies were delivered for each of the twenty-seven and at the conclusion of the eulogies the thousand delegates in the theatre arose and sang "Nearer My God to Thee." This scene was one never to be forgotten and drew an eloquent tribute from Father Dolje who was seated on the stage.

Upon a motion sufficient money was appropriated to have the name of Tom Sheffield, a Waco fireman who died in the discharge of his duty, carved on the firemen's monument at Austin. Some of the firemen came to their deaths through accidents in the discharge of their duty as firemen, others died while attempting rescues from drowning and others died natural deaths.

Wichita Falls First. Father Heckman who left this afternoon for his home at Temple was given the privilege of the floor for a few minutes after the memorial service and said he wished to change a statement he made yesterday. PLANS FOR RACE MEET TAKE FORM

WILL BE HELD ON LAKE TRACK BEGINNING ON AUGUST 5TH

OTHER TOWNS IN CIRCUIT

Substantial Prizes Will be Offered--Details are Now Being Worked Out

Arrangements have been completed whereby Wichita Falls will be included in a county fair and racing circuit, and a four days' meeting will be held here, beginning Tuesday, August 5.

The association of which Wichita Falls will be a member is known as the Texas-Oklahoma Short Strip Circuit, and is a member of the American Trotting Association. It will include the towns of Clarendon, Vernon, Childress, Frederick, Quanah and Wichita Falls, and many of the best horses in the state will be entered. In addition to racing-features incident to a regular county fair will be introduced and prizes will be offered for entries of live stock and farm products. It is planned to eventually make it a regular, county fair, and an annual event that will be looked forward to each year.

T. J. Jeffries of Vernon, who is himself a race horse owner and secretary of the Vernon Association, has been engaged to conduct the races, and he, H. W. Conner, secretary of the local organization, will have charge of the work of listing the horse and getting up the purses. The meeting will be held at the lake track and a large number of horses will be brought here for training for a month or so before the races. The program will include both harness and running races and purses will range from \$100 to \$400 for each event.

WILLIAM W. IRWIN NOW IMPERIAL POTENTATE

West Virginian Succeeds to Leadership of Shriners and Other Officers Move Up

Dallas, Texas, May 14.—William W. Irwin of Wheeling, W. Va., was today elected imperial potentate of the Shriners. All other officers except imperial order guard were moved up in regular order, succeeding the vacancy left by Irwin's accession to the position of head of the order.

Washington, May 14.—When the fight was renewed in the senate over tariff hearings today between Senator Ransdell, who opposes the sugar schedule, and Chairman Simmons, Senator Ransdell asked to have the clerk read a letter from L. C. Rowley of Lansing, Mich., who described himself as an original Wilson man. Over spirited objection the clerk read the letter, describing the leading Democratic opponents of free sugar as "accursed, unpardonable apostates from Democratic faith, licking the footsteps of the imperial potentate."

NO GUARANTY IN CURRENCY BILL

MEASURE SAID NOT TO MEET BRYAN'S VIEWS ON MATTER

WILL HOLD CONFERENCES

President Will Meet With House and Senate Leaders--Bryan's Views Are Awaited

By Associated Press. Washington, May 14.—Conferences between President Wilson, leaders of the house and senate and other advisers on currency legislation will be held at the White House, probably next week. House leaders are eager to see the draft of the bill under preparation.

It is understood it does not provide for a guarantee of bank deposits which William J. Bryan has favored and that it may contain some other provisions not in accord with Mr. Bryan's views as expressed in some of his public speeches.

House leaders are awaiting with a great deal of interest to know Mr. Bryan's attitude. An asset currency, to be issued through the banks, is one of the provisions contemplated.

COLORADO-TEXAS ROUTE MEETING WILL BE HELD

Towns Along Denver Will Send Delegates to Meeting at Childress May 22

The cities and towns along the Fort Worth and Denver will send representatives to a meeting to be held at Childress on May 22, at which steps will be taken to have the Colorado Springs-to-Gulf highway routed along the Denver.

D. P. Talley of this city had been notified of the meeting and will endeavor to see that Wichita Falls is duly represented. The call for the meeting was sent out by Secretary Hilman of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, who also urged that the several counties through which the Denver passes make all possible road improvements, so that the highways will be in good condition when the Coloradans make their trip.

Two other routes from Colorado to Texas are proposed, one being by way of San Angelo, following the general direction of the Santa Fe cut-off; the other going through Kansas and Oklahoma along the old-Chisholm trail. A Meridian road meeting will be held tomorrow, but Mr. Talley did not learn of it until yesterday, when he returned from a business trip, and so was unable to see that this city had representation there.

BAPTISTS MEET IN CONVENTION

SOUTHERN MEMBERS GATHER AT ST. LOUIS WITH LARGE ATTENDANCE

MEXICAN MISSION WORK

Revolution Has Almost Stopped It--One Report Discusses "Cheapening of Human Life" in South

St. Louis, Mo., May 14.—The annual convention of the Southern Baptists, with delegates present from all Southern states and missionaries from two continents, met here this afternoon. A plea for denominational loyalty was made in the report of the board of home-missions. The report says that this kind of loyalty must be maintained if the prestige and influence of Baptists in lifting up "Southern civilization" is to be maintained.

The report mentioned the "fearful cheapening of human life" in the South. The foreign missions board report says: "The year 1912 was one of the most trying in the history of the Mexican people. Thousands of bandits have overrun the rural districts, leaving ruin and distress. Such conditions have made it nearly impossible to do missionary work except in the cities."

\$5000 Claim About To Be Paid After Century Of Trying To Get It

By Associated Press. Washington, May 14.—Theron Rudd, a clerk in a New York United States district court, absconded in 1812 with about \$5000, and ever since there has been a controversy over paying it. H. J. Betune of Canada, the heir of the man who originally lost through the defalcation of Rudd, is now pressing the claim. Its legality never has been seriously questioned, but the claimants have been unable to pay it. It now appears that the claim will be paid with interest, making a large sum.

ANOTHER SUFFRAGETTE BOMB IS FOUND TODAY

Discovered on Train Near London Before It Had Time to Explode--Is Third Recently

By Associated Press. London, May 14.—Suffragette bombs were found today in one of the passenger cars of a train on the Southwestern Railway, near London. This is the third occurrence of this kind on the same railway in two months. When the train stopped at the station, the conductor became suspicious of three parcels in one of the compartments. He found two of them contained pin-cushions, filled with inflammables, and wrapped in suffragette placards.

IMMORALITY CHARGED AMONG INDIAN STUDENTS

Woman Makes Serious Allegations Before Senate Commission This Morning

By Associated Press. Washington, May 14.—General charges of immorality among the students at the Carlisle Indian school were made today by L. C. Kellogg, a woman student of Indian affairs, before a senate commission. Miss Kellogg declared the superintendent of Carlisle did not maintain the standard of discipline necessary to such an institution. She said she could give no specific instances of immorality.

13,455 BALES IN WICHITA COUNTY

1912 CROP BREAKS ALL PREVIOUS COTTON RAISING RECORDS

ELLIS LEADS THE STATE

Has 178,353 Bales--This County's Showing 4000 Bales Better Than Previous Record

Wichita county's cotton crop last season was larger by 4,000 bales than any previous crop, the total being 13,455 bales, according to figures compiled by the department of commerce and labor at Washington. O. P. Maricle, lagron reporter in Wichita county for the department:

Last year's crop was three times as large as that of the previous season, which produced only 4,250 bales. The largest previous crop was that of 1908, 8,674 bales. Figures for the last six seasons follow:

## DRILLERS RALLY BUT CANNOT WIN

INFIELD FAILS TO GIVE PROPER ACCOUNT OF ITSELF AND LOCALS LOSE

### SCORE TIED IN EIGHTH

Then Game is Presented to Cubs in Ninth—Two Home Runs secure Hitting

When earth's last ball game is over and the bleachers and stands are dark,

When the loudest rooster is silent and the last fan has left the park, We shall rest, and we shall we'll need it after the game is done, And shall sit down and figure forever on the games that might have been won.

After coming from way behind and tying the score in the eighth, the Drillers wrapped the game up in a package of tissue paper, tied pink ribbons on it and handed it to Sherman. There was a game, plucky fight and then flazied miserably and Sherman won. You can sit down and calculate, as per poetry above, a dozen things that might have saved the day, but that doesn't help in the percentage column.

The game was lost, not on Phillips' error, nor on Sherman's hard hitting, but on the absolute absence of pepper on the Drillers' infield. Of the nine hits that counted on Jones, three should never, never in this world have gotten past the infield. Giving the Drillers full credit for the brilliant rally that tied the score and for the fight they made, the fighting stuff was not there when Sherman was at the bat. Only one error is charged against them, it is true. But when the official scorer is called on to count up dumb plays as well as errors it will be different.

We didn't mean to get our hammer out just because the boys dropped one game, but we want to see the old-time pep come back on the infield and stay there.

**Jones Gets Steadier.** Sherman hit Jones hard for four innings and then the old warhorse steadied down and was a real star for four innings. In the fourth singles by Reed, Walker and Black, a two-bagger by Allen and a sacrifice fly by Humphries netted three scores. The Drillers scored twice in the fifth. Phillips, first up, hit to deep right for the full circuit. Morris went out on a grounder; Jones was safe when Williamson dropped his fly and Brooks Gordon, and stole second. Phillips, White, led off with a single, Nicholson fanned and Brown singled; Workman was an infield out, advancing both runners; Lawson uncorked a double to right, scoring White and Brown.

**Sherman Wins in Ninth.** Black opened the ninth for Sherman by fanning. Allen walked, thanks to Brooks Gordon, and stole second. Phillips bobbled Humphries' grounder, as aforesaid, and Allen scored. Crosby advanced Humphries with a single that might have been handled by Nevitt, and Williamson advanced both with an infield out. Then Sque Lawrence came up and sent a two-sack drive to left field, scoring two men. Gathrie and Scoggins were sent in as pinch hitters in the ninth, but failed to deliver. Nevitt singled, but was forced by White.

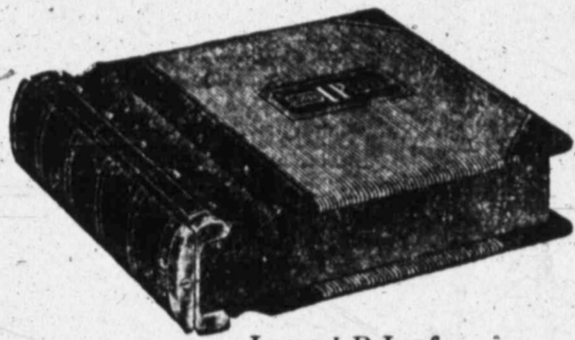
