BOAT UPSETS, TWO DROWN

H. C. STEWART OF DENVER AND MISS SIBYL COLLINS MEET DEATH IN LAKE

OTHERS RESCUED

Boat Tampered With, At Bugg Point, According To Surviving Members of Party

H. C. Stewart of Denver, Colorado. aged 28 and Miss Sibyl Collins of this city, were drown I in Lake Wiehit shortly after II c'clock last ich when a row boat which they occupie was overturned mean the eastern edge of the lake, about 75 yards from the dam. Their bodies were recovered at 2:30 this morning.

Ed Richardson and Miss Pauline Gebrart, the other occupants of the boat, were rescued. They saved thei: lives by clinging to the boat after it overturned, a party of young men nowing out from the pavilion to where they were marooned

When the boat upst-to Stewart and Miss Collins started to swim for the shore, Stewart remaining close to the young woman's side. He evident ly decided to go back and make av effort and bring the overturned boat to her and turned around. Seeing that she was about to sink, he swam back to her and they sank together.

Stewart had been here only a day or two, coming here from Amarillo Friday. He traveles for a coal company. Miss Collins was 23 years of age and was employed by Orville Bullington as stenographer.

Say Boat Was Damaged.

That the accident was due to the boat's being tampered with by un known parties while the quartette was at Bugg Point is the story of Richardson. He said that while the two couples were walking around on the point they noticed two men seemingly drunk, tampering with the Fearing that the intruders would steal the craft, the four returned and drove the men away Shortly after setting out in the boat they noticed that it was feaking badly and determined to cut across the lake as directly as possible. When from the dam, the

boat suddenly settled in the water. Stewart and Miss Collins jump out, overturning the boat, to which Richardson and Miss Gebhart clune The boat turned completely over and Miss Gebhart - was sitting upon 1 when the rescue partly arrived.

Cries for help attracted the attention of people in the pavilion and two boats occupied by Bob Roar Joe Perry, Ed Gorsline Jr, Reill Hickman and Harry Lewis went a full speed to the scene. They found Richardson and Miss Gebhart on the boat, but there was no sign of the others. Miss Gebhart was taken to the Lakeside Hotel, while Richardson joined in the search which was quick

Many Join In Search.

News of the accident was, brought to town by Joe Perry and the alarm was quickly spread. A number of citizens went out in automobiles and a special street car carried a number of others. A large supply of lines and hooks was taken and the lake was systemtically dragged for a long time without results.

Officers were dispatched to Bugg Point in an effort to apprehend the two men who it is alleged tampered with the row boat but these had not returned at 2:30. A fire could be seen burning on the point.

The four occupants of the bear were members of a small picnic party which went out late yesterday and the stillness of the lake, with the moonlight, prompted them to take a boat ride. Richardson declared that the boat gave no trouble on the way over to the point, and that it did not begin to leak until after the two men were seen to toy with it.

Mayor J. M. Bell went out in hi auto promptly upon hearing the news and took personal charge of the search work.

Governor Cox Firm In Refusal T. Send Troops To Cincinnati, Ohio

By Associated Press Cincinnati, Ohio, May 17.-The re fusal of Governod Cox to send troops to this city to control the strike of the employes of the traction company after spectacular riots in the early part of the day had influenced Mayor Hunt today by the filing of a petition by the city of Cincinnati for a receiver for the company. Judge Geobagan of the common pleas court, before whom the action was brought, heading pleas of attorneys for the traction company for more time in which to answer, ad journed court to Monday, when he expected to pass judgment.

Rioting was almost continuous today from the time the company attempted to operate the cars until they withdrew all card from the streets at noon While a riot that occurred at th Brighton barns this morning probably wed the most serious, one a little later at Fourth and Vine stratets wa nost spectacular. Small steel beams barrels of plaster and bags of cemen were hurled upon a passenger car from he upper floors of a thirty four-stor building. The car was wrecked, but o one was seriously hurt.

Members of the crew and other cor any employes riding on the first reout of the Brighton barn were assault ed and beaten almost into in sensibility hree of them are at a hospital in a pro arious condition. Various other sma riots occurred, in which the crew were beaten or forced to flee. Mayo Hunt asked Governor Cox for troop after the riot at Fourth and Vin streets. MUCH SCULPTURE AT FRISCO FAIR

BE ONE OF PRINCIPAL FEA-

San Francisco, Cal., May 17,-The sculpture of the Panama-Pacific exposition will carry out the note of the exposition in celebrating the opening the Panama canal. The spirit of achievement as exemplified by America's work at Panama will be idealized now engaged in completing the models Figures of the early explorers of the oceans, statuary sympolizing the struc-gle to pierce the rocky backbone of the contients, masses of glorified work-men, the human bulwark of the canal, and great groups of idealizing the crowning success at Panama will be among the important sculptural works that will bring home to everyone the world significance of the Panama

The statuary will be executed upon a vast and wonderful scale and in its omplete presentation of sculptural art will carry forward the work of the great expositions of the past, each of which has marked a distinct advance the popular appreciation of sculp

The sculptural plan will be easy for anyone to comprehend. The sculpture designed to form a sequence from the moment the visitor first enters the main gets of the exposition until he has made the circuit of the exposition ourts and of the enclosing walls. En tering from the city by the main gate. the visitors will first be confronted with a huge equestrian fountain, sympolizing the creation of the fsthmian aterwall between the oceans.

The fountain will be outlined agains: the opening of the 110-foot archway of Administration building, which rise to a height of 400 feet. An epic equestian groups representing Energy, the Lord of the Isthmian Way will be the main motif of the fountain A colossal figure of a splendid nude youth mounted upon a Homeric horse will be depicted as advancing steadily brough the waters of the dam. The sedestal itself will be extremely sim ple, recalling the constructive elements of the canal, and will be planned to permit the flowing of water down its sides in four great vertical sheets which will empty into a large horizon tal basin. Grouped in serried rank about the piers of the pedestal beside the falling waters will be figures o canal workers.' In the basis before the pedestal an auxiliary Victory will be perched upon a huge winged sea mon

The great success of moving picture shows in Germany has long been a cause for the deepest concern to German theatre managers and actors, who are always on the lookout for ways and means to diminish this serious compe The latest development is a petition

of the German Stage Society to the Reichstag requesting that a special law. B. Marlow and the opera house will be passed for the regulation of moving picture shows. The society asks, among other things, that the moving picture business be put under the same regula tions as the theatres in regard to construction of buildings, fire appliances and safeguards; that continuous pe formances be prohibited, and that it be made unlawful to serve beer and other refreshments at moving picture shows. The petition gives some striking statistics to prove that the "kinos" have cut into theatre attendance. In Elber field, for example, the number of theatre tickets sold was reduced from 118,000 to-90,000 between the years 1906 and 1911, whereas the attendance t the moving picture shows rose in the same time from 126,000 to 880,000

government is now preparing a bill that will meet many of the wishes of theater owners. One of the leading features of the measure propably will be to require picture shows to take out a license. Strict regulations will control the granting of licenses, none being given unless the applicant proves that there is a real need for a show at the place in question.
