REDUCTION OF NINE PER CENT

WICHITA FALLS SHOWING FOR PAST THREE YEARS ENTITLES IT TO LOW RATE

PREMIUMS ARE DOUBLED

Losses Paid During Three Years, Total \$81,983.39, While Premiums Were \$189,728.85

A reduction of nine per cent in their insurance rates dating from January 1, 1913 will soon be given on risks within the corporate limits of the city of Wichita Falls. The reduction will be ordered as soon as the State Fire Rating Board approves the figures compiled by the City Marshal, J. C. Ward and other city authorities. These figures show that the total amount of insurance premiums collected on Wichita Falls risks during the three years preceding January 1, 1913 was \$189,728.85, while the losses paid during the same period were \$81,983.39, being 43.2 per cent of the amount of the premiums.

These figures were collected from the insurance companies and their agents and are sworn to. They will be forwarded to the State Fire Rating Board within a short time and it is expected that the reduction and the refund from January 1 on insurance already paid will be ordered within the next few weeks.

The figures show premiums paid in Wichita Falls for the three years as follows:

The figures show an excess of premiums paid over losses of \$107,799.46. The increase in premiums in 1912 over 1910 was over 34,000 or nearly 70 percent, while the increase in the losses paid in 1912 over 1910 was less than \$200.

INJURIES FATAL TO OIL FIELD WORKER

Turning of Pipe Threw J. Mitchell From Wagon Under Wheels and Skull Fractured

J. Mitchell, aged about twenty-four years, driver for an oil company at Electra, died at a local hospital here yesterday as the result of injuries received Friday afternoon when he was run over by a wagon which he was driving.

Mr. Mitchell was driving a road well casing to the oil field when the accident happened. He was striking by one of the pieces of casing when it turned, throwing him to the ground under the wheels. One of the wheels of the heavily loaded wagon passed over one of his arms and his head. His arm was crushed and his skull fractured. He was brought to a hospital here and died this morning.

The body was removed to the Undertaking parlors where it is being awaiting word from Mitchell relatives in Alabama.

ANHUT CONVICTED ON BRIBERY CHARGE

Attorney Found Guilty of Attempting To Free Thaw By Illegal Means

New York, May 17.—John M. Anhut was convicted of attempted bribery tonight by the jury before which he has been on trial in connection with an attempt to free Harry K. Thaw from Matteawan by illegal means. The young lawyer will be sentenced Tuesday by Supreme Court Justice Sealbury. The jurors deliberated less than two hours and a half. They found that Anhut was guilty of offering Dr. John W. Russell, former head of the Matteawan asylum, \$20,000 for the release of Stanley White, alleged assassin of Dr. Russell, testified. Thaw has given Anhut \$2,000 in stocks and cash to be used for him free. Anhut's defense was that the money was a contingent fee. Anhut seemed calm when the verdict was brought in. He faces a maximum penalty of ten years in prison and a fine of \$500.

SMUGGLERS USE COFFIN IN VAIN

HIGH DUTY ON SACCHARINE CAUSES GANGS TO EMPLOY UNIQUE METHODS

OTHER NEWS FROM BERLIN

Fancy Prices Paid For Wine of Rare Vintage—Moving Pictures Popularity Increases

Berlin, May 17.—Smugglers of saccharine, on which there is a high import duty in Germany and a higher one still in Austria, are ever inventing new tricks to elude the authorities, of which the public learns only when the customs inspectors hit by accident upon the contraband.

A short time ago the inhabitants of a Bavarian village on the Swiss frontier were amazed to see a modest funeral procession, coffin, pallbearers, mourners and undertaker, all in order, pass through the village with policemen and inspectors acting apparently as honorary escorts. A hall was made at the police station, the coffin was opened, and from it was taken one hundred pounds of saccharine which the smugglers had attempted to introduce in his way.

At one of the railroad stations in Berlin the other day one of the roomy furniture vans which in Europe are filled with household goods, loaded on a flat car and shipped to any desired place, was accidentally opened. Railroad employees were surprised to find it loaded with broken furniture of no value. As the car came from Switzerland, the police were called in, and a thorough examination for illegal articles was made but without effect. Finally one of the policemen noticed the unusual thickness of the walls of the van. Investigation showed a space two inches wide between the side walls and a camouflaged secret garret under the roof packed solidly with saccharine. The same van had made the trip between Schaffhausen and Berlin at least once before, according to the railroad records. The van and contents were confiscated, but the consignee disappeared.

Most of the saccharine smuggled into Germany is destined for Austria, the smugglers finding it much easier to hoodwink the Austrian officials with bribes from Germany than elsewhere. Also the Austrian duty is higher.

A classic trick, now exposed as no longer practiced, was to send canisters to be blessed to the pilgrims' monastery at Einsiedeln, in Switzerland, and after which they were exported to Austria. Here they went, not to the pilgrims, but to a refinery, to be melted up and the saccharine in them removed. Both the monastery and the customs were for months taken in by this device.

PROTEST AGAINST AMBASSADOR PAGE

Secretary of Allied Printing Trades Council of New York Denies Connection With Effort

By Associated Press. London, May 17.—Resolutions of protest against the nomination of Walter S. Page as United States ambassador to Great Britain were introduced in the council today by W. Coffey, a member of the executive committee of the London Trades Council, on the strength of a letter written on paper bearing the letter head of the Allied Printing Trades Council of Greater New York and General Charles N. Conway, secretary of the National Brotherhood of Bookbinders. After describing Page as a member of the firm of Doubleday Page & Company, the letter says:

"This concern is bitterly opposed to organized labor. The only department that forced recognition from the union standpoint was the bookbinders but they are now on a strike being forced out as it is the policy of the firm to replace men with boys." The letter also says that the International Typographical Union Local No. 6 continues the item of the "unfair" list and that the men who had been secured to take strikers' places rebelled and struck without the aid of any organization. It concludes by asking all organized labor to "assist in giving this matter the widest publicity and also file to a protest to our government on its selection and a protest to Great Britain against his acceptance."

"RELIABLE"

RETURN TO NORMAL WAIST IS PREDICTED

New York, May 17.—Late fashion advice is to the effect that the figure is returning to its normal lines. After a season of short waists, and then long ones, nature is to be allowed her natural sway. This is already more than hinted in advance styles. Lines of waist, hip and throat, too, are fluctuating and even the lines about the ankles, although to be exaggeratedly narrow, at least, according to former measurements are, nevertheless, not so far removed from the natural standards. To be sure, fashions are neither made nor unmade in a day, and abnormal lines may still prevail for a time. The dropped waistline is at present one of the most favored of these fancies, and it is surprising how delightfully chic it is when worn by a slender girl. Generally, however, a style so unique is not long lived. Fortunately for those who like change, the vane of fashion has a way of whirling about with wonderful rapidity when dealing with the unusual.

One of the vagaries which has been with us longer than any other is the dropped shoulder. It is a striking style feature of the frock first illustrated. Waist, neck and hip lines are all extremely smart. The frock was developed in pale blue ratine with pink floral motif. Allover eyelet embroidery was used for collar and cuffs. Many women are obliged to make one frock a season do duty for all sorts of occasions. If care is taken in choosing both model and material there is no reason why lady may not always appear stylish and well groomed. To be sure, she will have no variety, but it is better policy to wear a dress continuously when in style than to wear it occasionally and have it remain in the wardrobe as a memento of bygone glories. For the woman who may have but one frock, as well as for the one who may have many, the model shown above, developed in the materials described, is equally pleasing. For the woman of abundant gowns, a few suggestions may not go amiss.

Judging from the opinion of the importer, the number of fancy fabrics one sees in the shops, and the number of these already made into most charming frocks, a change in materials will take place when the mercury begins to climb, and the daintiest and most diaphanous fabrics will be used. To be sure, printed silks, liberty pressaline, foulard and charmeuse will still be popular, especially where drapery is a feature of the gown, and in the models for cool days. In spite of the availability of silks to drapery, transparency will become for summer the prevailing note. Drapery and filmy fabrics are not so near akin as are flounces and filmy fabrics. As an outcome of this departure from draped styles and the introduction of flounces, there will be a marked difference in the silhouette. The long, tube-like lines will disappear, to be replaced by the more bouffant. But even where this fullness about the hips appears, the gowns, being of very sheer materials, will still retain many of their original slender characteristics.

Another peculiarity of the summer modes will be noticeable in the likeness that exists between the afternoon and evening frocks. They will be made of similar materials, dotted plain and embroidered net, chiffon and mousseline sole, whether the occasion be afternoon garden fete, tea at the Casino or an evening dance at a smart hotel. Even though the gown be of gay, printed silk, soft and supple, which has recently been replacing foulard, the bodice is finished about the upper section with chiffon or mousseline in white or in delicate contrast to the fabric of the gown.



The elbow sleeves may be of similar material, and either lined or unlined. This arrangement presents a much dressier appearance, quite smart enough for informal evening wear. The greater number of these stylish new skirts in sheer fabrics are made of two or three flounces. The corsage is of material similar to that of the skirt, has a little droop over the girdle back and front, and, if for afternoon and evening, is fashioned with slightly rounded or V-shaped neck, and with elbow sleeves. The entire gown is posed over a silk slip of pale blue, Nell-rose pink, white or other fascinating shade.

With these attractive frocks a deep girdle of bright-hued ribbon is worn. This may match in tone the foundation slip, or be in pleasing contrast to it. It may be of monotone or many-toned ribbon, and with picot-edge or raised floral motif. Shades of chiffon in two or more colors are also popular with this dainty style of gown. The girdle finishing the frock of the second illustration shows effectively one method of tying these sashes—the left over the hip. Other than the girdle, many up-to-date features make this dress desirable, notably a low-turned collar, snug-fitting lines of the waist and skirt, smart finish of the sleeves, and the attractive note of contrast in the materials employed. It was developed in gray voile, and Futurist silk in purple tone, shading into pink, green and gray, was used for girdle and insets.

When the frock is developed in sheer fabric it is advisable to wear it over a silk foundation slip, but an attractive combination petticoat and corset cover, especially if the frock be of cotton, is equally suitable and much more practical, as it is easily laundered. These combinations are most effective when developed in shallow lace and crepe-de-Chino. They may be trimmed with ribbon or tiny rosebuds, both about the fineness of the skirt and about the bodice. The shoulder straps may be of ribbon or lace. Bastille, too, in white and pastel shades, is much in favor for these petticoats and equally in demand for the various articles of underwear. If is not a strong pink that is used, but a pink so delicate that it is almost like the rosy flush of healthy skin. It, no doubt, owes its popularity to the transparency of the upper section of the waist and frock. It is trimmed with Cluny, Valenciennes and point de Paris, and frequently has a broad ribbon run through a wide hem.

FOURTH CENTENARY OF DISCOVERY OF PACIFIC

Spain Will Celebrate By Organizing Congress of Hispano-American History

By Associated Press. Madrid, May 17.—The fourth centenary of the discovery of the Pacific Ocean by Vasco Nunez de Balboa is to be celebrated here this year, and the President of Panama, Belisario Porras, has sent a letter to King Alfonso, assuring his Majesty of Panama's friendship for Spain. Balboa, the Spanish soldier and adventurer, first saw the Pacific Ocean from the Isthmus of Panama.

President Porras sets forth that the bonds of kinship between Spain and the Hispano-American nations are ever growing closer, and announces that the Panama National Assembly has decided to commemorate this centenary by a competition of lyric poetry; by an exposition in which Spain is specially asked to participate and by the erection at the entrance of the Panama Canal on the Atlantic Ocean of a colossal statue of Balboa, the cost to be defrayed by public subscription. He asks the king to place his name first on the list.

The Spanish Government has decided to organize at Seville a congress of

Hispano-American history and geography and an exposition of the precious documents from the archives of the Indies and the Columbine library relative to the conquest and exploration of the New World by the Spaniards. The congress and exposition, which will serve as a fitting prelude to the great Hispano-American Exposition being organized for 1919 at Seville, will open on September 25 next, the anniversary of the discovery of the Pacific by Balboa in 1513.

One of the Ayers automobile overland moving picture outfits mentioned some time ago by The Times has been turned out at the automobile factory and is now being loaded up with supplies preparatory to starting out on the road Monday. A second and larger outfit is to be delivered tomorrow. The wagons are finished in a resplendent red and will attract

much attention. The operators will travel about the country in the wagons giving moving picture shows at the smaller places. They will sleep and live in the wagons. Current for the operation of the moving picture machines will be generated from the same motor which furnishes the transportation power.

Frank L. Ayres for whom the machine was built, is the pioneer traveling vaudeville showman. His show consists of vaudeville and moving pictures, carrying a company of ten. Two machines carry the tent, the seats, and other equipment, while a touring car transports the member of the party. Upon arriving at a town, the tent is set up to form an air dome, while the dynamo furnishes

current for the lights and the picture machine.

Other showmen have told Ayres that the idea was not practical, but so far from being discouraged, he has invested close to \$10,000 in equipment and will try, on a trip through the middle western states, to prove that his judgment was good.

STERLING WHITE GIVEN 50 YEARS

SLAYER OF BEULAH LEE FOUND GUILTY OF SECOND DEGREE MURDER

VERDICT SATURDAY A. M.

Defense Files Suggestion of Present Insanity Which Will Be Heard This Week

Guilt of second degree murder was the verdict of the jury in the Clay county district court at Henrietta in the case of Sterling White, who had been on trial for murder for the killing of Beulah Lee last October. His punishment was fixed at fifty years' imprisonment in the state penitentiary.

Attorneys for the defense have filed a "suggestion of present insanity," which will be heard by a jury before Judge Martin some time next week. The time for this hearing has not been definitely fixed.

The case has features of the Frank Hursch case, tried here a year or more ago. Hursch was found guilty by the jury, but the same jury also found him insane at the time of the trial. In White's case the present insanity suggestion will be heard by another jury. If he is found to be insane at the present time sentence will be suspended until such time as he is pronounced sane.

The case was given to the jury at 6:25 Friday night and a verdict was reached at about 11:30 Saturday morning.

Judge Martin, Judge Scurry and Court Stenographer Eugene Sherrod are home to remain over Sunday. It is expected that the term of the Clay county court will be closed this week.

White is 22 years of age, and if he is not found insane his sentence will mean practically life imprisonment.

MEXICO CITY OUTLOOK IS FAR FROM HOPEFUL

Diaz Is Making, None But General Promises—Pessimism Prevails in Capital

By Associated Press.

Mexico City, May 17.—General Felix Diaz has published his platform in the form of a manifesto or open letter to the political clubs supporting him. In it he has carefully refrained from giving any but the most general undertakings, such as a promise to restore peace; to do justice to all; to encourage education, etc., and all without entering into details as to how he is going to proceed. But the election of Diaz appears far from certain. Had the election for president been held the day after the close of hostilities in the capital, there is no doubt he would have been elected without any material opposition. With Huerta in the chair, however, and a big revolution to attract of distract the people, there is much less heard of the popularity of General Diaz. There are many of his own partisans who have expressed the opinion that he never will be president. It is nothing that he has done, say they, to turn from him the popular support, but rather the fact that he has done nothing spectacular since he ceased firing shrapnel into all quarters of the city.

Investigation of the army payroll has shown an expenditure of 27,000 pesos (\$13,500) a month for salaries to officers who never appeared in uniform. It is charged that this was the work of one of the Madero family. He is said to have used the paymaster of the Rurales Guard to pay of his own henchmen. His method was, according to the story told at the palace to name a man whom he wished to favor or use, an officer in the rurales at the same time telling the commanding officer that this new officer would report once a month for his pay. None of those appointees has appeared to collect his money since

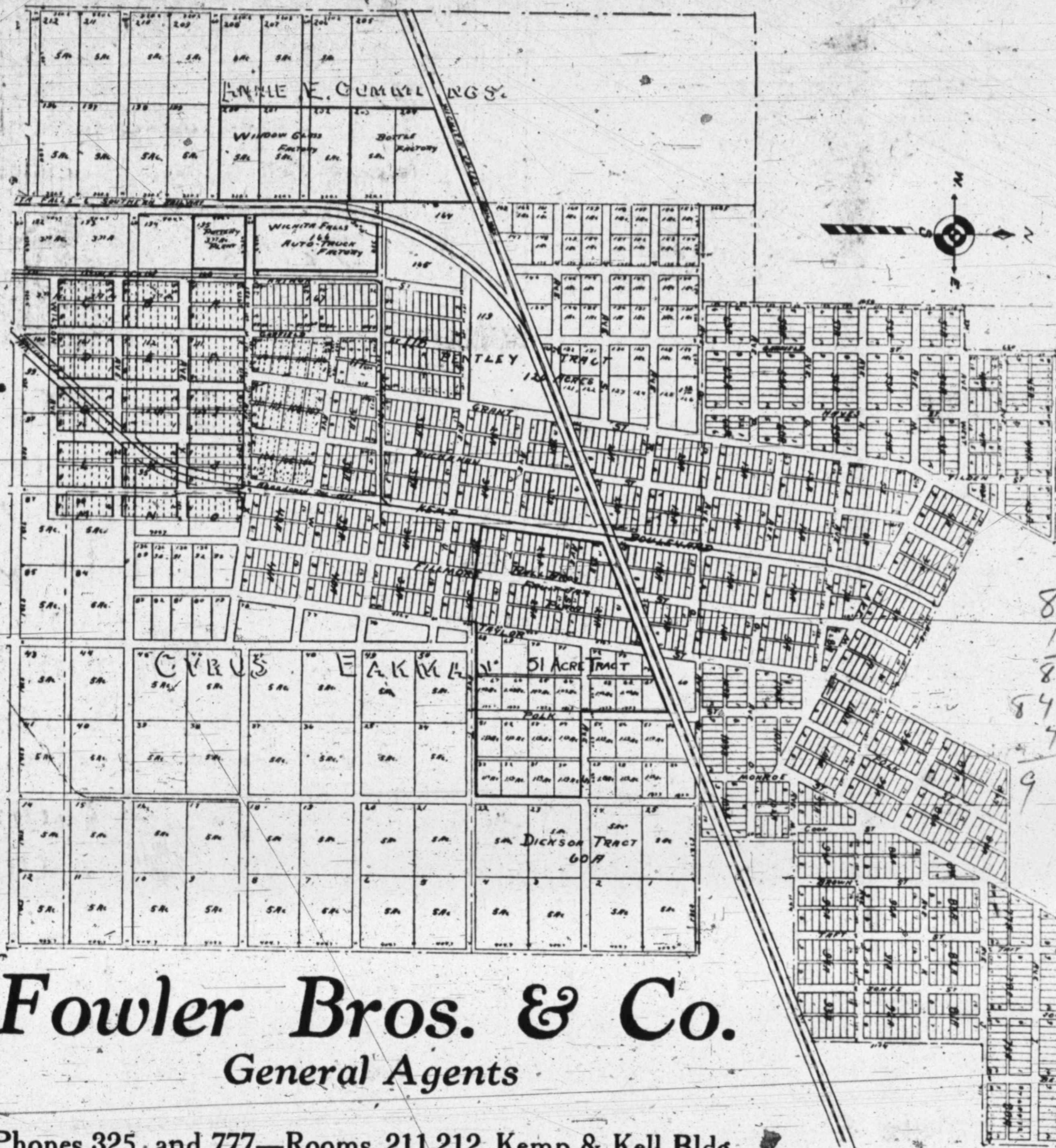

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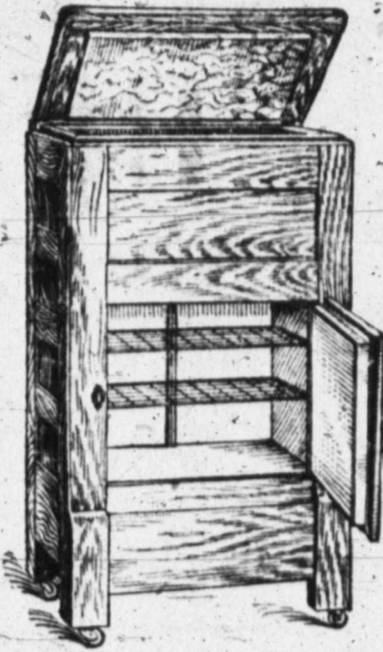
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SUFFRAGETTES' MANY METHODS

WOMAN WHO IS POLICE SPY IN THEIR RANKS GETS FOOLED

WEEK'S NEWS IN LONDON

New Regulations For Safety At Sea Planned—Strike of Seamen Threatened

By Associated Press. London, May 17.—The two militant suffragettes who recently captured "The Monument," Wren's masterpiece, which stands near the northern approach to London Bridge, commemorating the great fire of 1666, knew that they were in grave danger of personal injury from the exasperated crowd which gathered about the base of the structure, but they have not yet learned their temporary abode was in even greater peril. Overlooking the monument is one of his Majesty's tax collecting offices, and in the office sat one of that type of the King's tax collectors who never overlook anything that may add to the Lloyd George budget.

This collector, after hastily reading the law relating to the imposition of the inhabited house tax, sought the police inspector in charge of the squad besieging the monument and begged him for permission to present the suffragette garrison with a demand for inhabited house duty on the ground that, having dispossessed the caretaker, the two women were the de facto occupants of the structure. As the tax collector mournfully confessed later, the inspector was the usual type of London police official without the requisite imagination to grasp the possibilities of this counter stroke, and he refused to permit the levying of the demand. The collector stated that the tax would have made no small hole in the war chest of the militants, because he flattered himself that the adjusters would permit a rather steep assessment on this beautiful structure.

Bombs More Numerous. The innocuous bombs which have been discovered near various banks in London recently were not placed there by practical jokers, as the police have been inclined to believe, but, according to a member of the militant organization, the fake explosives were left by recruits of the Women's Social and Political Union, who were being tested by their leaders as to their fitness for more serious forays.

It seems that a militant member who was suspected of being an agent of Scotland Yard was given a bomb to place in the doorway of a well-known bank. It was of the usual milk can variety, filled with black powder, and with an electric fuse attached. The suspected member hastened to Scotland Yard with the bomb, where it was very gingerly conveyed to the department which makes a specialty of handling these dangerous contrivances. After the fuse was removed the powder was submitted to the Scotland Yard Chemist, who, after a brief examination, pronounced the substance ordinary wheat flour, mixed with lamp black. The woman was then permitted to place the bomb as originally planned, but Scotland Yard fears that the usefulness of its agent is at an end because she was shadowed to the Yard by members of the W. S. P. U.

A conference of the leading maritime nations of the world will be held in London early next autumn with the purpose of establishing on an international basis the new regulations for the safety of life and property at sea.

In June or July an informal consultation will be held, at which the report of the committee on bank heads, appointed to advise as to the waterlight subdivision of all merchant ships, will be available. Meanwhile the different countries concerned are making preparations and so far as the life saving rules are concerned, opinions have been interchanged for some time. The new international Radio-telegraphic convention will come into operation next July. This is the outcome of the International Wireless Convention held here last summer.

Seamen May Strike. A general strike of British seamen is to be declared early in July as the sequel to the agitation for a national conciliation board to regulate working conditions on board ships, and it is possible, unless the demand is acceded to, that the transport workers throughout the country will come out in sympathy.

Tom Mann, who organized the great transport strike of two years ago, has been engaged by the National Sailors' and Firemen's Union to carry on a month's campaign, which he commenced on May Day, to enlist the support of the transport workers.

The actual date of the strike will be kept secret, as it was two years ago, the giving of the signal being left to Havelock Wilson, the president of the union; Edward McHugh, M. P. for Mid-Tyrone, and Father Hopkins, trustees of the union.

Churchill's New Plan. The first merchant vessel to leave England armed in accordance with the proposals of Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, has sailed for South America. She is the Aragon, of the Royal Mail line,

and she brings home from the Aragon the great quantities of chilled meat. Her sister ship, the Amazon, which is now completing, will be similarly outfitted. The necessary structural arrangements were made while the ships were building, and to each vessel the admiralty has supplied two 4.7 inch guns. The officers and seamen of the steamers include a large number of Royal Naval Reserve men who in case of an emergency would be capable of manning the guns.

Port O'Connor.—At the meeting of the Commodores of the Intercoastal Canal celebration to be held in Galveston, June 12 and 13, arrangements were made for the participation of the various fleets. President C. S. E. Holland of the Interstate Inland Waterway League was elected Admiral of the fleet.
