GAMBLING ON CONVICT FARMS IS NOW CHARGED
 Committee Also Hears Allegations That Guards are Allowed to Drink on Duty

HOUSTON, MAY 22.—When the prison probers reconvened many additional witnesses were heard upon the subject of crops. The trend of the testimony taken here so far has been in the direction of ascertaining the most profitable crops to be grown on the farms. A vast amount of testimony bearing upon the growth of cane, cotton, corn, truck and other products has been placed in the record. Reasons for alleged past failures have been aggressively sought by the committee. Many former officials of the system were present when today's hearing was resumed.

JUDGE WILKINS H. GILL WHO SERVED AS A COMMISSIONER 1907 TO 1910, GAVE THE RESULT OF HIS EXPERIENCES. HE ALSO DEPRECATED THE ABOLITION OF THE LEASE SYSTEM IN THE WAY IT WAS BROUGHT ABOUT.

J. B. THOMAS, A FORMER ASSISTANT MANAGER AT THE CLEMENS FARM, TESTIFIED THAT WHILE HE WAS THERE GUARDS WERE ALLOWED TO SHIP IN ALIQUOT QUANTITIES OF LIQUOR. HE SAID HE HAD SEEN THEM INTOXICATED; THAT THEY WOULD GAMBLE, FIRST PLACING TRUSTS ON THE WATCH FOR CHANCE PASSENGERS.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR MAYES STATED HE HAD LEARNED OF THESE MATTERS IN CONVERSATION WITH THOMAS. THE LETTER APPEARED TO TESTIFY AT HIS REQUEST.

THOMAS SAID HE HELD HIS POSITION FROM AUG. 28, 1912, UNTIL MAY 4, LAST, WHEN HE HAD BEEN "FIRED."

THREE NATIONS' RULERS ATTEND

ENGLAND'S, RUSSIA'S AND GERMAN'S POTENTATES NOW AT BERLIN

PRECAUTIONS ARE TAKEN
 Will Attend Royal Wedding Saturday—Car Travels on Crowded Train

 Berlin, May 22.—The gathering of three emperors, those of Germany, Russia and the British dominion, for the wedding Saturday of Princess Victoria Louise and Prince Ernest August has made the German capital the center of European interest.

EMPEROR NICHOLAS ARRIVED TODAY AND WAS MET AT THE STATION BY EMPEROR WILLIAM AND KING GEORGE OF ENGLAND AND A GATHERING OF MEMBERS OF VARIOUS ROYAL FAMILIES. THE JOURNEY FROM THE FRONTIER TO BERLIN WAS MADE IN THE RUSSIAN IMPERIAL ARMORED TRAIN.

AT THE ARRIVAL OF THE VENERABLE DUTCHNESS OF HADEN, EMPEROR WILLIAM, ALWAYS A MODEL OF PUNCTUALITY, WAS LATE, PROBABLY FOR THE FIRST TIME IN HIS LIFE, AND SPECTATORS AT THE STATION WERE TREATED TO THE SPECTACLE OF HIS MAJESTY IN A HASTY RUN ENDEAVORING TO REACH THE HALTING PLACE OF THE RAILWAY CAR BEFORE HIS SUNT STEPPED OUT. The administration was commended to its friendly and the statement was made that sixteen members of Congress carried union cards, while one member of the cabinet and several bureau chiefs were also identified with the union labor cause.

HOLDS STATE CAN MAKE ROADS BUILD UNION DEPOTS

 Austin, Texas, May 22.—The railroad of Texas received a set back when the court of civil appeals held constitutional the act of the second special session of the 1909 legislature empowering the railroad commissioner to order union depots constructed. The decision was rendered in the case of the State vs. St. Louis Southwestern Railway Co., better known as the Hillsboro case. The trial court today stated the trial court erred in reversing the holding of the commission. It said that body was the best judge of findings and facts in such cases. It also makes the concession that the commission should be empowered to order depots only to correct abuses and that abuses must be defined by law.

JESSE FLETCHER DIES IN PRISON

DEATH RECALLS KILLING WHICH FOLLOVED AN ELOPEMENT HERE

SENTENCED TO BE HANGED
 Case on Appeal to Higher Courts in Oklahoma When Death Came to Prisoner

Jesse Fletcher, under death sentence for the murder of Jesse Barklow, a young Randlett farmer whom he killed with a shot gun July 10, 1912, on a public highway near Randlett, died in the Oklahoma State penitentiary Tuesday night, according to advices that have been received here via Lawton.

FLETCHER WAS WELL KNOWN TO MANY WICHITA FALLS PEOPLE HAVING LIVED FOR A NUMBER OF YEARS IN THE CHARLIE COMMUNITY. HE WAS A SISTER OF MRS. F. N. GALLANT AND MOVED TO OKLAHOMA ABOUT THE SAME TIME AS THE GALLANTS DID. HE HAD ALWAYS BEEN KNOWN AS "QUEER" BUT WAS VERY DEVOTED TO HIS NIECE, THE SIXTEEN YEAR OLD DAUGHTER OF MR. AND MRS. GALLANT, AND NEVER FORGAVE YOUNG BARKLOW, A FARM HAND EMPLOYED BY THE GALLANTS FOR ELOPING TO WICHITA FALLS WITH HER WHERE THEY WERE MARRIED.

SAYS STEEL CO. GAVE NO FAVORS

PRESIDENT FARRELL DENIES THERE WERE ANY PRIVATE AGREEMENTS

SAYS PRICES NOT SECRET
 Admits Preferential Prices Were Given But Declares They Were Known to the People

By Associated Press.
 New York, May 22.—James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel corporation took the witness stand for cross examination in the government's suit to dissolve the corporation. He was questioned by Judge Dickinson, government counsel on price lists published by the corporation subsidiaries. He declared that means of these lists, "It is generally true that our prices are known to the trade."

"DID THE UNITED STATES STEEL CORPORATION HAVE A SECRET AGREEMENT WITH THE HARRIMAN LINES BY WHICH THEY WERE GIVEN PREFERENTIAL PRICES?" ASKED THE GOVERNMENT COUNSEL.

"THERE WAS NO SECRET AGREEMENT; A GREAT MANY KNEW OF IT. THERE WERE CONTRACTS BETWEEN THE HARRIMAN LINES AND OUR CONTRACTS AND THE SALES LISTS WERE DISTRIBUTED—BROADCAST AMONG OUR SALESMEN," SAID MR. FARRELL.

"DID YOU HAVE A SECRET CONTRACT WITH THE AMERICAN CANN COMPANY?" FARRELL SAID THEY WERE GIVEN PRICES LOWER THAN OTHER BUYERS BUT THAT IT WAS BECAUSE THEY WERE LARGE BUYERS. HE DID NOT CONSIDER THE AGREEMENT SECRET.

"I KNOW OF NO REASON WHY THERE SHOULD BE SECRECY ABOUT PRICES. I KNOW OF NO CONTRACTS WITH ANYBODY THAT MIGHT NOT HAVE BEEN MADE WITH ANYBODY ELSE FOR LARGE QUANTITIES," HE SAID.

"CITY PLANNING" AN ESSENTIAL IN EVERY COMMUNITY.

Suffering From Inflammation of the Lungs With Eight Doctors in Attendance

He is 34 years old and has three sons, the oldest of whom is twelve years old. The emperor previously suffered from lung ailments and during an attack in 1908 his condition was very serious.

ARDMORE LOSES LURID CONTEST

ERRORS AND PASSES MAKE VERY POOR EXHIBITION OF GAME

GOOD PLAYS BY LOCALS

White's Sacrifice and Brown's Running Catch Redeem Several Pieces of Ragged Work

In a game that could hardly be classed as a No. 1 exhibition of the National pastime, Wichita Falls won the opener for Ardmore yesterday breakin up the Oklahoma's winning streak of four games. The variety of baseball that was served may be realized from the fact that of the thirteen runs scored, not one was earned. Wichita Falls played punk and Ardmore played punker; that tells the story.

Ardmore took the lead in the sixth inning, scoring four runs on two hits, two errors and two hits, but Wichita Falls scored six runs in the seventh on three walks, two hits, two errors and a sacrifice and maintained the lead.

There were two feature plays that made up for much of the ragged work of the locals. One of these was the really remarkable sacrifice hit by Foley White in the seventh inning when Morris was on third and one run was needed to tie the score. There was only one out and Smith, evidently figuring that the squeeze would be attempted, threw a high ball close to the batter. Foley held his bat up horizontally in front of his face and laid down as pretty a bunt as could be asked, Morris sliding across the plate a second later. It was as nifty a piece of work as has been seen in many a day. The other feature was Brown's running catch of a high foul, retiring the last man in the ninth; he sprinted across the foul line back of third and grabbed the ball.

Jones Works For Locals. Jones was in the box for the locals and gave a better account of himself than he has yet this season. With proper support in the sixth the side would have been retired without a score; he issued only one base on balls and did effective work with men on bases. Allen, who started for Ardmore, was too free with his passes, though hits off him were scarce.

Ardmore scored in the first. Henderson led off with a single past third, Gardner and Gray filed out; Naylor was hit by a pitched ball, and both advanced on Carey's neat single to left field, filling the bases. Birge hit a short grounder and was safe when Lawson threw it poorly to first, Henderson scoring, Pelkey to first, Henderson scoring, Pelkey was an easy out.

The Drillers tied the score in the second; Workman walked, stole second and scored on Phillips two-bagger to left field. In the third, Nevitt walked, was sacrificed by White; Nicholson singled to center field and the ball was quickly fielded to the plate, holding Nevitt at third; Nicholson went to second and Bettison threw the ball away trying to catch him, Nevitt scoring. A double play then retired the side.

How They Scored. Gray started the sixth for Ardmore by singling. Naylor hit a grounder to Phillips who passed up a lovely chance for a double by booting the ball, both runners being safe; Carey fanned. Jones then proceeded to hit Birge and Pelkey with balls, forcing in a run. Bettison hit a grounder that Brown failed to handle and Naylor scored. Allen hit a grounder between first and second and Nicholson failed to cover the bag, the drive counting as a hit and scoring Birge. Henderson was out on a grounder to first, Pelkey scoring. Gardner went out, short to first.

In the seventh, the Drillers came back. Workman walked, Lawson filed out. Phillips walked. Morris sent a single to left field that scored Workman after some speedy footwork. Jones walked, filling the bases. Then Allen was yanked out and Smith sent in. All runners advanced when Birge failed to handle Nevitt's grounder. Phillips scoring; then White laid down his big league bunt scoring Morris. Another accommodating error by Birge on Nicholson's drive scored Jones and Nevitt; Brown delivered a two sacker to left field that sent Nick across the counting pan. Workman filed out to left.

HUNDRED MILLION LOAN FOR MEXICO IS FLOATED

French and English Interests Believed To Have Taken It at Six Per Cent

By Associated Press. Mexico City, May 22.—The Mexican Congress has given its sanction to an agreement for a loan of \$100,000,000 at six per cent. The amount is to be placed at ninety and will run for ten years. It is guaranteed by thirty-eight and one-half per cent of the customs receipts. The Mexican National Bank is named as the representative of the bankers in supervision of disbursements.

The minister of finance was charged with failure to take better offers which were made. He replied that Provisional President Huerta and the other cabinet members had urged upon him the immediate acceptance of his loan, as the other offers received necessitated more delay. The loan has been placed with French bankers but it is certain British interests are participating. The names, however, have not been made public.

NEW CHINESE LOAN IS QUICKLY OVER-SUBSCRIBED.

By Associated Press. London, May 22.—So great was the rush of the public to secure a portion of the new Chinese loan that the issuing banks closed their lists at 11 o'clock. Then it was announced that the loan had been largely over-subscribed. It was quoted at one per cent premium by sellers.

The Times is informed by the manager of the Southwestern Telegraph and Telephone Company that it has telephone connection with Lake Wichita, and the report that there was none, is error. On the night of the drowning the line was out of order. It is true, however, that the pay station formerly maintained at the Pavillion at Lake Wichita has been removed, but a booth is located at the Lake Hotel. The Telephone company, so the manager says, will replace the booth at the Pavillion provided the owners will give permission to install it on the inside of the building, and have some one to look after it. The Times is glad to make this announcement.

That President Wilson has as firm a grip on the Senate as he has on the House there is but little doubt, and that the tariff bill, as passed by the House will also be adopted by the Senate. This was made evident by the ballot between the Republicans and Democrats in the Senate one day last week at which time it was made clear that the Republicans can only expect assistance from two Democrats on the tariff question when that matter finally comes up for a vote. These are the two Senators from Louisiana—Thorton and Ransdell. This means that the bill will be passed as framed and those Democrats who are displeased had just as well make the best of the situation. They can do no possible good by predicting panics and hard times, but can do a great deal of harm. If they prefer to pursue the latter course, without first giving the new administration an opportunity to test the matters, it will be some evidence that it is their desire to bring about just such conditions as they are predicting.

GRASSHOPPERS APPEAR; HOW TO ERADICATE THEM

Grasshoppers have made their appearance in parts of this section and are damaging crops to some extent, according to J. W. Campbell, district agricultural agent, who issues directions to the farmers on how to combat the pest. He says:

"I find that grasshoppers are making their appearance in many fields and are damaging young cotton; the outbreak may become more general and I think it advisable to combat them on their first appearance.

"The most successful remedy is poison. If they have not spread over the fields, plow a strip around the field from fifty to 100 feet wide and harrow well so as to kill all vegetation; then put the poison outside of the strip plowed. This will check them, as they come into the field they will eat the poison more readily.

"The proper mixture is two pounds of white arsenate, one gallon of molasses and one hundred pounds of bran; dissolve the arsenate in hot water, then add the molasses and bran. This is the best remedy recommended by the state entomologist and I have tried it myself in former years and found it successful.

"This poison is dangerous to both man and beast, so keep all stock away from the poison; do not handle the poison with your bare hands, but use either a spoon or a paddle."
