

The attorney general's department is now urg ing the governor to submit club legislation at the called session in July and is this matter should be consid ered at such session it means that all clubs will close. You know that if no bill is enacted at the July session one is certain to be passed at the next regular session unless something is done in the meantime It is absolutely vital that we should perfect a permanent State organiza tion. This time next year all candidates for the Legislature will be in the field and if we do not organize this summer it will be too late. We L. H. Mathis can do nothing without such organiza. tion, nor can we hope to accomplish much unless all the clubs unite and take an interest in this matter.





The manufacture of compressed corn cakes was an impressive demon-stration of the utilization of every asset which is a characteristic feature of European agriculture. The country about this city does not produce any corn. Cattle is raised, however, and so corn has to be bought from other districts. In the coin grain there is an oil which, has absolutely no nutritive value. It is a waste. But in Italy the corn is placed in hydraulic presses and this oil is squeezed out. The oil is sold for the manufacture of soap and the corn is pressed into cakes which are distributed among the members of the co-operative institutions. The same plan has been at-temted in the United States, but was not found commercially successful There is not profit enough in the sale of the corn cakes in competition with the grain. But in the enterprise visited by the Commission profit is nots considered. So long as there is any saving at all it is sufficient reason to adopt the plan; for the entire work is carried on upon co-operative, nonprofit seeking basis.

Manufacture of Fertilizer In the manufacture of the phosphate fertilizer it is evident that the farmers have gotten down to raw material rices at every point. Iron oxide is ought and roasted. The freed sulphur is employed in the manufacture of sulphuric acid. The natural phosphatic rock is bought and treated with the acid for manufacture of the fertilizer. In this way the farmers buy for themselves only the raw material and conduct every step of the manufacturing process themselves. It is a large undertaking but it has sueceeded. The produce of the plant sup-plies fertilizer for farms of 115,000 acres about the city.

The actual demonstration of the ability of a community of farmers to thus initiate and conduct economical ly a manufacturing business of this size was the most convincing lesson of the practicability of agricultural-cooperation which the Commission has

The enterprise is carried on by the Consortio Agrari, an association of landowners. In this part of Italy the soil is mostly owned by large landowners, and is farmed through a tenant system on a share basis. Consequently co-operation as it would have to be practiced in the United States is not seen here. The men belonging to the association are landowners and the small farmers receive only indirect benefit fro mthe co-operative associations without entering into their management. In such an enterprise as the one seen by the Commission in Piacenza it is clearly shown that an association of farmers or landowners are capable of giving an economical administration to a business enter prise. There is no paternalism nor ledding strings connected with the project. It is such a business under-taking as would be worthy of the best American enterprises.

Implement Warehouse The association has erected a large warehouse for storing farm implements. A majority of the machines are of American manufacture, but the assertion so often made in the United States that American machines can be bought at lower prices in Europe than at home did not seem to be borne out by comparison in prices made by the members of the Commission with the managers of the warehouse, although the prices quoted at the warehouse were practically wholesale prices, since no profits are sought in the sale of implements to members of the co-operative institu-

Credit for operations of this en terprise are obtained through a local co-operative bank, but not one of a rural type. It is a cooperative bank organized among the small tradesmen of the town as well as the farmers, and though much of its business is to decentralize credit for the tradesmen and so help the small dealer, it pursues the policy of granting every pos-sible privilege to agricultural enter-The notes of the agricultural association, are discounted and also the notes of the farmers themselves on purchases made through the association when guaranteed by the asso

Had Asked Injunction. The decision is in the case of Mrs. Nettie C. McIntyre vs. J. A. Woods. C. Oats and W. L. Johnson. suit was brought by the plaintiff to river extending from her propert; line out to the middle of the stream the sought an injunction restraining defendants from taking sand from the bed of the river without paying "abutting" property owners for same. The injunction was granted. The decision is of wide importance Nearly all of the sand used in build ing in Wichita Falls is sand taker from the Big Wichita River bed Heretofore it has been the custom of those wanting sand to go down to the river and get it without asking any questions, except as right of way to the river had to be granted.

Laws In Conflict. Texas has a state statute declaring he Big Wichita a navigable stream This is because the Big Wichita I more than thirty feet wide. But this law was passed more as a means of guiding surveyors in their work than in anything else. The intent of the staute is apparent in that it uses the stipulation as to width only, and not to depth. A stream might be as wide as from here to the depot and yet not deep enough to float a raft with a five" inch draught, so of course would not be literally ravigable. The federal court takes a different view of the matter. According to federal laws a stream is not navigable un less it is literally navigable, and will permit the passage of freight and pas-senger bearing steamers.
