

# HEAVY DAMAGE IN HUNT COUNTY

RAIN AND STORM CAUSES NEAR-LY MILLION DOLLARS LOSS TO FARMERS THERE

Rainfall Heaviest in Recent Years a Many Families Driven From Homes by Water

Special to the Times. Greenville, Texas, July 2.-One of the heaviest rains in recent years. fell here last night and this morning. putting the city light and water plant out of commission, flooding the low lands and driving more than 100 fame illes from their homes, besides sweep ing away railroad tracks and damag ing telephone and telegraph wires. The crop damage in Hunt county is estimated at nearly one million

The Sabine river is now higher than for years, the rise coming within a few hours. Between 4 and 5 o'clock this morning following heavy rains during the night almost a cloudburst fell. The river became a torrent within half an hour sweeping every thing in its path. Greenville citizen immediately organized for the relief of those made homeless.

On the Shreveport branch of the Katy near here nearly half a mile of track was washed out. The Katy Limited was delayed three hours. Near Commerce the Cotton Belt lost a quarter of mile of track.

n Speech at Newport, Colonel Attacks
President Wilson's Views With

Newport, R. I., July 2.—The demand made in the first national platform of the Progressive Party for regula-tion of corporations and combinations to "insure their doing justice to their rivals, to their customers and to their employes," has been emphasized. Theodore Roosevelt declared this af ternoon at the clambake which opened the National Conference of the Progressive Party by what has oc curred since election in the West

Forgery Was Fulcrum by Which Great Fortunes Were Lifted by R. R. Manipulators



An interesting experiment for the purpose of creating immunity against tuberculosis is being tried in Pittsburgh under the direction, of the Tuberculosis league of that city. Dr. William Charles White, medical director of the league, says it will probably take ten years before definite re-sults of the work will be appreciated. The experiment is being co the theory that much, if not all, tuber ulosis infection begins in childhood i view of this fact, the league is aim ing to supervise the growth of every baby born for the next ten years in the South side district of Pittsburgh. The babies and their mothers will be taken in charge at the birth of the infant, and everything possible will be done to increase the resisting power of the child to disease and to make it thereby immune to tuberculosis infection.
