CHILD THROWN FROM WAGON AND KILLED

LIFE CRUSHED OUT OF LITTLE RUTH McGRATH IN RUNAWAY ACCIDENT.

INSTANTLY KILLED

Line Broke When Horses Started to Run; Party Was Enroute to Lake Wichita.

The life was crushed out of little Ruth McGrath, the seven year old daughter of Dan McGrath and wife of 503 1/2 street late Monday afternoon, when she fell beneath the wheels of a wagon in which she was riding when the horses became frightened and ran away. Death was instantaneous for she had breathed her last when picked up by her father who had been thrown out of the wagon soon after the team started to run, and who ran to the spot of the accident on a badly sprained limb.

Was One of a Merry Party. The little girl was one of a merry party enroute to Lake Wichita where the McGraths and a number of other families were going to pitch camp and spend a week's outing. The wagon was loaded with a tent and camping utensils and supplies and on the top of the load rode Mr. McGrath and six children, three of his own and three of the neighboring family. At the front beside her father sat the youngest, little Ruth.

Horses Frighten and Line Breaks. All went merrily until just as the wagon had passed over the street car tracks near C. B. Toney's residence in Floral Heights when the horses came frantically from some cause that has not been learned. Mr. McGrath could have managed them safely but in holding them in one of the lines broke. The team then started to run in a circle with the wagon rolling after them and they had not gone far before Mr. McGrath was thrown out without a chance to drop any of the children to the ground. The team continued running in a circle and was circling the second time when little Ruth was thrown headlong beneath the front wheels just as the horses wind ed and the harness torn to shreds, came to a stop. The wagon came to a standstill before the rear wheel passed over the child's body but one of the front wheels had crossed her chest crushing out her life.

Other Children Were Unhurt. The other five children had remain ed in the wagon and were unhurt. Others who had witnessed the run away and had attempted to stop it reached the scene soon after Mr. McGrath when they found him holding the lifeless body tenderly in his arms.

Mother Brought From Lake. Mrs. McGrath and a neighbor woman had gone out to the lake on the street car ahead of the wagon. An automobile was dispatched after her but a telephone message telling of the accident had already reached her and she had started back on the car when the automobile reached the lake. The automobile, however, overtook the car and Mrs. McGrath was hurried to the scene of the accident. In the meantime the body of her child had been carried to a nearby house. Later it was removed to the family home on Lee street.

Funeral Wednesday Morning. The funeral was held at the family home at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning and was conducted by Rev. F. F. Walters. Mrs. W. J. Bullock, an aunt of the little girl, is expected to arrive tonight with her two children from Corpus Christi from which place they are now en route. No death has saddened the community more or evoked more sympathy for the bereaved than this.

SOCIETY AGAINST DANGEROUS THOUGHTS

Patriotic Organization in Tokio to Maintain Japanese Individuality and Ideals.

Tokio, July 22.—A "Society Against Dangerous Thoughts" has been organized in Tokio. The Japanese name is "Doka Kai," and it is a patriotic organization. The "dangerous thoughts" that it proposes to combat are, first, that the Japanese might be inclined to follow the example of revolutionary "chins," second, the "foreign thoughts" that the Japanese are not an equal of the white race. The "Doka Kai" was called into life by a number of Japanese scholars and learned men of the old school for the purpose of maintaining the Japanese individuality and ideals. The founders declare that one of the Japanese political leaders have "become drunk" with western civilization, are forgetting Japanese nationality and are instilling "dangerous thoughts" and ideas in the public minds.

Rome, July 22.—King Victor Emanuel at the earnest solicitations of Queen Elena and Mother Margherita, today signed the electoral reform bill passed by the recent parliament. The signature clinches for the women of Italy the first step in their fight for suffrage. Although parliament refused to include in this measure the right of women to vote, insisting that the time is not ripe in Italy for such a radical innovation, it consented to remove the first obstacle in the path of the women who are fighting for that end.

Occupation Taxes in Denver. Denver, Colo., July 22.—To meet the threatened deficit in the city's finances three license ordinances went into effect here today. They provide annual taxes upon dealers in meat, bucksters and peddlers, and dealers in cigarettes. The present tax on cigarettes is \$50 a year. It probably will be raised to \$200. Judge Pierson held his court in the parlor of the Hotel Beckham at Greenville to pass upon the agreement reached by counsel, Attorney General Loomer and Assistant Attorney General C. A. This \$500,000 fine is the largest ever recorded in an agreed judgment. This is the second time stock has been trusted and discharged in an anti-trust suit, the Union Pacific case being the first.

BULL MOOSE LYON'S DOLOROUS WAIL. Houston, Texas, July 22.—There was something of a blend between the leisure life of the Far East and the cut and dried life of the military camp in the attitude of a linen-suited man registered at the Rice Hotel. Colonel Lyon is back from the Orient. He's been in the land of the Kiplingese, "where there ain't no bad, no worse," and he comes back with the idea, the very pronounced idea, that he wants to live in a country where there is a tariff and the "tariff" the better. Last week he doffed the ivy-leafed coat of the globe trotter and forgot for a time a rare old vintage found in Ceylon, rivaling the Southern mini julp; the color and beauty of the road to Mandalay; the deep blue waters and the brilliant red and green shore lines of Java and Sumatra, and formed the uniform of a colonel in the Texas National Guard at Austin. The colonel is still rated as "A 1" in the "Broadsheet of Politics." Following the "feetsteps" of the Colonel Higher Up, he too crossed the high seas. He did not disclose the high seas to state, though a suggestive undercurrent seemed to imply that such ideas did simmer and boil politically appetizing under his Panama hat. Nor will he admit that after oriental pot-pourris, and rare teas spiced with "loves," that he has thought of such a "downstage" thing as an "American pie." To hear him speak of the everlastingly alluring East is to pay a tribute to British colonization, and a sort of dry humor at the passive philosophy of a people who dream of outer worlds and inner world and bow to the "Kismet" of "What is, is." Colonel Lyon has not been discontented by an ancient civilization which looks upon the Occident with envious half closed eyes. The apathy and the languor rather held him, but it doesn't hold him any more. The colonel is back for business. "Why," said he, leaning across the table, you mark my word, we are going to hear a different song a year from now. And it's the cotton farmer of Texas who's going to suffer. The democrats have trimmed the wool growers and the sugar industry for fair. And they are going to suffer from it. You can't raise the wage and lower the cost of living at the same time. And then the gentleman in white—same suit no doubt that he sat on a bamboo chair, smoking Java cigars, leaned back in his chair, with a Havana and reverted to the subject—the alluring subject of the East.

ASSUMPTION OF THE VIRGIN MARY

POPE PIUS SAID TO BE PLANNING PROCLAMATION OF SUCH AS FUNDAMENTAL DOGMA.

ACT CLIMAX OF CAREER

If He Takes Such Steps It Will Be the First Dogma Proclaimed Since 1870.

Rome, July 22.—From high Vatican sources it was today learned that Pope Pius is taking active steps for the proclamation, in the very near future, as part of the fundamental dogma of the Catholic church, the doctrine of the assumption of the Virgin Mary.

Should His Holiness succeed in carrying out his present desire, it will be the first time a dogma has been proclaimed by a pope since 1870, the last time previous to that being in 1854.

It is now known that since his recent illness, Pope Pius, realizing that his active pontificate is practically at an end, has expressed the desire to some of the highest dignitaries of the Catholic church at Rome to round out his career by this last great act. During his entire pontificate, Pope Pius X has devoted practically his entire time and energy to the building up of the religious side of the church only, paying little, if any, attention to the political side which has been the sole concern of his predecessor, Pope Leo XIII. He has promulgated reform after reform amongst the clergy, he has sought to stamp out all the modernistic and progressive tendencies

that he says would weaken the fundamental doctrines of the church, and he has reorganized all of the congregations and working machinery of the religious side of the Vatican.

The proclamation of this new dogma by him now, as the last great act of his pontificate would be in perfect harmony, he is said to feel, with all that he has sought to accomplish up to date. It would stamp his entire pontificate as one essentially and wholly religious.

As the matter now stands, it is learned on high authority that the dignitaries to whom His Holiness has expressed this desire have replied that there is no reason why it should not be fulfilled. Although not a dogma of the church, it has ever been one of the accepted traditions and beliefs of the Catholic religion that the Virgin Mary upon her death, ascended to heaven—did Christ—and that her body was not to be found in the tomb afterward.

For Pope Pius to proclaim this now as a fundamental doctrine of the church would merely be giving the official sanction to what the church fathers, almost from the foundation of the church, have always accepted as true. The right of Pope Pius to do this is also not only fully established, but under the doctrine of the infallibility of the Pope, which is now a part of the fundamental dogma of the church, such a proclamation would carry with it what would be considered nothing less than divine sanction. It was this doctrine of the infallibility of the supreme pontiff that was in fact the last dogma to be proclaimed by a vicar of Christ.—This was in 1870.

Previous to that time this belief, the same as the belief in the assumption of the Virgin Mary, had been accepted by the church from the earliest days without, however, being officially incorporated into the fundamental creed. When, towards the close of his stormy pontificate, in which Rome had been taken from the popes by the new kingdom of Italy, and the church was being assailed on every hand, Pope Pius IX felt it imperative that the position of the pontiffs be strengthened.

he startled the entire world by proclaiming this dogma. Its proclamation was later affirmed by the cardinals, arch bishops and bishops of the entire Catholic world, and it is this infallibility of the pope—this affirmation that every act of the vicar of Christ is the direct inspiration of God—that would lend an unusual significance to the proclamation now by Pope Pius X of the dogma of the assumption of the Virgin.

It would be the first proclamation of this kind made since that which established the infallibility of the pontiffs. Barring this latter exception, it would also be the first dogma proclaimed since, as has been stated, in 1854, when Pope Pius IX, just beginning his pontificate, proclaimed the dogma of the immaculate conception of the Virgin. This also was immediately affirmed by the Catholic world.

The feast of the assumption of the Virgin Mary is now set down in the Catholic calendar of established feast days for August 15. It is on this day, it is now believed, that Pope Pius will make his proclamation. Aside from the appropriateness of the occasion, the pontiff himself is declared to have admitted recently that he fears his own life may not continue much longer and he desires to carry out in person this last contemplated act of his pontificate before it is too late.

TWELVE OFFICE HOLDERS, BUT NO PRIVATE CITIZENS

Town Near Summer Residence of President Wilson Presents Strange Situation in Politics

New York, July 22.—When President Woodrow Wilson selected Cornish, N. H., for his summer retreat, he unwittingly arranged to make his temporary home almost on the outskirts of the most remarkable community in the United States. This is Baltimore, Va., the smallest chartered town in the entire country.

Baltimore might be termed "The Office Seekers' Paradise," for there are only twelve voters when the whole population is in town, and these are not enough to fill all the offices. Not only does each voter usually hold at least three offices, but in times of stress it has been necessary to send committees down into the valleys to bring in a few outsiders to hold down some of the town dignities prescribed by law.

Just now, however, the town is undergoing a wonderful experience for Victor Bemis, feeling that public life was too great a strain upon him, resigned his three or four offices recently, and now, for the first time in its history, Baltimore has a complete set of city officials and one private citizen.

Baltimore nestled between Hawk Mountain and the Vermont Hills when the War of the Revolution was declared. It still drenched on its way when the War of 1812 was fought and it sent some of its scanty population out with muskets to fight the British. When the Civil War broke out it heard of it and sent a few more. Each time their bodies came back over the brush strewn trails to lie in the graveyard that is so old that the road into it has been covered with a thick growth of underbrush, and now when

the dead are buried they are carried from the little mountain road into the cemetery by the mourners.

Along about 1792 Baltimore was part of Cavendish, Vt., a little town that lies over the way across Hawk Mountain. Even then its inhabitants perturbed because they could not get into town without crossing the mountain decided they ought to get a town charter of their own.

Peter Amaden, keeper of an inn on the peak of the hill where the village begins—and ends—decided it. He called a meeting one night in his home—the one which Charles Dean, the Representative in the State Legislature, lives in now—and suggested to the men folk that they were being trodden upon by the other part of the village. They weren't getting their just share of offices, he told them fiercely. Whereupon they applied for a township charter, got it and started housekeeping on their own account.

SOME THREADS PICKED FROM LIFE'S SEAMY SIDE

SEVENTEEN DEFENDANTS FACED CHARGES IN CITY POLICE COURT THIS MORNING.

NONE ACQUITTED

A Glimpse at the Unhappy Crowd Which Judge Rye Must Face Every Day.

Seventeen offenders sat on the mercy seat in the city court Tuesday morning but none of them got off without fines, at least not yet. Two cases were continued until this afternoon and three more went over until tomorrow.

There were representatives of both sexes in both colors in the crowd that faced Judge Edgar Rye and the complaints embraced charges of drunk, vagrancy and fighting. Another case continued from Monday and set for 3 o'clock this afternoon charges violating the speeding ordinances.

The first offender to plead this morning was a young, white man. A witness testified to having seen him follow two ladies along the street in the downtown district Monday morning and finally seize one of them by the arm, which he dropped when she rebuffed him over the head with a parasol. The witness thought the defendant acted like a drunk man. Judge Rye assessed a twenty dollar fine and his manner indicated that he restrained his personal feelings when he didn't make it more.

The next up was a negro man charged with fighting. The African told the court he was guilty, "but I wasn't really fightin'." Judge Rye thought the "brillies on his head amply bore out his plea of guilty and assessed a fine of \$10. Another negro was fined \$10 for intoxication and was assessed \$10.

A Son of Erin was next arraigned on a charge of intoxication. He said he had had several drinks and asked the court if he thought that was "drunk." He said that after those several drinks a gang of policemen came and carried him off to jail. "Some of them got behind me back," he indignantly told the court, "and some of them in front of me face, and what could I do." Policeman Nail testified that he had brought the man to jail himself but that he had had to charter a wagon to do so because the prisoner wasn't in a state for self-locomotion. He was fined \$10 and said he had the money to pay it, and to get even with such an unsympathetic town he was going to buy just as soon as I can get meself out and am sure sound back.

The next man limped up in front of the judge on a peg leg and with one eye closed. He pleaded guilty and a fine of ten dollars was assessed. "Judge, don't it make any difference when a fellow's only got one leg and one eye?" he asked. Judge Rye couldn't see why these disabilities should induce him to get drunk and the fine stood. After he took his seat against the man unstrapped his wooden leg and from somewhere got out a ten dollar bill with which he paid his fine and went free.

Mary Smith, a negro, was charged with fighting. Mary denied that she had been fighting but admitted that she had been "quarreling" quite a bit. She drew a ten dollar fine. "I Hain't Been Doin' Nothin'" Plea To Vagrancy Charge. Arizona Moore, a negro girl, was

arraigned on a charge of vagrancy. "Arizona, you are charged with being a vagrant, are you guilty or not guilty?" asked the judge. "I don't no judge, I hain't been doin' nothin'," was the answer. "That's exactly what you are charged with," Judge Rye replied. Further questioning brought out the fact that the defendant had been in town three weeks and that she was born in 1896 and she stoutly maintained that "I ain't been doin' nothin'."

Her case was continued until this afternoon when the court will make another effort to explain the charge to the defendant so that she can plead with what intelligence she has. Just Plain, Ordinary Humdrum Drunks. Several other cases in which plain drunk was the charge were heard and pleas of guilty accepted. Another fine for vagrancy was paid and several cases went over until this afternoon and tomorrow.

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RULES FOR SAFETY OF CHILDREN ON STREETS

Story of "Little Girl Who Didn't Think" Is Sent Out By New York Organization.

New York, July 22.—Containing many "Never's" and "Always's" a pamphlet has just been sent out by the American Museum of Safety to be distributed among families on the East Side and in Brooklyn and other sections where children are thickest, bringing home to little girls and boys the dangers of not thinking when they run into the streets. It is entitled, "The Little Girl Who Didn't Think," and Dr. William H. Tolman, director of the museum, believes it will be a great thing toward saving child life.

The little pamphlet tells the story in picture form and prose of the terrible things that happened to children who ran into the streets when wagons and cars were about. Some of the instructions read: "Never jump on or off a moving car. Never stand or sit on the car step, nor put your head or hands out of the car window. Never get off a car facing the rear. With the left hand take hold of the handle, left foot to the step right foot to the ground; face forward. Never fall on leaving the car to look out for passing wagons and automobiles. Never run in front of a passing car. Never hitch on and steal rides behind street cars or wagons. Never play on the car rails. Never cross a street except at a regular crossing. Never make chances. Always in passing behind a car look to see if another car, automobile or wagon is coming from the opposite direction. Always look both ways before crossing a street. Always be careful of the children of grown persons and children as well, in the opinion of Dr. Tolman.
