LOWER EXPRESS REBELLION HAS RATES ORDERED BEEN SUPPRESSED

Washington, Aug. 4.-Reductions in express rates which will cut the revenues of the companies full: \$20. 000,000 approximately 16 per cent of their gross revenues, were orde et b the Interstate Commerce Commus ic today to become effective October 1913. Notable reforms in the applic: tion of rates were also ordered.

The 100 pound rates for short dis tances either have been left unchang. ed or slightly reduced; for longer trave been lowered. For 50 pound packages all rates have been reduced. For packages of more than four pounds going more than 200 miles and less than 2.000 miles the rates are generally lower than the parcels post rates. For packages of more than four pounds going more than 2,000 miles the rates are practi cally the same.

The express companies had file statements claiming the losses of revenues under the proposed rates would be intolerable and argued that the establishment of the parcels pos had deprived them of thirty per cent of their revenues from parcels 11 pounds and less. They contended that the express company could not sur vive if the rates were enforced.

"This is equivalent to saying," con menced Commissioner Marble in his "that inasmuch as the shippers have been given a convenience and economy of the parcels post, the express carriers must on that count be allowed to charge higher

rates than would otherwise be right. The new system is not only a simplification of rate methods but in the opinion of rate experts lays the the express business.
