For its part, the United Cates Congress can show its gratitude by passing legislation hat provides those who are serving now and those who have With the past with the quality of life they deserve.
ife Apprat in mind, the House passed the Military Quality of egislapropriations bill for the 2006 fiscal year last week. Thi billion to fund military construction projects, family houn $\$ 53.5$ the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) proces. I am pas to report that the bill includes $\$ 43$ million for hovsing contric ion at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene. This level of funding allow Dyes increase in funding over last year's amount and will To bess to build 190 new housing units.
House bill also agreed to provide $\$ 315$ billion its veterans, the Department of Veterans Affairs in 2006. Making sure vertera have quality medical care was a top priority with this year's bill. Here are some highlights of the legislation:
ü Veterans Medical Services receives $\$ 21$ billion, a $\$ 1.68$ billion increase over last year's total and a $40 \%$ increase since 2001. ü Reflecting increased support for National Guard and Reserve veterans, funding for benefits such as veterans pensions and disability sees an increase of $\$ 1.5$ billion
ü The House bill also takes several steps to improve mental health care for veterans. For the first time ever, $\$ 2.2$ billion is allotted for specialty mental health care, and the bill requires comprehensive study on Post The bill dos mar verans
u The bill does not contain the Bush Administration's propo The Senate has yet to pass its version of either a Defense Veterans appropriations bill. Once they put that legislation to gether, the House and Senate will form a conference committee to hammer out any differences the two bills may have. It is my hope that the final version will retain the same commitment to our nilitary that the House has shown.
