'Grad' rain boosts monthly moisture

Local weatherman Bill Ellis says if it hadn't been for the annual "End of School Rain' during the past week, the month of May was about to end with just over a half inch of mois-

But a nice rainfall of .80 inch was received on graduation night locally, plus another .05 inch on Sunday, May 29, and then a slow-falling .46 inch in early-morning hours of

Tuesday, May 31.

That brought the month's total to 1.83 inches, and the calendar year's total to 7.94.

The May total was actually 34 inch more than was measured in the wet, wet year of 2004, when the month of May tied for the lowest moisture in a year that produced 36.56 inches, second-wettest month on record locally.

At this point a year ago, the official gauge had recorded 10.25 inches of moisture

10 years later: Friona's tornado remembered

Today, June 2, 2005, marks then housed several dozen the 10th anniversary of the devastating tornado that struck Friona. June 2, 1995, was a Friday. Monday, June 5, was to be my first day as a Friona Star employee. Bill Ellis had told me earlier that Friday that nothing very exciting ever happens in Friona.

That changed pretty quickly. The tornado struck from the south about 6:45 p.m. Friday evening destroying the trailer home of Delores and Ed Bailey at South Main and FM2397, pummeling the Mendoza family compound in the same area, and destroying several residences owned by Hereford Bi-Products for employee housing.

Veteran observers have Wheat Growers elevators at the south end of town deflected and split the tornado, saving much of the town from destruction. As it was, Health on the east edge of town was totally destroyed. The office building, which east of Friona sustained a tally destroyed as the mon-national TV news.


employees, was demolished to the foundation. Fortunately the office workers had gone home for the day.

The Excel plant west of town sustained major damage and a train near the plant was blown off the tracks and ended up on its side. A cinder block building on Highway 60, used then by Terry Stanberry as a mechanic shop, was totally blown away and scattered through the neighborhood.

Electricity was off for several days, complicating the retail trade that relied on it for pumping gas and operating cash registers.

Ten years later life is back to normal. Friona Industries chose to rebuild the Hi-Pro Feed Mill and offices. Excel is now Cargill Meat Solutions and they have steadily expanded over the years. Most damaged businesses were repaired and rebuilt.

Delores and Ed Bailey are now living in McLean, Texas. Ed was the most serious injury in the tornado when it destroyed their trailer home on South Main. Ed suffered brain damage and was in a coma for months and in rehab in Dallas for an extended period. The Baileys ended up closing their printing business and auctioning off its contents.

Ed continues life in McLean. We wish he and Delores and their family well. You are in our thoughts and prayers as we recall the events of 10 years past.

Honoring America's Soldiers

Over the Memorial Day weekend, Americans across the counry gathered together at ceremonies and events that honored the fine men and women who have protected our freedoms on the battlefield. In my opinion, it is impossible to thank these brave folks too much or too often. There are many ways that Americans can show their appreciation for what our military has done for us. We can fly the American flag in front of our homes or we can send letters to soldiers on the front lines. For its part, the United States Congress can show its gratitude by passing legislation that provides those who are serving now and those who have

served in the past with the quality of life they deserve.

With that in mind, the House passed the Military Quality of Life Appropriations bill for the 2006 fiscal year last week. This legislation calls for the Department of Defense to commit \$53.5 billion to fund military construction projects, family housing, and the Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) process. I am pleased to report that the bill includes \$43 million for housing construc-tion at Dyess Air Force Base in Abilene. This level of funding equals a 66% increase in funding over last year's amount and will allow Dyess to build 190 new housing units.

To help repay the debt this country owes its veterans, the House bill also agreed to provide \$31.5 billion in funding for the Department of Veterans Affairs in 2006. Making sure veterans have quality medical care was a top priority with this year's bill.

Here are some highlights of the legislation: ü Veterans Medical Services receives \$21 billion, a \$1.68 billion increase over last year's total and a 40% increase since 2001.

ü Reflecting increased support for National Guard and Reserve veterans, funding for benefits such as veterans pensions and disability sees an increase of \$1.5 billion.

ü The House bill also takes several steps to improve mental health care for veterans. For the first time ever, \$2.2 billion is allotted for specialty mental health care, and the bill requires a comprehensive study on Post Traumatic Stress Disorder in order to better serve combat veterans.

ü The bill does not contain the Bush Administration's proposals to increase co-pays and deductibles for some veterans

The Senate has yet to pass its version of either a Defense or Veterans appropriations bill. Once they put that legislation to-gether, the House and Senate will form a conference committee to ammer out any differences the two bills may have. It is my hope that the final version will retain the same commitment to our military that the House has shown.

Tennessee Co. bilks Texas Medicaid

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott has intervened in a now-unsealed federal "whistleblower" lawsuit against pharmacy ben-efit manager Caremark Inc. of Nashville, Tennessee. The suit, on file in a San Antonio federal court, alleges the company engaged Medicaid for payments of prescription drugs for individuals who were insured by one of its health plans.

Although the individuals and families covered by the plans Caremark designs and administers were also eligible for Medicaid assistance, Medicaid is always the payer of last resort by law if individuals are already covered by a health plan or pharmacy benefit manager. Attorney General Abbott seeks to recover dollars Caremark bilked from the Texas Medicaid program through this illegal scheme.

intend to send Caremark a past-due bill for its conduct,' said Attorney General Abbott. "This company schemed to avoid responsibility for its health care obligations to members who were paying premiums. Instead it opted to let the Medicaid programand Texas taxpayers—cover expenditures it should have covered on behalf of those already insured under its plan. I intend to get those dollars back for Texas.'

pharmacy benefit manager administers prescription drug benefit plans for insurance companies, employers, managed care organizations and other entities. In doing so, they strive to keep costs low for these clients, sometimes by illegal means.

The suit, also joined by the federal government and the states of Tennessee, Florida and Arkansas, tracks systematic effort by Caremark to allow Medicaid to pick up the tab for medications acquired by families who were dually covered by both Caremark

and Medicaid. State and federal law require health benefit plans to reimburse Medicaid when a claim covered by insurance is paid for by Medicaid.

The practices were brought to light in a 1999 whistleblower lawsuit filed by an employee of Caremark, whose job involved the review of claims processing. The employee complained to the company that legitimate government requests for reimbursement for these unlawful practices were being rejected, but company officials ignored her. She then filed suit on behalf of the state of tam, which entitles the whistleblower to a percentage of damages collected if the case succeeds.

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
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
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Bovina News



corn is up and is off to a good start. Some of the early planted cotton has already been re-planted and some others are currently being evaluated. In some instances a good stand emerged in one field but an adjacent field planted the same day had to be replanted. Seed quality, environmental conditions, and production systems all appeared to have played a role in poor emergence

When adverse conditions result in poor emergence or an uneven stand, replanting may be necessary. Decisions regarding replanting should be based on objective evaluations of the existing stand, stand uniformity, condition of emerged plants, calendar date and the costs associated with replanting. Thin, skippy stands are usually the primary considerations in the replant decision. Once the decision to replant has been made, consideration must be given to fine tuning the production system to optimize productivity of late planted cotton.

Cotton spacing studies have been conducted in the United States for more than a century. The optimum plant density for both optimum production and harvesting efficiency ranges from about 25 to 50,000 plants per acre in conventional row spacings. Grower experiences and field tests have demonstrated that acceptable yields can be obtained from stands as low as 13 to 26,000 plants per acre (1 to 2 per foot) if the plants are uniformly spaced.

> Plant spacing uniformity is a critical consideration in replant decisions. Poor spacing uniformity, or skips, may cause significant yield reductions even though the average number of plants per acre is adequate for optimum production. Research has shown that skips which decreased stands by 26 and 45%, respectively, lowered yields by 13 and 26%, respectively, even though final plant densities were in excess of two plants per foot of row. Studies in Arkansas indicate that stand losses of 20 to 30 percent can occur without yield decreases if the skips are bordered by rows greater than three feet in length are likely to result in higher yield losses than longer skips within the same row

> cotton usually coincide with the last practical dates for planting without incurring significant reductions in yield potential. On the Texas High Plains, it has been demonstrated that cotton planted on June 1, June 10 and June 20, yielded 7.6, 23.6 and 48.9%, respectively, less lint than cotton planted on May 15. In addition to lower yield potentials, later plantings often result in reduced fiber quality, delayed harvest and increased harvesting costs.

Texas wheat harvest in full swing

wheat harvest is well on its The first load of wheat was taken in at Interstate Grain in Corpus Christi the week of April 18. Harvest was off to a slow start, with only five truck loads by April 28 from the Premont and Harlingen areas. By May 16, harvest was in full swing in the southern part of Texas with Interstate Grain taking in 60-80 truck loads per day. Reports on the quality of the wheat from South Texas are Cut-off dates for planting good with strong test weights averaging 61.0 pounds; protein is down slightly with an average of 12 percent instead of the usual 13 percent for the area. Areas cutting include: the Hill Country and Valley areas, Dilly, Saginaw, Hondo and Seguin.

Harvest continues to move north, with the Ennis area, 60 miles south of Dallas, begin-ning harvest on May 23. It is too early to have an estimate on quality for this area, but overall bushels taken in will be down because of excessive moisture during planting. This area, as well as many areas of the state, had a stripe rust problem this year, which will also affect the overall yield.

harvest moves north. It would be great for producers to come out ahead this year," said David Moore, TWPB Chairman and

It's time again, and Texas bushels, down 3 percent from 2004, but 9 percent higher than 2003. This forecast is unchanged from the April forecast.

According to a May 1 survey conducted by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, statewide yield is expected to average 30 bushels per acre, down 1 bushel from last year, but up 2 bushels from two years ago. Harvested acreage for grain, at 3.5 million acres, is identical to 2004.

"The Upper Panhandle is producing a much larger percentage of this year's crop. Conditions have been very good, however, an emerging rust problem will have to be closely monitored," reported State Director Robin Roark.

Production on the Northern High Plains is forecast at 57.0 million bushels, up 18 percent from last year. Winter wheat production on the Low Plains is forecast at 23.7 million bushels, down 7 percent from last year. The Blacklands' production is estimated at 8.5 million bushels, down 45 percent from last year. Production on the Edwards Plateau is forecast at 6.4 million bushels, 40 percent higher than

percent from 2004. Yield is expected to average 45.4 bushels per acre, 1.9 bushels more than a year ago. Acreage to be harvested for grain is expected to




District water levels increase in 2004

Annual depth water level levels with an increase of 3.46 measurements made in early 2005 by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. show an average increase of 0.74 of a foot in the ground water levels of the Ogallala aquifer during 2004 within the district's 6.8 million acre service area. As a comparison, the 2004 depth-to-water level measurements had indicated an average decline of 1.34 feet during 2003.

'We are pleased that aboveaverage rainfall across the water district last year helped reduce pumpage from the aqui-fer," said Jim Conkwright, Dis-foot. trict Manager.

Lynn County had the largest wells. average annual change in water

The exceptions to this theory may be the area of southern Lynn County and various locations of Lubbock County, as well as other possible locations in the water district where the shallow depths to the water table may allow rapid infiltration of water to the aquifer.

Depth-to-water level measurements are normally made during January to March each year to allow stabilization of water levels in the aquifer following pumpage during the previous year of ground water produc-

The current issue of the High Plains District's newsletter, The Cross Section, features the results of the annual 2005 depthto-water level measurements. It contains individual county maps, which provide the approximate location of each well in the district's observation well network. Each map is accompanied by available 1995, 2000, 2004, and 2005 depth-to-water measurements for individual wells in that county. Also listed are available total changes in water levels for each observation well for the periods 1995 to 2005, 2000 to 2005, and 2004 to 2005.
