KAFFIR CORN BREAD IS NEW DISH IN OKLAHOMA

Stillwater, Okla., August 19.—Of course you have never made a breakfast of kaffir corn. This list of kaffir corn products Dr. Charles K. Francis, chemist of the Oklahoma A. & M. College experiment station, says you may have at your own table or order at a restaurant: Two kinds of breakfast food (ground and crisped), hot biscuits, muffins, corn pone, corn bread, Boston brown bread, corn pudding. There may be other uses, but these are a few. Popped kaffir corn has been found at the college experiment station to possess wonderful commercial opportunities.

The United States census of 1910 is authority for the statement that 4,658,752 bushels of kaffir corn and milo maize were grown in Oklahoma in 1909. That was some years ago and Oklahoma has developed wonderfully agriculturally and kaffir corn has leaped into popularity since then. Probably double that amount of kaffir corn will be harvested this season. The State could furnish a good slice of this three-meal a day country with kaffir corn food products and still retain enough of the kaffir plant to fatten thousands of steers.

For the last six or seven years the A. & M. College experiment station chemists have been working on the possibilities of kaffir corn as a food for human beings. Dr. Francis has served kaffir corn breakfast food at his own table and pronounces it first class. Experiments in baking bread with kaffir corn flour or meal are now going on in the laboratories here. An electric cook stove is a part of the laboratory equipment and a chemist sometimes has to try his hand at domestic science.

The outcome of these experiments may prove of vital interest to Oklahomans. This State is one of the great producers of kaffir corn and many experts expect to see Oklahoma lead the world in this crop. The removal of the grain from kaffir corn only slightly lessens the feeding quality of the kaffir plant for animals and after the heads are harvested the stalks and leaves can be run through a silage cutter and into the silo for winter food.

The food content of kaffir corn does not vary materially from that of corn. Sample analysis of kaffir corn, corn and wheat, taken at random from a stack of records in the chemical laboratory of the experiment station, show the following:

Analysis of Wheat—Water 10.5, ash 1.8, crude protein 11.9, crude fiber 1.8, nitrogen free extract 71.9, crude fat 2.1.

Analysis of Corn—Water 12.92, ash 1.25, crude protein 10.19, crude fiber 1.73, nitrogen free extract 70.22, crude fat 3.69.

Analysis of Kaffir Corn—Water 13.90, ash 1.41, crude protein 11.31, crude fiber 1.54, nitrogen free extract 2.56.

One of the chief difficulties encountered by the A. & M. chemists has been that of giving kaffir corn flour a pleasing color. The flour contains black specks when made from the black hulled white kaffir corn, a common variety in this State. While these tiny black specks do not interfere with the food value or cleanliness of the product, they might effect the sale as a commercial product. Experiments are under way to remedy this defect in color.

MARGARET BELL ON TRIAL ON ANOTHER FORGERY CHARGE

Immediately after the jury retired in one case of forgery against Margaret Bell she was arraigned on another charge of forgery and the selection of a jury to hear the evidence in the second case was begun.

The jury in the first case in which she was charged with the forgery of the name of Eddie Bussard of Electra to a check was given to the jury at about three o'clock this afternoon. The selection of another jury was then begun to try her for raising a check signed by Mr. Bussard's mother from \$5 to \$35.

The woman is being represented by Attorney Hunter. District Attorney Scurry is representing the state. The state will have practically the same witnesses as in the first case but the defense has not indicated whether the defendant will again take the stand or not.

CARBOLIC ACID ROUTE IS TAKEN

WOMAN ENDS LIFE THIS MORNING BY SWALLOWING POISON

SAYS "WELL, HERE GOES"

Takes Quince and a Hint of Acid and Death Ensues Within About an Hour

Rose Matkin, aged twenty-six, swallowed an ounce and a half of carbolic acid in her room at Lillian Hall's resort on Mulberry Row at about 10:45 this morning and about an hour later breathed her last.

The negro maid at the place was cleaning up the room this morning when she heard the woman who was sitting on the bed say, "Well, here goes" and she turned in time to see her "drain" nearly the entire contents of a two-ounce bottle of carbolic acid down her throat and fall back upon her bed writhing in agony. The negro alarmed other inmates of the place and while a physician was being summoned some of them who know antidotes from other experiences with this poison, forced whites of egg down the woman's throat. When the physician arrived he continued the administration of this and other antidotes but he realized that his efforts were hopeless. The report had been sent out that the woman was dead and Justice Brothers was summoned and arrived with Deputy Sheriff Carnes before the woman was dead.

Other Women Gather.

News of the attempted suicide spread quickly among the women of her village and as she held it she said in varying degrees of dishabille and gathered with the crowd of women and the officers that watched at the bedside of the dying woman. Eggs came to the eyes of a few of them and they spoke in hushed tones. One, after a look at the dying woman turned and asked quickly and nervously for a cigarette and one being found for her she lighted it with a hand that shook and walked into an adjoining room where she sat upon the edge of a bed with her face in her hands.

Another picked up the nearly empty bottle from which Rose had drunk

the fiery fluid that was now eating at going to live until it's my time to go. "This stuff won't ever get me. I'm I've thought about it all right, lots of times, but I've never had the nerve." Others concurred with these sentiments but there were women there who were silent and their silence seemed to say that sometime when the hour grew too dark they too would attempt to cut short nature's course with a deadly poison.

Woman Soon Succumbs.

The woman never spoke after she took the acid and as she lay there with her breath gasping growing shorter and shorter and the death sweat gathering on her forehead one after another of the women came to the bedside and taking her whitened hand would murmur, "Poor Rose." Finally her breathing came in convulsive sobs and then ceased altogether and her features set in the stillness and immobility of death. Women whose eyes have been the sport of lust and passion sobbed as they turned and left the room while Justice Brothers began to prepare for the inquest.

The Matkin woman had been in Wichita 2 1/2 years last November her home is said to have been at Waco where she has relatives. One of the women told a reporter that the dead woman was a niece of John L. Sullivan, the famous ex-pugilist. Other inmates of the place said she had eaten scarcely anything for two weeks and had during that time been drinking heavily. This fact made the poison act all the more certainly and quickly, the physician said.

SOME RIDICULOUS THINGS ABOUT SEASON'S STYLES

The September Woman's Home Companion is an Advance Autumn Fashion Number and contains the latest information about styles. The editor of the Fashion Department, Grace Margaret Gould, takes what might be called a "middle of the road" course. She wants women to dress fashionably, but, at the same time, economically. She laughs at the extremes of French fashions while she adapts the best points to the needs of the American women. She describes as follows what she did when she looked over the new fall fashion designs sent to her from Paris:

"I laughed not merely chuckled but laughed until I shook and was ready to cry. You remember I once whispered to you that I am fat. Well, you know how a jolly, fat person can laugh, don't you? That was the way. Now wasn't that a very irreverent thing for a fashion editor to do? But I did, and I could not help wishing all my good friends, our women readers could have had a peep over my shoulder at those sketches—not to follow the fashions depicted—mercy! JAPANESE PEOPLE WANT INCREASE IN STATURE

Hope by Means of Callisthenics and Exercises to Gain in Size as Individuals

Denver, Colo., Aug. 19.—The stature of the Japanese people is going to be heightened through American influence. As a result of callisthenic and eugenic methods imported from the United States, the little brown men of today hope to become the big brown men of the centuries to come.

This was the statement made today by Mrs. Antoinette A. Hawley, honorary president of the Colorado W. C. T. U., who returned from a trip around the world just in time to celebrate her seventy-second birthday anniversary a few days ago.

Despite her advanced age, Mrs. Hawley is as active as a girl. She hopes to be again circulating tour on her seventy-third birthday.

"The tremendous influence of American thought in the Far East was the one thing that impressed me most during my travels," said Mrs. Hawley. "This is most noticeable in Japan. Everywhere there you will find evidences of the American influence. The United States has almost a complete monopoly on furnishing the little brown men with ideas.

"By American methods of physical culture and hygiene, the Japanese actually are proposing to increase the height of the inhabitants of the island kingdom. In one school I saw several hundred girls going through a series of physical culture exercises copied after those given in American schools and the Japanese authorities explained that these exercises are the beginning of a movement to develop the stature of the people of Japan."

"I do not believe that there is any feeling of general dislike for America in Japan. I am sure I saw none of it during my travels and I visited all parts of the empire. On the contrary my observations lead me to believe the Japanese people are very fond of us and look to us for lessons in advancement in all lines."

Mrs. Hawley, who is an ardent believer in equal suffrage, having voted in every state election in Colorado since the women were enfranchised there, says the women of the Far East, though far behind the women of other countries, already have begun campaigns for their social and political freedom.

"The women of the Far East," said Mrs. Hawley, "are making slow but certain progress. There is unrest there as everywhere today. Chinese women, long ago, unbound their feet as the first sign of emancipation. But it will be a long time before the Far Eastern centuries, regarded as the mere playthings of men. It will be many years before either they or the men of the Far East get accustomed to the notion that they are free, intelligent, individual human beings."

BRYAN DEFENDS LECTURE PLANS

SAYS THAT OBLIGATIONS HAVE INCREASED AS FAST AS HIS INCOME

LECTURING AND WRITING

Declares He Has no Intention of Neglecting His Official Duties in Any Manner

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 19.—The current issue of "The Commoner" contains a signed defense of Bryan's course in going on the lecture platform. It follows:

"That the readers of the Commoner may be able to answer any criticism whether thoughtless or malicious that may be directed against me because of my lecturing during a part of my vacation, the following facts are set forth—facts that have been taken into consideration by friends—and ought to have been taken into consideration even by those politically unfriendly.

"When I announced that I found it necessary to supplement my official income and that I would turn to the lecture platform as the most natural, as well as an entirely legitimate means of earning what additional income I needed, the question was at once asked, 'Why is Mr. Bryan unable to live upon a salary of \$12,000 a year?'

"It ought to have occurred to anyone who was tempted to ask the question that a cabinet officer could live on \$12,000 a year if he had nothing to consider except the expenses attendant upon living in Washington, but whether he could add the expense of official life to his other expenses, and meet them all out of his salary.

"Every man who has reached a position where he is likely to be appointed to a high office, has assumed obligations which cannot be suspended when he enters office. My obligations to church, charity, education and for my insurance cannot be discontinued. They amount to more than \$6,800 per year, and these, though the largest, are by no means all, will absorb more than half the salary which I receive.

"A great many public officials, especially those holding the higher offices, have had to supplement their salaries sufficient to meet the outside expenses. It may be my fault that I have not, but if so happens that the larger part of my property is not only non-productive, but a charge upon my income, in fact, the income which I receive from that part which produces is not sufficient to cover taxes, insurance and care for that part which is non-productive. My outside income, therefore, is a minus quantity.

"My income for nearly twenty years has been derived almost wholly from lectures and writing—the larger part from lectures, and since both writing and lecturing are honorable professions, there is no more reason why I should not augment my income from them than that other officials should refrain from adding to their official incomes the returns from business or investment.

"I have not complained of the salaries of cabinet officers; neither would I advocate an increase, although the position of Secretary of State carries with it more enticement than any other position in the cabinet, because of its relation to the outside world, and my acceptance of hospitality throughout the country and throughout the world has increased the amount of entertaining expected of me. But there is no rule requiring a cabinet officer to compress his expenditures within the salary limit and no criticism has been offered heretofore when cabinet officers have drawn upon their private incomes to meet their expenses when those expenses
