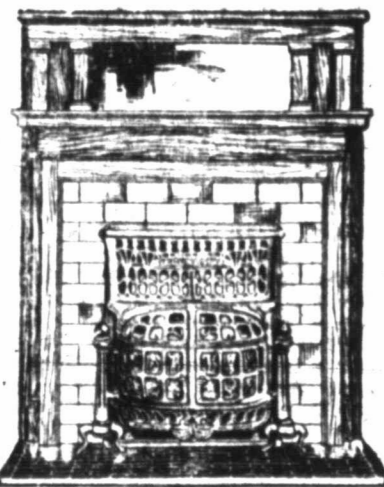

France Agrees On Mothers' Pensions  
Paris, Aug. 25.—Final details of the mothers' pension law were agreed upon today by the cabinet after a report submitted by the minister of the interior and the minister of labor. During the period of repose made compulsory by the new law, the government will allow a pension to all mothers who work, from 10 cents to 30 cents per day until the child is born. In case the mother nurses the baby her pension will be increased 10 cents per day. The sum of \$2,000,000 has been provided to meet the extra expense, departments and com-

munes sharing the burden with the state.

## ASSESSMENT OF COST OF PAVING

### CITY ATTORNEY BONNER ISSUES RULING UPON CITY'S RIGHTS IN MATTER

### UP TO PROPERTY OWNERS

They Can Be Made to Pay Three-fourths of Entire Cost, Including Laying of Storm Sewer

In a written opinion submitted to the mayor and the city council, City Attorney Bonner construes the statutes and the decisions thereon to mean that the city can assess three-fourths of the entire cost of digging storm sewers, grading and constructing pavement on the streets and at the intersections against the abutting property owners, and that the entire cost of sidewalks and curbing against such property owners.

In his opinion Mr. Bonner quotes the revised civil statute acts of 1889 as to "Powers of city council, etc." and further quotes the revised civil statutes 1911, articles 1006 and 1007, and several court decisions thereon and deduces the opinion that the council has the right and authority to levy the proportionate cost of paving street and alley intersections against owners of "abutting" property.

Discussing the matter Mr. Bonner says:

"The question has been before the courts in numerous cases with the result that there is some conflict in the decisions as to just what property abuts on adjacent property. There is no decision in the Texas courts on the question but the great weight of authority seems to hold that the word 'abutting' refers to that which is on the side as well as the ends and the supreme court of Kansas, in a statute authorizing the levy or assessments for improvements on the ground abutting the improvements has held it to include everything which touched the lot, whether in front or on the side. City of Lawrence vs. Kilian 113 Kan. 498. Again under the statute of the State of Illinois, similar to the statute of Texas, it was expressly held that the city had no authority to expend municipal funds for the improvement of street intersections, holding that the assessments should properly be made against the owners of the abutting property. Holt vs. City of East Saint Louis, 150 Ill. 530. It was also held in the city of Springfield vs. Green, 120 Ill. 269, that where the side of a street, as well as the end thereof was bound by the lot on the street in front and at the side were both to be paved, the corner lot should bear the expense of the improvement in front of the side as well as at the end of the lot.

"I therefore conclude that the city has authority to order any street in this city to be paved and to assess three-fourths of the entire cost of digging the storm sewers, grading, constructing pavement on the streets and at the intersections and the entire cost of sidewalks and curb against the abutting property owners.

"It has further been held that where a portion of the street is occupied by a railroad or street railway, such railway company may be required to pave or otherwise improve its road bed with two feet on the outside of each rail and the cost of such improvement may be applied by the city as a credit on its proportionate share of expense in making such improvements.

"In determining what is the actual course of improvements such as paving and what cost may be assessed the authority has held the following to be legitimate items of cost. The installation of storm sewers; preparing the bed of the road or street, bringing it to a proper grade with sufficient means for carrying off the water that falls upon it and to cover it with suitable material and properly work the surface in the way; the services of skilled men requiring in order to secure the proper plans and the proper performance of the work, surveyor's or engineer's fee, the cost of advertising and in fact all legitimate expenses incident to the performance of the work.

"I have conferred with the city engineer and with various contractors who have been engaged in paving work of different kinds and from what I learn from the estimates given me from such sources I conclude that should the city pay the expense in bringing the street to proper grade and then bear the expense of paving all street and alley intersections that in such events more than one-third of the total cost of the improvements would be borne by the city without reference to the matter of storm sewers.

"In the matter of the pavement heretofore constructed in the city I know that it has been estimated by competent engineers that the city, after bearing the expense of installing storm sewer, bringing the street to grade, paving the intersections and in addition to this paying one-third of the cost of improvement along the street, bore more than one-half of the entire cost of such improvements.

"The statute provides that a lien may be created against any property abutting upon a street improved and such property (provided it is not a homestead) may be sold under execution to pay the cost of such improvement. Where the property is a homestead the statute provides that a personal judgment shall be created against the property.

## TEXAS LANDS FIRST RANGERS IN PATRONAGE

Leads Every State in Union in Number of Federal Appointments

Washington, Aug. 25.—That the work of installing democrats in federal offices in place of republicans, especially in Texas, is proceeding at a rapid rate and that patronage is being rapidly distributed among the faithful by the present administration is shown by the nominations which have been sent to the Senate since President Wilson took office. These nominations number approximately 3000 and these about 2000 are postmasters.

Texas ranks first among the states in number of federal appointments. One hundred and sixty-seven jobs, according to the official record, have fallen to the sons of the Lone Star State.

Iowa is second with 109, Illinois third with 100, Pennsylvania fourth with 95, New York fifth with 94, Ohio sixth with 92 and North Carolina seventh with 74.

It will be seen from the following that the South is far behind the Northern and Western states in getting federal patronage. Texas and North Carolina are the only ones in the Southern group to secure a large slice of the pie.

The jobs awarded to the states are as follows: Alabama 45, Arizona 20, California 27, Connecticut 19, Florida 25, Idaho 20, Indiana 51, Kansas 72, Louisiana 25, Maryland 5, Michigan 53, Mississippi 40, Montana 1, Nevada 6, New Jersey 39, New York 96, North Dakota 43, Oklahoma 69, Pennsylvania 95, South Carolina 20, Tennessee 36, Virginia 39, West Virginia 26, Wyoming 9, Porto Rico 3, Alaska 2, Arkansas 30, Colorado 20, Delaware 10, Georgia 56, Illinois 100, Iowa 109, Texas 167.

## NATIONAL MATCHES AT CAMP PERRY

Crack Riflemen and Sharpshooters of United States Began Elimination Competition Today

Camp Perry, O., Aug. 25.—Crack riflemen and sharpshooters of the United States today began the elimination competitions in the matches of the National Rifle Association of America on the Camp Perry rifle range where the international and national rifle shoot began a week ago. The match which began today is open to members of the army, navy, marine corps, United States military and naval academies, educational institutions, organized militia of the United States and the District of Columbia and the National Rifle Association of America and affiliated clubs.

The coveted prize in today's shooting is the president's cup, emblematic of the individual military championship of the United States. With the exception of Nebraska, Nevada, Ar-

izona, Idaho and South Carolina, every state in the Union was represented. To the winner goes a gold medal appropriately inscribed, an autograph letter from President Wilson and cash. Second and third men receive respectively silver medal and cash bronze medal and cash.

HUERTA'S GRIEVOUS MISTAKE

Houston Chronicle.—In assuming that the Wilson administration is not backed by a strong and united popular sentiment relative to its Mexican policy Victoriano Huerta has made a grievous mistake.

Undoubtedly General Huerta is inclined to believe that the Wilson administration was not sustained by popular sentiment in its efforts to eliminate him from Mexican affairs because the American people have declared their disinclination to use force except as a last resort.

Had the United States preface its suggestions to General Huerta by assembling a considerable army along the border and a strong fleet of battleships along the Mexican coast, it is quite probable that they would have been received by him much more favorably than they were.

proached the subject quietly and unobtrusively through its special representative, John Lind.

Mr. Lind did not enter Mexico backed by a hundred thousand men and a fleet of fifty ships of the line, as he might have done, and as he would have done had popular sentiment had its way.

This government wished to give Victoriano Huerta an opportunity of indicating to the world the depth and sincerity of his patriotism, so, without the display of force or the implication of threats, it suggested to him, through its special representative, John Lind, that he step aside in the interest of peace, which he has utterly failed to bring about, and give others a chance.

Had Victoriano Huerta been as unselfishly devoted to the welfare of his country as he pretends he would have gladly acceded to the propositions made to him by the Wilson administration. Had he been sufficiently intelligent to grasp the real meaning of such propositions made by a special representative of the United States of America under such circumstances, he would have accepted them without parley.

Victoriano Huerta is neither a patriot nor a statesman. He is a rather high type of ambitious bandit. He is occupying the national palace because it suits his personal pride and appeals to his personal vanity.

From the fact that John Lind approached him unsupported by a show of arms he concluded that American sentiment was so strongly in his favor that the administration did not dare appear too hostile. Victoriano Huerta could not rise to the conception of generous motives or kindly feelings on the part of the American government.

Victoriano Huerta believed that Lind presented him with a golden opportunity. Defiance of the United States might gather about him all the quarrelsome factions of Mexico, and, since American sentiment seemed split in his favor, defiance of the United States could be carried out with impunity.

ident Wilson's suggestions and accused the latter of not being sustained by the united sentiment of the American people. By this time, Huerta has doubtless learned his mistake. Republicans and democrats alike have hastened to assure the president of their support; party lines have been swept aside; the country has been brought together as one man.

State Senator John G. Willacy indicated as to whether he will be a candidate for governor. It is whether he can raise the money with which to make the campaign. Let's see. Judging by the expense accounts of others—successful and unsuccessful candidates for gubernatorial honors, it requires an average of \$16,152.29 for each candidate. The salary attached to the office is \$4000. Figuring it that way, it would take all the salary for the first and second terms to pay the expense of getting the nomination for the first term, and still lack \$609.16 of coming out even.

A DREAM OF HARMONY

(By Savoyard in Houston Chronicle) Mrs. Ormsby McHarg is a political evangelist running up and down the earth saying much and doing little. Her principal call is that there is relentless hostility to the democratic party. He would regret the g. o. p. if in his power and possibly give it a dose of reform if Penrose and Cannon, Lodge and Gallinger, Root and Alden Smith and the rest of the standard-bearers would take the pill, which they wouldn't.

Just now McHarg is all for harmony. Here is his manifesto:

"The time is at hand when the republicans and 'bull moosers' must unite in common defense against the democratic party. We now have the opportunity of crystallizing the mistakes of the present administration, the Chicago dinner has been proposed as a method of preparing for the reunion. This should not prove difficult. Both republicans and progressives have been influenced for a generation by the same political thought. The progressive movement was a political and not political."

Greater men than Mr. McHarg have made the mistake that harmony is to be commanded; that it is to be bought or bullied or cajoled. It is a spontaneous product and, politically speaking, it is the child agreement in the matter of principles and concord in the matter of action.

How are you going to put in the same trundled Theodore Roosevelt and William Howard Taft? As well seek to herd in the same basket a brass-headed snapping turtle and a frying chicken. A diamond-back rattlesnake and a Norway rat would have a fight if yoked together, but it would be tranquillity compared with the terrific combat between the Hon. Boies Penrose and the Hon. Robert M. La Follette.

That is not a fusion that McHarg is after, but an amalgamation. He proposes to take a little chunk of hell and a little batch of elysium, fuse them together and make Utopia out of them; but whether Roosevelt is to be boss or Taft he does not go on to say. Whether the "Grand Young Man" Beveridge or Jim Watson, whether old "Subsidy Pom's" ghost or Victor Murdock, whether old Joe Cannon or Medill McCormick, whether John C. Spooner or R. M. La Follette, whether Lafe Young or Al Cummins are to be the aristocracy of his realm he leaves to our poor conjecture.

One thing you can depend on, and that is this—the Hon. Teddy Roosevelt will have none of it unless he is put at the head of the thing. There may be some doubt about some matters in the future, but there is no doubt about that. This evangel of Mr. McHarg will

likely annex one enthusiastic recruit—Hon. Eugene Foss, now governor of Massachusetts. The governor is as whimsical in political moods as the Hon. Bourke Cockran. A while ago he left the republican party because he disagreed with its policy of a conspiracy between the producers of raw materials and the producer of finished products to rob the American people by means of prohibitive tariff duties on foreign merchandise.

Foss got into the democratic party, a glorious convert, and was honored by an election to congress and to the chief magistracy of the old bay state. Long before the Baltimore convention of 1912 he was in a war with the labor he employed and declared he would move his plant across the border and make his wares in Canada. He is yet at war with his employees and still threatens to go abroad to manufacture his varietal line.

Theodore Roosevelt is a capable politician. He has his eye to the ground and his finger on the public pulse. He knows that McHarg's plan is all wrong and will have none of it. If in 1914 the Wilson administration has the confidence of the people to the extent it now enjoys Roosevelt will support the democratic ticket, and if, on the contrary, that administration shall be as unpopular as Grover Cleveland's was in 1896, then, and in that event, Teddy hopes to come in as the successor of Wilson elected by his progressive party.

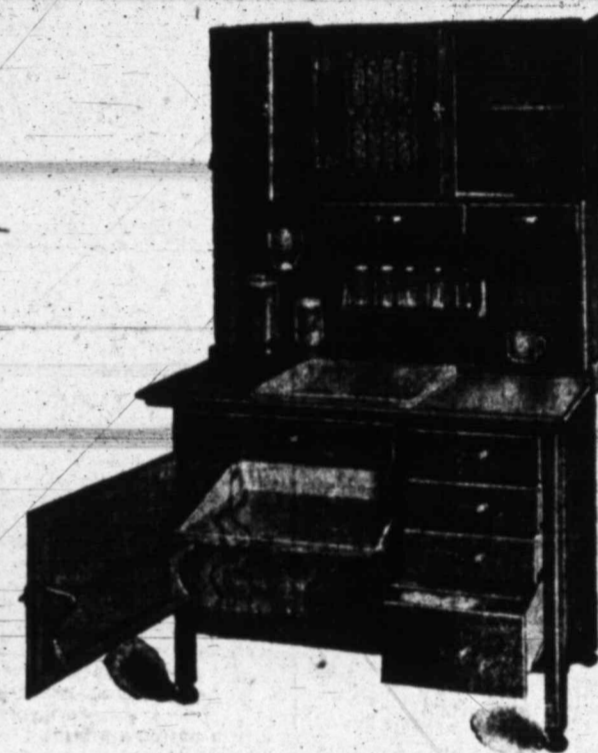

### SCHOOL HYGIENE CONGRESS OPENS

MEETING OF NOTED EDUCATORS AND HEALTH WORKERS IN SESSION AT BUFFALO

### AIR BORNE "DRIPLETS"

Speaker Declares Principal Factors in the Spread of Tuberculosis

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 25.—Air borne "driplets" are the principal factors in the spread of tuberculosis, according to Professor Edward C. Jordan, of the University of Chicago, who was the first speaker today at the opening sessions of the Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene, which will continue in session throughout the week. President emeritus Chas. W. Elliot of Harvard, president of the congress, called the great meeting to order today. More than 300 of the most noted educators and health workers in the world are scheduled to address the delegates

who represent every state of the Union, and the leading nations of the world. Every well-known educational institution in the Americas is represented officially and hundreds of cities in Canada and the United States likewise are represented by formally accepted delegates.

Professor Jordan's declaration that "air borne driplets" are the chief cause of dissemination of tuberculosis came in his address entitled "Disease Carriers Among School Children." He pointed out that the gathering together of children in schools must necessarily play a large part in the dissemination of diseases and especially those to which the young are subject.

Many opportunities for infection, as regards specific opportunities for infection furnished by the school, it must be admitted that while the slate, the common drinking cup and the roller towel are fast passing away, sufficient facilities for the transfer of disease seems still exist in the friendly exchange of the pocket handkerchief, lip moistener pencils, chewing gum and the like," said Prof. Jordan.

"One danger peculiarly difficult to guard against is the discharge of minute driplets of spray from the mouth or nose by sneezing, coughing or speaking. These highly infectious driplets may float in the air for some minutes and, as shown by experiments can be borne by air currents to a distance of several feet. In the opinion of many, these

air borne driplets are the principal factors in the spread of tuberculosis. The school playground as well as the school room must be considered in considering the question of school diseases. And the fight to exterminate the spread of diseases among children, of course means a fight to prevent disease from spreading to other persons. Increasing the number of associates must necessarily increase the chances of infection.

"The abolition of the common drinking cup is a highly desirable procedure, but has anyone ever put on record a measurable diminution in disease in a school after the introduction of the bubbling fountains? In point of fact we do not know to what extent the various influences summed up under school attendance are factors in the dissemination of infectious diseases. The question is one for deep consideration."

### School House Ventilation

Under the subject, "Construction of School Houses from an Architect's Standpoint" W. K. Kilham of Boston, declared that the present intricate systems of ventilation are inadequate and a waste of money.

"The enormous cost and installation of present school house ventilating systems," said Kilham, "is too heavy a graft on the tax payer and the results obtained are not worth the cost. More healthful as well as economical results can be obtained by a return to a method of ventilation by simply opening windows and

supplying school rooms with pure air that is really fresh instead of cooked."

"The education of school hygiene to industrial hygiene," said Dr. Ira S. Wile, member of the New York board of education, "should be very close. Teaching of school hygiene should be based upon the practical use that is to be made of it. A large portion of life is spent in occupation, therefore the importance of industrial hygiene cannot be gain-said. If the public schools are to prepare the children for citizenship, they should aim to prepare citizens of the present to work toward the same ends. The cost of teaching industrial hygiene is negligible compared to the amounts needed for expenses afterwards."

### Harness Racing Revived in New York

New York, Aug. 25.—High class harness racing was revived here today when a meeting to last through August 30, under the auspices of the grand circuit officials, opened at the Empire City track in connection with the fair and industrial exposition being held there. Purses of \$28,000 have been hung up for the nine events. All colt races and the 2:05 trotting and 2:04 pacing races will be mile heats, two in three. The other races will be three in five.

### INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION LAW NOT IN OPERATION

No Appointees Have Been Confirmed and Action by Congress is Being Urged

Washington, Aug. 25.—Economists who hailed with delight the enactment of the law creating an industrial commission just about one year ago, today are besieging Congress for some action in the matter. The measure, which was passed with considerable acclaim, has not yet become effective, simply because no commissioners have yet been able to undertake the work. President Taft nominated nine commissioners but they "died" with the last Congress. More than a month ago President Wilson sent in the names of nine persons, but so far the Senate has failed to act upon them. The fear is now expressed that unless the commission is soon able to get down to work, it cannot complete the task assigned to it in the time specified in the creative law. The Hughes-Borah bill establishing the body specified that it must report to Congress within three years after passage of the measure. One year already has passed without any action at all. If the commission lived up strictly

to the scope of the work outlined for it, it is expected to be one of the most important steps ever taken toward solutions growing out of the age old war between capital and labor. It originated with some of the ablest thinkers and best known industrial students in the country, about the time that the nation was shocked by the McNamara dynamiting confessions. It was designed to ascertain exactly the relations between the employers and their employes in every field of labor.

The law provides for a commission of nine members, three representing the employers three representing the employes and three representing the public. The members are to be paid their expenses and \$10 per day while actually working. The commission is given broad investigational powers. Its specific duty is to inquire into the general condition of labor in the United States in all the principal industries including agricultural, and especially into the industries controlled by corporations; to study the effect of industrial conditions on public welfare; to study conditions of sanitation and safety of employes; to investigate labor unions and associations and organizations of employes; to investigate disputes between capital and labor and formulate some plan of settlement to be suggested to Congress. Just why the nominations have been held up in the Senate this session has not been made clear except

that certain southern senators are said to be dissatisfied that there is not enough representation from that section among the membership.
