That the United States is backed by a world-wide sentiment in its peace policy is conceded in diplomatic circles here. Tangible evidences of the attitude of France came today in the news dispatches from Paris stating was practically certain Presi dent Poincare and Foreign Minister Uichon would not receive Francisc de la Barra, appointed minister to France by Provisional President Huerta, and now en route to his post His status, it was pointed out in the advices from Paris, was similar to that of Gen. Feltx Diaz, special am-bassador to Japan from the Huerta administration, who, it was announce ed in Tokio, would not be welcomed except as an individual.

ITY ATTORNEY BONNER ISSUES RULING UPON CITY'S RIGHTS

UP TO **Property owners**

fley Can be Made to Pay Three-fourthe of Entire Cost, Including Laying of Storm Sewer

In a written opinion submitted to the mayor and the city council, City Altorney Bonner construes the stat utes and the decisions thereon to mean that the city can assess three fourths of the entire cost of diggins storm sewers, grading and construct ing pavement on the streets and at the intersections against the abutting property owners, and can assess the entire cost of sidewalks and curbing against such property owners.

In his opinion Mr. Bonner quote the revised civil statute acts of 1889 as to "Powers of city council, etc.," and further quotes the revised civi statutes 1911, articles 1006 and 1005 and several court decisions thereon and deduces the opinion that the council has the right and authority to levy the proportionate cost of pav-ing street, and alley intersections against owners of "abutting" proper

Discussing the matter Mr. Bonner

Bays:
"The question has been before the courts in numerous cases with the result that there is some conflict in the decisions as to just what property abutts on adjacent property. There is no decision in the Texas courts on the question but the great weight of authority seems to hold that the word 'abutting' refers to that which is on the side as well as the ends and the supreme court of Kansas, in statute authorizing the levy or assessments for improvements 'on the ground abutting the improvements' has held it to include every thing which touched the lot, wheth er in front or on the side. City o Lawrence vs. Killan 11th Kansas 499. Again under the statute of the State of Illinois, similar to the staute of Pexas, it was expressly held that the city had no authority to expend municipal funds for the improvemen of street intersections, holding that the assessments should properly be made against the owners of the abutting property. Holt vs. City of East Saint Louis, 150 III. 580. It was also held in the city of Springfield vs. Green, 120 III. 269, that where the side of a street, as well as the end thereof was bound by the lot on the street to be improved, and where the street in front and at the side were both to be paved, the corner should bear the expense of the improvement in front of the side as well as at the end of the lot.

"In the matter of the pavement heretofors constructed in the city I know that it has been estimated by competent engineers that the city, atter bearing the expense of installing storm sewer, bringing the street to grade, paving the intersections and in addition to this paying one-third of the cost of improvement along the street, bore more than one-half of the entire cost of such improvements.

"The statute provides that a lien may be created against any property abutting upon a street improved and such property (provided it is not a iomestead) may be sold under execution to pay the cost of such improvement. Where the property is a homestead the statute provides that a personal judgment shall be created against the property. W. N. BONNER."






