Governor Sulzer Is A Very Pitiable Figure

(By Herbert Corey, in the Dallas Times-Herald.) Albany, Oct. 1.—There will never be another impeachment trial in this country," said Governor Sulzer. "One hundred years from now lawyers will still be going for precedents to the case of the people of the State of New York against William Sulzer."

The central figure in the most important impeachment trial since that of Andrew Johnson—some good lawyers hold that in its bearing on constitutional law this Sulzer case is even greater—stopped in pacing up and down the floor of his office in the executive mansion to shake an emphatic forefinger at his caller. His face lighted up. He seemed to feel a certain vanity in the very greatness of the catastrophe in which he has been engulfed.

"All the great continental journals have representatives here," said he. "The reports of the trial are being printed in every paper on the globe. Lawyers have come here from every university in Europe, perhaps, to study the case. It is a cause celebre. I have a wonderful array of counsel. Wishes He Had Never Taken Office.

He walked over nearer the long windows that faced upon the well kept lawn. Characteristically enough they are draped by lace-curtains that are not only too short by half, but are soiled and ragged at the ends. Nothing is quite so ill as this in this disorderly office. Papers are piled high on chairs and desks and heaped upon the floor. The linen summer coverings of the furniture are stained and torn, and pulled away. In the middle of the floor, handy to the path that Sulzer follows diagonally through the office length, is a solid brass cuspidor, half the height of an umbrella stand. Dust lies on the handsome mahogany. "I wish that I had never taken office," he burst out, with Sulzerian frankness. "My friends warned me—"

Declares He Will Take the Stand.

Then he returned to a consideration of his story. "I will take the stand," said he. "They cannot keep me off the stand. I will demand the right to tell my story."

A most remarkable scene followed. The interviewer sat hunched up in one of the great chairs in the office. Mr. Sulzer paced up and down before the audience—of one—and apparently rehearsed the speech he proposes to deliver when he finally takes the witness stand. He repeated the objection which the state's attorneys will make. "The moment," he said, drawing himself up to his full height, shaking back that Henry Clay forelock of tow colored hair, and shaking a monkey forefinger at an imaginary court, "the moment that I begin to tell the story of Charles F. Murphy—and I WILL tell it—some of those senators who have enjoyed his voice will object. And then I shall say 'Judge Cullen—'

Sulzer an Actor.

He swung on his heels and his long forefinger fairly stabbed the air as he histrionically picked out in their seats in the senate the men he accuses. "And if I am forbidden the right to speak I shall appeal to the people this very night your honor," he declared. "I have here in my pocket proofs—"

That appeal to the people will have weight, too. "One reason why I am being legally lynched is because I have kept the faith," he said. "I tried to give the people of New York the primary law the Democratic party had promised, but which the bosses would never grant. From their point of view they were right. Even with the abortive primary law we now have on the statute books—a law bad from every point of view—I have defeated every upstate leader in the primaries."

"But the real reason is that I have been after the grafters. I have secured the indictment of nineteen grafters in the prison scandals, and shown that \$17,000,000 were stolen by the highway thieves in twenty-two counties alone. When they saw that I could not be handled—one of the biggest men in New York said where you sit now, and tried to bribe me. They offered me everything—money, political power. Then they tried to frighten me. And when they could not, the grafters went to Murphy. 'Now,' they said, at the meeting in Helms' parlors, 'you must stop him. We have failed.'"

"And this impeachment trial is the result. If Murphy had the power he would hang me for the crime of wearing a slouch hat."

Says Not Afraid of the Facts.

Sulzer declared that he was not afraid of the issue. If the case were to be tried on its merits, "I have always wanted to go to trial on the facts," said he. "I have been criticized by those who did not know, because they thought I was trying to avoid trial. But my lawyers have insisted on having the constitutional questions settled first. But even before this court I am not afraid of what may come. In all the history of the English speaking people you will not find any instance of the people going back on a man who stood up for them. The people will know who is in the right. And when they realize that in order to try me for acts they say were committed before I took office they have overthrown the precedents of three hundred years, the people will say: 'Bill Sulzer isn't being tried. He is being legally lynched.'"

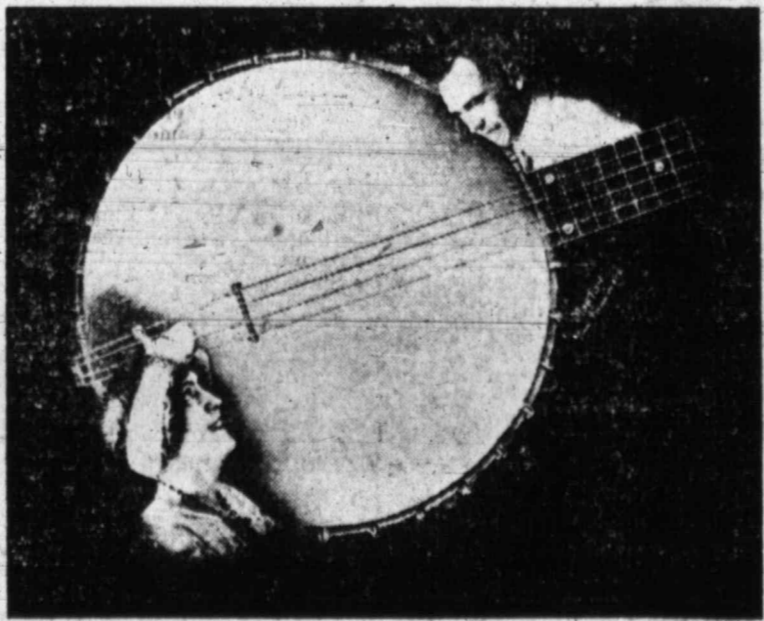

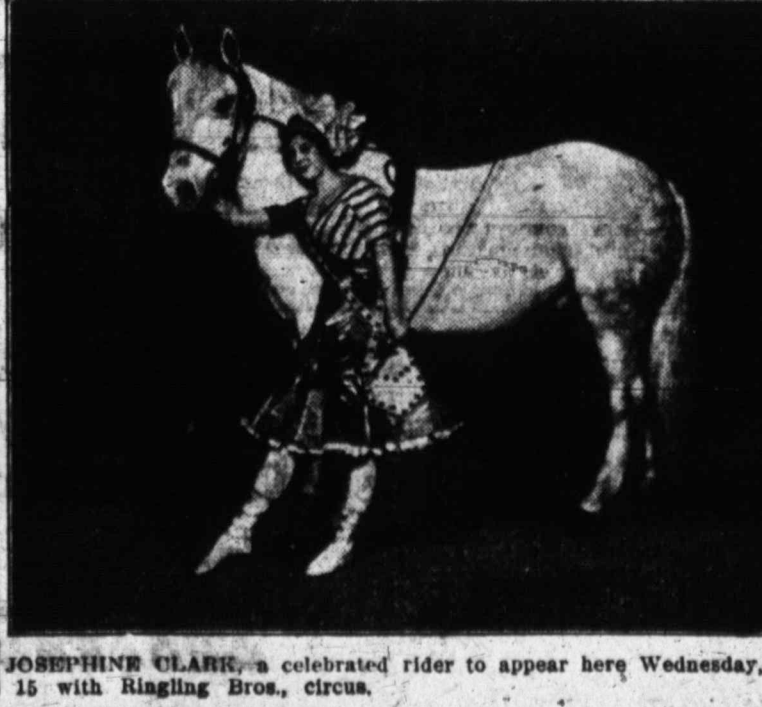
