## COLD STORAGE PLANT IS RUN BY MUNICIPALITY

City of Cleveland Has Plan To Bask High Cost of Living. Proving Successful

Cleveland, O., Oct. 14.—Mrs. Housewife of Cleveland, has taken at least one fall out of that old bogey, high cost of living and the city has helped her to do it. Use of the municipal cold storage plant was the hold by which the old bogey's shoulders were pinned to the mat.

The city's cold storage plant is open to the humblest citizen as well as the biggest commission merchant. Small quantities of eggs, butter and the like can be stored in it by individuals at a nominal price. Mrs. Housewife of Cleveland can buy a barrel of fine apples today for about \$2 and put them in the city's cold storage plant until May and the storage cost will be only 40 cents. In the spring when dealers want \$5 a

barrel for them she and her family can eat their fill at one-third that price. She could store away a hundred pounds of good butter along in June at 20 cents a pound and take it out in February when everyone else is paying 40 cents a pound.

Only half of the city's West Side ice plant is in operation and it will earn \$4,800 this year above all expenses.

Just now there is in cold storage much of it placed there by the individuals. Six thousand bushels of cherries; nearly forty thousand pounds of butter; forty-four thousand seven hundred pounds of cheese; three thousand seven hundred bushels of various fruits; forty-two thousand and two hundred dozens of eggs.

## SKETCH OF NEW CHINESE RULER

YUAN SHIH KAI, FIRST REAL PRESIDENT OF REPUBLIC IS 54 YEARS OLD.

## NATION'S STRONGEST MAN

Has Been in Public Life For Score of Years and His Name is a Prominent Figure

Peking, China, Oct. 14.—Yuan Shih Kai, just elected the first permanent president of China, has been the first provisional president since March 10, 1912. Contrary to the general opinion, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, to whom perhaps the greatest credit is due for the revolution which overturned the Manchus in 1911, was never provisional president of the Chinese republic. When the revolution broke out at Wuchang on October 10, 1911, Dr. Sun Yat Sen was in Europe. He hurried to China and on January 1, 1912, he was installed at Nanking as provisional president of the so-called "government" which the rebels had set up. At that time the Manchu emperor was still the legal ruler of China. He abdicated on February 3, the edict of his mother, the Empress Dowager, ordering that from that date all power of herself and son should be vested in Yuan Shih Kai, the prime minister. One month and two days later Yuan was inaugurated provisional president of the republic of China. At that time Peking contained the capital and the temporary and revolutionary organization at Nanking ceased to exist.

Yuan Shih Kai was born 54 years ago in Honan province, Central China. Thus, he is not a North Chinese, as has been said so repeatedly in the foreign press. Another erroneous impression is that Yuan, known as "The Washington of China" is that he is of a noble family. His family has been of the Hsiao gentry for many generations, and his uncle was a general in the old Manchurian army, but they were not noble titles to preferment in Chinese politics. Yuan rejected the easy path by way of the Hanlin Academy, and chose the life of a soldier after taking his provincial B. A. As the society of scholars ranked below all grades of society except the merchant and the actor, his rise is all the more remarkable. He is essentially a self-made man.

Yuan Shih Kai's public career began in 1882, when 23 years of age, with his assignment to Korea. Three years later he became Chinese Imperial resident. He held that position for nine years and was driven out by the war with Japan. He has held many other positions under the Manchus.

When the outbreak at Wuchang on October 10, 1911, started the world's greatest terror to the hearts of the Manchus, Yuan Shih Kai, then a quiet life of a Hsiao gentleman farmer. The army that he had trained, the first corps of Chinese soldiers that ever got their full pay one day, was in the hands of others, but the spirit of the corps was with its old commander and benefactor. The Manchu Emperor and his mother sent out three divisions signals to Yuan Shih Kai before he responded. He was in the vicinity over the disaffected provinces, with full command of the land and naval forces. Soon thereafter he was summoned to Peking and appointed prime minister to succeed the notorious, corrupt, Prince Ching. He then succeeded in bringing about the resignation of the Prince Regent, Prince Chon, who had dismissed him two years before.

An unsuccessful attempt to assassinate Yuan was made in the streets of Peking on January 15, 1912. The bomb thrown from a roof, killed a member of his bodyguard. Yuan continued to smoke a cigarette throughout the ordeal. Three times he was offered and three times he refused the rank of marquis tendered him by the imperial family the month before their abdication. He opposed both the Manchus and the radical republicans. Yet the Manchus leaned upon him in their days, and the republicans accepted him as their first president. The reason was that he was, and still is, the strongest man in China, as the foreign governments have considered him since 1890.

## 77 CONVICTS RELEASED FROM McALESTER PEN

McAlester, Okla., Oct. 14.—Seventy-two prisoners have been released from the state penitentiary since yesterday afternoon. Thirty-five went out on expiration of time, but thirty-seven were released today were discharged under the act passed by the legislature, known as the "Good Time" law.

## FINAL CHARTER ACTION IS TAKEN

COMMITTEE FINISHES WORK—COUNCIL ORDERS SPECIAL ELECTION FOR NOV. 28.

## JACKSON IN OPPOSITION

Chairman of Aldermanic Forces Announces His Attitude—Tax Rate is Issue of Contentious

The final session of the charter committee and the ordering by the city council of the charter election for November 28 were yesterday developments in the charter situation. The committee's session was stormy and brought out the fact that there will undoubtedly be opposition to the final adoption of the charter. J. L. Jackson, chairman of the aldermanic caucus, committee, announcing that he would oppose the measure before the people.

Mr. Jackson and Judge Felder renewed the efforts which Judge Felder made at the previous session of the committee, to change several provisions in the charter, and in addition sought to reduce the tax rate for general purposes, from forty-five cents to thirty-five cents and to strike out the provisions for sewer and light plant tax of thirty cents, which proposed changes would have cut the maximum tax rate from \$1.25 to eighty-five cents. Mr. Jackson explained that he believed, with the increase in property values, that thirty-five cents general tax would be sufficient to provide for the city's needs.

The charter as finally adopted and as it was ordered submitted by the council last night, provides for a tax rate of ninety-five cents unless the people vote a special tax of thirty cents additional for interest and sinking fund for a municipal water and light plant.

The effort to strike out the provision allowing the purchase of land outside city limits for park purposes was renewed and again defeated as was the plan to divide the city into wards, with an alderman from each ward elected at large. The voting down of these proposed changes led Mr. Jackson to attempt to send in a minority report at the council meeting last night. Incidentally, he allowed himself to be put on record as opposing the adoption of the charter as finally submitted.

The majority of the charter committee, it is believed, holds the opinion that all of these matters having been in the charter at the time the law went into effect, and all heretofore acted upon by the full committee originally, they should make no material changes. No change was made from the charter as originally published except with the consent of every member, save the initiative, referendum and recall which were placed in the charter at the request of a mass meeting of friends of the charter form of government, with Messrs. Bell, Bullock and Noble opposing them.

In answering the contention of Mr. Jackson that thirty-five cents would be enough for general tax purposes, Judge Felder pointed out that under the new charter there would be no street tax and no city poll tax, from which approximately \$6000 revenue was derived for the current fiscal year. Mr. Jackson replied by saying that he had opposed the abolition of the street tax when the matter first came up in the charter committee.

The majority of the committee also took the position that the mass meeting of October, 1912, which selected the charter committee had authorized a rate of ninety-five cents, and that as forty cents of the proposed increase could never be added unless by express vote of the people on bonds for various purposes, it was bad policy to make no provisions for these matters. It explained that the council itself cannot vote an additional tax except the increase of twenty cents for general purposes without special votes of the people, which means about \$1500 annually. The abolition of the street tax, from which about \$4500 annually is derived, thus entailing a cut of about \$3000 in the city's revenue on the present basis of taxation.

Judge Felder voted with Mr. Jackson, and the council followed him, and then left the committee room. The committee made several minor changes, to which there was no opposition, all being of a corrective nature so that the council last night in proper form.

## MR. JACKSON MAKES EFFORT TO FILE MINORITY REPORT

At an adjourned session Monday night the city council ordered an election on Wednesday, Nov. 28, to vote on the adoption of the special charter. The election was ordered following a report of the charter committee to whom the charter had been referred by the council for some corrections in minor details.

J. L. Jackson, a member of the charter committee and chairman of the aldermanic committee in the recent campaign, protested against the order for election, asking time in which to prepare and submit a minority report from the charter committee. Mayor Bell declared that he had been advised by competent legal authority that council could do nothing but accept the report and order the election, and other members of the committee concurred in this view.

Mr. Jackson, in asking for a delay, said that the charter committee had not concluded its session until 9 o'clock Monday afternoon and that the meeting of council had been called for 7 o'clock the same evening, and therefore he had had no time in conjunction with other dissenting members to prepare a minority report. He pointed to the fact even when the council met the majority report had not been signed by the required number of members and that authority

## NEW RULES PLANNED FOR SHIP'S SAFETY AT SEA

Secretary of Commerce Propagates Regulations to Minimize Danger of the Deep

Washington, Oct. 14.—Secretary of Commerce Redfield's committee on aids and perils to navigation to prepare recommendations for the use of the American delegation to the London International Conference on Safety at Sea has made its report, recommending that:

- All ocean-going steamers, equipped with electricity, shall carry a searchlight so placed as to illumine all points of the horizon as far as practicable, and of sufficient power to distinguish a ship's 24-foot boat at a distance of not less than one nautical mile on a clear dark night.
- All light vessels on important outside stations shall be equipped with submarine bells. All ocean-going vessels shall be provided with means for detecting submarine bell signals.
- The committee recommends that the international rules of the road be modified so that carrying of range lights shall be obligatory instead of optional, as at present; and that all vessels shall carry a fixed starlight. The international rules shall also be amended to provide that every vessel navigated in the vicinity of icebergs or icefloes during darkness

should go at moderate speed, having careful regard to circumstances and conditions; the use of rockets, showing red, should be restricted to distress signals at night.

The application of radiotelegraphy to the collection of weather reports from oceanic areas gives promise of securing to navigators a greater measure of safety from the perils of the sea than has hitherto been possible. Such a service necessarily would be international in character.

The question of submitting the charter as a whole or in sections was discussed and it was finally agreed that it was impractical to submit it in sections, and it was voted to submit it as a whole.

The city secretary was directed to mail a copy of the proposed charter to each qualified voter in the city at least thirty days before the election, as required by law.

The polling place will be at the city hall and the polls will be open at 8 a. m. and closed at 7 p. m. It was ordered that those favoring the charter as submitted have written on their ballot, "For the special charter;" those opposing, "Against the special charter."

The committee comprises George F. Cooper, captain, United States navy, hydrographer, chairman; E. P. Berthoff, captain-commandant, United States revenue cutter service; G. R. Putman, commissioner of lighthouses; A. J. Henry, professor of meteorology, weather bureau; E. T. Chamberlain, commissioner of navigation.

## RINGLING SHOW HERE TOMORROW

FOUR TRAINLOADS OF CIRCUS TO ARRIVE EARLY IN THE MORNING

## PARADE AT TEN O'CLOCK

Advance Guard is Here Today Completing Final Arrangements For Coming of Others

Long before the residents of Wichita Falls have taken their last nap tomorrow morning four long trains will have arrived in the Katy yards and circus day will be here.

Today the advance guard of Ringling Brothers' shows are completing final arrangements for the coming of the big organization and all of its equipment. The circus is traveling this year on four trains over a mile in length and comprising 86 cars with a score of sleepers. The first section will bring the commissary and all the animals. 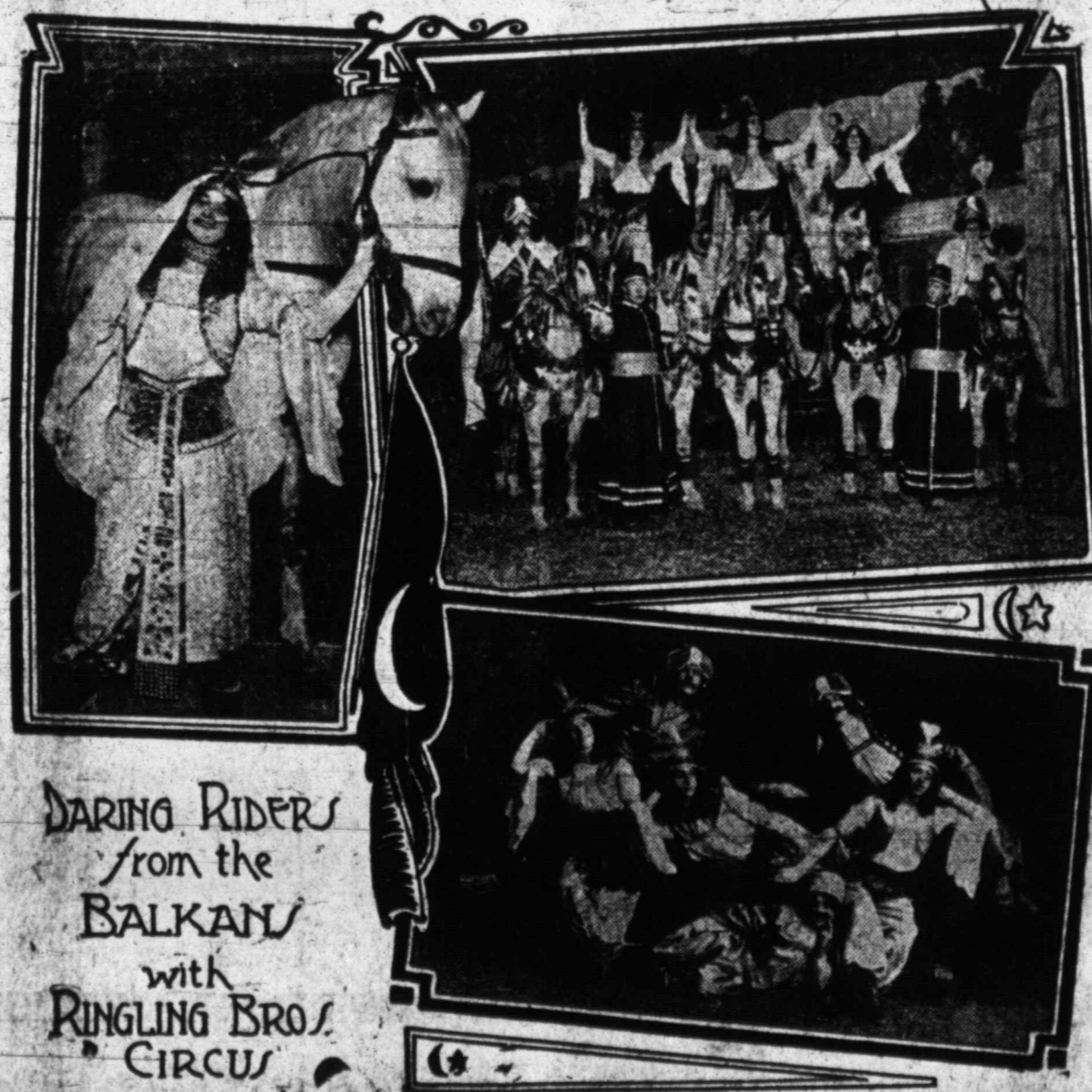

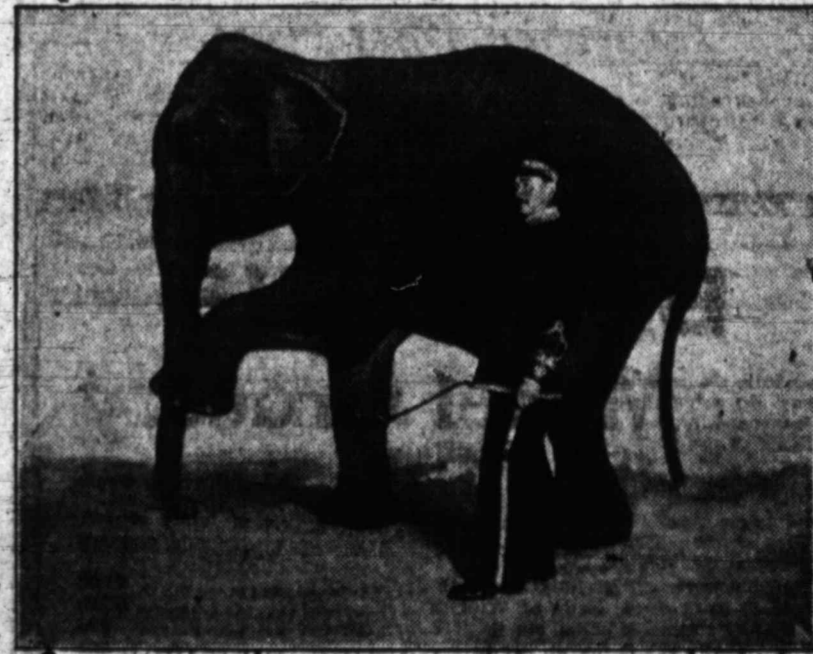
