UNITED STATES LOSING SOUTH AMERICAN TRADI

Lack of Publicity and Banking Facilities is Cause, According To

Washington, Oct. 22.—The United States is losing out in the world race for the South American trade chiefly scause of the lack or an America banking system and the lack of a proper news service between the two continents, in the opinion of Charles Lyon Chandler, a consular official now stationed in Washington.

Mr. Chandler also believes the Panama canal will result in a great aggrandizing influence in South Am-This influence will be due through it to South America and not wholly to increased commercial fa-

"There are many barriers against American trade expansion in South America," Mr. Chandler says, in a report printed by order of the Senate, "and many handicaps which American investors today have to overcome. But perhaps the most important are these: We need in South America, American banks, American young men, a better informed press, and our investors there need better labor -that is, cheap, dependable labor." There is now no American bank south of Panama. England, France, Germany and Holland have banks which have been established as long as fifty years. He says of the news

"Another of the greatest handicaps against the American in South America is, I think, the lack of good news service between the two continents and of sound knowledge of South American history and econmi conditions."



Mr. Redfield declared his department had an ambitious program of nvestigation and trade furtherance. le said it was the intention of the zovernment to press it vigorously

if funds were provided. "For example," said he, "at this resent moment the inquiry into the ottery industry, which is a very important and intended to be a very helpful investigation, is almost at a standstill for lack of funds.

There are fascinations in the man warsman's life other than the spec cular and patriotic side. During the luejacket's leisure hours (and he has many) there are numerous pleasure and entertainments to occupy There is fencing, boxing matches, con-certs aboard ship every night by the ship's band, short concerts each morning during breakfast hour, dancing minstrel shows by the crew's own roupe, use of the ship's books...

When the members of the crew wish to-gorsailing in the harbor to visit points of interest and foreign ships or to go fishing. There is foot bal and base ball and boatracing, for which the government furnishes uni forms and racing boats. In point of fact everything that will enable the bluejacket to enjoy himself.

One-fourth of the crew of a mano'warsman is allowed to go ashore each day after the afternoon drill practical and they remain ashore until the following morning On Wednesdays and Saturdays leave s granted immediately after dinner and on Sundays directly after genera' muster with the privilege of remaining on shore until the following morn-

Shore leave is regulated by conditions; sometimes it is curtailed, while at other times even greater leave is allowed. It might be well to point out here that the civilians working on the shore get mingty few days off.

It frequently happens that disparaging reports are circulated concern ing the food served on board a man These reports, however, are in most instances without foundation as all food served is carefully inspect ed, and prepared under the close supervision of the commissary officers. Bind Men Not to Join Labor Union If They Accept Work-Early Trouble is Feared

The trouble between the Katy and its telegraph operators is reported to be near a climax and the men are said to be preparing to walk out after several days of talk and threats. The railroad is said to have drawn up a contract which it is requiring all new applicants for portions as telegraphers to sign. It is also reported that the company will require all its present operators to sign this con-tract. J. J. Dermody, vice president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers claims to be in possession of one of these contracts which he has given to, the press and which follows: "I hereby make application for employment as railroad telegraph op-

erator with the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company and represent myself to be an experienced, capable man in that capacity. "In accepting employment with the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company I understand I am to be assigned to station where labor union telegraph operators have been working and in eyent of strike being called by the telegraph operators I

"I am to be governed by the said railway company's rules and regula-tions at all times, which they now nave or may place in effect from time

agree to remain at the station where I am assigned and faithfully perform

my duties for the said railread com-

'In accepting this position as tele-graph operator, for the Missouri, Kan-sas & Texas Railway Company it is understood that I am to be paid a salary of not less than sixty dollars per month and I am to receive a sal ary in excess of said amount in accordance with my ability.

"I am to be furnished transportation from Kansas City to the point where I am assigned work. It is also agreed that I am to be given steady employment provided I faith fully perform my duties.
"I agree to refrain from the ex-

essive use of all intoxicating liquors

while in the employ of said Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company "I agree while in the employ of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company not to join any labor union organization. Furthermore, I
