FOREST OIL COMPANY GETS GOOD PRODUCER

Number Eleven on Marriott Come in For 300 Barrels—Other News in the Oil Fields

The Forest Oil Company brought in their No. 11 on the Marriott lease in the Electra field Tuesday afternoon and according to officials of the company in this city, it is good for 300 barrels. The sand was reached at 1550 feet, there being twenty-four feet of pay. Oil spouted over the derrick. The Forest Oil Company has been unusually successful since it began business here, taking over the Owen & Wilson properties. Since the company was organized last March it has drilled eighteen wells, all producers, and yesterday's completion brings its daily production above the 1000 barrel mark. The company has one well down 1000 feet

and another 1100 feet, on the Marriott and one down 500 feet on the Douglas. This company was organized in March of this year with a capital of \$300,000 with W. W. Johnson of Strawn and Gordon, Texas, as president.

W. Lawrence Baker, geologist, representing the Rio Bravo Oil Company, is now in this city looking the field over and making some investigations. The Rio Bravo company is controlled by Southern Pacific railroad interests and has extensive holdings in the Southeast Texas field. W. E. Rather of Beaumont, head of the Guffey's geological department, is also a visitor here today.

Stamford parties will soon enter the Wichita county field, their charter having just been approved. It was for the purpose of looking into the value of their holdings that Secretary of State E. C. Wernher visited this city recently. The Stamford company has holdings in Haskell and Jones county, also.

FIND BABY UPON THEIR DOORSTEP

INDIANA AVENUE FAMILY DISCOVERS INFANT BOY AT DOOR EARLY TODAY

LETTER FROM ITS MOTHER

"Papa So Mean He Won't Stay at Home" Says Message—Home Is Sought for Foundling

THE MOTHER'S LETTER.
"Please take care of my darling little baby, don't let him cry. He sweet little baby on earth, but I can't keep it, am not able to support him but I love him better than anything on earth. I would rather die than give up my fresh babe. Please don't never whip him but learn him to be nice. It sure is awful to give up your little baby, but Lord I had to give this one up. His papa is so mean that he won't stay at home any and I am not able to make my living and his to. Now dear, who ever get my darling little baby for God sake don't let him cry and take good care of him. Please love him."

C. D. Storms and wife of 1308 Indiana Avenue were awakened at about 2:30 o'clock Wednesday morning by the wail of an infant apparently coming from their front yard. Mr. Storms got up to investigate and found a baby wrapped in a small blanket lying on the front doorstep of his home. The child was brought into the house and cared for and the authorities were notified.

The baby is apparently three or four months old and is a large, fat, healthy boy with lustrous dark brown eyes. After a hearty meal this morning he was cooling contentedly and appeared just as much at home as Mr. and Mrs. Storm's own baby of about the same age.

Seek Home For It.
Having a young baby of their own Mr. and Mrs. Storms do not want to keep the foundling but just the same Mrs. Storms isn't going to let him go until she is satisfied that he is going into good hands, so she told Police Chief Gwin this morning. The right of discovery, she believes, allows her to exercise that much authority in the disposal of the baby.

A letter was pinned to the baby's dress begging the reader to give it a good home and to treat it kindly saying that the mother loved it dearly but was unable to support it and herself too, and that the father would not stay at home and was mean.

The police believe the mother of the child to be a young woman who had been working in an Ohio avenue boarding house and who disappeared with her baby last night. The woman came to the boarding house about three weeks ago carrying the child which she said was only three weeks old, and was given work.

Mother Not Located.
She was about nineteen years of age and is described as a rather tall, dark complexioned and good looking young woman. She had said nothing about leaving but this morning she and her baby were found missing. Later it was learned the woman had bought a ticket for Fort Worth but whether she went to that place the police had been unable to learn this morning. The young woman told another young woman at the boarding house that her husband was employed in a bank at Fort Worth.

At the boarding house it was stated that she did not do her work well and was evidently not accustomed to such work and was retained only because her employer did not wish to discharge her when she knew she had no other place to go with the little baby.

TO BREED "ARISTOCRATS" IS PURPOSE OF COLONY

Germany Society Is Getting Ready To Put Some Startling Theories Into Effect Soon

Berlin, Oct. 22.—A colony for breeding "aristocrats of the race"—physical Apellos and Junes and mental giants—is being started near Jena. In this colony each man—if he is physically handsome and mentally a genius—may have 10 wives, not at one time, but successively.

The Mittgard "Band" of Society, which created a sensation last spring by announcing that the only way to check the deterioration of the race and race suicide, was by establishing centers of higher culture where men physically and mentally fit could have numerous wives, is about to put its theory into practice. That is they expect it if there are no legal obstacles.

For this purpose the society has purchased a farm near the great educational center of Jena. This farm is to be stocked with the best specimens of mankind. By a process of selective breeding Eugenic man, the human race is to be improved and regenerated.

According to members of the society, each fine physical and mental male specimen is to have one wife at a time "until the purpose of marriage has been accomplished." After that he may take another wife.

Each woman is to be physically perfect and a beauty. Two years is considered to be the limit of married life with one woman on the Eugenic farm and it may be dissolved after one year. In this way the society believes that in the future known for its beauty and brains may be produced.

DRY FARMING CONGRESS OPENS AT TULSA TODAY

Thirty-Three Foreign Countries Are Represented by Exhibits—Large Attendance Expected

Tulsa, Okla., Oct. 22.—Thirty-three foreign countries, together with the United States and Canada were represented by exhibits today when the eighth annual International Dry Farming Congress opened to continue through November 1. The premium lists aggregated approximately \$15,000. At its last session Congress appropriated \$20,000 for a complete exhibit by the United States department of agriculture, particularly with reference to work in the Western States. Governors of twenty states have accepted invitations and President Wilson and the governor general of Canada were invited to attend. Tulsa has made arrangements to entertain 10,000 accredited delegates and 100,000 visitors during the eleven days of the exhibition. Several new hotels were erected to accommodate the influx of delegates and visitors. All Oklahoma has rallied to the support of Tulsa in handling the big exposition and nearly every county in the state today is participating in the event. China has an exhibit under the supervision of Minister of Agriculture Ashan, and Russia, South Africa, Australia, Turkey and several other foreign countries named special delegates to take charge of the respective exhibits. The Farm Women's Congress is being held here in conjunction with the exposition. Matters of deep interest to farmers' wives will be discussed during the sessions which are being attended by women from all farm-sections of the country.

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LONG DISTANCE WALKER IN CITY

VISITOR HERE EXPECTS TO HIKE AROUND THE WORLD BY MARCH 1, 1916

IS TRAVELING ON WAGER

Was in Wichita Falls Once Before When There Was Practically Nothing Here

To win two bets—one for \$25,000 and one for his life—Dr. Arnold de Falaise is endeavoring to walk all the way around the world before March 1, 1916. He reached Wichita Falls today from Henrietta and will remain here a day or two before pushing westward towards San Francisco.

The \$25,000 bet is with the New York Medical Club; the other bet is with himself, for Dr. Falaise contracted tuberculosis while engaged in laboratory work, being a physician by profession, and he has adopted the long distance walking plan as the best way of curing himself. When he left New York on March 1, he weighed 104 pounds while today he tips the beam at 141 pounds.

Dr. Falaise represents the New York Herald and the New York World on his travels and serves as correspondent for them on his long and tedious trip around the globe. Leaving New York last March he came through to Shreveport, thence to Houston, Texas; Temple, Waco, Fort Worth and then up the line of the Fort Worth and Denver have been his route since then. From here he will walk up the Denver to Colorado Springs, Salt Lake City, Reno, then San Francisco. There he will sail for Japan to resume the long tramp—China, India, Persia, Arabia, Asiatic Turkey, European Turkey, all the leading countries of Europe, then across the Atlantic to the lights of Broadway again.

20,000 Miles to be Walked
The walking part of the trip totals 20,000 miles and Dr. Falaise is ahead of his schedule now. It was the original agreement that he should complete the trip by September, 1915, two and a half years from the time started. But a short time ago at Lampasas, Texas, he took an overdose of strychnine by mistake and for a while it looked as if he would do no more walking at all; but he recovered and was able to resume his journey. The incident, however, secured for him a six months extension of time. He expects to be in San Francisco by the first of next year, which gives him about seventy days to go the distance in.

Dr. Falaise travels "light," shipping his baggage and effects to the next town where he expects to stop, and carrying only such things as he is apt to require along the road. He is forty years old, but doesn't look it. He is of French parentage, but was born in Washington. He spent eleven years in study abroad and attended Johns Hopkins University in this country and Heidelberg and Paris institutions in Europe.

Not First Visit Here
This isn't the first visit of Dr. Falaise to this neck of the woods. More than a quarter of a century ago he visited a ranch near Matador, in which his father was interested.
"To think that I camped right here where Wichita Falls is today," he

said this morning, "why, there wasn't anything here then. It's wonderful how things have changed since that time."

Dr. Falaise will remain in this city several days before proceeding on his northward journey. He makes many friends on his travels, and sends back many souvenirs and mementoes. Photography is one of his hobbies and he takes pictures of interesting places and events as he proceeds along. He believes that the long walk will help him in his fight against tuberculosis and that is one reason he is making the trip.

TELEGRAPHERS' TROUBLES ARE THOUGHT TO BE RAPIDLY NEARING CLIMAX

CONTRACTS MADE PUBLIC

Bind Men Not to Join Labor Union if They Accept Work—Early Trouble is Feared

The trouble between the Katy and its telegraph operators is reported to be near a climax and the men are said to be preparing to walk out after several days of talk and threats.

The railroad is said to have drawn up a contract which it is requiring all new applicants for positions as telegraphers to sign. It is also reported that the company will require all its present operators to sign this contract. J. J. Dermody, vice president of the Order of Railway Telegraphers claims to be in possession of one of these contracts, which he has given to the press and which follows:

"I hereby make application for employment as railroad telegraph operator with the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company and represent myself to be an experienced, capable man in that capacity.
"In accepting employment with the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company I understand I am to be assigned to station where labor union telegraph operators have been working and in event of strike being called by the telegraph operators I agree to remain at the station where I am assigned and faithfully perform my duties for the said railroad company.
"I am to be governed by the said railway company's rules and regulations at all times, which they now have or may place in effect from time to time.
"In accepting this position as telegraph operator for the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company it is understood that I am to be paid a salary of not less than thirty dollars per month and I am to receive a salary in excess of said amount in accordance with my ability.
"I am to be furnished transportation, from Kansas City to the point where I am assigned to work. It is also agreed that I am to be given steady employment provided I faithfully perform my duties.
"I agree to refrain from the excessive use of all intoxicating liquors while in the employ of said Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company.
"I agree while in the employ of the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company not to join any labor union organization. Furthermore, I will do all in my power to prevent any labor trouble along the company's line."
