## RECORDS BROKEN BY POSTOFFICE NEW BUILDINGS TOTAL \$800,000

RECEIPTS FOR 1913 TOTAL OVER \$55,000, OVER TWENTY-TWO PER CENT GAIN

### DECEMBER IS BEST MONTH

Total Business is \$5,580.36, Being Largest One Month Recorded—Figures For Seven Years

POSTAL RECEIPTS FOR PAST SEVEN YEARS.

Postoffice receipts in 1913 were the largest in the history of the Wichita Falls postoffice. The gain over the preceding year was also the largest ever recorded here. Receipts for 1913 were \$5,580.36, the gain over 1912 was \$10,147.14, this being more than 22 per cent increase over 1912 when the receipts were \$45,115.81.

As 1913 receipts were the largest ever known here, December receipts were also the largest ever recorded during any one month in the history of the office being \$5,580.36. Every month during 1913 showed an increase over the corresponding month during 1912.

### WET WEATHER IS FACTOR

Believed it Prevented Total Being Much Larger—Many Fail to Take Out Permits

Wichita Falls building permits for 1913 totaled \$801,548 according to the records of City Secretary Arthur McCarthy. This is \$270,000 short of the record for the twelve months preceding October 15th which marked the first twelve months of the operation of the building permits ordinance. A considerable part at least of the falling off in the record can be attributed to the failure of those erecting new buildings to take out permits. At least three large business blocks are going up in the downtown district for which no permits have been issued and there are a number of residences also being built for which no permits have been issued.

Another big factor in the decrease has been the bad weather which has practically stopped all building operations for the past seven weeks.



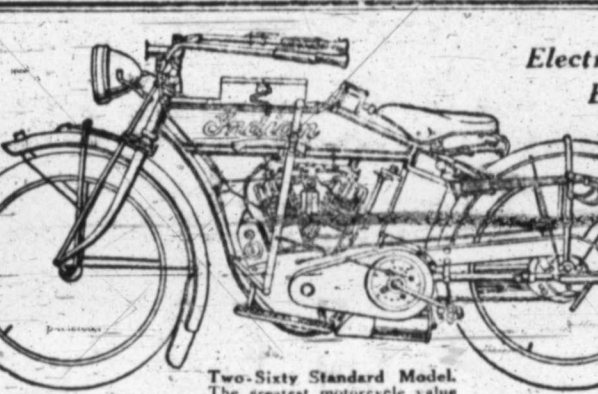

Work in "Othello" Considered Supb—Other News of New York's Plays and Playhouses (By Beau Rialto) New York, Jan. 1.—After one of the most remarkable runs in Broadway's history, "Within The Law" closed tonight at the Eltinge Theatre where Bayard Veiller's wonderful melodrama had its premiere about a year and a half ago. But that does not mean that "Within The Law" is dead. There are now nine different companies on the road presenting the play in every part of the United States and Canada. During the long New York run Jane Cowd played Mary Turner at every performance with the exception of a few weeks last summer, when she went to Europe for a short vacation. During her absence the lead was played by Helen Ware who is now out with one of the road companies. Succeeding "Within The Law" at the Eltinge will be "The Yellow Ticket," a melodrama by an Englishman, which will open on Monday night. Rehearsals for "The Yellow Ticket" were unique in that most of them were conducted in the German hospital. Florence Reed, the leading woman, underwent an operation for appendicitis, and read her lines from her bed. Jack Barrymore, who was picked for leading man after several aspirants had been tried out and failed, said it made him think of Othello to be going through the love scenes at Miss Reed's bedside.

Billy Burke came back to town on Christmas in "The Land of Promise," a play by W. Somerset Maugham, who wrote many plays for Ethel Barrymore. Maugham came over from London to see rehearsals and the premiere.

Miss Doris Keane in "Romance" took a vacation this week and on Monday will open in Cincinnati. The play, which had a run in New York surpassed only by "Pex O' My Heart" and "Within The Law," ran 14 weeks in Chicago.

The Criterion is not going over to the movies after all. The Man Inside, by Roland F. Molleneux will close there tomorrow and will be followed on January 5 by Young Wisdom, in which Edith and Mabel Talliaferro are to be starred jointly.

Went the other night to Sam S. Shubert's Memorial Theatre where I did see Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, the great London play-actor in Master Will Shakespeare's "Othello." He was the best Moor ever I saw. Mistress Gertrude Elliott was given excellent opportunity to distinguish herself as Desdemona, which she made the most of, save in the fifth act alone, when she sang the "Willow Song" in the bed-chamber scene. In that, it seemed, she too near sounded the note of Ophelia in the mad scene of Hamlet. In all else her Desdemona was the very best work she has done in this farewell season of her illustrious husband.

## RUSSIAN OIL MAN IS SOUTH TEXAS VISITOR

Finds Drilling Methods in This Country Vastly Superior To Those in His Native Land (Houston Post)

A. Adiasewich, an engineering expert of St. Petersburg, Russia, and a representative of the Government of the Russian Empire, is in Houston for the purpose of inspecting different types of oil drilling machinery used in the Texas oil fields. Mr. Adiasewich has been sent to the United States by the Russian government for the express purpose of examining the latest types of mining and well drilling machinery in this country and of considering the feasibility of their use in the mining and oil regions of the Russian Empire. Mr. Adiasewich has been in California examining mining methods in that State. In some respects he discovered that mining machinery in use in California is superior to some of the Russian machinery. He will make recommendations to the Russian government that they experiment with some of the American mining machinery. Mr. Adiasewich has been unable to examine the oil fields of Texas to any great extent as yet, but he has visited the Humble fields and others close to Houston. He believes that the rotary drills are far superior to the concussion drilling machinery used in Russia. He especially likes the type of rotary drills used in California, believing they are superior in some respects to the types in use in Russia. Mr. Adiasewich believes that much Texas well drilling machinery will be purchased during the coming year by the Russian government for use in the Russian oil fields. The best oil field in Russia is that known as the Baku field on the Caspian Sea. The production in this field amounts to 50,000,000 barrels a year. The oil bearing strata is found at a depth of 1500 feet. Another big Russian oil field is located north of the Caucasian Mountains. Oil in the Caucasian field is found all the way from 2000 to 3000 feet. The best gold fields of Russia are in Siberia and in the Ural Mountains.

Oil wells in Russia are made much larger in diameter than in the United States. The average well measures about 42 inches in diameter at the top and 16 inches at the bottom. The wells are bored by the percussion system, sharp drills spiking the dirt and rock, which is taken to the surface by small buckets. It often takes as long as 18 months to drill a well by this method.

## SHOULD PUBLIC LIBRARY HANDLE "POPULAR" FICTION?

Chicago, Jan. 1.—Whether public libraries should attempt to satisfy the public appetite for "popular" fiction or should leave that field to the subscription libraries was one of the questions discussed today at the annual meeting of the American Library Association. The increasing cost of furnishing magazines to library patrons, due to recent advances in subscription prices was another topic of discussion and it was probable that a resolution would be addressed to the publishers, asking for better terms for library purchasers.

## WASHINGTON NOW HEADS SCHOOL IN PITTSBURG

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 1.—Dr. William M. Davidson was expected today to assume the duties of the superintendent of the Pittsburg public schools. He was appointed by the school board in November and immediately resigned as head of the schools in Washington, D. C.

A SAN FRANCISCO school teacher who had suffered from eye troubles, at one of her visits to her oculist's office, described an incredible child in her school who appeared to have some defects of sight. This suspicion had been repeatedly reported to his parents, but as they were poor as well as ignorant, nothing had been accomplished. She decided, therefore, to make an independent effort in the boy's behalf and solicited the assistance of her oculist's aid. There were doubts of any good accomplishments being possible, as the boy seemed both dull and mean. His teacher said that at the age of 11 years he was the worst child in her experience of many years in school work. He frequently played "hooky" and associated with bad boys of all ages. The only physical defect noticed was that he held print unusually close to his eyes. Examination showed one eye had two-sevenths and the other one-fifth of normal vision. The boy was dumbly indifferent in the beginning of the eye test, but after much labor and aggravation, lenses were placed before his eyes, giving practically perfect vision at once; then he showed symptoms of being almost human. The glasses were ordered and the case speedily dismissed. More than a year afterwards the doctor saw the teacher again and inquiries were made with misgivings. The report was jubilant and astounding. She said that after she procured the glasses and had gained consent for wearing them, the child's transformation was rapid and complete. He had become the best pupil in the class. The Journal of the American Medical Association says the explanation of the metamorphosis is simple and natural. The child was more than three-fourths blind and no one had known it. He could not learn because he could not read well, and his eyes and head undoubtedly pained him when straining to see. His incorrect and absurd answers made the other pupils laugh at and guff him, so he hated everything connected with the school, and in playing truant he met the worst possible associates and learned from them his notable array of vicious habits. When he put on his glasses he saw the world for the first time clearly and in comfort. He therefore was able to learn and his ambition was aroused.
