### **BUSINESS OF RAILROADS 100 BODIES ARE FOUND**

Conditions Less Satisfactory There Volcanic Disturbances Continue To-Than in Other Lines-Trust Message Due Tomorrow

By Associated Press. Washington, Jan. 19 .- The adminis tration intends chiefly, through its trust program to "facilitate the process of accommodation" as contrasted with the "process of suit." He is said to believe that in some industries, especially those dependent on the railroads, conditions have not been so satisfactory, but he made if clear today that he had no expressed any opinion, as reported on the propriety of increasing freight

rates With reference to the tariff, he told callers, his letters lead him to believe that, business actually was stimulated by it and that the average small merchant is now in better consmall merchant is now in better condition than formerly

TOWN MANAGER IDEA GROWS IN MANY TEXAS TOWNS

Dallas, Texas, Jan. 19.—Residents of a dozen or more Texas towns and cities today started a campaign to have the manager plan similar to that santed in Dayton, Ohio, established. The movement, while not generally systematized is spreading throughout the Lone Star State and it was prophesied here today that managers will be appointed in many Texas cities this year. Amarillo, at a recent election, voted to employ a town manager at a large salary, in the belief that such an official and such a municipal government would save the city thou sands of dollars-more than enough to pay his salary and give Amarillo a far better government than it has heretofore enjoyed. A committee of Denton, Texas, citizens, also has decided on a similar course, and plans are being mapped out today to have the Denton charter so changed that the city commissioners will be put on nominal salaries and a town manager at the head at a salary of \$3,000

### NEBRASKA FARMERS MEET AT LINCOLN TODAY

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 19.-A huge stuffed steer, once a prize winner bu long since distintegrated into steaks and short ribs was the first thing that greeted the eyes of three thousand farmers who met at the state farm today for the first session of Organized Agriculture. Fully 5,000 men, inter ested in various phases of farm work are expected to attend the four-day session which opened with a discussion of beef producing steers, with the stuffed monster on the rostrum a he roic example.

Fifty-two different organizations go to comprise Organized Agriculture in Nebraska. Those meeting in buildings on the farm campus and in the city and are prepared to discuss anything from the proper coddling of queer bers to the use of monster traction engines. Reported To Have Found Pay at 1500 -Feet-Nineteen Rigs Now Drilling In That Field



## EXPRESS RATES ARE MUCH LOWER

CENT, IN SOME CASES, FROM

Expected to Result in Licrease i Large Package Business of the Express Companies

Local agents for the express com panies having offices here have received copies of the new tariffs which take effect February 1 giving greatly reduced rates between interstate points. The reductions in some cases will amount to more than fifty per cent from the present rates while in other cases, especially in shipments of more than twenty-five pounds to close in points, there will be practically no change from the rates now in

The Interstate Commerce Commis sion recently ordered substantial reductions in express rates. At first the express companies declared that the reductions ordered would put them out of business and would mean their uin. Later, however, they announced voluntary reductions in many cases nuch lower than those ordered by the

While the express companies do not ope to get back any large portion the small package shipments lost through the inauguration of the par-cels post, especially shipments des tined to or originating from rura' routes they do expect through the re fuction in rates and better service to create an increase in merchandise hipments that will compensate for he loss in the 'smaller parcels.

The head of one of the big express mpanies discussing the reductions ordered by the Interstate Commerc commission a few days ago said there vere three ways for the companies to make up for the reduction.

"In the first place," he said, "there the normal increase in traffic. That lthough sometimes it has been 7 o o per cent above the preceding year and sometimes 5 per cent under. Just now, unfortunately, business is run ning 10 per cent behind last year's However, we have lived long enough o know that in the long run trade will make up what it is losing now Business, Expected to Increase.

"Secondly, there is what we may call 'spurred business' That means the additional business which is sus ceptible to reduced rates and improved service. What this will amount to we can't tell, but we hope to make it mormous. We are going to big ship pers with an explanation of the pos sibilities of the new rates. We are good deal of their business cheape express than they are now moving by freight or mail. There are great ossibilities among wholesale grocery houses, for instance. It may be that can get so much additional busi less with the leverage of these new rates that our gross eaguings will show a good increase."



Road Working Days Popular Since Gov. Major made his grand stand play in the mud of Missouri roads, there has been an epidemic of road-working. Commercial clubs all over the west have taken it up, and only has good work been done, but splendid good roads enthusiasm has been engendered. The Austin Chamber of Commerce spent two days this week working the road toward San Antonio, mustering out about two hundred workers, and forty teams. And when people generally are interested enough in good roads to get out and blister their hands in the cause, politicians take notice. It is predicted that the next session of the state legislature will be guilty of some con structive legislation looking to a com prehensive system of betterment of the roads of the state. Senator Mc-Gregor has a good roads bill already drafted and printed in pamphlet form.

And there be those who insist upon pulling education out of the mud, also, The Conference of Education has a program looking to the building up of the public school system, includ ing such planks in its platform as "A liberal and independent income for the support of the higher institutions of learning," "Majority rule in school tax elections," "Longer terms for school officials," an othe like. It would build a firm foundation for the edu cational system of the state in its secondary schools, and at the same time would not neglect the important superstructure of higher education. The symetry of the whole should be preserved, it should be a rounded and complete edifice, neither top-heavy, nor resting upon insufficient base, is about what the Conference is driving at; and with its twelve or fifteen thousands members its influence is not to be overlooked.

And Then Those Shacks The shacks on the University camous have come to typify in the minds of many of the state's neglect of its higher institutions of learning. Regent J. W. Graham said the other day that not another one should go up if he could help it. The contract has just been let for another shack to house the overflow of the chemistry department. would tolerate. The Elimination Contest While rancous notes of defiance arise from opposite camps concerning the proposed elimination of certain ibition candidates, there is an ev ident determination on the part of all factions to eliminate bad roads and inefficiency in our educational system. On these matters of elimination there is practical unanimity. No matter may be about it, you can hardly find anyone who will fuss with you about it. And the two propositions have a deeper connection than would suppose at first glance, a good road to town often means a good road to education.


