Hearings to Be Held on Subject o Fixing Reasonable Charges for Work Now Done Free.

Washington, Feb. 3.—Another new development appeared today In the Interstate Commerce Commission, in which the fifty-two eastern railroads gre seeking to advance their charges five ner cent when Commissione Rarlan announced that the commis sion intended to hold supplementary hearings regarding the fixing of rea sonable charges for free service rail road systems now performed large industrial plants.

The recent decision in the indus trial railways case indicated that such free services to so-called trusts it did not disturb or affect the status not only cost the railroads about \$15. 000,000 a year but discriminated against smaller industries.



WILSON ORDERS LIFTING OF **EMBARGO ON MEXICAN ARMS**

Will Issue Proclamation Allowing Both Sides to Import Munitions, to Reverse Position of Taft

By Associated Press.

Washington, Feb. 3 .- President Wilson has decided to lift the embargo on exportation of arms to Mexico.

A proclamation, under the authority of the congressional resolution of 1912, which will restore the status of the arms question to where both forces of Provisional President Huerta and the Constitutionalists may import arms from the United States, soon will be issued from the White House.

President Taft issued the proclamation which barred exportation of arms to all sides, on March 24, 1912. It is believed that President Wilson finally decided to raise the embargo after being convinced that by restricting shipments of arms to Mexico, the United States was not really showing neutrality, which was the purpose of the embargo, but was in fact showing partiality, as the Hurta forces were able to get supplies from abroad, while the Constitutionalists, limited almost entirely to shipments from the United States, could get arms and ammunition practically only by smug-

It had been frequently represented to the administration that if the United States would permit shipments of arms to General Carranza the Constitutionalists would undertake to restore peace in Mexico and set up a constitutional government within a short time. It was understood that announcement of the president's intention to lift the embargo had gone forward to Charge O'Shaughnessy in Mexico City, probably with instructions to advise the Huerta gov-

Constitutionalist agents in Washington learned of the development unofficially and declared the end of the war was in sight. The only word that came from the White House was that an important announcement would be made at five o'clock this afternoon. Thereis every reason to believe that under the authority of the joint resolution of March 14, 1912, President Wilson will continue to exercise discretionary power in issuing permits for the exportation of arms, so that they may not fall into the hands of irresponsible

So far as possible, only the miltary chiefs on both sides in the Mexican revolt will obtain the munitions of war, though exactly how that will be done has not been worked out.







WOULD HELP MRS. FARMER

For Her and Many Extensive
Changes are Planned

Washington, Feb. 3.-The farm nouse is pretty nearly the most important point about the farm, so far as the condition of the agriculturalist is concerned and of the farm house, the kitchen is the most important room. Department of agriculture experts so held in a narticle prepared for the United Press today. The importance to the farmer of having an conomical farm house" has been emphasized by the department's farm architect. He holds that the mental and physical fitness of the laborers both within the house and in the fields is vitally affected by the building that affords the family sheleer.

"The average" American farm home," says the department, "has failed to share in the improvements that are every day being made in agricultural conditions and is a rebuke to our boasted civilization. Relatively the housewife of a century ago with her fireplace cooking and log house cabin, was better provided for than is the housewife today. The most important building on the farm is the home. The health, comfort and happiness are dependent upon its construction and equipment, and unless these matters are looked af-ter, the sanitary dairy barn or the economically constructed buildings for stock are of little value. Happiness and contentment in the family are as essential to efficient service as are improved tools and outbuildings

Economy In Labor.
"Although the housewife spends, in many cases, a lifetime in her work-shop—the kitchen—and the family rooms, she is not as a rule, capable of planning a house in the highest de-gree serviceable and comfortable, without assistance. Her help, however, is essential to the farm architect as the result of his plans most vitally concern her. One of the most import ant details regarding the average American income farmbouse is that it must be inexpensive. . The average net annual income of the farmer to-day, after deducting five per cent interest on his investment is less than This does not mean that the louse may not be attractive. They may, if intelligently planted, with the help of vines, shrubs and trees, become the prettiest spots in the land scape and more beautiful and inex-pensive than the crowded city houses. The tenant house is growing in importance. The number of rented farms increased by more than 324,000 during the last decade. Today little more than half the farms in this country are operated by own-

"The possible economy in house hold labor and the conservation of strength of the housewife are two important factors to be considered In the construction of the farmhouse reasant and comfortable farm home end to hold families together; bu cheerless, unattractive and unsanitar houses are what is driving girls and boys to the cities. Investigations of prisons, insane asylums and correct ive institutions seem to prove that the sins which account for the existence of these institutions are often bred in inadequate and unpleasaint farm homes. Therefore this social "The office of the farm management bureau has now undertaken to investigate and solve the problem of making the farm home better ready it has learned that certain features are overlooked in providing economical arrangements for the household, when they might just as easily be provided for. One of the department's specialists learned that a woman in Pennsylvania had broken down from overwork. She had been carrying coal from the kitchen to the barn for years. When the husband was asked if there was any reason why a coal bunker could not have been provided near the cook-stove and filled directly from his wagon, he answered 'nobody had ever thought of it.

Simplicity and Beauty. "After, economy in the construc tion of the building and in the bouse work has been attained, attention will be given to the development of Simplicity of line and good proportion are meant by the word beauty.' This simplicity is entirely in keeping with the general plan of economy, but not cheapness.

"Double strength glass may even be economical in the long run in a tenant house. A kitchen sink may be better paying investment, although it excludes a bay window, or a fire-place that has been the net idea of the farm housewite.
