## WAITERS CAN ORDER BEER FOR PATRONS

Attorney General Holds Allison Ac Does Not Compel a Diner to Carry Own Beer

By associated Press Austin, Texas, Feb. 7 .- "There nothing in the Allison act which would prohibit the porter of a hotel or waiter or servant thereof, or the personal servant or agent of another person transporting, carrying or de livering intoxicating liquors to person where the transaction takes place in wet territory. We do not believe there is anything in the Alli son act which would prohibit the waiters in the hotels or restaurants from procuring for a guest of the ho tel or restaurant, intoxicating liquor to be served in such hotel or restau-

.This was the opinion of the attor ney general's department today on a phase of the Allison law that has caused no little contention and creat ed some discussion by hotel restaurant keepers throughout State, following an opinion of controller, to the effect that the Allison law prohibited this phase. The Allison law as construed today holds that the act is effective only in dry territory and is not applicable to wet territory.

The seed produced in this section from start to finish this season were more or less damaged by either drought or wet weather. Good crops cannot be produced from seed of low germinating power. These have been run through our cleaning machinery and the linting machines, hence are absolutely clean and lint removed. They are in sacks of 2 bushels each, and will be sold at what they stand on our books-65c a bushel

If the planters do not care to buy any of the above we still urge them to send away somewhere and get some good seed not grown in

VATICAN READY TO ACCEPT PA PAL GUARANTEE FROM ITALY

Establishment of Peace Between Vat! can and Quirnal Would End Papal Imprisonment

Rome, Feb. - Pope Pius has just exprised the entire Catholic world ind not a little bit of the international political as well, by what is onceded to be most important ster his pontificate. This is nothing ess than the admission that the Vatican is now willing to accept the ondition imposed upon it for forty cars when Italy deprived It of its emporal power by the confiscation o ome and the Papal States. The Vatt an does not renounce its claim to imporal power; it admits only the stility of hoping to regain it, but this dmission is sufficient to permit the stablishment of peace between the Quirinal and Vatican. That such ace will be brought about is now practical certainty.

the final fall of Rome into the hands of the new kingdom of Italy, Pope ius IX the then reigning pointiff shut himself up in the Vatican. He declared himself a prisoner there at the hands of the Italians whom h said robbed him of his temporal powof and his means for protecting his person should he ever issue Pope Leo XIII has immediate successor, continued this tradition He went even parther in devoting practically his entire pontificate to the furthering of diplomatic relations and intrigues with all-of the leading powers in the hope that they migh assist him in regaining his temporal kingdom. He died with his dream unfulfilled and the tradition of im prisonment was fianded down to Pope Piux X. No one, however, has ever believed that the latter was in full ympathy with it and now this be ief has been justified.

Pope Pius, it now appears, has fo ten years merely been awaiting the pportune moment and preparing the hurch in the meantime. change in policy which he is believed have always considered inevitable. The moment which he has finally chosen for announcing a change in attitude on part of the Vatican has pot been without a certain dramatically background. It seems certain also that the moment was chonen by him all of a year in advance. The past year of 1913 marked the sixteen bundredth enniversary of the adoption by the Emperor Constantine of Christianity as the official religion of he state. This was the beginning of the temporal power and political independence of the popes. A little over a year age Pope Plus decided to elebrate the entire year as an aniversary and the celebration has been carried out at Rome on the most magnificant scale possible. At least 00,000 pilgrims from all parts of the world attended the various functions. This celebration came to a close in early part of December and was precisely the close of this celeration of the sixteen hundredth an iversary of the establishing of the hurch as an independent political entity and power that Pope Pius hose for making it known that the church will no longer insist on it. At the national congress of Catholics held at Milan in honor of the close of the Constantine year, Archbishop Rossi of Udine, a close personal friend of Pope Plus in the opening ad dress to the congress, made known the future attitude of the Vatican.

No Longer Necessary. He announced that society is now ganized on such a basis that an independent political state such as Constantine was no longer necessar, n order to insure the spiritual in lependence of the pope. dependence he admitted could now be secured by other means which would be just as effective. As one of the possible ways of establishing the future spiritual independence of the Monsignor Rossi suggested that the Italian law of Papal Guarantees, which Italy passed at the time it appropriated Rome from the popes, be guaranteed by a number of the leading powers. This law of Papal Guarantees the Vatican has never accepted- although Italy has lived constantly up to its part. guarantees the pope not only absolute spiritual independence but also abso-lute political independence within the walls, of the Vatican and within another small portion of territory where the former summer bome of the pope is located. Under the law the pope has a right to receive and send ambassadors to other powers to maintain his own troops and to be absolutely immune from the laws of Italy. No Italian official, not even the census taker, can enter the Vatican The person of the pope is also held inviolable and any attempts against his life or dignity are punishable as similar attempts against the King. After flowing wild for a period, the well was gotten partially under con-trol. The oil was being pumped into some large tanks, but before hydraulic fittings could be stubstituted for the regular ones, the well cut all connecions loose, and it is supposed that either from friction or by some of the material which the gas and oil were throwing out, striking a spark-from the crown block or other metal around the mell, that the fire started. ## JUDGE MARTIN WILL RESIGN

DISTRICT JUDGE TO QUIT PUBLIC SERVICE TO ENTER PRI-VATE PRACTICE

Will Become Member With Messrs. C. C. Huff and Bullington in Law Firm

Unexpected and without a previous hint came the announcement Saturday afternoon from Judge P. A. Martin, judge of the 30th judicial district, of his intention to resign the office of district judge. His letter of resignation has already been forwarded to Governor Colquitt but will not reach the governor's office until Monday and an announcement of the appointment of a successor to fill the unexpired term is expected with a few days thereafter.

In a letter to The Times in which Judge Martin announces his plans and which follows he gives his reasons for tendering his resignation. He says his duty to his family demands that he make more money than his salary as district judge and as an opportunity has presented itself to associate himself with Messrs. C. C. Huff and Orville Bullington in the practice of law he has decided to avail himself of this opportunity and on March 1 will become a member of the firm of Huff, Martin and

Formerly District Attorney.

Judge Martin has been district judge in the 30th judicial district comprising Wichita, Clay, Archer and Young counties for three years and two months. Before election to the district judgeship for four years he was district attorney in the same district and previous to that was for eight years county attorney of Young county making in all over fifteen years of public service.

His home was formerly at Graham but the heavy court dockets in Wichita county required that he spend two-thirds or more of his time here and about a year ago he moved to Wichita Falls to make his home.

As district attorney Mr. Martin by the vigorous and effective discharge of his duties and the display of sterling qualities of citizenship and manhood quickly became one of the strongest moral forces in the community and when the retirement of Judge A. H. Carrigan, then district judge, was announced he was the choice of a large majority of the voters of the district for that office and was elect-ed by an overwhelming vote.

For more than three years he has discharged the duties of the district judge's office with rare efficiency and satisfaction to the public and in his superior position his influence as a moral agent has been strengthened. He retires from office firmly estab lished in the esteem of the people he has served and with a record that

Although no announcement will be forthcoming concerning Judge Mar-tin's successor until his letter of recommendation is in the hands of Governor-Colquitt which will probably not be before Monday, it is regarded as altogether likely that the governor will offer the appointment to District Attorney Edgar Scurry of this city. It is reported, however, that Judge Scurry will recommend the appointment of Judge A. A. Hughes.

Judge Martin's Letter.

Judge Martin's letter announcing

his resignation follows: Mr. Editor: Please give me space in your paper to announce to the bar and the people of the district that I will not become a candidate for a second term as district judge.

Nearly all the lawyers of the dis-trict and dozens of the good citizens have assured me that I would have no opposition if I should again become a candidate and I believe from all they have said to me that it is true. Yet after a careful consideration of the matter, I have decided to retire to

private life, voluntarily.

I wish to be perfectly frank in the atter; I like the public service and othing has occurred to make my resent position distasteful to me; on e contrary I have been treated with ch uniform deference and courtesy the bar and the people and have en so successful in the administraon of justice, (my record of affirm ices in the higher courts being right ound 85 per cent) and I have reeived so much commendation from my friends and the people generally over the public record that I have made, that I feel proud of it and

loath to give it up. But my duty to my family demands am receiving as a salary from the State or else I will be but poorly pre-pared for that old age which will come upon me some day: I have spent fifteen years and more of my life in public service, as county attorney, district attorney and as judge and have become thoroughly convinced that no man can honestly serve the State of Texas, devoting his whole time and his whole talent to the public and ever lay by a competency for

the declining years of life. So, on the 1st day of March, 1914 I shall associate myself with Mesers.

the firm name of Huff, Martin and

My resignation as district judge will be in the hands of the governor within the next forty-eight hours and he will have abundant time in which to select my immediate successor to serve the unexpired term.

Allow me further space please to return my heartfelt thanks to the good people of the district who have tiring to private life, perhaps forever and I am taking with me a heart profoundly grateful to all and without he slightest enmity to any.
