# WILSON AGAINST HEARING TODAY

OF PLATFORM UNWISE FROM THE START

### NOT DOMESTIC QUESTION "TEXAS FIRST" IS SLOGAN

With Foreign Governments

By Associated Press. Washington, Feb. 9 - President Wilson let it be known today that rom the first he regarded as an unwise policy the insertion in the Democratic national platform of the plank favoring the exemption of American coastwise ships from the pay ment of Panama Canal tolls.

The president feels that a platform declaration on such is related to circumstances that arise all over the world as well as in the United States and that the only element which the United States can control in the sitnation ought to be binding. Mr. Wilon told callers today that the whole international situation and the point f view of foreign governments was to some extent involved in the set tlement of the controversy.

He indicated that platform de mands should be limited to matters of domestic policy and should not embrace relations with foreign governments.

It was made clear that only England had protested against the tolls. The president said Great Britain. through her representatives had not approached the American government however, on the question in any way since Viscount Brice left here a year

He presented statistics showing that the district as outlined represented a unit of the business of the Southwest and that Dallas was the center of the whit. He said the population of the district was mainly congested about Dallas and that within a hundred niles of that city there were more people than within the same radius of Kansas City or St. Louis. He said the yearly products of the

listrict represented a money value of \$88,900,000.

Sentiment of Oklahoma. When asked as to his authority for ncluding Oklahoma in the Dallas district, Mr. Babcock replied that it was done on a basis of population. Secretary McAdoo pointed out that hey must have regard to the course of trade and asked if Dallas had any expressions from the bankers of Oklahoma showing they desired to be included in the Dallas district. was replied they had no such exressions except that Oklahoma bankers do their trading in Dallas. 

Obtaining no relief from these sources his mother brought him back to me. We found enough eyestrain in that boy to mike him a mental, moral and physical decellet for life. The crimina ignorance displayed by those instrumental in preventing him from obtaining proper relief impels one to the thought that some measures ought to be taken to properly educate the public as well as the medical profession, concerning such matters, and that no child should be sent to school without first having its eyes examined.
