### FORT WORTH CONFERENCE

This County's Representatives To Meeting To Select Pro Candidates For Governor

W. J. Bullock has been named by Hon. R. B. ### CONVICT-BUILT HIGHWAY, COLORADO TO THE GULF

Wardens of Colorado Penitentiary Outlines Plan For Good Road Across Three States

Wichita Falls is on the route of the proposed convict-built highway from Colorado to the Gulf of Mexico, which plans are carried out, will be undertaken jointly by the states of Colorado, New Mexico and Texas. A Denver dispatch to the Dallas News says: "The construction of a convict-built highway from Colorado to the Gulf of Mexico will be undertaken jointly by the states of Colorado, New Mexico and Texas, according to a statement made by Warden Thomas Tynan of the Colorado state penitentiary today. Tynan has been attending the good roads convention at Galveston, where he has been the guest of the mayor and other city officials. Before going there he attended the good roads meeting at Fort Worth, where he found that sentiment in favor of co-operation with this state in the building of such a road was strong."

"The proposed road would be the longest highway ever built by convict labor and would be one of the longest continuous boulevards in the world," according to Warden Tynan. It would be approximately 3,250 miles, traversing the length of Colorado southward through New Mexico and Texas to Galveston. Tynan has found that convict-built roads in this state can be constructed at a cost of \$389 a mile and on this basis the total cost of the Colorado-to-the-Gulf highway would be \$474,550.

"The project is declared to be one of the greatest ever undertaken in the way of good roads in this country," Warden Tynan, he admitted today, has had the scheme in his mind for several months, but did not wish to announce it until he had talked with representatives of Texas and New Mexico. After those in authority there had fallen in hearty sympathy with his plan he decided to make it public. His announcement today caused great stir among good roads enthusiasts of this state. It is expected that the plans will begin to take definite shape in a few weeks.

Wardens of this city says that if Wichita Falls is to remain on the re-organized route from Texas to Colorado it is essential that this city remains alive to the situation, as another route, by way of San Angelo, is being considered.

### OPIUM TRAFFIC IN CHINA ENDED

GOVERNMENT'S DRASTIC MEASURES HAVE PUT STOP TO GROWING OF POPPIES

### HAD TO DESTROY CROPS

Results Not Accomplished Without Some Strife But Thought To Be Completely Checked

By Associated Press. —With the development of airplane routes to Western lines the isolated province of Eastern China is rapidly undergoing important changes. It may soon be imagined that a chunk has been taken out of New England or some other farming region of the United States and laid down in China for these are increased instances that fields once wholly devoted to the poppy will be turned over to potatoes and corn.

Progress has put its feet down on the opium business. Outside of China there are probably few persons who have dealt as a means of sustenance to a province whose resources were already overtaxed to maintain its crowded population. Opium has always brought a good price in local markets and formed an important source of the farmer's revenue. Mr. Tilden, however, that campaigns against the drug have met with armed resistance.

**Destruction of Crops.**  
Spontaneous and reckless destruction of full grown crops came last year with such a suddenness that farmers were not conscious that the government was waiting until they had their entire season's work lost. This year a new method is to be tried. Instead of waiting until the plants are grown and then destroying the crop, the government has served notice that all opium plants will be destroyed as soon as they appear in the field. In instances where the summary destruction of the crop last year caused riot and bloodshed, but the notices this year seem to be convincing farmers that the government means business, and the destruction of the young plants already under way has not caused the strife which resulted last year. The new policy is meeting with the approval of the farmers, and once they see that they must live up the poppy, they are turning to ridges, potatoes and corn.

**General Desire For Peace.**  
Another change a little less tangible but none the less marked, is the new spirit of freedom. During the revolution Fukienese men and money were not lacking to do the province's part in the overthrow of the hated Manchu government. But, that accomplished, trusting that a clean government would be organized by the patriots who were clamoring for control, the people of Fukien settled down to business and the general desire has been for peace and quiet.

There are always lawless bands wandering about the country back of Amoy and Foochow. Their numbers vary with local conditions, an unfavorable crop, reducing the country people almost to starvation and augmenting the number of outlaws. It was such a band which recently pillaged a village near Chao-an in the southern part of the province and was reported to have destroyed the American mission chapel there.

The United States navy said that of Great Britain. One of the first taken into the secret was Lieutenant Porter the English flyer. His offer to go is believed to have been accepted. The other man will be an American as two officers are to go and it is deemed certain that Uncle Sam's representative will be Lieutenant John H. Towers, U. S. N., who holds the American record for a nonstop flight, covering 292 miles in six hours and ten minutes. The cockpit proper will be twelve feet behind the motor and in it will be room for two men to sit at ease. The controls will be duplicated so that the machine may be handled by both men or either.

Members of Party Will Meet At Old Jail To Make Nominations For Municipal Offices

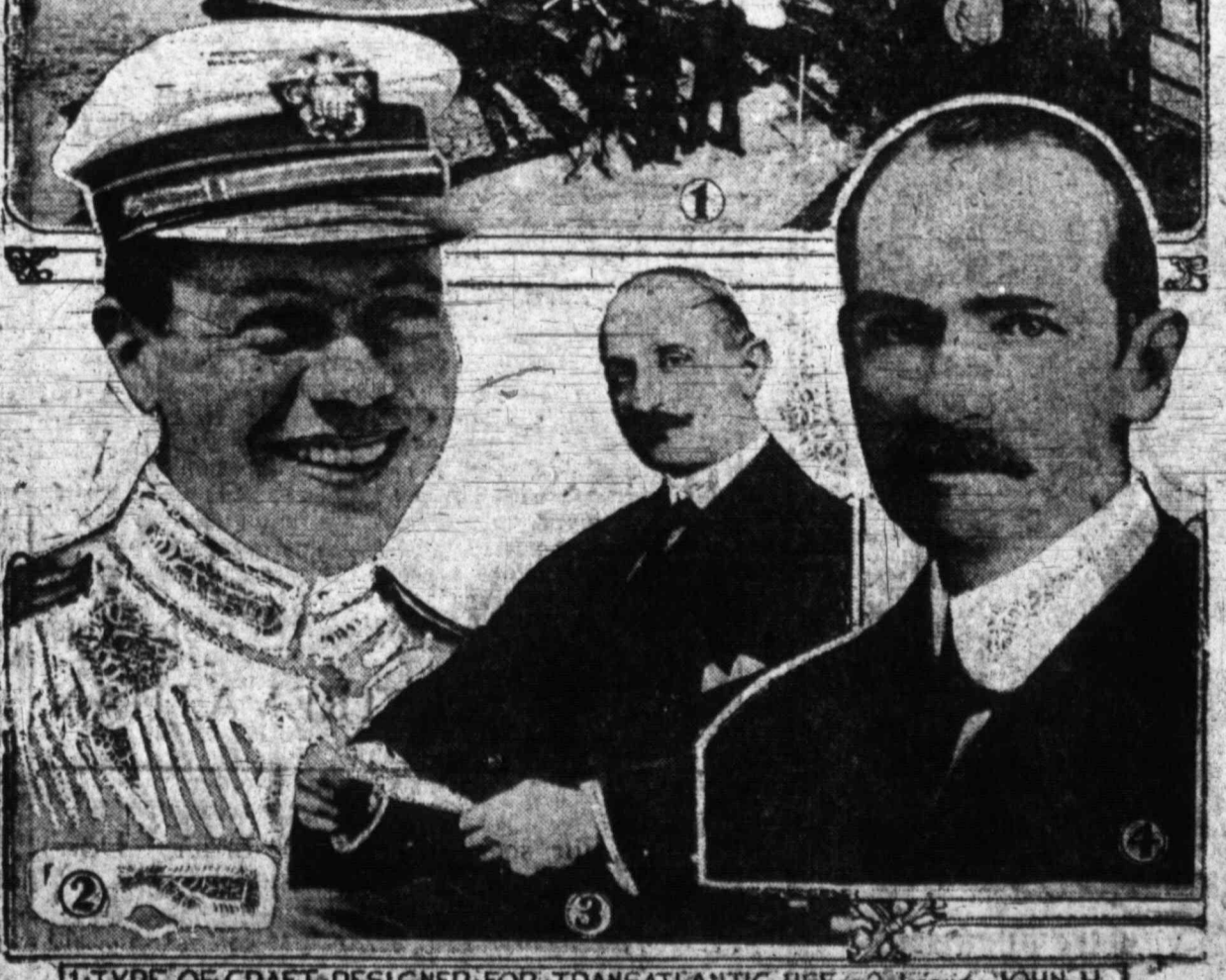
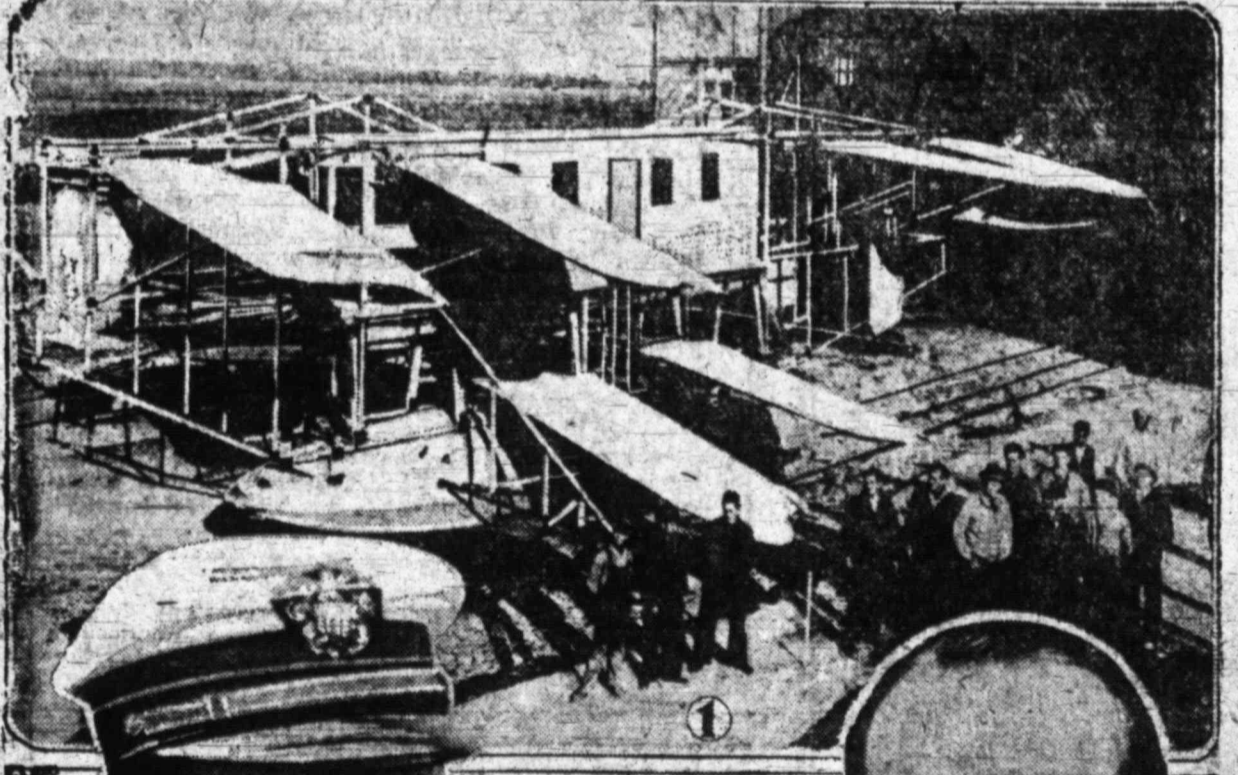

The municipal campaign, so far, is progressing along lines that it should—orderly and good natured. Of course, more interest centers in the majority race than all others. That is to be expected. There are a few, but they are not numerous, who would like to see the contest get red-hot, but such campaigns never leave the best of feeling among citizens.

Mr. Mayes, candidate for governor, is making a very strong bid for anti support, and has been doing this all along. That he has a strong anti following, no one who has been keeping up with his record and movements can doubt.

FEDERAL LIQUOR LICENSES The bill introduced to prohibit the issuance of federal licenses to sell intoxicating liquors in prohibition territory should have been enacted into law long ago. Comity between the states demands it.

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SELF GOVERNMENT BY STUDENTS UNDER FIRE

Right to Expel Classmate Alleged to Have Been Guilty of Cheating Probed by Regents

Austin, Texas, Feb. 9.—The right of student self government in the University of Texas was under fire when the executive committee of the board of regents reviewed the evidence on which a student was convicted and expelled on charge of violating the honor system. The board has not determined on any course of action.

The case is the first of its kind ever taken before the regents of the University. It is the first time since the adoption of the honor system in the University of Texas that the jurisdiction of the Students' Council has been challenged.

The case in brief follows: A student, on the direct testimony of another student and on additional evidence purely circumstantial in nature, was convicted on a charge of cheating on a quiz. The council voted to expel him. The case was appealed to the faculty committee on discipline. This committee ratified the action of the council. A new trial before the council was asked and given. A second conviction resulted. Appeal was taken to the board of regents and the executive committee was instructed to review the evidence with a view of bringing the case before the entire board of regents if the committee deemed it wise.

No definite information would be given out as to the meeting. President A. Garland Adair of the Students' Council refused to disclose any of the proceedings. Clarence Osley of the regents declined to discuss the matter.

Deal Includes Acreage and Production on Richard Meade Survey—Involves About \$40,000

The Corsicana Petroleum Co. has taken over the property of the Great Southern Oil Company including 109 acres and three producing wells out of the northeast corner of the Richard Meade survey. The consideration is understood to be between thirty and forty thousand dollars. Final papers in the transfer were signed this afternoon.

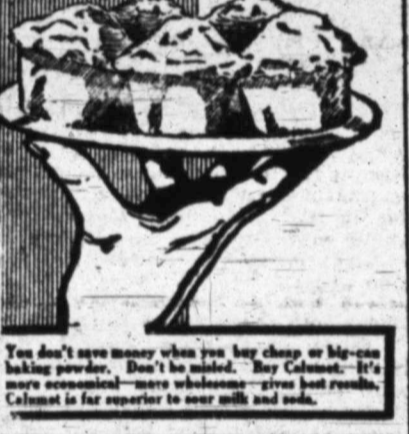

## 400,000 PRAIRIE DOGS KILLED BY GOVERNMENT

Department of Agriculture Destroys Large Numbers in Arizona and Colorado

Washington, Feb. 8.—The biological survey of the department of agriculture has destroyed about 400,000 prairie dogs in the Cochetopa and Pike National Forests of Colorado and the Tusayan and Coconino Forests of Arizona. It is estimated that the amount of forage that the rodents have eaten is sufficient for about 15,000 sheep or about 1,500 head of cattle, which would be valued at about \$150,000. This work was done at a cost to the department of about \$12,000. This view of the fact that American and English furriers secure better skins from Siberia for five cents apiece, no market for the hides of the prairie dogs has been found. The glove makers state that the skins are rather small to be worked up economically.

Last year the biological survey used 25,000 pounds of oats, 4,000 pounds of carbon bisulphide, and about 1,800 ounces of strychnine in the Cochetopa Forest in the work of dog destruction. The local oats were of very poor quality and it was found that the heavy oats that weigh about 40 pounds to the bushel were very much more economical than the lighter oats. The dogs shuck the heavy oats so readily that they escape the poison which is in the form of a coating; but the heavier oats are more difficult to shuck.

The agents of the survey prepare the poison which is mixed with strychnine with a starch mullage of about the consistency used in starching linen and by applying this to the oats, each kernel receives a fine film of poison starch. Many rodents which carry the grain in their pouches are poisoned by absorbing the poison from the pouches without swallowing any of the grain. This is the case with the California ground squirrel. Agents have found hundreds and hundreds of dead squirrels with their cheek pouches full and no grain in their stomachs.

## JACKSONVILLE PREPARES FOR VETERANS' REUNION

Will Change Plan of Entertainment. Use of Other Cities' Automobiles for Parade

Jacksonville, Fla., Feb. 9.—The 24th annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans' Association and the 10th annual reunion of the Confederate Veterans will be held in this city this days, April 29, and May 1 and 2. The reunion program is now being perfected by the officials of the Jacksonville Reunion Association and thirty committees appointed by President Ford of the association.

Jacksonville has an ambition to entertain the survivors of the Confederate armies and their friends, better if possible than they have ever been entertained before. An interesting program will be arranged for the reception and entertainment of the visitors and no matter how large the attendance may be all will be satisfactorily entertained. In everything that goes to make the handling of large crowds an easy task Jacksonville is well supplied. It has the transportation facilities, the hotels and streets, all necessary for the successful handling of reunion crowds.

The Jacksonville program will hence in at least two important particulars the customary reunion methods. It is the purpose of the old soldiers who have at other reunions been cared for at camps in hotels, boarding houses and private homes where they will have more comfortable quarters and better entertainment. Jacksonville believes that it will be more pleasant for the veterans to be cared for in that manner than in camp and many of the veterans will be assigned to such quarters.

Another change in program will be seen in the parade of old soldiers. Instead of waiting they will ride in arranges and automobiles.
