TRAIN BLOWN UP, 55 MEET DEATH

COMPANY OF GOVERNMENT
TROOPS IS ANNIHILATED IN
EXPLOSION RECENTLY

ALL ON BOARD ARE DEAD

English Engineer is Among the Slain
—Passenger Train Attacked but
Backs Out of Danger

Vera Cruz, Feb. 23.—A government troop train carrying a company of infantry from Vera Cruz City to Jalapa was blown up by rebels Saturday afternoon. The explosion demolished the entire train, killing all on board including fifty-five officers and men and the English engineer. A passenger train running behind the troop train was fired on by the rebels but escaped by backing rapidly. The wreck occurred near Lima, 140 miles from Vera Cruz.

UNKNOWN WHITE MAN'S BODY FOUND AT ALPINE

"That's not my daughter. My daughter has no freckles. She is also larger than my child. Her features likewise are different."

Dr. Winters nearly broke into tears as he convinced himself that the child was not his.

SEASON'S WORST SNOW IS PREVAILING IN MIDDLE WEST.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—The worst snow storm of the winter in the middle west continued today over a large portion of that section. It overspread Missouri, Iowa, Central and Southern Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska, Indiana and Ohio. Telegraph and telephone lines were demoralized.

In Illinois and Missouri many trains were reported stalled by deep snow which the wind drifted badly in several cities street car traffic was entirely stopped. In railroad lines generally were put out of commission.

PENITENTIAL SEASON TO START NEXT WEDNESDAY

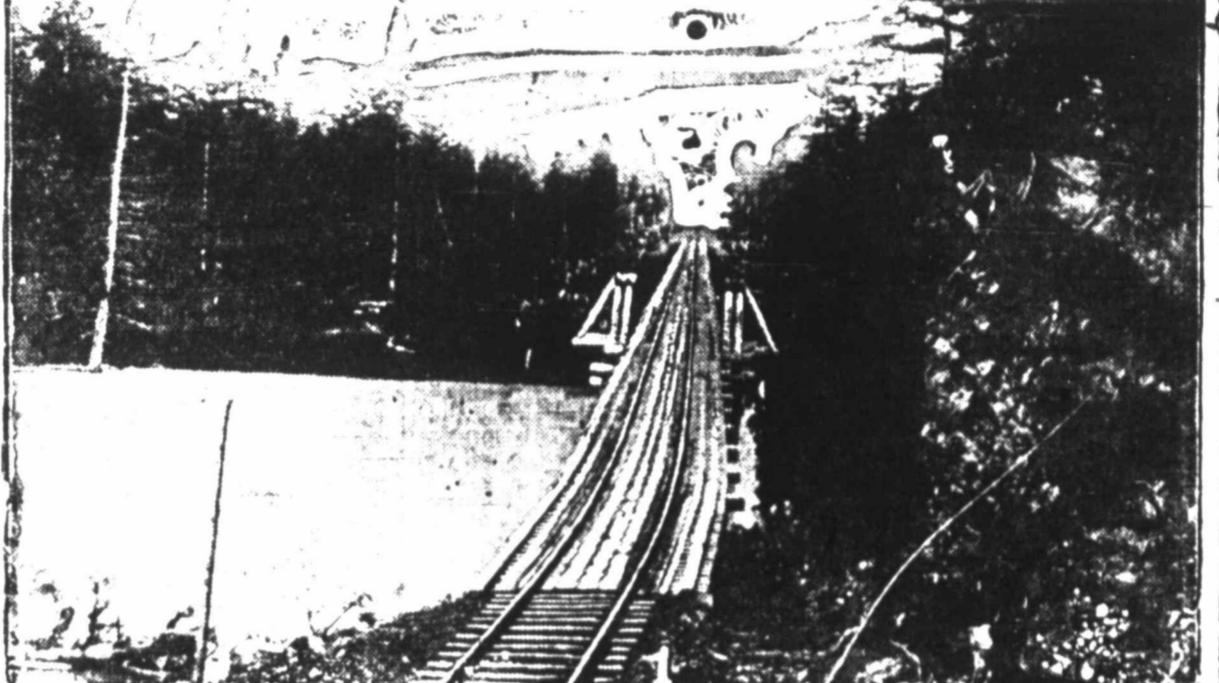
Lent Will be Observed with Special

Services will be held on Ash Wednesday by both the Episcopal and Catholic congregations, observing the beginning of the season. There will be special services during Lent, including meditation hour each Friday afternoon. At the Catholic church Ash Wednesday will be observed by the distribution of ashes and by a sermon in the evening. Services will be held at the Catholic church each Friday during Lent. On Sunday at ten o'clock there will be a sermon on the Passion.

In the church of the Good Shepherd, Episcopal, there will be Ash Wednesday services in the morning, with a special service for children at four o'clock in the afternoon. The meditation hour will be observed each Friday by this congregation also.

NEW INTERSTATE BOARD'S DUTIES

TRADE COMMISSION BILL IS BEING
DRAFTED TODAY BY
HOUSE COMMITTEE

GETTING OF INFORMATION

Proposed to Give Board Power to
Force Companies Answers to
Questions

Washington, Feb. 23.—Work on drafting an interstate trade commission bill was undertaken today by the House interstate commerce and anti-trust committee. Some of the main provisions likely to be in the subsequent bill would require that all companies subject to the bill report all required information and answer all questions the commission may ask, at any time.

Failure to comply within thirty days would be subject to a fine of not exceeding \$1000 for every day of failure to comply. On its own initiative or upon reasonable complaint by any person, firm or corporation, the commission may, and upon the attorney general's request, shall investigate the organization, conduct and management of any concern subject to its jurisdiction.

Attorney General to Help.
The commission's report on this investigation is to be made public and upon the attorney general's direction, if the commission, during any investigation should obtain information concerning unfair competition and practices not necessarily in violation of any law, it would recommend any additional necessary legislation. The commission would report to Congress by December 1 of each year, giving such facts and statistics as would be barred by limitation on public rights. This report would recommend any additional necessary legislation. The commission would have the same power as the Interstate Commerce Commission to investigate and compel production of documentary evidence.

COPPER MINERS' WIVES TESTIFY

TELL OF ALLEGED ATTACKS BY
DEPUTY SHERIFFS AND MILITIA MEMBERS

Women Declare They Were Kicked
and Beaten and Otherwise
Treated by Soldiers

Hancock, Mich., Feb. 23.—Wives of striking copper miners testified today before the congressional investigating committee that they had been kicked and beaten by deputy sheriffs and otherwise mistreated by soldiers without cause.

Mrs. Boris Feder charged that on July 30 last, and under sheriff's escort, she was taken to a rooming house and there she was kept for one day. She did not know who she was charged with, but said she was found not guilty.

She denied she and three other women taken at the time were arrested for picketing and interfering with non-union men.

OROZCO BACK SAFELY IN THE FEDERAL LINES

Returns to Mexico City—Had to Hide
for Six Weeks in Texas After
Ojinaga Defeat

Mexico City, Feb. 23.—Gen. Pascual Orozco, Jr., arrived here last night. He had hidden in Texas until the search for him relaxed and had then recrossed into Mexico. He said he left Ojinaga on General Rencor's order before the rebels gained their victory.

For six weeks, he said, he hid by the hills on the Texas side while searchers sought for him. Finally he reached the river near Las Vatas. He crossed the river and traveled in secret at night until he reached federal territory.

WASHINGTON IS WAITING

WANTS DETAILED REPORTS OF
VILLA'S EXPLANATION OF
BENTON'S DEATH

NO INTERVENTION

Despite Talk of Undersecretary of
Agriculture, Believed Administration
Has Priority of Support

Washington, Feb. 23.—The Mexican situation continued unperturbed in the public mind here today. Detailed reports of Villa's explanation of the execution of William S. Benton, the British subject, were expected here late today. Judgment will be reserved by the American government until other details, sought through independent investigation, are received.

Talk of armed intervention, possible speeches in the Senate by those who favor a drastic policy and general situation, is again in the air. Administration officials realize the situation is full of all sorts of possibilities in which unexpected happenings may play a vital part.

Administration leaders in Congress were confident they would be supported by the majority of democrats and by many republicans in their effort to keep the question within the councils of the Senate foreign relations committee and the executive department of the government.

Feeling that a repetition of the Benton incident may force the American government to a change of policy is apparent in official circles, but it is known the president and cabinet have repeatedly rejected the idea of intervention.

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LECTURE HEARD BY LARGE CROWD

ADDRESS ON CHRISTIAN SCIENCE DELIVERED SUNDAY AT THE WICHITA THEATRE

BOSTON MAN IS SPEAKER

Virgil O. Strickler Discusses Principles Upon Which Scientist Church is Founded

A lecture on the principles upon which Christian Science is based was delivered at the Wichita Theatre Sunday afternoon by Virgil O. Strickler, of the First Church of Boston, to an audience numbering between 600 and 700. The address was an interesting exposition of Christian Science and was attentively heard by the large crowd.

Judge A. H. Carrigan introduced the lecturer. Mr. Strickler's address follows:

It is undeniable—that Christian Science has healed many sick persons and has brought about the regeneration of many who were victims of sin. Among its membership are those who have been healed of intemperance, of so-called chronic and organic diseases, as well as of maladies that were acute or functional. It has healed others of sorrow, fear, unhappiness and similar diseased mental conditions that often cause more suffering and distress than physical disorders.

In every case of Christian Science healing, whether the disease was chronic or acute, physical or mental, the cure was brought about without the use of hypnotism, mental suggestion, drugs or any material means, and entirely through the application of the spiritual and metaphysical teachings of Christian Science.

The healing of the sick, however, is not the primary purpose of Christian Science. According to the teaching of this Science all sickness and disease result from error and false belief. If error and false belief are destroyed by the truth which Christian Science imparts, the disease disappears. Christian Science therefore, teaches that the cause of all diseases and sin is mental, and not physical, and that both sin and disease may be cured by one and the same metaphysical process, namely, by the substitution of spiritual truth in place of error and false belief in the human consciousness.

"Ye shall know the Truth and the Truth shall make ye free"

It is recorded in the 8th Chapter of the Gospel of John that upon one occasion when Jesus was being harassed by the lawyers and theologians who were plotting his death, and seeking to entrap him by his answers, he turned to a group of his followers, who were standing near, and said to them, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make ye free."

In all of the Bible there is no statement of greater importance to mankind than this utterance of the Master. It prescribes the remedy for every human ill. Knowledge of a thing must come through the mental and not through the physical, hence, according to the words of Jesus, mankind will be delivered from sin, disease and death not by doctoring the physical, but by filling the mental with truth. If this statement of Jesus was true it follows, by irresistible logic that the enslaving conditions from which humanity suffers must be due to the belief of something which is not true. In other words, if the time is ever to come, as Jesus has declared that it will come when the knowledge of the truth shall emancipate humanity from its bondage to sickness, sin, unhappiness, poverty, old age and death, such result can only be brought about when the knowledge of the truth shall have displaced and destroyed (out of human consciousness), the belief of that which is not true. There is no escape from this conclusion.

Christian Science shows that it is the effect produced by Truth operating in the human mentality, destroying superstition, false and vicious beliefs that must and will some day emancipate mankind from bondage to sin, disease and death.

Ultimate Truth There must be ultimate truth somewhere, and when it is apprehended by the human mind it will emancipate those who apprehended it from bondage to evil. Christian Science asserts that ultimate truth concerning God and man and their relationship is revealed by the Scriptures, and may be gained by every person when the Scriptures are rightly interpreted.

Difference Between Belief and Understanding

It is sometimes difficult for people to understand how religion can heal sickness and destroy sin, but the words of Jesus make it plain. Since it is through a knowledge of the truth that these results are accomplished the important thing for each one is to gain an understanding of truth in place of being satisfied with mere belief about it. In other words, in order to find out how religion can destroy sin, sickness and all sorts of evil conditions, it is first necessary to gain an understanding as to what is religion. To gain the benefits promised in the Bible to true believers it is necessary to get rid of that which is erroneous in religious belief and practice, and to ascertain what constitutes true religion.

There are many who honestly think that it makes no difference what religious beliefs they entertain, so long as they are sincere in them. A moment's reflection, however, will show that such a theory is pernicious and destructive for it is perfectly plain that if a thing is not, in fact, true, no amount of sincerity on the part of the believer can ever make it true. No engineer ever arrived at a correct result, no matter how sincerely he may have believed that his processes were correct, if they were not so in fact.

With respect to many things it may

be unimportant whether the thing believed is true or not, but with respect about God, and about themselves, and about their relationship to God, they are vital, because it will be shown that the things believed with respect to these matters, become laws that are binding upon the believer.

In trying to ascertain what constitutes religion the very first subject to be considered is that which relates to God. Every one must agree that a correct understanding of God is essential as the foundation of religion. Any system of religious teaching that is founded upon an imperfect or erroneous conception of God must necessarily fail to bring to its adherents the help and comfort for which they seek. When we look about us and see the splendid fidelity of men and women to their religious beliefs, and then see how much suffering and failure they have experienced, how far they are from attaining the good which they so honestly seek, it is a fair deduction that there is something wrong about their understanding of God.

No offense will be given, therefore, by the statement that the average person has a very indefinite and nebulous conception of God. If you were to ask a dozen people to tell you who and what God is, you would get a dozen different answers. There are some who think God is a person. How many people there are who, even they kneel down and close their eyes, and reverently pray to God, have in mind a person, or a form, or an image, to which they pray. And how many others there are who think of God as a being of anger and resentment, who dispense him! And are there not a great many others who think of God as a being who lives in a far off country called Heaven, and that it is necessary for people to die and go there, in order to see Him?

These are only a few of the incorrect beliefs which people entertain about God. When it is remembered that Jesus has said that it is the knowledge of the truth that shall make men free, in the face of such confusion of belief about Him, is it strange that people are sick and that they die? It is not apparent that what humanity needs is a demonstrable understanding of God in place of the theoretical and speculative beliefs about Him?

Yet, all the while that people have been believing these erroneous things about God, the Bible statements concerning him have been perfectly plain. The Bible says, for instance, "that God is love, and since He is infinite, He must be infinite Love." Christian Science says, therefore, that infinite Love cannot be the author of evil, either in the form of sickness or sin, and that no matter what one may think about evil, it must be accounted for in some other way than as being a part of the creation of God. Now, note the significance of that statement, for if God did not create evil, and it is manifest that He could not have created it, then it follows also that whatever God created must be eternal like Himself, and if God were the creator of evil, then evil would be eternal, and hence, indestructible.

62 DEGREE DROP IN TEMPERATURE

CHANGE FROM NEAR-SUMMER TO NEAR-ZERO COMES LATE SUNDAY HERE

SEVERE NORTHER ARRIVES

Sunday Afternoon's Balm Weather Gives Way to Cold Wind and Vicious Dust Storm

A DROPPING SIXTY TWO DEGREES in temperature in thirteen hours and the succession of a howling norther almost storm to blizzards, spring like furies were weather changes between Sunday afternoon and Monday morning that caused the meters to speed up at a terrific rate.

Sunday was a balmy day and from 2 until 3:30 in the afternoon the sun was above a clear sky. At the latter hour a heavy haze was observed, something over the northern sky and within fifteen minutes it fully veiled the surrounding clouds of dust over the city. The mercury dropped to 62 degrees at 3:30 and registered in a thermometer at Forsyth.

BOY BALKS AT POISON DOSE

Runs Away When Parent Urges Him to Swallow Bichloride of Mercury.

Cumberland, Md.—Mrs. Lydia Eury, forty-seven years old, widow of Columbus W. Eury, was taken to the Western Maryland hospital in a critical condition, having swallowed three bichloride of mercury tablets. She failed to get her four-year-old son George to join her in the suicidal attempt. It seemed to have been her intention to take the child with her.

Dependence over the separation from her children, two of whom, William, fifteen years old, and John, twelve years old, are at St. Mary's Industrial school, Baltimore, is believed to have prompted the attempt at self-destruction.

Mrs. Eury's family had been broken up since the death of her husband more than a year ago, and she was tired of life. With the son she was living at the home of J. T. Yost, 316 Race street, as housekeeper. The little boy told Pinkey Eury, his uncle, that his mother endeavored to have him swallow one of the tablets, but that she refused and fled down the stairs after he had seen his mother take three.

Mrs. Eury later became very ill and admitted to Mrs. Yost that she had taken poison. Several hours elapsed before a physician arrived. He took prompt measures to counteract the poison, and because the woman took an overdose, he thinks there is a chance for her recovery.

ROCKETS CARRY OFF MAKER

Man is Found Mile Away After Factory Explodes—Unable to Explain.

Winchester, Mass.—The factory of the New England Fireworks company went up in a puff of smoke, the result of an explosion, carrying with it Manager Ernest Borelli and three workmen. Borelli was thought to have been killed, when portions of his clothing, his eyeglass case and some coins were found in the vicinity, but a searching party discovered him in a clump of bushes a mile from the scene of the explosion, unable to remember what had happened. He was taken to the hospital, but later was sent home. The workmen were badly burned. Debris was scattered for several miles and the detonation was felt for a great distance. The building was of flimsy construction and the monetary loss will not be great. The men were packing rockets in the factory when the explosion occurred. Just what caused it is not known.

ROCHFORD GOT \$2400 WEEK

Famous French Writer Established a Remarkable Financial Record in Journalism.

London.—Henri Rochford drew at one time a larger income from newspaper work than any of his contemporaries. When La Lanterne was started it was arranged that he was to have a royalty on the sales. He wrote the whole of the paper, amounting to about three columns. About 60,000 copies were sold of the first number, and by the time the fourth number was issued that circulation was doubled. The result was that Rochford was soon making \$2,400 a week out of it, while it brought each of the directors \$62,000 a year, for doing nothing but keeping him up to the neck. There has been no other instance of a journalist getting so much money from his work.

BARED BREASTS TO TROOPS

Fanatical Russian Monk Objected to Restoration of Members Expelled for Heresy.

St. Petersburg.—To one of the Russian monasteries on Mount Athos from which the abbot and several monks had been expelled for heresy, the holy synod sent Archbishop Nikon on a Russian gunboat, escorted by an armed guard, to restore peace. When the troops surrounded the monastery an alarm bell was rung and the monks rushed toward the soldiers with their chests bared, shouting: "Transfix us in the name of the Saviour." Three of the monks were severely wounded and several were arrested.

No More State Bread.

Paris.—A Dutch invention will shortly be put into practice here which, it is said, will be as great a boon to bakers as it will to housekeepers. It is the application of cold storage to freshly baked bread, so that there need be no more night work for the bakers. The process is exceedingly complicated and scientific, but the method of operation is simple enough. The baker's oven is to be supplemented with a refrigerating chamber containing just as many degrees of cold as there are degrees of heat in the oven. The baker after baking his bread places it in the ice chamber and keeps it at a temperature of a degree or two below zero.

Tree Found Underground.

Sacramento.—A redwood tree, in a fair state of preservation, was discovered sixty feet beneath the surface on the Wright & Kimbrough tract in Colonial Heights by a gang of well borers. How the tree got there is the question that is puzzling the discoverers, and what kept it in such good condition is also a matter of conjecture.

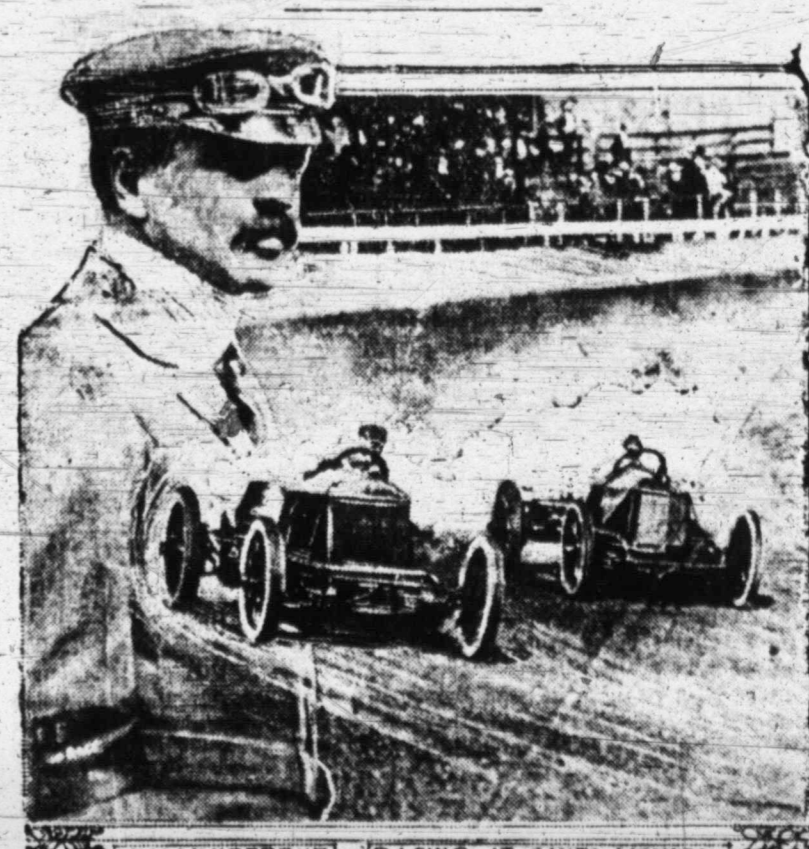

The City of Dallas, in order to get a test of the matter, taxed the telephone companies doing business in that city \$2 per annum on each telephone pole located on the streets and alleys of that city, and when the tax became due, brought suit for its collection and won the suit in the district court of Dallas county. The company will appeal to the higher courts. Ex Senator Horace Chilton has been retained by the City of Dallas. The final outcome of this suit will be watched with a great deal of interest by other towns and cities. The streets and alleys are kept up at public expense and those who make permanent use of them should not object to paying a reasonable tax to help keep them up.

The prohibition Democrats of Texas, through their duly appointed representatives, met in conference at Fort Worth Saturday and without a dissenting voice endorsed Col. Tom Ball of Houston as their choice for governor. They did more than this. They also pledged to raise a campaign fund of \$100,000 with which to pay the expenses of their candidate for governor, and that is something no other nominating convention in Texas has heretofore done. It has been clearly demonstrated gubernatorial campaigns that it requires from \$15,000 to \$20,000 to pay the campaign expenses of a single candidate, and usually this money has been paid in by a few friends of the successful candidate. The unsuccessful candidates generally have to stand that burden themselves. As the Times understands it, Candidate Ball's expense fund will be raised by popular subscription in amounts from \$1.00 to \$25.00. This is as it should be and even if he should not win in the July primaries the expense will be distributed in amounts that will not fall heavily on anyone. It is conceded by all—both pros and antis, that Ball is an able and strong man—one fully competent to make Texas such a governor as the state has not had since the days of Hogg. It is conceded by many that unless the anti prohibition Democrats can unite their forces upon a much stronger man than either Sparks, Terrell, or Ferguson, Ball will sweep the state in the July primaries. The antis are already beginning to realize the true situation, and on Saturday a few leaders gathered in Dallas to lay plans to do some eliminating themselves. Rumor has it that they were seeking to eliminate Sam Sparks on account of a letter he is supposed to have written during the campaign of 1910, in which it develops that Sparks was not an anti to the extent of giving his support to the anti candidate in that campaign. Of course, this is only a rumor. The conference was held behind closed doors, and the rumor has just leaked out. There may be nothing whatever to it, but if there is Dr. Rankin probably knows about it, and can be depended on to furnish the facts if indeed it is a fact that such a letter was ever written. Mr. Ferguson of Temple, a candidate for governor, who is an anti in the pro question and who is also a farmer and banker, was at the Dallas conference, but as to whether any one of the other anti candidates were present is not known. It is plain, however, that with the pros united on Ball, the antis can't hope to win in July unless they do some eliminating, and it now looks as if the whole bunch will have to give way.

NARROW ESCAPE IN EARLY BLAZE

BOARDING HOUSE AT 1100 OHIO DESTROYED BY FIRE AT 3:00 A. M. MONDAY

ARE AWAKENED BY SMOKE

Occupants Forced Out Into Bitter Cold—Fire Department Prevents Spread of Flames

Awakened by the smell of smoke at three o'clock Monday morning Mack Carter at 1100 Ohio avenue found the roof of his residence and boarding house in flames. He spread the alarm through the house and then turned his attention to getting some of his family's belongings out. Little was saved beyond trunks and personal belongings of boarders and members of the family and a few pieces of furniture.
The thermometer registered twelve above zero at the time of the fire and a fifty mile gale was blowing from the north carrying sparks and burning brands for a distance of several blocks. Despite these conditions the fire department prevented the spread of the flames to other outbuildings and a one story frame house less than twenty feet away, and which was at times swept over by the flames was saved. This and other buildings in the neighborhood on which the water was turned off this morning were covered with ice.

Mattress Starts New Fire.
A mattress which had been carried into the street and there caught afire was picked up and blown by the wind to the old produce house at the end of Ohio Avenue a block and a half away where it set fire to the ruins of that outbuilding which was still burning this morning.
The house burned was a two-story structure and was owned by Mrs. S. L. Frye living at Petrolia. Insurance was carried on the building and some insurance was also carried by Mr. Carter on his household goods.
Mr. Carter was so much occupied with warning the other occupants of their danger and in trying to get out some other belonging that he forgot about his purse left in a trunk up stairs containing about \$37, of which thirty dollars was in greenbacks. The coin was found in the ashes undamaged, but the greenbacks had been entirely destroyed.
The origin of the fire is unknown.

SUICIDE IS AN EXCEPTION

Gradual Increase in Breaking of Law Among Younger Males Also Shown by Statistics.

New York.—That married men are better than single ones is the most remarkable feature of a report of an investigation made by the district attorney's office which has just been made public. Out of the 2,857 men convicted last year only 754 were married, as compared to 2,068 who were unmarried. The one startling exception is in the case of suicide, the report showing that among men who attempt to take their own lives the married outnumber the single three to one.

A comparison for the last nine years gives 7,679 convictions of married men for all sorts of crimes and 18,406 convictions of unmarried men. The report indicates that there is a gradual increase in crime among young men, the male criminals under the age of thirty years having increased in number from 1,700 in 1904 to 2,200 in 1912. During the last year many offenders were between the years of fifteen and twenty.

Assault charges now show 40 under twenty years and 64 from twenty to thirty years, third-degree burglary, 213 for the younger period and 205 for the older; grand larceny in the second degree, 184 criminals under twenty years, and 258 from twenty to thirty; petit larceny, 167 under twenty and 144 from twenty to thirty years; unlawful entry, 34 under twenty years and 22 from twenty to thirty years. The total shows 940 under twenty convicted last year, and 1,278 from twenty to thirty. Only 404 offenders from thirty to forty years were convicted.

The statistics for women prisoners show that two-thirds of the women brought to court were under thirty years.

ACTRESS DESIGNS HER TOMB

Sarah Bernhardt is Busy Working on Monument That Will Embellish Her Tomb.

Paris.—Mme. Sarah Bernhardt is employing her vacation by carving a monument for the embellishment of her tomb, for which she has bought a desolate island off the coast of Brittany. She is working hard on a clay sketch of the complete conception with a young Breton woman as a model. The latter is sworn to silence and the design of the monument is kept a profound secret. It is said, however, by Mme. Bernhardt's friends, to be simple yet strangely moving in ideas. The tragedienne is reported to have said a short time ago that she had a horror of intrusting the erection of the monument to anybody else.

BABY HANGS SELF IN CRIB

Peculiar and Distressing Mishap to Little One Asleep in its Little Bed.

Phoenixville, Pa.—Strangled to death in her crib, where she had been placed to sleep but a few minutes before, the ten-month-old daughter of John Hallman of this place was found by her father.

The child had literally hanged herself. The small body, with the feet a few inches above the floor, was found hanging by the neck between the bars of the crib.

In some unaccountable way the child had forced her small body through its bed, a wedge of bed-covering preventing the head from following.

HELD FOR TEASING DAUGHTER

New York City Girl Says Her Father Harps on Style of the Dress—She Weeps.

New York.—Miss Elsie Lewis of Jessamine avenue, Yonkers, had her father, Loren Lewis, locked up for teasing her too much.

Lewis and the daughter have not been on good terms for some time and occasionally when he meets her he flatters her in a manner that gets on her nerves, declares Miss Lewis. Usually he harps upon the style of her dress.

Judge Ellis tried to get her to agree to give him another chance, but she insisted that he be given the limit. Lewis was therefore remanded.

To Make Body Transparent

Philadelphia.—Physicians of the Hahnemann Hospital and Medical college are perfecting a process, based on discoveries of a fluid by a German scientist, which will make the human body transparent after death. Students can study the veins, muscles and bones far more easily by the new method it is said. The fluid cannot be used before death.

Fine Children \$404

Montclair, N. J.—A package containing pennies, dimes and nickels worth \$404, representing fines imposed upon school children who damaged school property which caused loss to the taxpayers, was sent to the office of Town Treasurer Wendell by the local board of education. The package weighed 64 pounds.

Windsor, Mass.—Sewing several fishhooks in his wallet as a precaution against pickpockets, Albert Smith, a farmer, started to see the circus here. Lates he espied a candy stand and plunged his hand into his pocket for the wherewithal. The crook trap worked perfectly. A surgeon separated Smith from the fishhooks.

OIL COMPANY IS ENJOINED TODAY

ALLEGED THREAT TO TAKE DRILLING RIG BY FORCE CAUSES COURT ACTION

JACK KELLY IS PLAINTIFF

Rig on Andree Farm Near Frisberg is Basis of Litigation—Temporary Order Issued

Alleging that the Producers Oil Co. is threatening and planning to take a Star drilling rig from his possession by force, and that he is compelled to guard said rig with an armed force to prevent the defendant from carrying out this threat, Jack E. Kelly, through his attorney, Fred Weeks, this afternoon in the district court filed a petition for an injunction. Judge Martin issued a temporary restraining order.

The rig in question is located on the C. A. Andree farm near Frisberg where the plaintiff is putting down an oil well. In his petition he alleged that on or about February 18th one McMahon, an agent of the defendant company, told employees of the plaintiff that he was coming on the following day to take the rig by force. Since that time the plaintiff claims that he has been forced to guard the rig with an armed force to prevent the defendant from carrying out the threat.

"Plaintiff fears" says the petition, "that said defendant will put said threats into execution and that a breach of the peace will be caused by an attempt on the part of said defendant to take possession of said rig by force, that said defendant will attempt to take said rig by force unless restrained from so doing by writ of injunction."

North Texas Company Makes Application for Franchise at Fifty Cent Rate
