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## REAL CULPRITS BECKER'S QUEST

SAYS WILL DEVOTE ENERGIES  
TO CATCHING MEN RESPONSIBLE  
FOR MURDER

## RETRIAL IS IMPROBABLE

District Attorney Whitman Believes  
There is Small Hope For Conviction

Ossining, N. Y., Feb. 25.—As soon as Charles Becker gets out of prison he will devote all his energies, he said today, to running down the men responsible for the murder of Herman Rosenthal. He said he could furnish information that would bring the real culprits to justice. He added "After I have done that I will be willing to go back to the police department if they want to take me back. If they do not then I will enter some other line of work. The four gunmen are terribly downhearted today because they also were not granted a new trial. They thought their case was tied up with mine. When I was told I had been granted a new trial they immediately jumped at the conclusion that they also had been granted a new trial. It was hard when they were told the truth."

Becker said the four men granted immunity by the district attorney might yet be arrested for the murder of Rosenthal. He said he believed Harry Fallon is the man who fired the fatal shot.

District Attorney Whitman has little hope that he can secure a conviction against Becker under the courts ruling and may move for a dismissal of the charge.

"The District Attorney is the last man in the world," said Mr. Whitman "who should want a conviction to stand which is not justifiable by law. That is all the comment that I care to make."

Mr. Whitman, also, was under the impression tonight that in effect the court held that Sam Schepps, who corroborated testimony, also was an accomplice.

"If twenty men were in the conspiracy to murder," a lawyer close to the District Attorney said tonight, "and nineteen of them were to turn state's evidence against the twentieth, the twentieth could be convicted under this decision. It would be futile to bring Becker to trial again."

"THE DISPUTED BOUNDARY"  
IS JOHN D.'S FAVORITE

Cleveland, O., Feb. 25.—Those of the old residents of East Cleveland who had to run barefooted with John D. Rockefeller as a boy are authority for the statement that the oil king with all his nine hundred millions of dollars most highly among his personal possessions an \$87,000 painting, "The Disputed Boundary."

This statement, it is said, was in a degree responsible for Rockefeller's action in transferring first of all the painting from his Forest Hills estate to Pocomoke Hills at Tarrytown, N. Y., some time ago, when Cuyahoga county tax commissioners were demanding that he pay about \$12,000,000 taxes on his personal property.

"The Disputed Boundary," it is said, is typical of the disputed conflicts in John D.'s life, for the oil king has had more law suits and scarping heads over his fences and land claims than any man in the country.

The masterpiece was painted by Erskine Nichol, an English artist. It depicts a sturdy squire with puffed brows and a quill held between pursed lips, listening to the heated arguments of two worthy landowners.

The squire holds a rude map in his hand. Legal papers and books are scattered on the old style table. The compliments flying between the squabbling landowners can almost be heard, so realistic is the masterpiece.

"It's just like John," all the old friends comment.

## SNOW IN SOUTH ATLANTIC STATES

Twenty Years Records Broken—Snow  
Today in New Orleans and  
Mobile

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 25.—A general snowstorm throughout the South Atlantic States today broke weather bureau records of 20 years standing. A white blanket of snow extends as far south as Southern Georgia and considerable snow was reported throughout the Gulf States.

New Orleans and Mobile had their first snowfall in more than ten years. In Southern Georgia the snow was two to three inches deep. Snow fell over a large part of Mississippi and in places Louisiana. The heaviest fall reported was at Laurel, Miss., where the ground was covered to a depth of six inches. At Meridian, there was three inches.

Fruit trees and truck gardens, it is feared, have been damaged as the thermometer registered 32 degrees or lower almost to the coast.

## DEATH OF TEXAN IS CONFIRMED

OFFICIAL CONFIRMATION OF  
HANGING OF VERGARA RECEIVED BY GARRETT

## INVESTIGATION BEGUN

American Called Across Rio Grande  
Seized, Carried Into Interior  
and Hanged

Laredo, Texas, Feb. 25.—Official confirmation of the killing of Clements Vergara, an American citizen, by Mexican federalists, near Hidalgo, Mexico, was received today by U. S. Consul Garrett at Nuevo Laredo. The report said Vergara's body is still hanging three miles from Hidalgo. Mr. Garrett immediately left for the scene of the hanging to make an investigation.

Vergara was a citizen of Webb county, Texas, engaged in ranching. He used an island in the Rio Grande as a pasture for his horses. He complained that Mexican federalists were stealing his horses and a small detachment of Texas rangers was sent to his ranch.

On February 13 Mexicans appeared on the island calling to Vergara to come over, saying they would pay for the stolen animals. Rangers advised him not to go but he went anyhow. As soon as he reached the island he was struck on the head and knocked unconscious and carried into the interior. Vigorous representations on his behalf were made to the federal commander at Nuevo Laredo. The ranchman's release was promised.

## WILSON IN 1916 IS SLOGAN HEARD

Democratic Leaders Feel Certain the  
President Will Run Again and  
Will Win

Washington, Feb. 25.—Democratic leaders here feel certain that President Wilson will be a candidate for the nomination for president in 1916 and some of them are inclined to believe that his selection as democracy's standard bearer then is assured now.

In fact, political plans based on the conviction that Mr. Wilson will run for a second term are being made now. Current activity on the part of the democratic national committee has that end in view.

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This is the text of the plank: "We favor a single presidential term, and to that end urge the adoption of an amendment to the constitution making the president of the United States ineligible for re-election and we pledge the candidate of this convention to this principle."

Those leaders who are proceeding on the conviction that President Wilson will be a candidate for the nomination in 1916 have not regarded it as necessary to consult the president on the subject. They have felt a delicacy in making any such inquiries, but are satisfied that there need be no worry on that score.

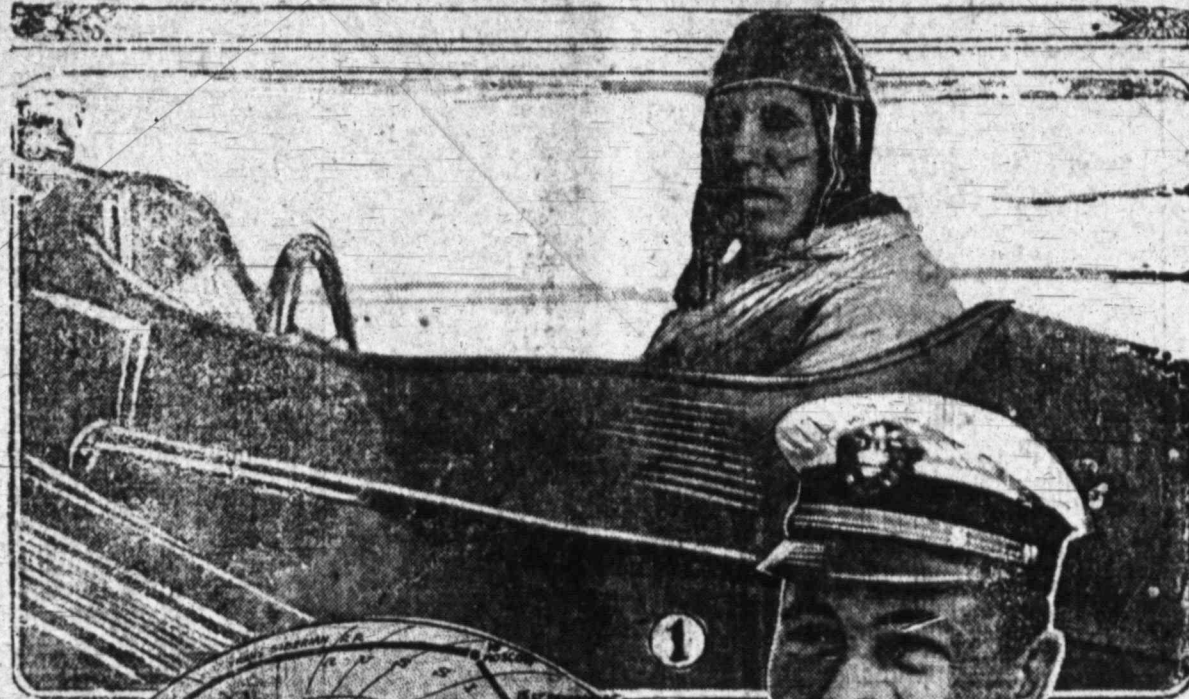
The preliminary work of the democratic national committee to keep Woodrow Wilson in the White House after 1917 is expressed in three pamphlets dealing with the accomplishments of the administration. They are intended to furnish the keynotes for the democratic campaigns for the election of senators and representatives this year. To hold the Senate and the House under democratic control is the immediate purpose of the committee. Democratic victories in a majority of the congressional districts are regarded as essential to the success of the ticket in 1916.

The leaders maintain that Mr. Wilson is immensely popular. They hold that if a presidential election were held now with Mr. Wilson as the democratic candidate, he would be triumphantly re-elected. While the tariff legislation is criticized in certain sections it is contended that the enactment of the currency legislation has offset it entirely.

Sixteen Months of Solitary Confinement  
Leaves Police Lieutenant  
Like an Athlete

His make-up is that of an athlete in training. He has also read much including the Bible, Shakespeare and other literature for a purpose which he refused to disclose.

## U. S. WILL EXAMINE BODY OF BENTON AT JAUREZ

Proposal To This Effect From Villa  
Accepted—British Consul Will  
Accompany American Surgeon

Washington, Feb. 25.—General Villa's proposal for an American examination of the body of William S. Benton, the Scotch ranchman executed at Juarez, without permitting its removal from Mexico has been accepted by this government without waiving any further movements that may be made to bring the body onto American soil.

British Consul Perceval at Galveston was ordered to proceed to El Paso at once where he is expected to arrive tomorrow to go to the grave in Juarez in company with an American army surgeon who will be detailed to make the examination.

A member of the Benton family will be taken with the party. The proposal was accepted after the exchange of several messages between the State department and General Villa who is now at Chihuahua.

## TANNER TELLS OF DEPORTATION

MAN WITH MOYER DESCRIBES AT-  
TACK AND SEIZURE OF FED-  
ERATION OFFICIAL

Moyer Bent Double and Struck On  
Head With Revolver Which Was  
Discharged

Hancock, Mich., Feb. 25.—Charles H. Tanner, auditor of the Western Federation of Miners today described to the copper investigating committee the deportation of Charles H. Moyer and himself. He said:

"Moyer was standing at the telephone in his room when there was a rap on the door. I was standing by the bed. A crowd of twenty or thirty rushed in shouting, 'Where is Moyer?' 'Where is Moyer?' At the same time three men covered me with revolvers. Then Moyer replied 'I am Moyer.' Several men made a rush for him and bent him over almost double. Another man rushed in from the hallway and struck Moyer on the head with a revolver. The gun exploded and Moyer was wounded in the back."

Tanner said he and Moyer were then rushed out to a train for Chicago.

### WICHITA FALLS RECIPE.

#### Recipe For Caramel Pie.

(By Mrs. Jno. C. Man)

Line a deep pie plate with pastry and place in the oven to brown. Separate three eggs, add to the well beaten yolks one and one-half cups of sweet milk, one cup brown sugar mixed with a heaping tablespoonful of flour, one-half teaspoonful of vanilla and a lump of butter. Place mixture on stove in double boiler or granite kettle, stir constantly until the boiling point is reached, remove from stove and turn into the crust. Heap on this the whites beaten to a stiff froth with the addition of a tablespoonful of sugar. Place in oven to brown.

### MANY HERE WILL PAY INCOME TAX

Wichita Falls individuals and Corporations Filing Out Information Blanks

Wichita Falls individuals and corporations that are subject to the income tax are now filling out the blanks giving the data required, preparatory to making their first payment of this tax. The internal revenue collector at Austin has mailed the blanks to all those affected locally and as a result there has been a general rush to attorneys' offices to learn what it is all about.

It is estimated that there are from fifty to seventy individuals in this county who will have to pay the tax, not including the corporations. Individuals who are married and whose income is as much as \$4000 annually, are subject to the tax; unmarried persons must pay on a \$2000 income. The amount of the tax varies with the annual income, starting at one per cent for the \$4000 man.

## ELECTION ORDER.

Whereas, the city council of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, at a regular meeting thereof, held on the 12th day of February, A. D. 1914, each and every member of the board of aldermen being present with the mayor or pro tem, all of whom join and concur in this order, (the truly elected mayor having recently died and no election having been held to elect his successor) has deemed it advisable to issue bonds of said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned and

Whereas, there is now no public hospital of any character or description owned, operated or controlled by either the City of Wichita Falls, Texas, or the County of Wichita, or in which either of said municipalities are in any manner interested.

Therefore, it is hereby ordered by the City Council of said City that an election be held on the 21st day of March A. D. 1914, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the city council of the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said city in the sum of \$25,000 payable in 40 years after date with option of redeeming the same at any time after 15 years from date, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest of said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of "building a public building in the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, to-wit: Joint county and city hospital building, the same to be erected, equipped and maintained jointly by the county of Wichita and the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, as authorized and provided by Chapter 39 of the general laws of the regular session of the 33rd Legislature of the State of Texas."

Said election shall be held at the city hall in the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, and at the Wichita county court house in the city of Wichita Falls, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed members of said election: At the city hall, J. W. Stone, presiding judge; J. B. Fitts, assistant judge; T. J. Weldman and J. P. Bryant, clerks, and at the court house there shall be W. J. Bullock, presiding judge; D. M. Perkins, assistant judge; and T. H. Vaughn and S. Heyser, clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 143, Acts of 26th Legislature, laws of 1899 and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said city shall be allowed to vote and all voting desired to support the proposition to issue bonds shall have voting said election at least 30 days prior to the date of said election.

A copy of this order signed by the mayor of said city shall serve as a proper notice of said election and the mayor is directed to cause notice of said election to be posted up at the places designated for holding said election at least 30 days prior to the date of said election.



## THE SOUTH IN THE SADDLE

An interesting and important inquiry has been made by Congressman John J. Rogers of Massachusetts. He points out that in the lower house of Congress there are fifty-eight committees. Of these, twenty-six may be dismissed as unimportant. Of the thirty-two remaining, thirty-one chairmanships are held by members from the South. Only one important chairmanship is held by a Northern democrat, the appropriation committee, of which Fitzgerald of Brooklyn is the head. And yet, of all the Democrats in the House only 132 came from the South, and 167 from the North and West. The explanation lies in the fact that chairmanships go with long service, and the Democrats who represent the South have been in Washington a long time; the Democrats from the North and West came in largely as the result of a political landslide, and are for the most part one and two-term men. Considering the very large power lodged in the chairmanship of a committee, these facts are striking and important. The country is being governed by and from the South to a degree not equaled since before the war. Congressman Rogers makes the charge that the southern members are using their power to divert most of the pork in the way of public buildings and other local appropriations to their section. If this is true, it is a perfectly natural thing, and merely an imitation of what northern republicans have been doing for a good many years. But the facts to which Congressman Rogers calls attention have a much more important significance.—Collier's Weekly.

## BETTER ROADS BUILT AT LESS COST UNDER THIS SYSTEM REPORTS KANSAS CITY PAPER

If Wichita county had a few more good roads, it would be long before its class roads would extend between all the communities of the county. Mr. Talley has given time, money and study to the road movement. He is now at Rochester, Minn., where he may undergo a surgical operation. From there he sent back the following clipping from the Kansas City Star relative to road building observations in Kansas:

It costs far less to macadamize county roads under the present system of open bidding and competition, than under the old system of political favoritism, which prevailed until a year ago. Much better roads are being built, too. In fact those who have examined the new roads, built under a new set of plans and specifications, are finding the "square deal" tax payers' policy, say there are no better roads in the country.

It really is the only one in the history of road building in Jackson county close observers say, that good roads have been built.

Under the old system, followed until Judge Gilbert had it changed last year, all the contractor did was to place the rock on the road and collect his money. The county courts employed men to roll the roads and to the finishing. "Political help" was employed to operate the steam rollers, and the same class of help was employed to haul water to the rollers and to the roads to finish the macadam.

But the contractors know what it is now costing them and accepting their present figure of cost, still Jackson county is building rock roads today at a far less cost—building them wider and better than in former years.

Under the present system the contractors do everything—make the subgrade, put on the rock and two days later working on the road, under the old system two layers of rock were placed on the road, rolled once or twice, no subgrade was made and the subgrade never was rolled. Under the present system the subgrade is made and rolled well. The hand-dug base is put down and that is rolled, after being nipped with hammers. They crushed rock is placed on that to fill the interstices and furnish another layer and that is rolled and flushed. Then a finishing coat is put on and flushed and rolled and flushed until the water is forced out in front of the rollers.

The old plans and specifications were gotten up by the road contractors and those they controlled. The new plans and specifications were gotten up by the county court, with the assistance of engineers furnished by the federal government.

Another thing that robbed the taxpayers under the old system was setting wagon measurements for rock. In other words the county paid for the rock by the cubic yard as it fell from the crusher into the wagon bed. It pays for it now after it is placed on the road, rolled and flushed. The shrinkage of hauling and rolling was from 30 to 40 per cent under the old system, but the county paid for the shrinkage and the contractor was happy.

There are no more "wagon measurements" under the present system.

## PHYSICIANS PLAN TO ELIMINATE QUACKS

Eminent Doctors Present Diagnosis of Ailing Sections of State Laws at Conference

Chicago, Feb. 25.—A nation-wide program to prevent an oncoming race of "quack doctors" was outlined here today when the Federation of State Medical Boards of the United States went into session. The Federation is striving to bring about uniform-legislation and a uniform, minimum educational standard, both preliminary and professional, for all applicants for license to practice medicine.

Eminent physicians, representing all branches in the healing art, from the homepaths to the eclectic and mental healers, were ready to present their diagnosis of "ailing" sections of the various state laws governing the requirements for securing a physician's certificate, with a recommendation for the proper "dose" to be administered to affect a cure.

"Most state boards are obliged to recognize all of the medical colleges in their own state, whether they are good or bad schools," said Otto V. Huffman, secretary-treasurer of the New York State Board. "The American Medical Association's list of medical schools is not sufficient because it considers acceptable some schools that are not acceptable to some of the high standard medical state boards."

"The Federation is on record as favoring the establishment of uniform laws that shall require a standard high school education before a person may take up the study of medicine, a four year's course in the study of medicine, and medical colleges to have abundant hospital and dispensary conditions for giving the necessary practical experience."

"At present there is a heterogeneous lot of laws in the country relative to the practice of medicine and the requirements in no two states are exactly alike. Very few state boards have facilities for passing upon the credentials of the applicants for examinations. The credentials as to the high school requirements should be passed on by one thoroughly familiar with high school work."

"When the federation's standard goes into effect it will be impossible for anyone to be graduated from a medical college before he reaches the age of 22 years. This is really entirely too low a standard, but it will be a great advance. It is not a question of fewer doctors, but better doctors."

"The greatest abuse today is a loop hole that may be found in the laws and regulations of nearly all the state boards which provide that applicants for a license to practice shall furnish a credential of having passed such and such an education or its equivalent. This word 'equivalent' provides the loop hole. An applicant may have been examined by anyone anywhere, and furnished a certificate saying that he had passed an examination, which is the equivalent of the educational standard required. This abuse must be corrected."
