### U. S. WILL EXAMINE BODY OF BENTON AT JAUREZ

Proposal To This Effect From Villa Accepted-British Consul Will Accompany American Surgeon

By Associated Press.

Washington, Feb. 25.-General Villa's proposal for an American examination of the body of William S. Benton, the Scotch ranchman executed at Juarez, without permitting its removal from Mexico has been accepted by this government without waiving any further movements that may be made to bring the body onto American soil.

British Consul Perceval at Galveston was ordered to proceed to El Paso at once where he is expected to arrive tomorrow to go to the grave in Juarez in company with an American army surgeon who will be detailed to make the examination. A member of the Benton family will be taken with the party.

The proposal was accepted after the exchange of several mesage sbetween the State department and General Villa who is now at Chihuahua.

### Feared That Discussion of Mexican Affairs Can No Longer Be Restrained In Senate

By Associated Press. Washington, Feb. 21. - Secretary Bryan has ordered a far-reaching investigation of the killing of William S. Benton, the British subject at Juarez. He announced today that until all facts in the case had been gathered, no opinion would be expressed by the state department. All information will be transmitted to the British government. Explanations made by General Villa to Thomas D. Edwards and George C. Carothers, the American consular representatives at Juarez, together with the court martial record, are to be supplemented by further information. Instructions went forth to American Consul Letcher at Chihua-

hua to get additional details from Villa, and it is understood that inquiry through independent sources will be carried on at Juarex Advices received by the State department up to late today, giving Villa's version of the affair, were that Benton was armed, had personally quarreled with Villa, had been disarmed, tried by courtmartial, and executed on the charge of attempting the life of Villa. Villa's explanation, telegraphed to the rebel agency here, was

unofficially exhibited to the State department, but brought no comment. Army officers took particular interest in the reference to Benton as an "armed prowler" and as such not entitled to the protection of the rules of war.

EVIDENCE OF ASSAULT WANTING

"The armed prowler" described in order "100" of the American rmy is essentially a guerilla, they explained, and one who is caught within military lines with arms, either engaged in the wanton destruction of property or as part of an invading force. Outrage The More Shocking Because Federals Had Promised No Harm Should Befall American

By Associated Press.

Washington, Feb. 27 .- That the American government regards the hanging of Clemente Vergara, an American citizen near Hidalgo, Mexico, as a subject for reparation by the Huerta government became known after today's meeting of the cabinet.

The cabinet discussed practically nothing but Mexican affairs. While the Benton incident was discussed in great detail members of the cabinet were particularly concerned over the hanging of Vergara. That act they believe d had shocked the American public and should not go unpunishd. Steps will be taken to impress the Huerta government with the feeling of the United States in the matter, particularly since repeated assurances had been given by the federals that Vergara would not be hanged.

So far as could be learned the Cabinet was not inclined to condone the killing of Benton but members were inclined to think Benton at least indiscreet in going into the camp of a military commander with whom he was not on friendly terms and engaging in a dispute with him.

GOVERNOR DENIED PERMISSION TO INVADE MEXICO TO PRO-TECT THIS SIDE

Neither Bryan Nor President Has Told Colquitt Whom To Recognize In Mexico

Austin, Texas, Feb. 27.—Governor Colquit today commenting on the telegram received from Secretary of State Bryan last night in which the latter, refused Colquitt's request that he be allowed to send rangers into Mexico in pursuit of the lawless elements who may cross the Texas bor-der, said that in declining his rquest the secretary had not answered his sestion as to whom he shall recog-Mexican government, whether Huerta or Carranza.

Colquitt said the president also has ot answered his question as to whom is the recognized government. Governor Colquitt says he intende send a larger force of rangers to the border to protect the lives and property of Texas citizens.

Message to President Wilson, The governor's message to the resident follows:

President, White House, Washing-Clemente Vergara, a citizen cf Texas: who complained that his prop erty had been unlawfully taken by Mexican troops, appealed to State auhorities for protection and Texas rangers were sent to give him protec ion asked for. On the theory that Mexicans wanted to confer with a riew of settling for the stolen proprty, Yergara was induced to meet hem on a small island in Rio Grande n Webb county, Texas, where he was assaulted, abducted and carried into Mexico and hanged, it is alleged, by soldiers of the Mexican army. Under reaty between United States and Mexico the governor of Texas has right to apply to governors of border Mexican States for surrender of the ten committing this crime to Texas uthorities.' 




