(Written for the United Press by an American in Mexicol Vera Cruz, March 5 Just a yea igo Victoriane Huerta took possession of the Mexican government and in spite of murders, treachery, oppres sion and the hundreds of other means he has taken to keep himself in pow er, each day has seen him slipping further downward on his bloody, seif constructed skids. 

Again Delivers Message In Person Before Joint Session Of Two Houses Of Congress

Washington, March 5 .- President Wilson personally appealed o Congress assembled in joint session today to sustain the National honor of the United States by repealing the Panama toll exemption clause against which Great Britain has protested. He asked Congress to do that "in support of the foreign policy

of the United States," and added that an exemption for American ships is not only "a mistaken ecomonic policy" but was contrary to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

"I shall not know how to deal with other matters of even greater importance and delicacy and consequences if you do not grant it to me in unbreakable measure," said the President. "The right thing to do is the only thing we can afford to do-a voluntary withdrawal from a position everywhere questioned and misunderstood. 





BRIEF OF NEAR 20,000 PAGES

Appeal of Southern Pacific Railroad in the Land Grant Case is in Forty Volumes.

Portland, Ore .- A legal brief printed in Portland is said to be more than twice as large as any other ever printed.

This particular brief is the appeal of the Southern Pacific company in the land grant case, in which the government sued to recover several million acres of land and won the suit in pany is now having its brief printed for the United States Supreme court. There will be 20,000 pages of printed matter. These will be made up into 40 volumes the size of the ordinary law book. The brief will, in twelf, be a formidable library, so far as the number of volumes goes. Each volume will be co posed of 500 pages, which is more than are contained in the "best sellers." as a standard encyclopedia. Although the brief must be printed and bound, it will be a very limited edition. Only some corporations like a raffroad with unlimited capital can afford to compile and publish a brief of such magnitude. Every phase of the land grant case, together with its history and the most inconsequential testimony of witnesses, will appear in the brief. 
