WHAT NEXT CLUB WITH MRS. JACK SHELTON

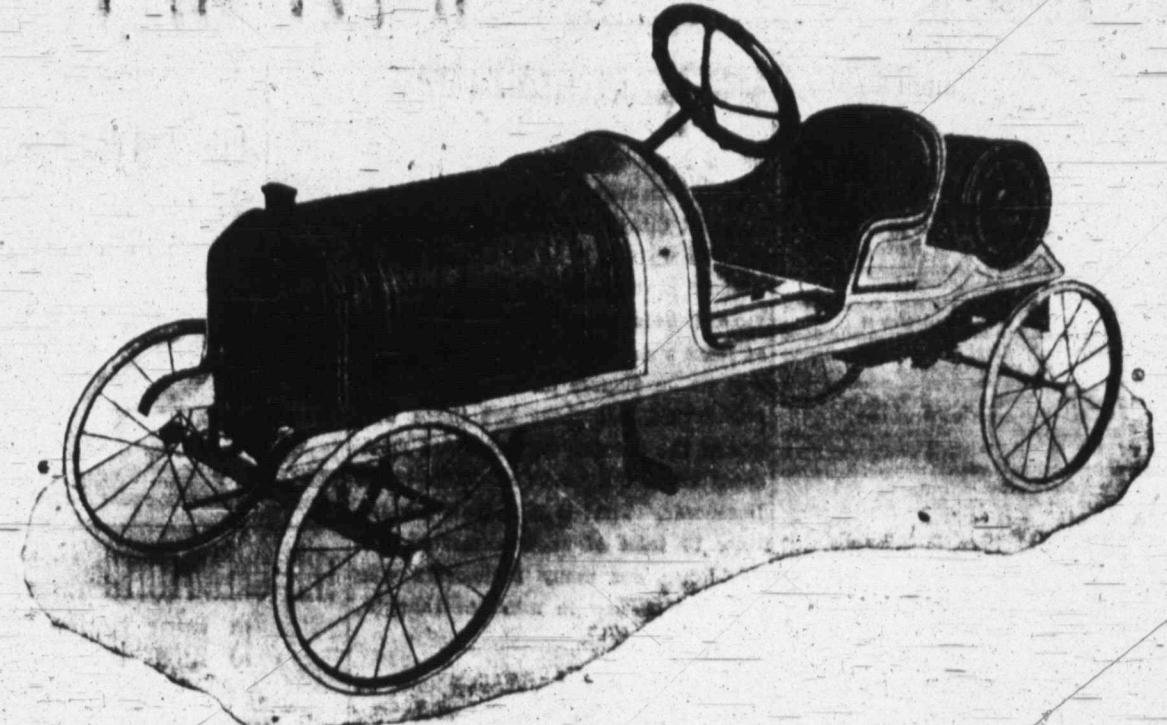

THE KATY AGRICULTURAL SPECIAL STARTS ON TRIP

Train Carries Cars of A. & M. and Industrial Arts Colleges Exhibits

Special to The Times College Station, Texas, March 5.—Preparations for the agricultural special demonstration train to be operated by the Katy over all of its lines in Texas have been completed and the special will leave Houston today for its swing over Central West and North Texas. The three cars prepared by the A. & M. College were shipped to Houston Tuesday morning and the cars from the College of Industrial Arts arrived here last night. Special stress will be laid on advising by the speakers from the Agricultural and Mechanical College with the view of encouraging that industry along the Katy lines. The College cars will be equipped with complete and thoroughly modern dairy equipment and silos. But other phases of agriculture also will be considered as the exhibits in the College cars will be representative of the instructional work done at the College. Representing the College on this trip will be C. M. Evans, superintendent of extension, Prof. R. D. Kennedy, instructor in animal husbandry, H. H. Williamson, assistant state agent in charge of club work, Miss Bernice Carter, in charge of the girls' club work, D. T. Stevens, assistant in the extension department and Ike Ashburn, publicity agent.

The College of Industrial Arts will have a special car also and Miss Floris Culver, demonstrator will conduct demonstrations in domestic science. Work of the students of the College also will be shown.

These speakers will have a message for the farmer, his wife and his children. Most of the stops will be for two hours and as the talks will be strictly practical much information can be gained from these discussions. The train will be in Wichita Falls March 18th.

MANY INDICATIONS THAT AMERICAN SPORT MAY GAIN FOOTHOLD IN FRANCE.

LAYING OUT THE DIAMONDS

Paris, March 5.—There are many indications that baseball will gain a real foothold in France this year. The visit of the New York and Chicago teams which are concluding their tour of the world will be followed by organized effort on the part of many of the French admirers of the American game to popularize it here.

Those in Paris who hope to see baseball interests increase here expect considerable assistance from the French army training school.

The pronouncement by the French youth is amusing to Americans, especially as to "foul" which is termed "fool" and "fly" which is termed "fea" and "fy".

"Besides the difficulty of getting playing fields," he says, "the hours of the French school boy are extraordinarily long. The average pupil is at his desk at eight o'clock in the morning and is not released until six, whereas in the United States generally in the public schools the boys leave their desks at from two to three. This gives them several hours for relaxation, which is devoted to ball playing or other forms of sport.

BRIEF OF NEAR 20,000 PAGES

Appeal of Southern Pacific Railroad in the Land Grant Case is in Forty Volumes.

Portland, Ore.—A legal brief printed in Portland is said to be more than twice as large as any other ever printed.

This particular brief is the appeal of the Southern Pacific company in the land grant case, in which the government sued to recover several million acres of land and won the suit in the lower courts. The railroad company is now having its brief printed for the United States Supreme court.

There will be 20,000 pages of printed matter. These will be made up into 40 volumes the size of the ordinary law book. The brief will, in itself, be a formidable library, so far as the number of volumes goes. Each volume will be composed of 500 pages, which is more than are contained in the "best sellers." When completed, the brief will be almost twice as large as a standard encyclopedia.

Although the brief must be printed and bound, it will be a very limited edition. Only some corporations like a railroad with unlimited capital can afford to compile and publish a brief of such magnitude. Every phase of the land grant case, together with its history and the most inconsequential testimony of witnesses, will appear in the brief. If the justices of the Supreme court of the United States attempt to read the entire brief it will command their entire time for several months in the reading alone.

NEGRO RESCUES CHILDREN FROM BURNING BUILDING.

Dallas, Texas, March 5.—A large two story frame building, and boarding house containing about twenty rooms was practically destroyed by fire which broke out shortly before 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Three little children who had been left in a room by their mother and the door locked were rescued by a negro servant who broke in a window and carried the children out. While the fire was at its height a young white man was discovered rifling the room and when arrested by the police had his pockets full of various articles that had belonged to different roomers. He was lodged in jail on a charge of theft. The house was located at San Jacinto and Masten streets, just in the edge of the business district, but was a mass of flames when the firemen arrived. The building was owned by T. H. Kleber and was valued at \$6,000. It was insured for \$4,000. J. W. Toaling occupied the building and valued his household goods at about \$2,000 and carried some insurance. The fire seemed to have started in the room in which the children were left and it is thought that the blaze was started by the children playing with matches setting some clothes in a closet afire.
