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## NEW PRODUCTION WAS 4,175 BARRELS

FEBRUARY RECORDED 79 COMPLETIONS IN FIELDS IN THE WICHITA DISTRICT

## PRODUCTION 32,250 BARRELS

During Month 28 Dry Holes Were Abandoned—Petrolia Figured in New Production

New production amounting to 4175 barrels daily was brought in the Northwest Texas field during February, bringing the total production to 32,250 barrels. The new production for February was distributed as follows:

Electra—42 wells completed, 14 dry, one gasser, 21 producing wells with 2600 barrels.

Burk Burnett—12 wells completed, six dry, no gasers, six producing wells with 275 barrels.

Petrolia—four completions, one dry, one gasser, three producing wells with 1150 barrels.

Iowa Park—21 completions, eight dry, no gas, 13 producing wells with 150 barrels.

Field production is distributed as follows:

Electra—27,300.

Iowa Park—600.

Burk Burnett—1900.

Petrolia—2450.

Among the months important features was the Sunday completion northwest of Iowa Park, showing either a new pool or a new link in the chain of production between Burk Burnett and Electra. Prospective early completions this month are expected to bring the production to a new high figure. There would have been decided slump in February but for Petrolia's completions. The Burk Burnett, the Producers and the Devel operators wells materially adding to the daily average.

The Iowa Park district continues to record a good bunch of shallow completions, holding the production up to a good figure. Interest now centers, however, in some deep tests in that section. The Sunday neighborhood may furnish one of these. A particularly interesting location is the J. C. Straus well on the Waggoner ranch and it is being closely watched. The Producers got a showing on this ranch and its proximity to the Fowles district also makes it look promising.

In the Burk Burnett field the Cordeana's shallow well on the Timmy was the feature. The completions at Electra were all inside.

## ECLIPSE OF MOON IS SCHEDULED FOR TONIGHT

Washington, March 11.—If it's clear tonight anyone living in North or South America and in portions of Europe and Africa, will be able to witness a partial eclipse of the moon. According to scientists the moon will enter the shadow at 9:42 p. m., and leave the shadow at 12:44 a. m., Eastern standard time; Central time one hour and mountain time two hours later. On August 21 it was announced today there will be a total eclipse of the sun visible as a small partial eclipse to the northwestern portion of North America as far south as Washington and also visible to Europe, northern Africa and the western half of Asia.

## COURT HOLDS DETECTIVE IS NOT AN ACCOMPLICE

Austin, Texas, March 11.—A detective who works with a burglar as an agent in the commission of an offense is not an accomplice according to an opinion rendered by the court of criminal appeals today in the case of R. E. Hyde of Taylor, Williamson county. D. G. Galloway, a detective employed by the citizens of Taylor to ferret out burglars, went with Hyde to rob a house. He received the stolen property from the house but turned Hyde over to the authorities and the property back to its owners.

Hyde complained that the court should have held Galloway as an accomplice. The Hyde case was affirmed.

## 3,000 CHINESE BRIGANDS ATTACK AND BURN CITY

Ply Torch and Sword and Kill and Wound Foreigners—Then Seize Arsenal

By Associated Press. Pekin, March 11.—Brigands today attacked and burned the city of Lao Hokow and killed Dr. Froyland, the Norwegian missionary and killed and wounded other foreigners. The attack was made by 3,000 brigands. They immediately plied the sword and the torch. They burned the Asiatic Petroleum Company's building and stores and likewise the American Tobacco Company's stores.

Two thousand coolies were forced to carry the supplies when the brigands looted the arsenal securing machine guns, rifles and supplies.

## TEXAS CATTLEMEN IGNORE COLQUITT

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED DO NOT MENTION GOVERNOR'S PLEA FOR ENDORSEMENT

## URGES PROTECTION OF LIVES

Attempt to Secure Endorsement of Administration's Policy Out of Order

By Associated Press. Fort Worth, Texas, March 11.—The Cattle Raisers' Association of Texas Wednesday morning adopted eighteen resolutions reported by the resolution committee without an opposing vote. The resolutions included two with reference to the Mexican situation but no stand was taken on the disagreement between Governor Colquitt and the federal government.

A resolution proposing endorsement of the policy of the national government was presented during the reading of the resolutions but James Callan, chairman of the resolution committee, declared it was out of order as the convention rule required that all matters for resolutions be presented to the committee for submission. The president's ruling was in accordance with the request.

One resolution adopted urged the protection of lives and property of Americans in Mexico and the other urged a vigilant policy along the border.

The association adopted a resolution asking for an amendment of the tariff law to provide for additional restrictions of importation of cattle along sanitary lines. Another resolution expressed hearty approval of the stand of the National administration in favor of rural credits.

## SUMMARY PUNISHMENT INJURY OF FOREIGNERS

Carranza Issues Orders Against Molestation of Americans and Other Foreigners

By Associated Press. Washington, March 11.—Consul Simplich at Nogales reported to the state department today that he has assurance from General Carranza that the lives and property of Americans and other foreigners would be protected and that all molestations of foreigners throughout the Nogales territory would be summarily punished.

Carranza issued this order on a protest delivered by the American consul acting under instructions from Secretary Bryan protesting against rebel depredations on George Bexbridge's ranch and Gamahja hacienda in the Nogales district.

## DARING ROBBERY IN TOLEDO'S BUSINESS DISTRICT

By Associated Press. Toledo, O., March 11.—Burglars dynamited a safe in the business district on Summit street and escaped with \$29,000 in bonds and \$350 in money and jewelry last night. They deafened the sound of the explosion by piling heaps of clothing about the safe.

## GUESTS SHOT THROUGH WINDOW AT A PARTY

Three Wounded at Houston Home Early This Morning—Shooter Still at Large

By Associated Press. Houston, Texas, March 11.—Police and detectives today are busy trying to ferret out the party or parties responsible for the wounding of three women and one man by shooting them through the window of a house where they were attending a social entertainment. An automatic shotgun was used and two shots were fired. The shooting took place at about one o'clock this morning.

The party was at the residence of M. D. Mitchell. The wounded include W. Lee Jr., Mrs. Ollie and Mrs. Della Kelley. The wounds of all are painful but not serious. The police believe they have a clue. The room was filled with guests at the time and a panic followed the two shots.

## SUFFRAGETTES PLAN TO CAPTURE VOTE IN SOUTH

Birmingham, Ala., March 11.—Women suffragettes in the opening of a two days conference here promised to take an open handed swat at Representative Underwood. They declared that his position against suffrage and his pleading the democratic cry against it was a sufficient reason to keep him out of the United States Senate, for which he is now a candidate. This question, however, caused somewhat of a division in the ranks for some of the members held that such an attack would not have an ill effect on his chances inasmuch as the state is not yet strongly pro-suffrage.

Dr. Anna Howard Shaw and her cohorts from the national suffragette organization were on hand when the convention was called to order today. The doctor, despite a recent painful injury, promised to take a leading part in the conference. The more radical delegates today thought that an active stumping campaign for Hobson as against Underwood would be the proper medicine to apply to the leader of the democratic majority of the house.

## WOMEN FAIL TO VOTE IN ILLINOIS

Chicago, March 11.—Although Illinois women were given their first chance yesterday in the selection of nominees for municipal offices in hundreds of Illinois towns, cities and villages there was no rush of the newly made voters to swell the ranks of the electorate.

A review of the various election reports shows that except where local contests were of paramount interest, women and men alike stayed away from the polls.

In Canton a woman candidate for mayor ran third on The Citizen's ticket. At Mt. Carroll another candidate was defeated 274 to 39.

Suffragist leaders declared the women voters were saving their energies until spring when the wet and dry issue is involved in more than 300 Illinois cities and towns.

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## NEGRO SCHOOL SHOWS BEST PERCENTAGE OF ATTENDANCE

Reports of City Schools Shows 52% Increase in Enrollment Over Last Year

The report of the city schools for the month ending March 6 shows an increase in enrollment of 58 over last month and an increase of 52 per cent of the enrollment for the corresponding month of last year. The report is as follows:

High school—Enrollment 603; average attendance 303.5; average absence 25; tardy 77; per cent of attendance 92.5.

Austin school—Enrollment 987; average attendance 734; average absence 76.5; tardy 81; per cent of attendance 91.

San Jacinto school—Enrollment 477; average attendance 289; average absence 38; tardy 66; per cent of attendance 83.2.

Alamo school—Enrollment 397; average attendance 252.3; average absence 66.6; tardy 61; per cent of attendance 90.3.

Travis school—Enrollment 289; average attendance 184.6; average absence 28; tardy 22; per cent of attendance 87.6.

Sam Houston school—Enrollment 129; average attendance 132; average absence 14.9; tardy 2; per cent of attendance 83.2.

Washington school—Enrollment 141; average attendance 135.5; average absence 3; tardy 16; per cent of attendance 96.8.

The total enrollment of all the schools is 2784; average attendance 2001; average absence 220; tardy 323; per cent of attendance 89.8.

## ART CUSTODIANS PANIC STRICKEN

IMITATORS OF MILITANT WHO MUTILATED ROBEY VENUS ARE FEARED

## MANY GALLERIES ARE CLOSED

Americans and Other Tourists Will Be Barred From England's Collections

By Associated Press. London, March 11.—The mutilation of the famous Valesquez painting known as the Robey Venus will result in the barring of Americans and other tourists from seeing many of England's art treasures. The Kensington Palace, and Hampton court galleries which visited yearly by thousands of tourists are closed. Moreover the \$200,000 collection of Oriental porcelains and bronzes in South Kensington court presented by the late George Salling have been locked up.

The custodians of all public art treasures are in a state of panic. Heretofore every suffragette demonstration of this character has been followed by scores of imitators. Large forces of special guards have been placed on duty in the British and South Kensington museum.

## A MELON CUTTING BY AMERICAN TOBACCO CO.

## TWO MORE ENGLISH ARMY OFFICERS KILLED TODAY

Aeroplane Collapses and They Fall From High Altitude at Salisbury Aerodrome

By Associated Press. Salisbury, Eng., March 11.—Two more officers of the British army were killed here today in a fall from an aeroplane. Captain R. Allen of the Welch regiment and Lieut. J. E. G. Borrowells of the Wilshire regiment while in a flight over the military aerodrome on Salisbury plain were hurled to the ground by the collapse of their aeroplane from a high altitude.

An officer was killed here in the same manner yesterday.

## ICE CREAM CLASSIFIED AS ARTICLE OF FOOD

By Associated Press. Washington, March 11.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered the express companies to classify ice cream as an article of food. The effect of the order will be to reduce the rate on ice cream shipments fifty per cent. The companies indicated their willingness to obey the order.

## WILL CALL OFF STRIKE IF MEN WANT IT DONE

Charles H. Moyer Recommends Referendum Vote of Copper Miners

By Associated Press. Chicago, March 11.—"We will sanction the calling off of the copper miners' strike if the men themselves want to do it," said Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners today. Moyer recommended a referendum vote to determine whether the strikers desired to waive their demands for the recognition of the union, the surrender of their union cards and return to work.

## MODEL WORE STRING OF BEADS ONLY ON BACK

Philadelphia, March 11.—The fashionable women of Philadelphia, in an effort to follow the Parisian vogue, adopted the green wig in a twinkling and accepted the skilful hat without a murmur, but today, when the "backless" evening gown was exhibited by living models, there were evidences of a fashionable revolution.

The exhibition of gowns was held at a hotel, and the grand ballroom resounded with shocked "Oh's" when a model walked out with nothing on her back but a string of beads and a draft.

The gown was of bright green crepe de chine, veiled with a lighter shade of tulle. There was hardly anything to the front of the waist, and the back was entirely absent. As a result, as the handsome model walked across the room, the effect was unusual, and the exclamations of the women present indicated that the gown will not become popular at once in Philadelphia.

As the model announced, four diagonal strands of beads are all that stand between the wearer and pneumonia.

## LEGISLATIVE POLL HAS BEEN TAKEN

EIGHTY-TWO REPRESENTATIVES AND 20 SENATORS FAVOR MAJORITY NOMINATIONS

## TO ASK SPECIAL SESSION

Many Prohibition Leaders, However, Declare Majority Nomination Already Assured

By Associated Press. San Antonio, Texas, March 11.—Eighty-two members of the House and twenty senators of the Texas legislature are in favor of amending the Terrell election law so as to require a majority vote for nominations for governor and other state offices, according to a poll taken by Mr. Kennedy, campaign manager for Chester Terrell, who is a candidate for governor.

Mr. Kennedy will call upon Governor Colquitt at Austin tomorrow and lay these facts before him with a request that a special session of the legislature be called to change the law.

One member of the House and one member of the Senate expressed themselves as opposed to any change in the Terrell election law. Five House members were non-committal.

## PROS DON'T BELIEVE SPECIAL SESSION NECESSARY

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 11.—At the Dallas conference last Saturday Governor Colquitt indicated that he would call a special session to enact changes in the Terrell election laws to require majority nominations, if he was requested to do so by prohibition leaders. Many prohibitionists, however, it has been learned, do not favor the calling of a special session. Believing that the action of the anti-prohibition convention to select a candidate to go into the primaries following their own action several weeks ago in endorsing Tom Ball of Houston, assures a majority nomination in the coming primary, without any change in the election laws. They declare themselves in favor of changing the law at a regular session of the legislature.

## HEAVY FINE AND JAIL SENTENCE IS AFFIRMED

By Associated Press. Austin, March 11.—Sentences of fines aggregating \$6,000 and six months' imprisonment against George Barnes, a prominent Elk and citizen of Marshall, Texas, was affirmed by the court of criminal appeals today. One sentence was a fine of \$4,000 and 90 days in jail for violating the law prohibiting the sale of liquor in local option territory and a \$2,000 fine 90 days in jail for operating a place for the cold storage of liquors in local option territory.

Judge Davidson, dissented in this case and attorneys for Barnes announced they will ask the governor for a pardon in case a motion for rehearing is overruled.

## FIRE ON MAIN STREET IN DALLAS THIS MORNING

By Associated Press. Dallas, Texas, March 11.—A fire of unknown origin swept through three buildings on lower Main street early today causing a loss of \$30,000. On the way to the fire the auto truck from station No. 1 crashed into a mail wagon at the corner of Main and Eray streets. L. W. Brooks, driver of the wagon, was buried in the wreckage and severely bruised while W. C. Adams, driver of the truck, was knocked unconscious.

## WILLACY WITHDRAWS FROM GUBERNATORIAL RACE

By Associated Press. San Antonio, Texas, March 11.—A letter issued today to the democratic voters of the State Senator John G. Willacy, retire from the gubernatorial race. He explains that he had hoped the governor would be chosen without reference to the liquor question but that now the issue has been raised he recognizes it must be met and does not desire to make the race on a single issue.

## GEN. FELIX DIAZ HAS REACHED WASHINGTON

Former Co-partner of Huerta, Has Plan To Restore Peace in Mexico

By Associated Press. Washington, March 11.—General Felix Diaz who helped Huerta in the revolution that overthrew Madero was subsequently taken under protection of the United States arrived here today. Members of his party said he had prepared a statement which would be issued later at the day.

From what was told the Senate foreign relations committee last week the purpose of the Diaz adherents is to restore peace in Mexico by a plan that would eliminate Huerta, Carranza and Villa. Members of the committee said sanction had been asked for a counter revolution.

**HUERTA'S DICTATORSHIP DEVELOPS INTO VERIFIABLE REIGN OF TERROR**

**DEPUTIES ARE ARRESTED**

Victory After Victory Adds to the Strength of Rebels in Northern Mexico

Vera Cruz, March 11.—With the two Maderos and Suarez murdered and countless others who opposed him "mysteriously missing" Huerta's dictatorship developed into a veritable reign of terror. Huerta's only hope of holding his blood bought power was to shed more blood.

The house of deputies, not realizing to what lengths the new president would dare to go, began to protest against Huerta's methods. One evening at 6 o'clock a cordon of soldiers surrounded the house of deputies, while other soldiers entered and arrested 100 of the leading statesmen of Mexico. They were herded to jail where common prisoners and they were hardly looked up in their cells before Huerta declared himself dictator of the country. He called an election. It was held. A new house of deputies was chosen, every man of whom was Huerta's servant. At a previous election he believed Huerta had been chosen president, but the votes were so few and so obviously controlled that even Huerta didn't dare to call himself elected.

And so with infinite craft, he ordered his new house of deputies to declare that the election was void and that another election be held on the fifth of July, 1914 and that in the meantime Huerta be considered provisional president. This congress also voted to Huerta dictatorial powers and then adjourned, leaving him in sole possession of the government in a situation that made his word and order as strong as any laws that both houses might pass.

In the meantime rebels victories multiplied, shortly every northern state was in rebel hands. Francisco Villa who had been one of Madero's generals, took the field with Carranza. It is true that Pascual Orozco went to Huerta's side but a slight scolding to be placed on all his former progress and defeats met him at every turn. How to get money and how to raise an army were Huerta's problems. He set about to do these things, but every dollar he raised by taxation only made him a new enemy and every man whom he forced into the army only gave him another soldier who would not desert.

In the seventh month of his rule he had built up a large army and had distributed it about the country but he could not pay it.

"You must pay these soldiers," he ordered the business men and farmers of the various states, "or I will withdraw from them. In many cases the business men and farmers chose not to have the federal soldiers in their localities. They preferred, indeed, to have the rebels rule over them, for the federalists were men of a low class, many of them conscripted criminals turned loose from jails, and they were heartless and insatiable for money, women and alcohol. Neither could Huerta trust his officers. He said once in a burst of confidence to Nelson O'Shaughnessy, charge d'affaires in the American embassy, "I can't trust my officers. I only wish I had about 150 American captains down here. I'd clear these rebels out in a short time."

Grat prevailed in every corner of the army. "One trouble is that no body in my army ever dies," said Huerta on another occasion. "Death never comes any chance in the world. Five hundred soldiers may be killed in a battle but the payroll never shows it." And so what men Huerta was able to gather together in various ways was vainly spent in the main. It was like pounding sand into a rat hole. He had to get his money's worth of military effort at any stage of the game. Even if the United States had recognized him, however, he had been able to secure all the funds he wished for. Huerta could not have wished the revolution against him. This is the fact that Porfirio Diaz himself, with \$2,000,000 in his treasury and means of securing much more, was forced to yield to Madero's demands that he resign. Diaz knew that it was not money he needed, but men and brains. He had had come in Mexico when, among the oppressed millions there were untold numbers of men to make up an army that would support oppression.

"During the months that Huerta was holding the government," he says, "I, Diaz, nephew of the former president and recipient of Huerta in the overthrow of Madero, was discovering the truth of the old adage: 'Traitor to one, traitor to all.'"

Huerta sent Diaz on a mission to Japan to thank the government there for its participation in the Mexican centennial celebration of 1910. This was a laughable mission. At least four men, leaders whom the Maderos or Huerta desired to leave the country had been started off for Japan, only to be shipped on the way in the same ship with orders to make a tight rope. As soon as Diaz got his orders he knew their significance. He was to be thrust aside. But he started, nevertheless. He got as far as Victoria, British Columbia. Then he turned around and started back for Mexico, determined to make a tight rope. He landed at Vera Cruz. He placed himself under the protection of John Lind, a special representative of President Wilson, who had been sent to Mexico to endeavor to bring about Huerta's retirement. Within a few days he saw that his life was in danger. In the night he made his way to the American consulate and asked to be allowed to go

**TOOTH-SOME DISHES.**

If one likes to delight a guest with an unusual salad, one who does not here is one worth trying: Lay a slice of banana on a crisp nest of lettuce, heap it with banana put through a ricer, and well mixed with lemon juice, sprinkled with chopped pecan meats and serve with a mayonnaise dressing. If one does not care for an oil dressing, there are any number of boiled dressings which are simple to prepare and have the good keeping quality. Equal parts of beaten egg and diluted vinegar cooked in a double boiler, and such seasonings, richness of dream of condiments added when used, is one of the good stand-bys.

**Cherry and Date Dessert.**—Put a pint of cherry juice in a cup of hot water, the juice of half a lemon and a cup of sugar over the fire. When boiling, add two level tablespoons of gelatine which has been softened in water. Cool and stir, setting the pan in ice water when slightly thickened, wet a mold and put the gelatine mixture in alternate layers with a cup of stoned dates. Serve with sweetened whipped cream.

**Date Torte.**—Beat the whites of three eggs until stiff, add the beaten yolks and a cup of sugar, a cup of bread crumbs and a teaspoonful of vanilla and a half cup of stoned dates. Bake twenty-five minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with whipped cream.

**Quaker Tea Cakes.**—Take two cups of rolled oats, one cup of sugar, two eggs—beaten slightly, one-fourth of a cup of butter, a teaspoonful of baking powder and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Drop on a buttered pan an inch apart. Bake in a moderate oven.

BOTHERSOME BUGS COSTING BIG SUM

GOVERNMENT APPROPRIATED \$800,000 FOR FIGHT AGAINST THEM

BOLL WEEVIL IS WORST

Argentine Ant and Australian Potato Tuber Moth Are New Insect Enemies

Washington, March 11.—Bugs! Bugs! Bugs! and bugs that burrow, bugs that bite and bugs that sting, big bugs and tiny bugs, lady bugs and mosquitos, anything but lady like are going to cost the federal government \$800,000 in real money during the fiscal year of 1915. That is the amount appropriated in the agricultural bill now before Congress. Dr. L. O. Howard, chief of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, and Uncle Sam's champion bug hunter, as pointed out, however, that these insects will cost the country fully 100 times that amount in cotton destroyed; corn and wheat and other grain crops injured; forests devastated; and crops ruined and fields laid almost bare. It is to stop such ravages as these that the bureau is maintained. That it saves many times as cost every year is easily demonstrated by statistics.

The biggest bug from the standpoint of destructiveness is the boll weevil which is slowly but certainly creeping before the desperate attacks of government scientists. But he "sneaks of war" provided by the appropriation bill are also wanted for campaigns against the gypsy moth that attacks tree foliage, the horn worm that destroys tobacco plants, the cane borer that lays low cane fields, the alfalfa weevil that attacks the alfalfa crop, the corn borer that attacks the corn stalks, the codling moth that spoils tree fruits, the pine beetle and the bark beetle. The latter insect is a serious menace to the national and private forests because it destroys millions of feet of standing timber.

The cotton red spider, also has been condemned as a public enemy, and two new menaces that have slipped past the immigration authorities are the Argentine ant which ruins growing tobacco and the Australian potato tuber moth. This latter pest lays its eggs in young potatoes with the result that when the farmer digs them he finds a large caterpillar inside each tuber eating sixteen meals a day. And finally there is a lot to be done in the way of reducing the number of house flies and stable flies which carry diseases more to be feared than crop failures.

The House Fly, Also. "We have undertaken an extensive study of the house fly," said Dr. Howard on this point. "In the small town and village 99 per cent of the house flies are bred in stable refuse and we have been co-operating with the bureau of chemistry to find some substance that will kill the fly larvae and not impair the fertilizing value of the refuse. We have found recently that there are one or two such substances which may be used at an economical rate. I think we are on the verge of a very practical discovery which will be of great value in the way of reducing the house fly pest."

"We have several lines of work now going on in regard to the effect of insects upon the health of man and animals. We wish in the first place to complete the records of longevity of the cattle ticks. These ticks, stable flies this insect has been shown to be instrumental in the carriage of infantile paralysis. We also expect to undertake a series of malaria fever studies and the bionomics of malarial mosquitoes, in order to provide remedies for the requirements of plantations, especially in the Mississippi delta where malaria is so prevalent. The idea being to find out what species of mosquito carry malaria in those districts, exactly how they breed, what can be done in the way of protecting people from their bites and what can be done to destroy the mosquitos in their breeding places."

War On the Boll Weevil. The boll weevil which is capable of extending flights, is much more difficult to deal with. Much has been done to control it by burning cotton stalks after the crop has been picked and by introducing parasites. Dr. W. D. Hunter, in charge of southern field crop insect investigations for the bureau says that records extending back 50 years in some instances show that the boll weevil never voluntarily leaves a territory it once invades.

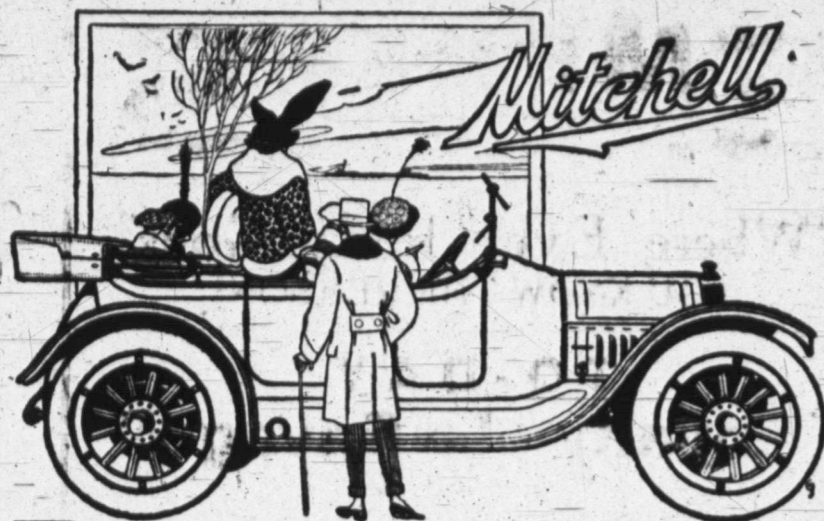

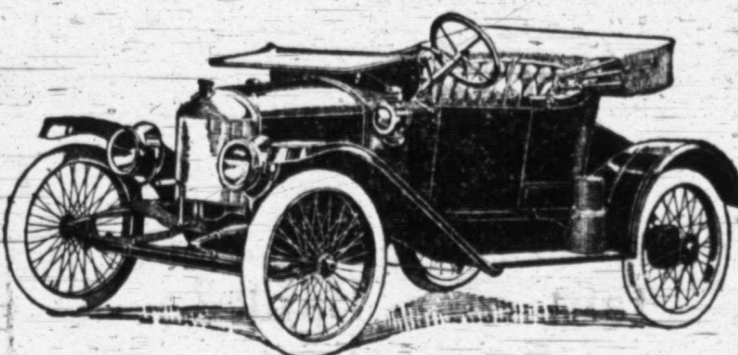



### 32 SENATORS MUST GO BEFORE PEOPLE

TERMS OF ONE-THIRD OF MEMBERS OF SENATE WILL EXPIRE IN ABOUT A YEAR

### RETIREMENT FOR SEVERAL

Senator Root Has Announced His Retirement—Bradley of Kentucky Also May Not Run

Washington, March 11.—The term of one-third of the members of the United States Senate will expire a little over a year hence. And thirty-two members will face the problem of getting back again—for with possibly one exception all of the senators would like to keep on with their legislative jobs—under the new three-year election law. All of which makes the political situation of considerable interest to the senatorial aspirants. Most of them are anxious to get on home and meet the political forces it will be a novel stunt for most of them this campaigning among the people instead of pulling wire among members of the state legislatures. Elinor Root whose term expires March 4, 1915—positively doesn't want reelection. Root has announced his retirement from public life at that time. Senator Bradley of Kentucky is not expected to fight for his return. It is practically certain that his successor will be a Democrat.

**Other Republicans Stated To Go.**  
Another Republican who is very anxious to be succeeded by a Democrat is Burton of Ohio. A Republican who will have the right of choice is to "go back" is Bristol of Kansas. His nomination will be opposed by former Senator Curtis, a regular Republican, while Murdoch will oppose him in the regular general election. Democratic senator who frankly looks forward to a hard struggle is Chamberlain of Oregon, who will be opposed by former Senator Bourne, a Republican.

A member of the Senate since the days of President Harrison in 1891, Gallinger of New Hampshire, will have to make his first fight before the people next fall. New Hampshire's other senator, Hollis is a Democrat. One of the most interesting battles of the fall will be that of Gore, the retiring senator from Oklahoma. Completely exonerated of charges of the most serious character, Gore is expected to be re-elected. A spectacular contest will be that of Pennsylvania, where Clifford Pinch will battle for the Progressive against Boise-Penrose, stand-patter, while the Democratic colors will be carried by A. Mitchell Palmer, who will probably have the regular support of President Wilson. Many of the regular Republicans especially a few representatives will join the ranks of the Progressives to beat Penrose, who they declare, dominates the party entirely too much to suit them.

**South Carolina Races.**  
Another fight in which intense interest will center is that of Cole-Blease, who will make the run against Ellison D. Smith of South Carolina and who, it is declared, has an excellent chance of beating Smith. Blease has a nation-wide reputation because of his "no hell with the constitution" views. He was recently re-elected governor despite the opposition of Senator Tillman. Another veteran of the Senate who is rounding out his last term is Perkins of California, whose long illness has almost paralyzed him. A senator who came make a struggle is Thornton of Louisiana, whose successor, Robert P. Broussard now a representative, has already been elected. Despite the fact that he has always been considered a leader of the Progressive movement, Cummings of Iowa, will probably be opposed by a Progressive candidate, even if he has no opposition in his own party.

While he will have no opposition in the general election, Clarke of Arkansas, president pro-temporary of the Senate, will have a hard fight with Judge W. F. Kirby of the state supreme court. Clarke is now mending fences back home, not having been in the Senate since the Christmas recess. Coe of Crawford has also been mending fences back in South Dakota since Christmas. In his place, Charles H. Burke will probably oppose him while Edward S. Johnson will probably lead the Democrats in the general election.

**George Ade May Run.**  
George Ade the humorist, is being brought forward to succeed Senator Shively of Indiana. Albert J. Beveridge will contest with Ade should Ade run for the Progressive nomination. Candidates for the Republican nomination are Ex-Governor W. T. Durbin, former mayor of Indianapolis, Charles Shoemaker and W. H. Taylor. Shively is unlikely to be opposed by the Democratic party as Taggart has said he will not run. Democratic voters in Alabama will have a chance to choose between representatives Hobson and Underwood. This is the first time the expiration term of the late Senator Johnson for which the Senate recently refused to seat F. P. Glass.
