Chihuahua, March 14. "Villa, the one time bandit, will be the no president of Mexico; that is his ambition and despite all reports to the contrary, it will remain his ambition until he is either dead or president." This declaration was made today by a friend so close to General Villa as to give authenticity to the assertion. It was prompted by reports that the. coming to Chihuahua of General Carranza, civil head of the revolution, would bring about conditions more satisfactory to foreign governments and place in authority better advisers than General Villa appears to have inhandling complications growing out of

the killing of William S. Benton. That Villa and Carranga might meet and that they might publicly embrace as an evidence of their per fect harmony was given out as a possibility. General Cararnza is now of his way overland from Sonora and a magnificent marble building has been prepared as his official residence, but it was stated emphatically that Carranza's coming will not lessen in any way the power now wielded by Villa, who for months has been dictator.



Tolls Must Bring in \$19,250,000 Annually or Become a Burden

By Associated Press. New York, March 14.—The exemp ion of coastwise shipping using the Panama Canal, from the payment of tolls, would mean a loss for the first D. A SHORT HISTORY OF THE COFFEE ROASTING INDUSTRY

In the early days all coffee was shipped from Brazil and other producing countries in sailing vessels. These vessels were subject/to severe storms and often the cargoes were badly damaged by salt water. This damaged coffee was piled on the wharves and there sprouted and rotted, and had to be hauled away at much

This was in the early sixties and since that time the business has grown to gigantic proportions and now involved the investment of millions of dollars and practically all coffee is sold in the roasted state. This method of course saves the house wife lots of trouble and annoyance, but, as most of the coffee so far has been roasted in the large sea port cities, it has been the cause of much stale coffee being used and has not tended to make coffee as popular. a beverage as it should be. 


