VILLA WOULD BE PRESIDENT

THIS IS DECLARED AMBITION OF REBEL LEADER, HIS FRIENDS SAY

WILL NOT GO SOUTH CUTCES HIMSELF OFF

Rebel Leader Will Remain In Chihuahua Until Prestige is Made Certain

Chihuahua, March 14.—Villanueva, the one time bandit, will be the president of Mexico; that is his ambition and despite all reports to the contrary, it will remain his ambition until he is either dead or president. This declaration was made today by a friend so close to General Villanueva as to give authenticity to the assertion. It was prompted by reports that the coming to Chihuahua of General Carranza, civil head of the revolution, would bring about conditions more satisfactory to foreign governments and place in authority better advisers than General Villanueva appears to have in handling complications growing out of the killing of William S. Benton.
That Villanueva and Carranza might meet and that they might publicly embrace as an evidence of their perfect harmony was given out as a possibility. General Carranza is now on his way overland from Sonora and a magnificent marble building has been prepared as his official residence, but it was stated emphatically that Carranza's coming will not lessen in any way the power now wielded by Villanueva who for months has been dictator. One of Villanueva's advisers said today:
"General Villanueva will remain supreme commander throughout the progress of the rebellion. His success in his victories against the federal army, his sweeping away of the Huerta soldiers from the north of Mexico while Carranza remained in comparative obscurity on the Pacific slope, have exalted him in the minds of his soldiers as to make his subordination to Carranza also improbable. General Villanueva could not afford to go south at the head of his troops on the attack on Torreón before he had first satisfied himself that his going would not result in the loss of any of his power."
In the absence of any indication that Villanueva intends to move southward this city apparently has resigned itself to an indefinite state of revolution. Outwardly, conditions are almost normal. The military band defenses operate music in the plazas and in the night in the gay lights of a wandering Tarahumara Indian, clothed only in a blanket, a pair of boots and a silk hat joined the parade and an enterprising merchant opened a soda water fountain. The disappearance of suspects, the report of economic conditions and the knowledge that many persons for months have been hiding in the basements of buildings form another matter little mentioned.

"The man on the hill," General Villanueva, who resides on an elevation a few blocks from the United States consulate, is the man who can pronounce life or death for any of those who stroll in the plaza or hide in the basements. Residing in his own marble home, not far from the plaza, but held a prisoner, is Luis Terrazas Jr. When seen today, he seemed to be utterly hopeless of his release. He has been confined here ever since General Villanueva's army entered the city last December. When told that his father, now a refugee in El Paso, was making every effort to procure his release, the prisoner tearfully shook his head and said that he had been submitted to torture in an effort to make him reveal places where Terrazas' money was supposed to be hidden. As understood here, he is being held for three purposes; one, that money may be extorted from the Terrazas family; another, that by threatening his execution, the Cientifico party may be dissuaded from invading Mexico from the north and that he may sign documents turning Terrazas property over to Villanueva.

FREE TOLLS EXEMPTION VIGOROUSLY DENOUNCED

CUTS HIMSELF OFF

Constitutionalist Leader Started on Horseback for Chihuahua City Saturday

Washington, March 14.—The declaration of General Carranza outlining his policy as to the right of American consuls to act for citizens of other powers was transmitted to the various powers today by diplomatic representatives here. Copies of the statement telegraphed to Secretary Bryan by American Consul Simplic at Nogales were supplied to diplomats late today and considered of such importance that there was no delay in submitting them to the government as a basis for specific instructions.
Embassy and legation officials commented on the Carranza note only in general terms. One fact is accepted, however, that the United States cannot continue to act for them in defiance of Carranza's refusals to listen to representatives on the old basis. They feel that there is no warrant of law for allowing United States consuls to accept credentials from foreign governments as seemed to be required by Carranza even if the various governments were willing to bestow such powers.

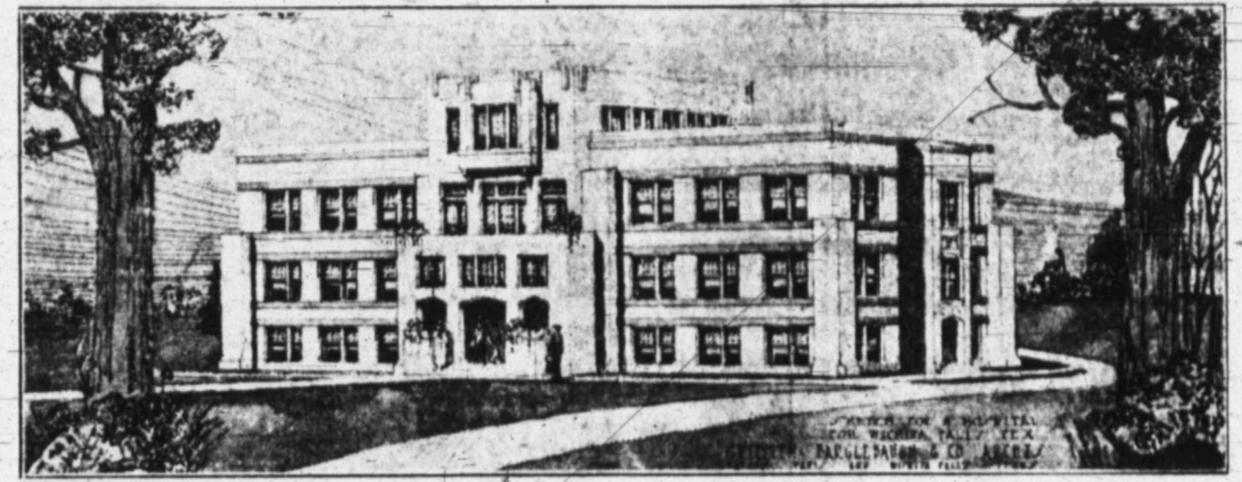
General Carranza has cut himself off from communication by starting on horseback across the mountains of Chihuahua. It will be nearly two weeks before he can be reached by telegraph and it is assumed at the State department that no change in the status of affairs in northern Mexico is likely in the immediate future. It is felt that General Carranza's declaration marks a change in his uncompromising attitude and that when he reaches Chihuahua he will be ready to concede to the United States the right to look after foreign interests in the country controlled by constitutionalists without the limitations imposed in today's declaration of policy.
For the next fortnight, at least, the old practice probably will be followed, and the State department will continue to protest against any maltreatment of foreigners or injury to the property. While on the other hand Carranza or his agents, without accepting these representations or protests as official, will note them as information on which cases will be investigated as if they had been reported by Mexican officials. This situation will obtain however only in localities where foreign government have no consuls.

It is believed that in other cases the various governments will accept General Carranza's suggestion and allow their consuls to do business with him on an unofficial basis, which will not carry with it political recognition. It is recalled that this was done by Europe in the Confederate States during the civil war.
"Carranza's note is a plain bid for recognition by this government," as well as by other governments," declared Senator Fall of New Mexico today. "It is a bid for recognition of Carranza's government as the representative of American consuls respecting the interests of foreigners whose interests the United States has asked its consuls to conserve. Carranza violates the comity of nations. It is not particularly Mexican in its disregard of international usage."
Secretary Bryan today denied any knowledge of a shipment of arms consigned to the American embassy in Mexico City and reported to have been detained. It is believed that the arms have been held up. They were destined for individual Americans and not for the embassy.

INTERLOCKING FEATURE NOW BEING CONSIDERED

Washington, March 14.—The Senate subcommittee on interstate commerce appointed by Chairman Newlands to consider the anti-trust legislative program, struggled for hours with the proposal of the tentative bill to prohibit interlocking directorates.
Some regulation of this kind, supplementary to the Sherman act, it was agreed, was needed, but interlocking directorates, it was felt, should be developed among committee members.
"We want to hit the bull's eye in framing this feature of the legislative program," said Senator Newlands tonight, "but we do not want a bill that may embody many useless restrictions or provisions that might hurt more harm than good. What the line of demarcation should be as to the prohibition of interlocking directorates is a problem first to be determined before the committee can draft a measure to be submitted to Congress. In the subcommittee are able men and women of different views and it will take some time to perfect the measure."

PLAN SUBMITTED FOR PROPOSED JOINT CITY AND COUNTY HOSPITAL



The above cut is from a perspective of plans for the proposed new county and city hospital submitted by Griffith, Hargreaves & Company, architects, who have recently opened an office in this city. All of the architects here have been asked by the joint committee from the city council and the county commissioners' court to submit plans and sketches for the proposed hospital. The cost of the hospital sketched above would come within the \$50,000 limit and would have room for sixty-five beds. It would be fire proof, of brick and concrete construction with tile, floors and other sanitary construction and arrangements.
To provide for the interest and sinking fund for the redemption of the proposed \$25,000 bond issue by the county taxpayers outside Wichita Falls would be required to pay only about fifteen cents a year on each thousand dollars of assessed valuation. The man who pays taxes on \$5,000 would pay only 75 cents; the man who pays taxes on \$10,000, only \$1.50.

NO ANNOUNCEMENT ON EXTRA SESSION

GOV. COLQUITT WAITING TO HEAR FROM OTHER MEMBERS OF LEGISLATURE

MANY CHANGES OF OPINION

Some Make Different Answers From Those They Made to Kennedy's Query

Austin, Texas, March 14.—Governor Colquitt refused to state tonight whether he would call an extra session to various members of the House and Senate were received today from seventy-seven members. Forty members replied to the governor's query as to the submission of an amendment to the election laws providing for a majority vote, in the affirmative. Twenty-seven members replied negatively and ten were non-committal. There was a decided change in the opinion of many of the members who assented to Representative Kennedy's proposal when it was made.
Mr. Kennedy presented to the governor telegrams from eighty-three members of the House and twenty members of the Senate advocating a special session for the submission of the amendment. Many of these, however, changed their opinion in response to the governor's query. There are about eighty-five members of the legislature to be heard from before the governor makes any announcement as to his intentions.

THAW ISSUES ADDRESS TO THE CITIZENS OF N.Y.

Asks People to Demand That His Prosecution be Terminated

Concord, N. H., March 14.—Harry K. Thaw has addressed to the people of the State of New York, in whose name he is being conducted the contest against the slayer of Stanford White to Matteawan for the Criminal Insane, an appeal to end the case against him. A statement of the case was telegraphed today by Thaw to newspapers and press associations calling attention to resolutions which have been introduced in the New York assembly by John E. Golden, demand that the prosecution be terminated.
Thaw, reviewing his two trials, set forth that of the twenty-six men convicted with him in the Tombs in 1906, charged with homicide, twenty-three are free today and the other men have escaped from Matteawan without being pursued. Thaw says he does not ask for sympathy, but only justice.
"For the deed committed, I ask no benevolence. It was done in a moment when sorrow wrecked my home and when I was forced to realize that the happiness of a lifetime, which after marriage, should have been mine, was taken from me. The deed was committed. My family, those near and dear to me, publicly exposed to the closest scrutiny, my mother plunged into grief and myself into a living death and torture, which I do not wish to relate."

TWO ULTIMATUMS FROM THE UNEMPLOYED ARMIES

One Asks Food and Other Demands Food and Special Train to Nevada Line

Sacramento, Cal., March 14.—Two ultimatum from the armies of the unemployed on the Yolo side of the Sacramento river were delivered today to the Sacramento citizens committee. Both demanded food and the privilege of continuing their journey eastward in units of fifty. One new ultimatum was from "General" Kelley's main army, the other from the "Kelley" headquarters, however, came a sweeping demand for the release of the army's leader. A special train to the Nevada line and food for the journey. "Asked if he were not aware that General Oddie of Nevada has asserted that the army would not be allowed to enter the state, the spokesman for Kelley replied:
"Yes, but we will take care of that ourselves when the time comes."

Clergymen here arranged to bring religious services tomorrow at the camp on the Yolo levees. The young men of their congregations were asked to carry baskets of luncheon to the men.

NO SETTLEMENT IRISH HOME RULE DIFFICULTY

Ulsterites Uncompromising in Demands for Permanent Exclusion of Ulster

London, March 14.—A settlement of the Irish home rule difficulty apparently has been little advanced by the government's great concessions to the Ulsterites and taking the assertions of both political parties at their face value, the deadlock today remains as immovable as before Premier Asquith's conciliatory offer was made in the House of Commons on March 9.
The signers of the Ulster covenant declare strongly that nothing less than the permanent exclusion of the Protestant county of Ulster from the Irish government, instead of the proposed six year option, will be considered by them. The more radical covenanters demand not only the exclusion of the four counties, Antrim, Armagh, Londonderry and Down, in which the Protestants are in the majority, but they want the entire province of Ulster excluded. Anything else, they say, would be the desertion of their comrades in counties where Protestants are in the minority and would be treason to their covenant.

PARCELS POST RATES EXTENDED TO SEEDS

Washington, March 14.—Extension of the parcels post rates to seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and various kinds of plants became effective today as the result of an order by Postmaster General Burleson. The order puts into effect the recent act of the Congress which repeals the special rate of postage heretofore chargeable on seeds and plants, etc., and makes regular parcels post rates applicable to such articles.

ALVAREZ REPLIES TO COLQUITT'S DEMAND

FEDERAL GENERAL SAYS HE CANNOT CONSIDER DEMANDS FOR DELIVERY RODRIGUEZ

HE GIVES CAUSTIC ANSWER

Suggests That Texas Authorities Seek Advice as to Proper Procedure

Laredo, Texas, March 14.—Governor Colquitt, through Adjutant General Hutchings, it is alleged, has made a formal demand on the commander of Nuevo Laredo, General Alvarez for the return of the horses alleged to have been stolen from Clemente Vergara, and for the delivery of Apolonio Rodriguez, the alleged murderer of Vergara, to Texas officials. At first General Hutchings sent a request along these lines, to which he received a very courteous reply, stating that the matter was not in Alvarez's hands, whereupon he sent an emphatic demand. General Alvarez then sent the following answer:
"I cannot possibly consider your communication in an official capacity as any demand or even suggestion must perforce go through proper diplomatic channels. Therefore, I must refuse your demand contained in your last letter and suggest that the State of Texas, if it has no competent adviser, employ some person who will advise you that the demand for the return of cattle must go through proper diplomatic officers. Anyway, it is entirely a judicial matter that must be taken up in the courts."
Consul Garrett denied having any knowledge of the matter.

COLQUITT DECLINES TO MAKE ANY COMMENT

Austin, Texas, March 14.—When the Associated Press dispatch telling of the presentation of the order on General Alvarez for horses alleged to have been stolen from Clemente Vergara, and the alleged statement to General Hutchings was shown to Gov. Colquitt, he refused to make any statement. After reading the dispatch several times, he merely smiled and remarked:
"I have nothing whatever to say at this time."
In recent days Colquitt has been in touch with the United States officials and secured from them recognition of the power in Mexico to whom requisition should be presented for the return of the parties guilty of the murder of Vergara.
It is unlikely, unless there has been a mistake in the matter, that the demand should have been presented in any but a legal matter. The governor has been in touch with the attorney general and received his advice on every step previously taken.

EXEMPTION WOULD LOSE \$20,000,000

FAVORS TO AMERICAN COASTWISE VESSELS WOULD MAKE TAXPAYERS DIG UP LOSS

RIVER REGULATION BEING CONSIDERED

INQUIRY INTO WATER POWER CONTROL AND RIVER CONTROL TO BE PRESSED

CANAL COMMISSIONER TALKS

Tolls Must Bring in \$19,250,000 Annually or Become a Burden to People

New York, March 14.—The exemption of coastwise shipping using the Panama Canal, from the payment of tolls, would mean a loss for the first ten years of \$20,000,000, said Prof. E. D. Johnson of the University of Pennsylvania tonight at a dinner of the University of Pennsylvania and of New York. The loss, he said, would have to be borne by taxpayers of the United States. Prof. Johnson was appointed special United States commissioner of Panama traffic tolls by former President Taft and served as such in 1911 and 1913. He said that to enable the canal to carry itself commercially without being a continuing burden upon taxpayers, it will be necessary to obtain revenues of about \$19,250,000 yearly.
"This amount is made up of \$3,500,000 for annual maintenance and operation," he said. "\$5,000,000 for sanitation and government, \$25,000,000 as annuities to the Republic of Panama, \$11,250,000 to cover interest at three per cent on \$375,000,000 invested in the canal and \$3,750,000 as a sinking fund of one per cent to return to the treasury the cost of the canal during the next fifty years."
Prof. Johnson said that this revenue must be obtained mainly from tolls collected from vessels that used the canal. He said that if all vessels using the canal paid tolls, at the end of ten years the revenue would cover the annual outlay for operation expenses and charges on capital.
Secretary of War Garrison was one of the speakers. His speech was confined mainly to a short statement of the end of the war. He said that the army, he said, the canal could not have been built nor the canal zone rendered habitable.

MEXICANS ARRESTED AS ROBBERS OF FREIGHT CAR

Two Identified as Those Who Entered Cab and Shot the Engineer

Princeton, Ill., March 14.—Thirteen Mexicans, track laborers, are in jail tonight and another is dying. It is said, in a hospital, as a result of a murder committed by two of the four men, who attacked the freight crew. These two men are the ones who entered the engine cab, it is said, and shot the engineer because he refused to obey their command to pull the train-out on the main track and proceed in spite of the fact that another train was due from an opposite direction.
The two men were captured at Langley early yesterday after a fight in a bunk car. When Deputy Sheriff Burton Scoglund and Leslie Byer followed the men up at the point of a revolver while the other three ran to the locomotive where they shot and killed the engineer. Then joining their companions all fled toward Langley.
Complaint had been made for some time that packages had been stolen from cars. Early Friday, while the train of which Fisher was engineer stood on a siding at Manlius, a member of the crew saw men throwing goods from a box car. 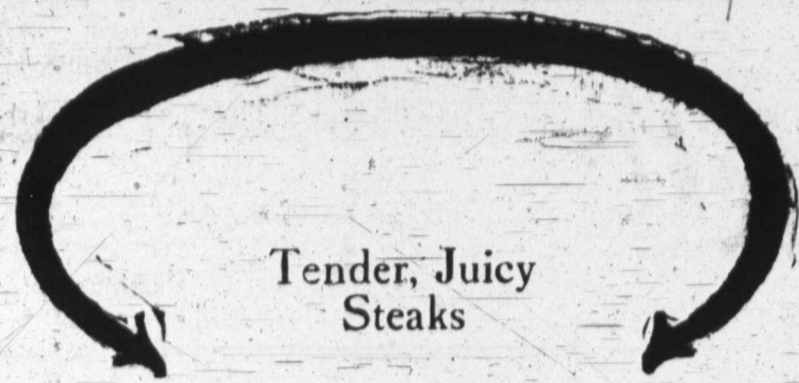
VALDE AND NORTHERN RAILWAY CO. CHARTERED

INQUIRY RECEIVED HERE CONCERNING A SUICIDE

Wichita Falls, Texas, March 15, 1914

The President and Mrs. Wilson announce the engagement of their youngest daughter, Eleanor Randolph, to Hon. William Gibbs McAdoo. It is the way a press dispatch from the White House reads. The prospective groom is fifty while Miss Wilson is but twenty-four, and the wedding it is said, will take place in June, which will be the fourteenth White House wedding.

The United States Express Company is to liquidate and go out of business. Last December stock in this concern was sold down as low as 28, and since that time has risen to 34. It is now thought that shareholders will get dollar for dollar. No body seems to have been hurt. The parcels post system is given as one reason for the company going out of business.

In a letter to the Times Hon. J. H. Lowry, editor of the Honey Grove Signal, who is one of the many candidates for congressman-at-large, speaks very encouragingly of his prospects, and while he has little money with which to pay necessary campaign expenses his friends are legion throughout the state, not one of whom will fail to put in a good word for him between now and the day of election. Here's hoping "Butter-milk Jim" will pull through, and if he does Texas will have a more able man or a more courteous gentleman composing her delegation in the House of Representatives.

It now develops that Mrs. Vergara, wife of the murdered ranchman, paid \$400 for the recovery of her murdered husband's body from a Mexican cemetery, and it was delivered to the captain of the Texas Rangers on American soil. It is not likely that any steps will be taken on the part of the government at Washington to punish those who composed the party who crept over into Mexico and brought back with them the body of Vergara, and whether that party was composed of Texas Rangers or not, it was a brave deed and there is not one American in a hundred thousand who is mean enough not to approve and commend it. The Mexicans had lied to the Washington authorities from beginning to end about what had become of Vergara, and while the Washington authorities seemed to know the Mexicans were lying, diplomacy and red tape prevented them from pursuing any course other than the course they did pursue in the matter. The only regrettable thing is that the Rangers, or whoever composed the party that brought back with them the body of

Vergara did not capture his murderers and bring them to justice.

If Governor Colquitt is wise he will not call the legislature in extra session again, unless some more important issue should arise than conflicts the people of this state at the present time. While provision for majority nominations is an important matter, it is not so important as to demand an extra session, with all the expense and agitation that such a procedure would entail. Majority nominations and elections are favored by pros and antis alike and the people can rest assured that the Thirty-fourth legislature will pass an amendment to the Terrell election law, providing for such a matter who is elected governor. The members of the legislature are not in a frame of mind at this time to consider special legislation upon its merits, even though a majority should commit themselves in advance to vote for an amendment to the election law, and unless some more important issue should arise, demanding the immediate attention of the state's lawmakers, it would be a useless expenditure of the people's money and the legislators' time and energy to call them back to Austin to enact special measures that could well afford to await the regular session in January. If the governor decides to call a special session it will become apparent that he has forgotten his program of "political peace and legislative rest," and some of the uncomplimentary things he has said about the legislature in interviews at Fort Worth and Dallas.—Waco Morning News.

If the anti-prohibition Democrats to convene at Dallas on April 21st will use as fine judgment in thinning out gubernatorial candidates as the pro Democrats did at their conference, the chances are the next governor of Texas will be chosen by a majority vote of all Democrats—or of both factions. Therefore, this talk of calling an extra session to amend the Terrell election law is a useless expenditure of the state's money. The law can be changed at the regular session. There is not the slightest danger that by not having the law changed in time for the July primaries a worse mistake can be made than has been made before.

If the proposition to vote bonds to the amount of \$50,000 for the construction of a joint city and county hospital carries on next Saturday, March 21st, tax-payers outside of Wichita Falls will only have to stand for about one-third of the cost. Taxable values within the corporate limits of this city are about one-third of the total for the county. There are to be two elections held on the same day for the adoption or rejection of the proposition. The county election, at which all tax-paying citizens, whether residing within this city or county, will vote for or against the issuance of bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for the construction of a joint city and county hospital. If this carries, taxable values within the corporate limits of this city will bear about one-third of the burden of that issue of bonds, and taxable values outside of the city limits the other two-thirds. The city election to be held on the same day, calls for the issuance of \$25,000 worth of bonds, and if voted on favorably, the burden of paying the interest and principal on these \$25,000 worth of bonds falls on taxable values within the limits of the city. The city tax-payers must therefore participate in both elections. The Times believes the tax-payers of this city are in favor of building this much needed joint hospital even if they do have to stand for two-thirds of the cost, and if it is defeated it will be by the votes of the tax-payers outside of the city who will be required to pay only about one-third of the cost. Every county in any civilized state should provide a place to care for its poor people—those who are sick and are unable to care for themselves, and the best way to do this is to provide a public hospital for that purpose. As this paper understands the proposition, the hospital will be made self-supporting by charging reasonable hospital fees for the care and attention given the sick who are able to pay. Those who are not able will be cared for at the expense of the county and city, jointly. It looks like a fair and just proposition to the Times and it

sincerely trusts the tax-payers of both the city and county will act favorably upon it.

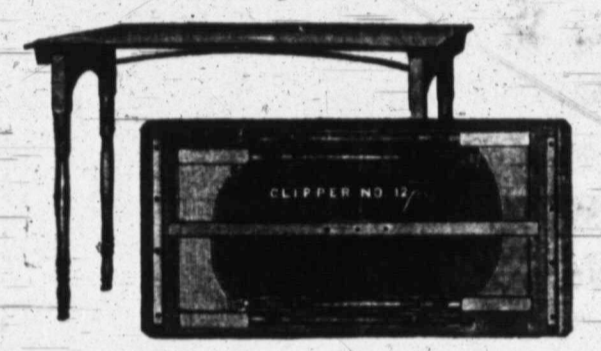

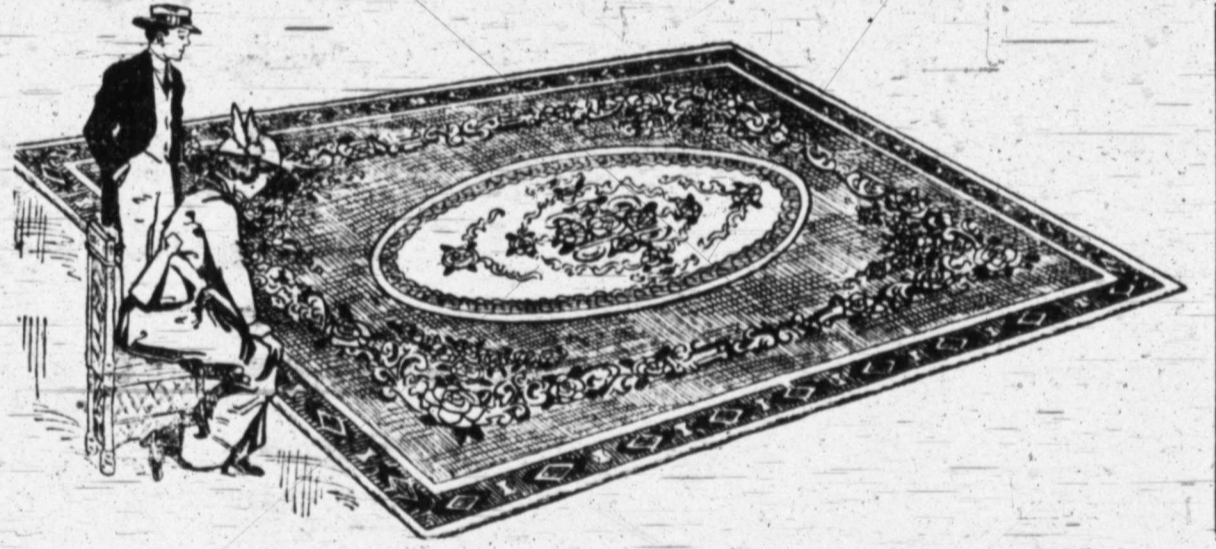

COMMISSIONERS GRILL RAILROAD ATTORNEYS

Asked to Explain Why Some States Can Have Two Cent Fares and Others Not

By Associated Press. Oklahoma City, March 14.—Railroad attorneys under cross examination were grilled by representatives of the corporation and railroad commissioners of Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma on the reason Kansas and Nebraska enjoy a two cent interstate passenger fare, but it is denied to the other States, in the closing session

of the hearing before Edgar Watkins, examiner of the Interstate Commerce Commission, relative to interstate rates in the South.

The States of Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma having two cent interstate rates, also, seeking from the commission an order requiring the railroads to reduce the interstate rates from three to two cents. During the examination of the railroad officials the announcement came from Topeka that the Kansas public utilities commission had been notified by the railroads that they will dismiss the suits now pending in federal court against the enforcement of the two cent rate in Kansas.

The railroad officials stated that this action was taken not because it was to their financial benefit, but because they could not contest against

lower rates in all States at the same time. It was testified that the railroads have spent \$200,000 in the fight in the three States involved, to oppose the two cent rate and the charge was made by George A. Henshaw, member of the Oklahoma commission that this fight is waged to avoid paying rebates of approximately \$6,000,000 in this State alone should the roads finally lose.

Felipe Angeles, Carranza's secretary of war, were persistent rumors that General Villa would leave Chihuahua Monday night for the South and that an early attack on Torreon might be expected. Angeles is one of the most expert artillerymen in Mexico and was specially requested by General Villa to forsake his political administrative duties to command the big guns of the service in the impending attack on Torreon.

That General Villa proposes an early move received additional credit when it became known that a special agent for the state department said he expected to leave Chihuahua in a day or two; his particular duty is to look to the interest of foreigners in places where there are no regular consuls.

TEN KILLED IN WRECK IN N. S. W. SATURDAY.

By Associated Press. Lemora, N. S. W., March 14.—Ten passengers were killed and fifteen injured in a collision between a mail train and a freight locomotive today at Exter station. The accident occurred in a dense fog.

FATAL MALODY RAGING IN NORTHERN MEXICO

Disease Resembles Cholera and Results in Speedy Death of its Victims

By Associated Press. Douglas, Arizona, March 14.—A strange disease resembling cholera in the speedy death of its victims is reported in the State of Chihuahua, a district just freed from an epidemic of smallpox. Persons arriving here from territory adjacent to Chihuahua said that recently a collection was taken up in the city of Bacanora, Sonora, to purchase medicine for residents of the affected area.

REBELS ATTEMPT TO ENTER TEPEC IS DISASTROUS.

By Associated Press. Douglas, Ariz., March 14.—A message confirming the reported route of constitutionalists who recently attempted the invasion of the Mexican territory of Tepec was received here today by the Mexican federal authorities from the minister of war at Mexico City. No details were given. Official messages received here for transmission to General Carranza said large portions of the National Railroad of Mexico between Monclova and Monterey had been destroyed by rebels.

A battle between constitutionalists and federals at Gloria a small town south of Monclova was reported. It is declared the federals were defeated with a loss of thirty killed and twenty-six wounded. The rebel dead numbered two and the wounded eleven, said the message. Col. Pallos who formerly commanded all border garrison had been made commander of garrisons in Sonora, it was announced today.

PARTNERSHIP NOT SUBJECT TO INCOME TAX

By Associated Press. Washington, March 14.—Commissioner of Internal Revenue Osborne notified collectors of customs today that partnerships are not subject to the income tax, but are required to file certificates of ownership of bonds, etc. to prevent withholding their income at the source. Individual incomes from partnerships, it was explained, are subject to the law.

CHILD WELFARE COMMISSION IN SESSION TOMORROW

By Associated Press. New Orleans, March 14.—The tenth annual National Child Labor Conference will begin here tomorrow afternoon with an open air mass meeting in Lafayette Square opposite the city hall. This departure in the manner of holding the first meeting of the conference was made in an endeavor to attract to the session the people whom the child uplift work is destined to benefit. City officials have arranged for a seating capacity of several thousands.

For several weeks leaders in child labor endeavors here have tried to impress upon the minds of those who are employed in industrial plants to attend the first meeting. Some of the most prominent speakers of the conference will address the open air meeting. These include Jane Adams of Hull House, Chicago; Dr. Felix Adler, chairman of the National Child Labor committee under the auspices of which the conference is held; Luther E. Hall, governor of Louisiana; Martin Bahrman, mayor of New Orleans; Senator Robert Owen of Oklahoma and Judge Joseph E. McCullough of Greenville, S. C. Among other speakers at the conference which will extend over four days, are some of the foremost child labor betterment advocates in the country.

The program this year is devoted largely to the need for enforcement of the state child labor laws, rather than a plea for more drastic measures in this respect. A call for a change of laws in some states will not be overlooked. It is said, but an earnest plea will be made for enforcement of what are considered good laws.

"A great many of the states have good child labor laws now," said Miss Jean M. Gordon, former Louisiana factory inspector and who took a prominent part in arranging for this conference. "For instance Louisiana had a good law as far back as 1888, but it was not enforced until recent years. A few years ago we saw the need for a more stringent act and we got it. Enforcement of measures now on the statute books will do wonders toward solving the problem of the working child, particularly in the cotton mills of the South."

Miss Gordon said she believed conferences of former years had not reached their full importance because people who work in the factories and mills have not been attracted to the meetings. It is for this reason the mass meeting was planned and some interest aroused among workers in New Orleans.

On March 20 a meeting of the Southern conference of women and child labor will be held. Many of the delegates to the national organization are members of the Southern conference and their work is along much the same lines. The southern conference is a new organization having been formed in 1910 in Memphis.

WALT SMITH POSTMASTER AT GRANDFIELD, OKLA.

(Fredrick Leader). Predded Wilson Friday sent to the Senate the nomination of James W. Smith, better known as Walt Smith to be postmaster at Grandfield. Mr. Smith is editor of the Grandfield Enterprise and has been a resident of that town ever since it was laid out. He had the support of Congressman Scott Ferris and of almost the complete Democratic county committee as well as that of the State committee and many citizens.

BANKERS CANNOT ACCEDE TO ORDER

WILL BE UNABLE TO MEET HUERTA'S DEMANDS FOR HUGE SUMS FOR ARMY

HUERTA WILL TAKE FIELD

Reported at Mexico City Provisional President Has Virtually Decided This

By Associated Press. Mexico City, March 14.—Bankers in the capital have obtained from the government a week's more time in which to answer the government's demand that they supply it with from 15,000,000 to 18,000,000 pesos a month, but it is unofficially stated that there is no doubt the reply will be a refusal. Knowledge that the demand will not be complied with, it is said, has caused President Huerta virtually to decide to go into the field at the head of the greater part of the army.

MONCLOVA STATION IS CAPTURED BY REBELS

Railway Shops Burned and Town Sacked by Rebel Victors is Report Received

By Associated Press. Mexico City, March 14.—Monclova station on the International Railroad between Ciudad Porfirio Diaz and Monterey, was taken today by rebels, who burned the railway shops and three hundred cars and sacked the town. Minister of War Blanquet minimized the destruction wrought by the rebels and insisted that the federals had repulsed them. The minister said he assumed the rebels intended to move from Monclova towards Monterrey.

From the State of Cuernavaca, various rebel successes were reported today. The rebels continue threatening Tamico, but have not attacked the city. The gunboat Tampico which recently joined the rebels is declared by Minister Blanquet to have gone ashore in the harbor of Tolobato.

CONSPIRACY AGAINST GEN. CARRANZA CHARGED.

By Associated Press. Nogales, Sonora, March 14.—Senator Alberto Pina and Lio Donillas, secretary of Fomento in the cabinet of the late President Madero, were arrested here late today charged with conspiracy against Gen. Carranza, leader of the constitutionalists. Rumors that arrests of other prominent men would follow were current tonight.

**LIEUT. GOVERNOR MAYES
FAVORS SPECIAL SESSION**

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 14.—Lieut. Gov. W. H. Mayes reached here today to confer with the governor on the proposed special session. He said he favored a special session not only to amend the Terrell law, but to pass the bonded warehouse bill, the rural credit measure and to take same action on the penitentiary system. He said:

"I think the election law should have been amended sometime ago and I am in favor of the proposition if it can be done without incurring so much expense in the holding of primaries. To change the law so as to require a majority vote means three primaries and the expense incidental thereto."

He said he doubted whether a change in the law would unify the democratic party. Replies today came to the governor from members of the legislature, answering the governor's message of last night on the question of an extra session. Up to noon the governor had received about thirty replies and most of these were favorable to the proposed amendment of the law.

Judge T. D. Rowell, a member of the House, from Marjon county, reached here today at the governor's request to confer on the special session. Judge Rowell is a pro leader and favors calling the session.

**MCDONALD WILL JOIN
PITTSBURG FEDERALS**

Charles McDonald, a well known ball player who has been visiting here for several weeks, will leave early this week for Lynchburg, Virginia, to join the Pittsburg Federals, with whom he has signed for the season. McDonald once played with the famous Farmersville team, and wore Wichita Falls and Quannah uniforms during his semi-professional career. He was with Dallas in the Texas League and from there went to the National League, being with Cincinnati in 1912 and part of last year. For a time last season he led the National League in batting. He is an infielder, third base being his station.

**DO TRANSFER COMPANIES
COME UNDER EXPRESS-RULE.**

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, March 14.—The question whether transfer companies which are held to be express companies, are subject to the gross receipts tax will be tested in a case pending in district court here. The case is that of the State against the North Texas Transfer and Warehouse Company of Dallas. The defendant has refused to pay the gross receipts tax on the ground that it is not liable for it.

**GREATEST SALVO EVER
DISCHARGED FROM SHIP**

Argentine Dreadnought Stands Test of Firing Twelve 12-Inch Guns

By Associated Press. Boston, March 14.—Firing what was said the greatest salvo of big guns ever discharged from a battleship the Argentine dreadnought Rivadavia today ended her trial. Every requirement was fulfilled. The salvo was delivered in one broadside. Twelve 12-inch guns, six six-inch guns, trained from the portside of the big sea fighter as she lay off Cape Cod. With the pressure of a single button all eighteen guns were discharged. The dreadnought was shaken somewhat. Glass was broken and minor fittings were displaced, but the structure of the battleship, it was declared, stood firmly under the strain. The test was repeated without causing any unexpected damage. It was estimated that the ship's 12-inch guns carried thirteen miles. The Rivadavia was at sea today on the closing test. Upon them depend the acceptance of the battleship for which it already had paid \$10,000,000.

**REPORTS CHARACTERIZED
AS MONSTROUS PERVERSIONS.**

By Associated Press. Washington, March 14.—Statements that government vessels could be compelled to pay tolls if the Stimms bill repealing the exemption clause of the Panama Canal act were characterized today as "monstrous perversions of the truth, and the most foolishly enunciated since fools were discovered" by Representative Adamson, chairman of the House interstate commerce committee.

The minority report on the tolls repeal plan was presented from the committee today. Representative Doremus of Michigan and O'Shaughnessy of Rhode Island, Democrats, declared they could see no reason to reverse their position advocating coastwise shipping exemptions. While Representative Knowles of California and Representative Lassar of Oregon presented separate reports attacking the repeal plan.

**WHITE SLAVE DEFENDANT
IS AGAIN IN TROUBLE.**

By Associated Press. San Francisco, March 14.—Maury I. Digg, former state architect already under conviction for white slavery in connection with the Sacramento Reno elopement, pleaded not guilty today in superior court to a charge of assault preferred against him by Ida Pearring, a girl who swears she is only seventeen years old. Walter Gilligan, accused by the girl of the same offense, also pleaded not guilty. The trials were set for April 20. Both men are in jail in default of bail.

**SMALL-POX EPIDEMIC
FEARED FROM MEXICANS**

By Associated Press. San Antonio, Texas, March 14.—Small-pox conditions in Southwest Texas, due to the influx of thousands of Mexicans who have crossed the border to escape the revolution, have assumed such a serious aspect that fears of an epidemic are being expressed. A movement is on foot in

San Antonio led by Dr. D. Berrey, county health officer, to ask the federal government to instruct its army all along the border to vaccinate every person who crosses to this state.

The State health department will be asked to co-operate with local town and county physicians throughout the section, to vaccinate all Mexicans who have reached this side recently. Literally thousands of cases of small

pox are said to exist in the southern part of the State, practically every case being that of a Mexican who came from the other side.

Koenigsburg, Germany, March 14.—A German aviator, Lieut. DeLessor was instantly killed here today while attempting to land. His airplane capsized near the ground and he was crushed beneath the motor.

ALL PASTORS OF THE COUNTY ASKED TO SPEAK ON NEED OF A HOSPITAL

IS FAVORED BY MINISTERS

Need of a Joint Hospital Emphasized in Several Cases Recently

Today is Hospital Sunday in Wichita county and every pastor has been asked to speak this morning upon the urgent need of a joint hospital for Wichita county. The election will be held next Saturday, and it is believed that with the pulpits back of this movement, the bonds in both city and county will be carried by a substantial majority.

Little open opposition has been voiced to the bonds, and while this does not mean that the issues have no opponents, there is every reason to believe that if those who favor the issues will all go to the polls and vote, the bonds will be overwhelmingly carried.

City property owners are to vote at two elections, one being for city bonds only, the other for the county bonds. Those residing outside the city limits will vote only for the county bonds.

The need of a joint hospital has always been felt here, and has been emphasized in several ways recently. It has been calculated that the additional tax, needed to care for the interest, sinking fund and support of the hospital, will amount to only a cent and a half on the \$100 valuation and this is considered nominal as compared with the benefits to be received.

TEXAS KNOTS HELD CONTORTIONIST

SPECTATORS WITNESSED PERFORMANCE AFTER HE HAD STRUGGLED VAINLY FOR HOURS

COWBOY TIED THE KNOTS

Eight Dollars Raised as Pledge if Successful—Was Donated to Salvation Army

From about 9 o'clock Friday morning until about 2 o'clock Friday afternoon an itinerant juggler and contortionist lay bound with ropes on a vacant lot on Indiana avenue between Sixth and Seventh streets while many curious spectators gathered about to witness his efforts to untie and free himself from the ropes. A cowboy had tied him and it was very difficult for him to make much progress in untying the tightly bound rope. He was to receive a purse of \$8 if he succeeded in getting the ropes from around his body. About 2 o'clock Friday afternoon some of the spectators saw that he had no chance of releasing the ropes and also that he was becoming weak and weary from heat and ordered the ropes cut from his body.

He was too weak to stand alone. Immediately after the cutting of the ropes he was carried to a shade and his face and arms washed in cold water. He revived after an hour or more of rest and appeared none the worse for his experience. He had been tied so securely that the circulation of blood was apparently stopped in his arms and legs and it was feared to leave him bound longer.

The eight dollars which was raised by the crowd was held by Dr. F. K. McClure and when the contortionist failed to make good the subscribers went to Dr. McClure and wanted their money back. No list had been kept of those donating and the doctor declined to return the money to anyone unless affidavits were produced. None were forthcoming and yesterday morning Dr. McClure turned the money over to Captain Robb of the Salvation Army, believing that it would serve a good cause. The money was given in dimes, nickels and quarters by the crowd and was to have been given to the contortionist if he was able to free himself. The Texas method of tying knots proved too much for him, however.

OPPOSITION TO SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION REPORTED

Patrons of Friberg District Said to be Against Plan for a Central School

Considerable opposition in the Friberg community to the proposal to consolidate the schools of the Cooper, Cashion and Friberg districts, was reported at a conference of some of the school trustees held at the office of County Superintendent Johnson at the court house Saturday afternoon. No action toward calling a meeting of the tax payers of the district affected by the proposed consolidation was taken. County Superintendent Johnson advising that such a meeting would do no good unless it was felt that there was some prospect of the consolidation being effected.

The proposal is for the consolidation of the three districts named and so possibly the Bacon district, and the building of a substantial brick building at about the center of the district for all the pupils. Men and conveyances would be hired to haul the children from a distance to the schools.

The school trustees in the territory affected will make inquiry among the residents of the district to see how they stand on the proposition and if a majority are found to favor the proposed consolidation a meeting will be called probably at Friberg to discuss the matter.

RED CROSS FIRST AID CAR WILL STOP HERE

Instruction Will Be Given Railroad Men in First-Aid and Accident Prevention

Announcement was received here Saturday that a Red Cross First Aid Car would be here for three days from May 3 to May 5 to instruct railway employees in first aid work and the prevention of unnecessary suffering and loss of life among railroad men. The car will be in charge of Dr. Lipscomb, a government surgeon. It will make stops on the Fort Worth & Denver at Bert Worth, Wichita Falls, Childress, Amarillo and Texline. The car is sent out by the American Red Cross Society, under the patronage of the federal government.

KRESS AND COMPANY WILL OPEN STORE IN THIS CITY.

S. H. Kress and Company, operating a string of five and ten cent stores throughout the South, will open a store here sometime during the coming summer. The company has closed a contract for a fifteen year lease on the two story building on Indiana avenue now occupied by the North-Texas Furniture Company. A

copy of the lease has been filed in the county clerk's office.

The company is to get possession of the building on May 1, 1914. For the first five years the rental is to be \$250 per month, for the next five years \$325 per month. The rental for the last five years of the contract is not stipulated but the contract provides that if the parties to the contract are unable to agree the rental is to be determined by arbitration. The contract provides that the owners, Florence D. and H. J. Cobb, of Dallas, are to expend \$5,000 in improvements on the building.

ANOTHER BUILDING FOR BLAND AND HENDERSON

Messrs. Henderson and Bland, owners of the lot 100x150 feet at the northwest corner of Seventh street and Scott avenue will build a one story brick building on the north fifty feet of the lot now occupied by a store and half residence. The house and barn on this lot will be moved off at once and work started on the building as soon as the ground is cleared. The building has already been leased to Schnell & Weaver who will use it as an automobile display and salesroom. This building will be completed before the two story structure to be erected at the corner.

DRILLERS MAKE NEW RECORD AT ELECTRA

W. H. Merritt and F. Randolph Complete Well at 1196 Feet in Twenty Days

What is said to be a new record for "making hole" was established this week at Electra when W. H. Merritt and F. Randolph, working for Contractor Steelmith, drilled to a depth of 1196 feet in twenty days time. The record was made on one of the "Producers" wells. To make half as much hole in the time mentioned would not have been a bad record, and to go nearly 1200 feet, an average of about 60 feet per day is considered remarkable.

The Pikers Oil company secured another shallow producer near town during the week, making three wells for this concern in the 160-foot sand. These wells, with five of the same depth belonging to the Archer Oil Company, will be hooked onto a power early this week. All eight wells are in the 160 foot sand and range from three-to-ten barrels daily, each. None have been pumped yet and their exact production is not known. Wichita Falls men own both companies.

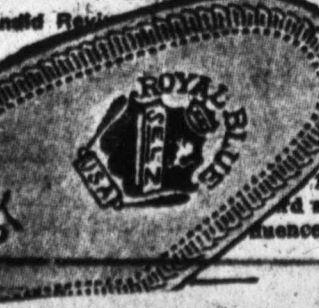

Many Signatures To Petition For Local Option Election

Considerable interest has been aroused locally by the petition filed during the week for a prohibition election April 4, in precincts 2, 3 and 4, taking in all of the county except the Wichita Falls precinct.
