SLAVERY PROBLEM GERMAN COLONIES

Brief Defending Slavery Is Presented By Expert-Emancipation Would

Cause Much Suffering

Berlin, March 21 .- A brief, defeadng slavery for the colonies, declaring hat its immediate abolition would ad to the native risings, is handed in y the Governor of German East Afca. Dr. Schner. In response to a solution passed by the Reichstag est year, calling for the termination household slavery by January 1,

920. Dr. Schnee has reported that here are about 185,000 slaves in the olony at present-many of them capives in wars as late as 1905 and 1906 hile others are being imported even day from Portugese East Africa and British Cape Colony But the number s steadily growing less.

A law passed a few years ago librates all children of household slaves ourn after 1905; deaths are further ducing the number of slaves; many re able to buy their liberty from sums enging from \$2 to \$15 and in-addien many owners are voluntarily giv ng their slaves freedom

The governor predicts that slavery nactically will have ceased to exist dithout further restrictive measures y 1930 and pleads against setting any xed date for a general emancipation hich he declares would ruin many lantation owners, provoke rebellion mong the native farmers and cost the vernment at least \$2,000,000 to in country owners for the the loss of heir property.

They are willing that the burden of caring for the dependent sick should be distributed on all alike, and it is the right way and the just and honorable way to meet a pubile duty. The provision of the law gov erning public hospitals is that only have been such for one year, are to be admitted to the hospital. This is a wise provision, as it will tend to pre vent other counties and cities from sending their dependants to us to be cared for. Every county and city should be forced to provide for its own dependents, and the best way to handle such a matter is to do just as Wichita Falls and Wichita county has

Many system of reaching the rural popula States are enacting legislation to this end and even the national government is likely to lend financial sup-Every educator is keenly interested in the social, economic and

"We must learn that true and effivastly different from general or liberal education, especially in second-ery schools and colleges. True voational education must not be bookish: it must center in the shop or the field or in the home.

"Liberal education should train the mind, taste and character, so as to ake a man who is lapable of se utilizing the resources of civilization as to benefit himself and to benefit other men who produce and who also utilize the goods of civilized society. But vocational education must make the producer rather than the consumer of utilities. Liberal education seeks to produce the broad, appreciative man; vocational education the intense skillful productive man." Correlation of Work,

For the practical administration of vocational education Dr. Snedden urged separate organization of vocation al schools, at least for the present. Supt. Condon of Cincinnati, agreed with Dr. Snedden and attempted to show how the so-called liberal culture studies could be correlated with tne work designed for practical train-ing and personal efficiency. Ex-Superintendent James M. Greenwood of Kansas City, with his characteristic wit and wisdom, sought to point out the good and the bad in both the liberal culture saints and the yocationalized sinners.

Supt. Ira I. Cammack of Kansas City, said that vocational training should be introduced into the grammar grades; because a great majority of pupils do not reach the secondary tool. Industrial training, he said, also a necessity on account of its ethical value in the formation of character, wholesome employment be ing one of the greatest sufeguards against indolence and vice. It reveals also the pupils natural aptitude and taste and so enables the teacher to give him intelligent guidance.


