BRITISH WAR MINISTER OUT

COL. SEELEY RESIGNS AS RESULT OF POPULAR PROTEST OVER ORDERS TO OFFICERS

EMPIRE IS ASTOUNDED

"Mutiny of Army Aristocrats" Made Basis of Attack by Liberals Forcing Resignation

By Associated Press. London, March 25.—John Seeley today resigned as secretary of state for war in the British cabinet. Documents made public today disclosed officially the fact that the British government had given to army officers in Ireland a written guarantee that the government would not use the army to crush Ulster political opposition to the home rule bill. This correspondence, however, shows that the government retains its right to use the army to maintain law and order. The correspondence between the war office and the army officers in Ireland declared that Colonel John Seeley interviewed the general officers in command and explained to them that an officer of the British army was compelled to obey orders to shoot "only in case the order was a reasonable one under the circumstances," and that from a general down to a private in the army was expected to use no more force than was required to maintain order and safety of life and property. Colonel Seeley continued, "If, therefore, officers and men of the army in Ireland have been led to believe that there is a possibility that they might be called upon to take part in a demonstration of Orangeism who are causing no danger to the lives of their neighbors that no matter what would be the effect on discipline in the army, nevertheless it is true that they are in fact and in law just as in a refusal to obey. There never has been and it is not now the intention to give outrageous and illegal orders to the troops. The law will be respected and must be obeyed."

That the version of General Paget's communication read by Andrew Bonar Law, leader of the opposition in the House of Commons, Monday, was substantially correct seems clearly indicated. General Paget, the Irish commander in chief, wrote that he was in close communication with the war office and had received instructions from headquarters that those domiciled in Ulster would be allowed to disappear and be afterwards reinstated. They must, however, give their word of honor not to fight for Ulster. General Paget said that active operations were about to begin in Ulster.

Colonel Seeley's resignation followed quickly after the publication today of the "quiet paper" giving details of the crisis in the British army. Col. Seeley in his valedictory address to the House of Commons declared that King George had taken an initiative of any kind in the matter.

He said: "The suggestion is absolutely without foundation in the broadest sense. His Majesty took no initiative of any kind." The correspondence between Seeley and the Irish officers had surrounded the country and in the opinion of seasoned politicians either one of two courses: The cashiering of the secretary of war or the resignation of the entire cabinet. The first course was decided upon at a protracted meeting at 6 o'clock this evening Premier Asquith had not accepted Col. Seeley's resignation.

FERGUSON WILL SPEAK HERE NIGHT OF APRIL 2

Itinerary of Speaking Tour of gubernatorial Candidate Includes This City

Temple, Texas, March 25.—Headquarters of James E. Ferguson, candidate for governor, gave out the itinerary of a short speaking tour to be made by the candidate, which will open at San Antonio on the night of Thursday, March 26. Mr. Ferguson will deliver speeches in advocacy of his candidacy on this tour at the following places on the dates and at the hours indicated: San Antonio, March 26, 8 p. m.; Houston, March 27, 8 p. m.; Taylor, March 28, 3 p. m.; Corsicana, March 30, 2 p. m.; Greenville, March 31, 2 p. m.; Denison, April 1, at night; Wichita Falls, April 2, at night; Dallas, April 3, at night; Waxahachie, April 4, 2 p. m. The decision to make the second speech at San Antonio was reached after the receipt of numerous urgent messages and invitations from Southwest Texas friends. Campaign headquarters are now busily engaged in mapping out a second speaking tour to commence at the conclusion of the one described above.

CLARENCE OUSLEY NOT A CANDIDATE

SAYS SITUATION SO RIFE WITH MISUNDERSTANDING OF POSITION WON'T RUN

IS PREPARING STATEMENT

Says Speaking Campaign for Which He Has Neither Disposition nor Time Necessary

By Associated Press. Fort Worth, Texas, March 25.—Clarence Ousley, preparing a statement withdrawing his consent to become a candidate for governor. He told his friends that he finds the situation in many parts of the state so complicated and so rife with misrepresentation of his views that a speaking campaign would be necessary to correct and make his position plain to the people. This he said he has neither the time nor the disposition to do. The withdrawal of Ousley leaves the following avowed candidates for the nomination: Thomas H. Hall, Houston; Felix H. OBSERVE ANNIVERSARY OF DISASTROUS OHIO FLOODS

Dayton, Ohio, March 25.—Exactly one year ago today mountainous torrents ripped open the banks of the Ohio river and its tributaries, and tearing through Dayton and other Ohio cities and villages, left death and incalculable damage in their path. Eighty one lives were snuffed out by the disastrous floods of a year ago, and today the anniversary was appropriately observed here and elsewhere by mass meetings in public halls and by special services in many churches. President Wilson had been urged to speak here today but press of important business of state kept him from attending.

MAJOR J. C. SMITH WILL BE HERE TOMORROW

Chief Divisional Officer of Salvation Army Coming to Inspect Local Corps

Major J. C. Smith, chief divisional officer for the Salvation Army with headquarters at Dallas for the district comprising Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas and parts of Louisiana will be here tomorrow for an inspection of the local corps under the command of Captain Robb. Major Smith will speak at the corner of Seventh street and Ohio avenue and following the open air service will speak in the public hall here tomorrow. The public is cordially invited to attend both services.

PUBLIC LAND BILL CONSIDERED TODAY

Washington, March 25.—Consideration was begun today by the House Public Lands committee of another "administration" bill—that for the development, free from monopoly, of coal, oil, phosphate and other mineral sources of the public domain. It provides a leasing system, excepting Alaska coal lands which are provided for in a separate measure. Secretary of the Interior Lane who drafted the bill, was invited before the House committee today to inaugurate hearings upon it. President Wilson has given his approval in its general features. Western Senators and Representatives, who conferred with Lane also approve the general leasing plan, which is adopted as the administration system of opening and developing Uncle Sam's resources which have been locked up tight for years. The bill proposes that all leasing shall be paid to the interior department half to be used in reclamation projects and the other half to be given to the states in which the leased land is situated for public schools, public works or other state improvements. For development of oil lands, the bill proposes "prospector" licenses for limited areas up to 2,560 acres and, if oil is discovered, that the prospector shall receive one-fourth of the tract free for his work. A royalty of 2 cents a ton and an acreage charge of 20 cents to \$1 per acre for coal leases are provided. Stringent provisions against monopolization are included in the bill. The hearings will continue for about three weeks.

REDUCED DIVIDENDS FOR PENNSYLVANIA STOCKHOLDERS

Philadelphia, March 25.—The directors of the Pittsburgh, Cincinnati and St. Louis Railway Company, comprising the Pennsylvania lines west of Pittsburgh, today reduced the dividend on the common stock from five per cent a year to three per cent and on the preferred stock from five per cent to four per cent. It was announced that the reduction was due mainly to losses in the Ohio flood last year.

ELECTRA METHODISTS PLANNING FINE CHURCH

Campaign Launched at Banquet There Friday Night For Splendid Church Building

Plans of a tentative nature were drawn and an enthusiastic campaign launched last night at Elegia for the erection of a modern brick Methodist church building for that city to cost between \$18,000 and \$25,000. At a banquet held in one of the store rooms with 140 covers laid, speeches were made by prominent business men of Electra, the Methodist pastor, Rev. R. N. Huckaby and visiting ministers. The banquet with its significance is said to have been the most noteworthy church event ever witnessed in Electra. Rev. T. H. Morris, presiding elder of this, the Bowie district, was present as also was Dr. J. W. Hill of this city. Those ministers together with Rev. Huckaby and wife of Electra and Rev. H. B. Johnson of Iowa Park came in on the noon train yesterday and left in the afternoon for Mesquite where the Methodist conference of the Bowie district convenes tonight.

AMERICAN ARRESTED BY FEDERAL AGENTS

Mexican Authorities at Nuevo Laredo Declare They Know Nothing of Reported Arrest

Laredo, March 25.—Arturo Yalla, the American who went to Nuevo Laredo Monday and was reported arrested by Mexican federal agents, has disappeared. The Nuevo Laredo authorities say they have no prisoner of that name although they had a prisoner named Alphonse Sols who had been sent to Monterey for trial.

ONE MEXICAN FEDERAL KILLED BY AMERICANS

Bullet Fired By U. S. Troops at McKee's Crossing Kills Mexican Soldier

Eagle Pass, Texas, March 25.—General Guardia, commanding the federal garrison at Nuevo Laredo admitted today that one federal soldier was killed by shots fired by American troops during the fight at McKee's Crossing near Del Rio. He refused to say why his men fired across the international line. Several hundred constitutionalists are reported moving toward Las Vacas opposite Del Rio and a battle is expected in that vicinity within the next forty-eight hours.

STOCKHOLDERS MEETING OF FOREST OIL COMPANY

E. S. Britton, Formerly of Strawn, Chosen Manager—Directors and Officers Named

At a meeting held Tuesday at the offices of the company in the Kemp and Kell building, officers and directors were chosen by the stockholders of the Forest Oil Company. About ninety per cent of the stock was represented and the following directors were unanimously chosen: W. W. Johnson, G. E. Wilson, T. W. Owen, John T. Overby, J. L. Cunningham and E. S. Britton. Mr. Britton is the only new member of the board, the succeeding George W. Hazlewood who is temporarily residing in Los Angeles. The board of directors re-elected the present officers as follows: W. W. Johnson, president; G. E. Wilson, vice president; T. W. Owen, secretary-treasurer; E. S. Britton, general manager. The financial statement showed the company is in a prosperous condition. Mr. Britton for the past ten years has been general manager for the Mount Marian Coal Company at Strawn, Texas, and is considered a good selection for the work here.

WEST TEXAS NORMAL SCHOOL IS BURNED

LOSS OF \$200,000 IN FIRE AT CANYON EARLY THIS MORNING

STARTED BY PLUMBERS TORCH

No One Injured in Fire and College Sessions Will Continue in Court House

By Associated Press. Canyon, Texas, March 25.—The West Texas Normal School here was burned to the ground this morning. No one was injured. The building and equipment was valued at \$200,000 with \$100,000 insurance. Considerable equipment was saved. The college will continue holding classes which will meet in the court house. A plumber's torch started the fire. Plans for rebuilding the school have not been announced although it is not doubted here that the school will be rebuilt.

DATE SET FOR EXECUTION OF LEON MARTINEZ

Austin, Texas, March 24.—While the pardon board has not written its findings and filed same with the governor in the case of Leon Cardenas Martinez, it was learned from a member of the board that a decision has been reached and that it is adverse to the plea for commutation. Martinez will hang on April 21 unless the governor intercedes. Martinez is in jail at Pecos. He was convicted of the murder of Miss Emma Brown, an Austin citizen, who was visiting in Reeves county when she was murdered by a Mexican. Martinez was brought to Waco to escape mob violence. He appealed his case to the United States supreme court, which tribunal declined to disturb the judgments of the Texas courts. The pardon board has also reached a decision in the companion cases of Ed Jones and Jim Banks, from Dallas, negroes under death sentences for murder, and will submit same at once, as the men are sentenced to hang on Wednesday of this week. The governor is in Dallas and may act on the cases while there. The pardon board is going to recommend clemency. The board believes that the negroes are innocent and is also of the opinion that one of the negroes who testified against Banks and Jones perpetrated the crime.

TWO NEGRO CABINETS ARE DYNAMITED LAST NIGHT

Port Arthur, Texas, March 25.—The first violence since the beginning of the dock workers strike, took place here last night when two negro cabins were dynamited. No one was injured.

VILLA REPULSED AT TORREON REPORT FROM MEXICO CITY

Silence At Jaurez And Great Number Of Rebel Wounded Give Color To The Report

MEXICO CITY REPORTS FEDERAL REPULSE

By Associated Press. Washington, March 25.—The Mexican embassy today received the following cablegram from Mexico City: "The rebels were repulsed today in an attempt to reach Torreon. General Bellasco is well prepared for attack."

THINKS JUAREZ SILENCE SIGNIFICANT

By Associated Press. El Paso, March 25.—Miguel Ditbold, of the Mexican federal consular service, today said he had been officially informed that the rebels were repulsed with heavy loss at Torreon and that some of them were driven back twenty miles. "It is very significant," he said, "that Juarez is without news and I regard it as confirmation of my dispatch."

TRAINLOADS OF REBELS WOUNDED

By Associated Press. Bermejillo, by Courier to El Paso, March 24.—Rebel wounded from Gomez Palacios and the lesser recent fighting in that vicinity are being brought north in large numbers and it is officially reported that the rebels met with unexpected defense by the federals at Gomez Palacios. A train load of wounded soldiers started north today to be deposited at water stations along the railroads where hospitals have been provided.

Villa has the largest medical corps ever attached to a rebel army in Mexico but they are exhausted from the severe strain of the last few days.

JUAREZ WITHOUT DEFINITE NEWS

By Associated Press. Juarez, March 25.—The vigil of officers at rebel headquarters continued today without authoritative information as to the outcome of the fighting at Torreon. General Chao still awaited confirmation of the report that Villa's army had captured two quarters in Torreon.

No definite news had come over the wires since the Associated Press dispatch from Chihuahua at 5 p. m. yesterday that fighting was still in progress at Gomez Palacios.

A private telegram this morning said "Fighting is in progress this morning in the outskirts of Torreon." No details were given. Official prophecies were readjusted to the effect that it might be several days before the federal stronghold would be taken.

The last newspaper telegram said the rebels had possession of the railroad roundhouse in the outskirts of Gomez Palacios. A personal telegram from General Benavides to his father here said "All is well with us."

NEGRO BOY MUTILATED BY POSSE AT MARSHALL

Accused of Attacking White Girl His Ears Are Slit and Otherwise Mutilated

By Associated Press. Marshall, Texas, March 25.—Charles Fisher, a negro boy accused of attacking a white girl here about a week ago was mutilated by a posse of men Tuesday night. It was announced today by the sheriff. The tips of his ears were slit off and he was otherwise seriously mutilated but will live.

FEDERAL LEAGUE WILL OPEN SEASON APRIL 16

Kansas City Will Open at Home With Chicago-Indianapolis Opens at St. Louis

The Federal League baseball season will start on April 16 for the Indianapolis and Kansas City teams, according to advices received here today, the schedule having been adopted yesterday. Kansas City will open at home with Chicago as her opponent, while Indianapolis will open at St. Louis.

This will cut the training season about a week shorter than was planned, but gives both teams a full two weeks more for practice. With good weather this will be sufficient time to get both clubs in good shape to start the season.

STATE ROAD EXPERT COMING TO ADDRESS WICHITA COUNTY PEOPLE HERE

COUNTY MEETING IS CALLED

How Bond Money, If Voted, Will Be Expended Will Be Discussion Subject

Prof. R. J. Potts, head of the road department of the A. & M. College, has accepted the invitation to address a road meeting at the county court house in this city Saturday afternoon. The meeting will be called to order at 2:30 o'clock. It is also probable that Mr. Travilla, the Tarrant county road expert, will be here at that time. The meeting has been called by Morris Marcus, acting chairman of the good roads organization in Wichita county. The purpose is to try to arrive at some conclusion as to how the bond money, if voted, will be expended. It is believed that if some definite proposition can be agreed upon it can then be presented to the voters for their approval or rejection. Road meetings have been held in several precincts in the county and there is much interest in the matter. All citizens of the county interested in better roads are invited to attend the meeting and participate in the proceedings.

AN IMMENSE SIGN TO ADVERTISE CITY

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE DIRECTOR ADOPTS RESOLUTION MADE BY ADVERTISING COMMITTEE

WICHITA FALLS FACTORY CITY

Flaming Torches Would Symbolize Cheap Gas, One of City's Chief Inducements for Factories

An enormous electric sign, advertising Wichita Falls as a factory city, will be erected at the corner of Eighth and Michigan if plans formulated by the advertising committee of the Chamber of Commerce can be carried out. At this morning's meeting of the directors, the recommendation of the committee was adopted and the sign will be erected if necessary arrangements for current and maintenance can be made.

The sign would stretch across Eighth street at a height of about thirty feet, visible both from the business district and from all passing trains. At each end, it is planned to have a natural gas torch while the middle of the sign, including the words, "Wichita Falls, the Factory City, Cheap Gas," will be illuminated by the flash system.

It will cost about \$1000 to erect the sign, and it would cost about \$200 monthly to keep it burning for seventy hours a night. It is proposed to reduce this expense by keeping the sign illuminated for an hour or two in the early part of the night, then cutting it on, turning it on again when the trains pass through. In this way, it is believed the expense can be reduced to about \$15 monthly. The advertising committee members feel that the impression that such an advertisement would make on all visitors and its general value, would offset the heavy expenditure.

The directors appropriated \$20 to help defray the expenses of local firemen who wish to attend the state convention, it being the custom to help out with this expense. J. C. Ward presented the firemen's request which was promptly granted.

It was announced that the convention of the Texas Press Association would probably be held on June 15, instead of in May as at first planned. The change was desired so as not to bring the Texas editors here such a short time after the National Editorial Association holds its meeting.

KONE URGES EXHIBIT AT PANAMA EXPOSITION

It Offers Judicious and Effective Advertising of State's Advantages. He Says

Austin, Texas, March 25—To the People of Texas: Having been requested by the Texas Panama-Pacific Exposition Commission to add my word to that of others asking you to respond to the call of the Commission for co-operation and liberal financial contributions for a creditable Texas building and exhibit at the exposition, I hereby urge you to do so and heartily endorse the work of that body.

In my opinion, it is in the highest degree necessary that Texas should be well presented—not only from the standpoint of State pride, but that of self-interest. Every desirable new settler and every new dollar added to Texas' working capital increases that much the general wealth and moves Texas a peg higher in the scale of economic development. Former Commissions did not appeal to Texan patriotism, pride and enlightened self-interest in vain, and now, when a supreme chance of aggrandizement has arrived, I feel confident that they will prove equal to the occasion and respond with a heartiness and adroitness that will ensure this State reaping the economic benefits from the Panama-Pacific Exposition to which it is entitled by reason of its situation, resources awaiting development, and multifarious other advantages that no other area of equal size on earth possesses.

I hope that every Texas county, city, town, agricultural association, commercial body, bank, manufacturing establishment, business enterprise and man and woman who has influence, money and "pep," and those even who only have "get-up-and-get" will fall in line behind the Commission, and, with a strong pull and a pull altogether, help to make a quick, safe and brilliant landing for the grand undertaking. It will be a pleasure to me to do all I can.

The Houston Chronicle, though a strong friend of the Wilson administration, says that perhaps the greatest mistake the President has made is in not sending John Lind to England and Walter Page to Mexico. Page talks too much, and Lind says nothing and does nothing.

The editor of the Archer County News has been under the weather, and as a consequence the News was late in getting out last week, but his explanation, which is as follows, should be accepted:

"The News is late the last of the week because the editor was sick the first of the week, and if you are either interested or inquisitive as to our physical 'deficiency' we will state it as a slight cold complicated with bad medicine. The medicine was acquired in Archer City."

Cyclone Davis, or "Methodist Jim," who is a candidate for congressman-at-large, says that while there are but two to be elected there are seven candidates—five of whom are prohibition Democrats, and two anti-prohibition Democrats, and inasmuch as the lines are to be closely drawn in the July primary on the question of prohibition, Cyclone wants the five candidates for congressman-at-large to agree to hold a sort of elimination convention and cut the number down to two. He is willing to have Judge Walker, manager of Ball's campaign, to decide who are the two strongest pro Democratic candidates. The proposition seems to be fair enough, but so far not one of the other candidates have entered into the agreement. Unless they do, however, it is plain enough to see in advance what the result of that contest is going to be.

John M. Duncan, without doubt one of the ablest men in Texas, and who, for a time it was thought would not support Col. Ball for governor, has written another letter which is published in the Houston Chronicle of March 23rd, in which he takes occasion to explain the motives that prompted him in the writing of the first letter, published prior to the pro elimination meeting at Fort Worth, in which he made a rather severe attack on Col. Ball, recalling the Waco convention in which the enemies of the late Gov. Hogg made an attack on and attempted to destroy him politically. Col. Ball was in that convention, and he, at that time, was not in harmony with Hogg, but at the Fort Worth convention Col. Ball explained to the satisfaction of all who attended that great meeting that he was then and had always been Hogg's political as well as personal friend. This explanation also seems to have been satisfying to Judge Duncan, who was Hogg's friend and law partner, and an excerpt from his letter says: "I feel that the people have just gotten back a man who has belonged to them all the time, and that he will make by far the best governor this state has had since 1898." Thus another influence which the opponents of Ball had been counting on has been lost to them. And that is not all. Some of the most stalwart anti-prohibition Democrats of the state, such as Judge Jim Wells, are in the Ball band wagon. It is becoming more apparent every day the campaign progresses that the opponents of Ball are worried. They don't seem to know who to pit against Elm; and there is some evidence that in the event they lose in the July primaries they are paying the way for a bolt. If that is their object, their candidate must be one who can appeal for other than Democratic votes

Growing crops were never in better condition and the prospects for future business are excellent."

FIVE MILLION DOLLARS FIRE LOSSES IN TEXAS

Austin, Texas, March 25.—There was a fire in every forty minutes last year and each fire cost \$414 according to a report just issued by the state fire insurance commission. The total number of fires reported during the year was 12,655 and the adjusted losses approximated \$5,236,000. The predominating class of conflagrations occurred in the frame dwell houses, the total number being 5,130 or 40 per cent of the total fires. Seventy-one per cent of the fires last year in Texas were preventable, eighteen were of an unknown origin and only eleven per cent were unavoidable. Texas property is insured against fire loss to the extent of \$76,804,000 and the annual premiums paid by the policy holders is \$10,089,375.
