NEW ISLAND HAS SPRUNG UP

Next Eruption May Cut Off Portion of Gulf and Cause Submerging of Villages

Tokyo, April 11.—The Sakurajima volcano, whose eruption in January caused great devastation, is likely to show still further activity according to Dr. Thomas A. Jaggar, professor of geology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and director of the Hawaiian Volcano Observatory. Dr. Jaggar, who has just ascended Sakurajima, made the following statement to the Associated Press concerning his observations.

"Thinking of the volume of the most recent passage around the island, the average tide level in Kagoshima Bay has risen two feet. In the short space of 1,000 years, considerable changes may take place in the topography of the Gulf of Kagoshima. To preserve the safety of the volcanic zone, Sakurajima is likely to erupt once or twice on the northern side in the future and if the lava ejected were to equal the amount thrown out this year, it might easily cut off the northern part of the Gulf thus forming a lake. Then the water level would rise and finally this water would become fresh so that a large lagoon may possibly be formed in the present village of the northern shores near in time be submerged just as the remainder of Philis was covered by the Nile after the completion of the Assuan dam in Egypt."

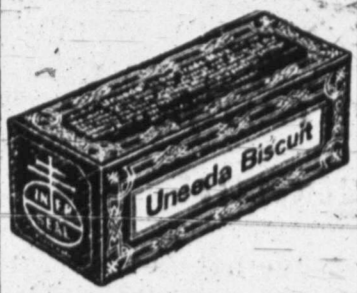

confess, but he said he had told all he knew and that he had not been present when Herman Rosenthal was killed.

Story of the Crime. The murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, who "squealed" probably was the most sordid blooded in its conception and the most carelessly and contemptuously carried out of any in all the sordid and sensational criminal history of Greater New York.

Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, leader of New York's "strong arm squad" was convicted previous to the gunmen of first-degree murder, as instigator of the crime and sentenced to death. For over a year he sat in a cell on the "life side" of the "little green door" which leads to the death chair and the beyond. Then he was granted a new trial by the court of appeals on technical grounds. He is now in the Tombs. Besides the five convictions men-

tioned, four police inspectors, one police captain, a police sergeant and several patrolmen, were sent to the penitentiary, following investigations of graft conditions revealed at the murder trials. Dennis Sweeney, John J. Murtha, James T. Hussey and J. F. Thompson, all police inspectors, were convicted of grafting and served a year at Blackwell's. Three days before their terms were up, Murtha's conviction was reversed by the appellate division, which upheld the conviction of the others.

Herman Rosenthal was murdered at 2 a. m. on the morning of July 16, 1912. He had been furnishing District Attorney Whitman with evidence of police grafting which connected Becker with gamblers. He had been several times warned to "hold his tongue." While dining at the Metropole located just off Broadway on West 42nd street, he was called to the pavement by a man never identified. As he stepped to the curb he was shot through the brain. The murderers calmly walked to a wait-

ing automobile and rode off toward Fifth avenue. A policeman recorded a fictitious number of the car. A bystander who had witnessed the shooting, took the license number and was arrested when he gave it to the police of the 47th street station. Only the fact that District Attorney Whitman got out of bed to assume immediate personal charge of the case, saved this man and his memory of the car number to the prosecution. It was this slender thread of evidence from which Whitman traced the real slayers and built up his case.

It was subsequently learned that Becker received word of the shooting from Jack Rose, Becker's stool pigeon by phone, and that the police lieutenant immediately rushed from his apartments uptown to reassure the man who had engineered the shooting. It was also learned that Becker, in an automobile, had passed the Metropole a few minutes before Rosenthal was killed. 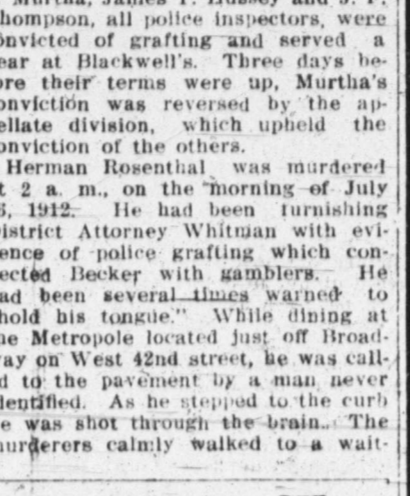

K C Baking Powder Biscuits

Three cups flour; 1/2 to 3/4 cup shortening; 3 level teaspoonsful K C Baking Powder; about 1 cup milk or water; 1 teaspoonful salt.
