**DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE CORN MEAL RECIPES.**

Uncle Sam, as a culinary instructor is something new. The department is now issuing bulletins, telling the farmers of the nutritious values of food stuffs and the best way of preparing them.

The peculiar consistency of corn meal which is a disadvantage under some circumstances, is a great advantage in making griddle cakes and waffles; for it makes them very tender, according to a new farmers' bulletin issued by the department of agriculture today. Among the many corn meal recipes which the bulletin recommends, are the following:

**Corn-bread pan cakes:** Two cups of flour, one-half cup of corn meal, one and one-half tablespoons of baking powder, one and one-half teaspoons of salt, one-third cup of sugar, one and one-half cups of boiling water, one and one-quarter cups of milk, one egg. Add meal to boiling water and boil five minutes; turn into bowl, add milk and remaining dry ingredients mixed and sifted, then egg well beaten and butter. Cook on a greased griddle.

**Indian pudding:** Three cups of milk, one-third of a cup of corn meal, one-half of a cup of molasses, one teaspoon of salt, one teaspoon of sugar. Cook milk and meal in a double boiler for twenty minutes; add molasses, salt and sugar. Add one teaspoon of ginger, pour into buttered pudding dish and bake two hours in slow oven. Serve with cream.

It is often possible to substitute corn meal for part of the flour in baking cakes. In some cases there is no special advantage in using it, but it is well to know that it can be used in emergencies. In making doughnuts there is a decided advantage in substituting corn meal for part of the flour. The doughnuts so made are likely to be tender.

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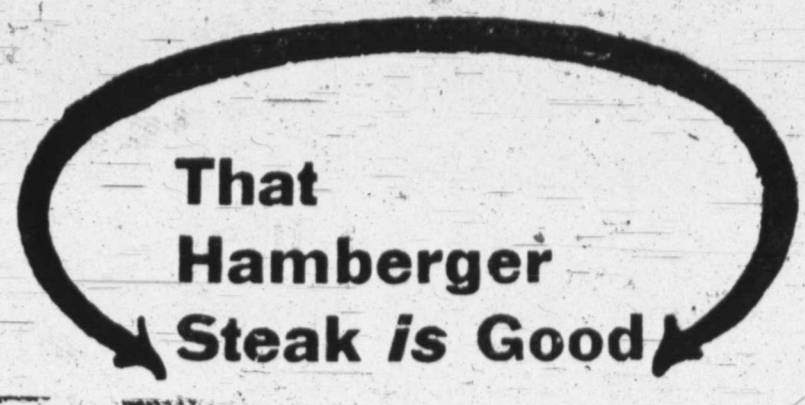
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**That Hamberger Steak is Good**

It's just our luck. Yesterday we subscribed for a little bunch of stock in the Cleveland oil company and immediately there was a slump in the price of oil on the barrel.

President Wilson has accepted an invitation to deliver a very important address at a luncheon to be given by the Associated Press on April 24th and there will be no other speaker. The committee on arrangements is expecting the attendance of members to be larger than ever before.

Cone Johnson has announced he will support Col. Tom Ball for governor, not particularly because Ball has been endorsed by prohibition Democrats, but with the present line up, would support him were he a candidate of his own motion, because he thinks Texas at this time needs as her governor a man of experience, ability and courage, and in that respect he is of the opinion that Col. Ball fills the bill in every particular.

An article in yesterday's Times regarding Sunday School attendance in Wichita Falls on Easter Sunday made it appear that "less than 1000 attended." This should have read "less than 2000." To be exact, the total attendance, not including the colored Sunday Schools, was 1,648. That is a small enough percentage of Sunday school attendance, considering we have a population of 15,000, but it is a marked improvement over that day last year, and the Sunday School people feel greatly encouraged.

If the Webb law is not valid, states with laws regulating the handling and sale of intoxicating liquors are absolutely helpless. Writes Judge R. A. Burch, of the Kansas Supreme Court. To this most people will heartily agree. As long as liquor could be shipped into dry territory without let or hindrance prohibition was ineffective. The Times ventures the prediction that the brewing interests aren't going to raise any strenuous fight over this issue. As long as the states can have the right to handle the liquor

question as the majority of their people see fit, there isn't going to be any overwhelming demand for nationwide prohibition. When they are denied that right nation-wide prohibition will become a decidedly live issue. The brewers, it appears, should be very glad to let the Webb-Kenyon law stand.

Examination of the records of the four gunmen who died in the electric chair at Sing Sing yesterday shows that all of them were of respectable parents and that their careers of crime started when they began to roam the streets and form bad associations. This reminds us that there are a lot of boys roaming the streets at all hours of the night right here in Wichita Falls. Some of them have already started petty thieving. The next step is the hold-up—and there you have your gunmen, only a degree removed from the four who paid the penalty yesterday. Two things that ought to be done for the boys are, to furnish them with employment and wholesome recreation, and make the police restrictions more rigid. The public may be dilatory in its duty to the boys, however, that ought to excuse no parent.

If those Congressmen and Senators who are mulling such a strong fight against the repeal of the canal toll exemption are in real earnest about wanting to provide competition for transcontinental railways they might propose the amendment of the shipping laws to admit the vessels of all nations to coastwise traffic, and allow all the vessels in coastwise traffic passage free of charge. England could not object to this for there would be no discrimination. This would make competition for the transcontinental railways and would be a great boon for the cities and territory on both coasts. The Times is not prepared to endorse such a proposal except as to the admittance of the ships of all nations to American coastwise traffic, but in advocating such a proposal there could be no grounds for suspicion that the advocate was working in the interest of the shipping trust. As the shipping laws now stand only American owned ships can engage in coastwise traffic. These ships must also be built in America. The steel trust which builds them and the shipping trust, which owns and operates them, it appears, would be the principal beneficiaries of the toll exemption as it now stands. The whole people would pay the freight.

DEMOCRATS REVERSE STAND AT BALTIMORE Senator Gore of Oklahoma has written a letter to all the delegates who attended the Baltimore convention to

ascertain how they stand on the question of repeal of the free tolls question, and of the answers received thus far 328 favor repeal, 69 against and 11 non-committal. A Washington special to the Dallas News on yesterday regarding this matter is as follows:

Washington, April 12.—The most significant development in the contest over the repeal of free tolls granted through the Panama Canal to American coastwise vessels is the preliminary result of a poll being conducted by Senator Gore of Oklahoma among delegates to the Baltimore convention, and the tabulated results, now promising to be more pronounced for the Administration's position than was anticipated, are to be given to the Senate during the debate.

The Baltimore convention declared in favor of free tolls, and upon this the Administration's opponents have relied to defeat the repeal bill. It is the chief argument among the opposing Senators and was so among members of the House while the bill was pending before them. With a view of ascertaining the sentiment among delegates to the Baltimore convention on this question, as detached from every other, Senator Gore addressed a letter to the delegates asking whether they favored or opposed free tolls. The returns have been rapidly coming in during the last few days, and tabulated tonight, show a vote of 328 in favor of repeal, 69 against and 11 who are non-committal, a ratio of five to one among the delegates for repeal as the ratio among Democratic Congressmen was four to one.

Texas Poll Unanimous But two States have given a majority against repeal. A number of them, as far as the returns have been received, are found unanimously for the President's position, notably Texas and Pennsylvania. A notable showing is that from among the Illinois delegates, twenty-four of whom have responded in favor of the Administration's position and but two against it.

The letters are accepted as reflecting not only the sentiment among the delegates on the issue as it stood before the convention, but of the present sentiment of communities throughout the country, and a potent feature of them is the argument against bounties and privileges and in favor of keeping the National Faith. But two letters received from the Southwest have been made public. One is from J. K. Thurmond, president of the First National Bank of Safford, Ok., and a delegate to the Baltimore convention, who writes: "While I went to the Baltimore convention and voted for Mr. Clark, I believe, forty-five times, however I think he is on the wrong side in this fight. I believe that we should stand with the President and that you could not make a mistake in making a strong fight for the President in this matter."

Another, from Robert E. Huff, an attorney of Wichita Falls, Texas, and a delegate to the Baltimore convention, says: "You will doubtless remember that the report of the platform committee was read late at night, after the nomination for President had been made, and when but a small portion of the convention was present, and that portion in confusion. I think Senator Kern read the report, or a great portion of it, and his voice was weak

and could not be heard by the great body of the convention. Moreover, there was no minority report. The convention supposed that the platform committee had done its duty, according to Democratic policy, and, therefore, this section went unchallenged."

### OIL PRICES HERE DROP TEN CENTS

LOCAL PRODUCERS NOW RECEIVING ONLY 95 CENTS A BARREL FOR CRUDE

### REDUCTION POSTED MONDAY

Overproduction in the Oklahoma Fields Assigned as Reason for Drop in Price

The first price reduction in Northwest Texas oil in three years was announced Monday afternoon, when the Magnolia Petroleum Company reduced the current quotation of crude from \$1.05 to ninety-five cents per barrel, a slash of ten cents. While local oil men were expecting a reduction on account of the cuts in Oklahoma oil, they had anticipated nothing like a dime drop.

Mid-continent oil has declined fifteen cents within the past few days and prices here follow the general trend of those in Oklahoma.

The Magnolia reduction was followed this morning by a similar announcement by the Texas Company and owners of the crude product can get only ninety-five cents per barrel for it today.

The price of oil in this field had risen from forty-five cents in 1911 to \$1.05, climbing slowly with five and three cent jumps until it went above the dollar mark early last winter. There it remained until Monday.

Heese S. Allen, whose royalties and separate production give him control of more oil than any independent factor in the field is not affected by the advance as much as most of the independents. Some time ago Mr. Allen bought a 55,000 barrel tank farm only, the property of the Waters Pierce Company at Electra and has been running his oil there and storing it. Other individuals and corporations, without storage facilities, must of course take what they can get. That a refinery in Wichita Falls would serve to keep the price of the crude at a proper level is the opinion of some of the local men and they look forward to the time when such an industry will be established here.

The recent reductions are all due, in a general way, to overproduction in Oklahoma. Production there has exceeded the storage and refinery facilities of practically all the companies, making a price reduction necessary and it followed naturally that the Magnolia would not pay \$1.05 for Northwest Texas oil when it could get the Houston oil for sixty cents.

### UNCLE SAM HAS DECLARED WAR ON THE ROOSTER

Washington, April 14.—Uncle Sam has declared war on the rooster, according to a bulletin by the department of agriculture today. It says: "On the interest of the infertile eggs, the poultry specialists of the department of agriculture have started a campaign for the elimination of the rooster among the poultry flocks during the season between May 1 and De-

ember 1. It is estimated that one-third of the tremendous annual loss of eggs is due to the fertile eggs.

It is pointed out that fertile eggs spoil very quickly when subjected to the ordinary methods of handling on the farm and when marketed during the hot summer months the same conditions and that fertile eggs will keep in good conditions in temperatures which would cause fertile eggs to rot.

### Convicts Fight Sterilization

Keokuk, Ia., April 14.—Federal Judges Smith, McPherson and Pollock are today hearing the attack upon Iowa's new law calling for the sterilization of insane and habitual criminals by the state board of parole. The attack is being made by thirty convicts in the state penitentiary at Fort Madison who have banded together and employed a lawyer. The state parole board has already put the law into force in three insane

asylums, where fifty operations have been performed. The board issued an order for operations at Fort Madison but it agreed with the attorney for the convicts to withhold action until the law can be tested in court. The convicts claim that the law is in violation of their rights guaranteed by the federal constitution.



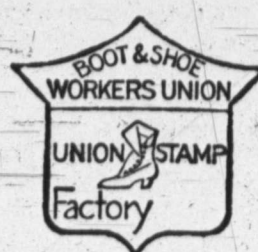
