PRESIDENT CONFERS WITH STATEMENT OF ADMINISTRATIONS VIEWS WILSON'S TAMPICO ACTION

Washington, April 15 .- The following official statement was issued today representing views of President Wilson and administration:

"In discussions in official circles in Washington of the present Mexican situation the following

"It has been pointed out that, in considering the present somewhat delicate situation in Mexico, he unpleasant incident at Tampico must not be thought of alone.
