PRESIDENT CONFERS WITH LEADERS OF BOTH HOUSES

Other Indignities To American Honor By Mexico Made Known At Conference This Morning.

Washington, April 15.—Huerta will salute the American flag or the Atlantic fleet will seize Vera Cruz and Tampico. What happens afterwards depends upon Huerta.
This is the fixed determination of President Wilson. Leaders in Congress with whom he conferred today agreed that there was ample precedent for such a course.
One new fact brought out at the White House conference this morning with ranking members of the committee in charge of foreign affairs was that two of the American blue jackets arrested at Tampico were actually taken from the Dolphin's boat. Not only the Tampico incident but a long stretch of indignities offered to the United States to the conspicuous exclusion of other foreign nations represented in Mexico has convinced the President that the United States has been singled out for manifestations of ill will and contempt by the Huerta government.

Official dispatches from American Charge Nelson O'Shaughnessy have been intercepted. A ship's orderly, in full uniform on business was arrested and later released while nominal punishment was meted out to the officer responsible for his arrest.
These hitherto unpublished facts were disclosed by the President in his conference with the representatives and senators today.

President Wilson told his advisers that he is for peace but is determined to make Huerta salute the American flag.

While these developments were taking place in Washington the ships of the Atlantic fleet were steaming toward Tampico. The first of the big fighters has already cleared Hampton Roads and the others were ready to sail before night.

NEW SHIP LINE PRACTICALLY ASSURED FOR HOUSTON

Houston, Texas, April 15.—W. W. McDonald, secretary of the Sunflower Boat Line is making arrangements to establish a daily passenger and freight service between this point and Galveston. The Sunflower Company will incorporate within a few days for the sum of \$50,000 of which \$27,000 is already subscribed. The Houston Chamber of Commerce was instrumental in securing this new service and has guaranteed to furnish the line with 400 tons of cargo daily. Local merchants are planning to take stock in this project to the amount of \$5,000.

CONGRESS WILL SUPPORT WILSON

THIS IS BELIEF OF REPRESENTATIVES AND SENATORS AT TODAY'S CONFERENCE

UNITED STATES NOT BLUFFING

Future Course of Action Depends Upon Mexico City Says Senator Shively

Washington, April 15.—Following the conference at the White House this morning, Representative Flood, chairman of the House committee on foreign affairs, said he was sure the president would have the backing of Congress.

Senator Shively described today's conference as "chiefly in formative and said the 'future course of action depends upon Mexico City.'" Senator Shively said congressional action would be based upon a message from the president.

"Will there be a message from the president?" he was asked.
"It will certainly come to that if reparation does not come from the Huerta government for its contempt to the United States," he answered.

He was emphatic in declaring ridiculous any declaration of idea that the American government was bluffing. "There is no first-class power in the world from which the United States would have patiently withstood what she has from poor emboldened, ill-vised Mexico. It is like the case of the cory snapping at the heels of the great Newfoundland who must ultimately teach his tormentors a lesson."
Some other senators declared the president would have the support of the Senate in his course.

STATEMENT OF ADMINISTRATIONS VIEWS

Washington, April 15.—The following official statement was issued today representing views of President Wilson and administration:

"In discussions in official circles in Washington of the present Mexican situation the following points have been very much dwelt upon:

"It has been pointed out that, in considering the present somewhat delicate situation in Mexico, the unpleasant incident at Tampico must not be thought of alone. For some time past the defacto government of Mexico has seemed to think mere apologies sufficient when the rights of American citizens or the dignity of the government of the United States were involved and has apparently made no attempt at either reparation or the effective correction of the serious derelictions of its civil and military officers.

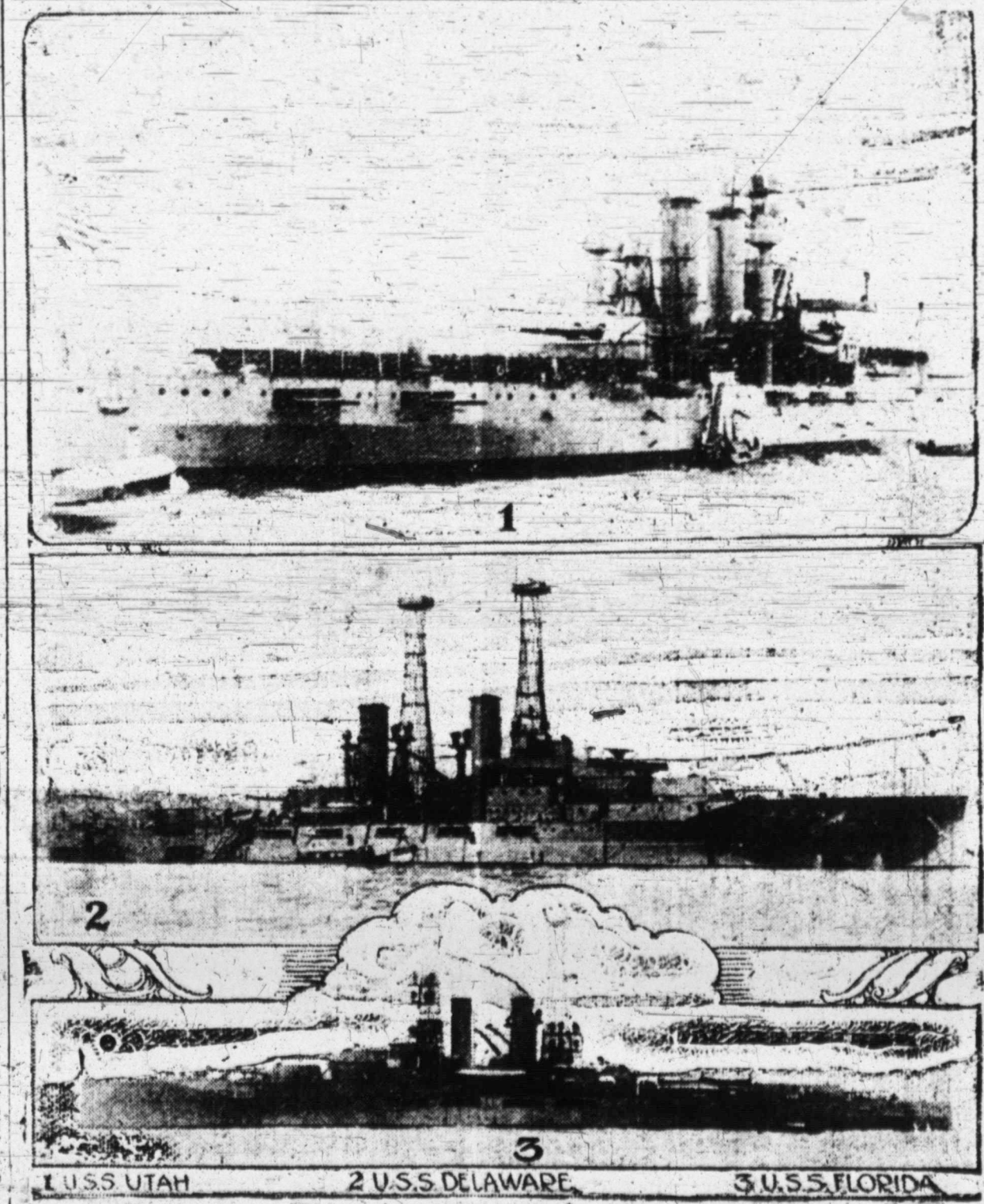
"Immediately after the incident at Tampico an orderly from one of the ships of the United States in the harbor of Vera Cruz, who had been sent ashore to the post office for the ship's mail, and who was in uniform, and who had the official mail bag on his back, was arrested and put into jail by the local authorities. He was subsequently released and a nominal punishment inflicted upon the officer who had arrested him. But it was significant that an orderly from the fleet of the United States was picked out from the many persons constantly going ashore on various errands from the various ships in the harbor representing several nations.

"Most serious of all, the officials in charge of the telegraph office at Mexico City presumed to withhold an official dispatch of the government of the United States to its embassy at Mexico, until it should have been sent to the censor and his permission received to deliver it, and gave the dispatch into the hands of the Charge 'D' Affairs of the United States only upon his personal and emphatic demand, he having in the meantime learned through other channels that dispatch had been sent him which he had not received.

"It can not but strike any one who has watched the course of events in Mexico as significant that untoward incidents such as these have not occurred in any case to representatives of other governments were concerned, but only in dealings with representatives of the United States and that there has been no occasion for other governments to call attention to such matters to ask for apologies.

"These repeated offenses have necessarily made the impression that the government of the United States was signaled out for manifestations of ill will and contempt. The authorities of the State Department feel confident that when the seriousness and cumulative effect these incidents is made evident to the government of Mexico that government will see the propriety and the necessity of giving such evidences of its desire to repudiate and correct these things as will not only be satisfactory to the government of the United States, but will also be evidence to the rest of the world as an entire change of attitude.

"There can be no loss to the dignity of the defacto government in Mexico in recognizing to the fullest degree the claims of a great sovereign government of its respect."



WILSON'S TAMPICO ACTION ASSAILED IN CONGRESS

Rep. Mondell And Sen. Works Make Bitter Attacks Upon The President's Course Of Action.

Washington, April 15.—Representative Mondell of Wyoming in the House today assailed the administration's Tampico action. He asserted the President was suing the Atlantic fleet to enforce the mandates of his personal prejudice against the person who happens to be at the head of Mexican affairs.
Senator Works, Republican of California, issued this statement:
"Hundreds of American citizens have been slaughtered, their wives and daughters outraged, their property destroyed and this government has not raised its hands for their protection.
"Because a few blue jackets from one of our ships are arrested in a city in civil strife, when they had better been aboard their ship, and the Mexican government refuses to salute our flag, we are to go to war or back down and make ourselves ridiculous in the eyes of the world. I can support no such policy."

TRAIN HITS AUTO; FOUR WERE KILLED

FATAL ACCIDENT AT GEORGETOWN EARLY THIS MORNING

WERE RESIDENTS OF FLORENCE

Two Others in Automobile Seriously Hurt When Katy Passenger Crashed Into It

Georgetown, Texas, April 15.—Four men were killed and two others seriously injured here at 1:17 a. m. today when a Katy passenger train crashed into an automobile. All the victims were residents of Florence.

The accident occurred at University avenue crossing south of the Katy depot. The party was returning to Florence after having been on a trip to this city. The automobile was demolished.
About fifty persons were returning from Granger where the W. O. A. county convention had been in session and the accident occurred in the view of twenty persons.
The bodies were strewn along the road for some distance. Ex-Constable Robinson's head was completely severed from his body. The automobile was stopped so close to the track that the steps of the coach caught the automobile and hurled it along the track throwing the occupants beneath the wheels.

QUET AT TAMPICO AT LATEST REPORT

CONSTITUTIONALISTS HAVE RETIRED AND REFUGEES GOING ASHORE AGAIN

INTERVENTION IS POSSIBLE

Landing of Marines; Seizure of Gunboats; Blockade of Ports Among Possible Actions

Washington, April 15.—The arrest of an orderly who went ashore at Tampico to obtain mail for the American fleet, the interception of dispatches from American Charge O'Shaughnessy, censorship of dispatches from American officials in Mexico and repeated offenses against the right and dignity of the American government, were given today as some of the causes for the dispatch of the Atlantic fleet to Mexico, in an official statement reopresenting administration views.
The following dispatch dated at 11 p. m. last night was received from Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz this morning:
"No new developments at Tampico. Constitutionalists have retired from the vicinity and refugees are going ashore. The Mexican gunboats have left the harbor."
While the Atlantic fleet was headed toward Tampico, President Wilson took into his confidence the Republican and Democratic ranking members of the two congressional committees in charge of foreign relations in Congress. He sought for Senators Shively and Lodge and Representatives Egan and Cooper and revealed to them the situation in detail. He expected them to communicate what he told them to their colleagues in order to have this way for any further steps that might be decided upon.
The possibility, in case Huerta does not accede to the demand for a salute include the blockading of Mexican ports, the landing of marines, the possible bombardment and seizure of federal gunboats and armed intervention. The impression here, however, is that Huerta will yield.

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How Four Youths Of Good Families Became Gunmen

(Winthrop D. Lane in the Survey)

How are "gunmen" made? Gyp the Blood, Lefty Louie, Whitey Lewis and Dago Frank will die in Sing Sing during the week of April 13 unless the governor of New York intervenes. When their bodies are lifted from the chair society will rest content in the belief that it has done its utmost to make their cases crime deterrent.

All society seems to ask is did they kill Rosenthal, the gambler and "squealer" who was shot in July, 1912? And will they pay the penalty? Doubtless this is society's first responsibility.

But shall we stop there? Is it not important to learn as much as possible of their early lives and associations to discover how we may prevent more gunmen from being made? Where did these four boys come from? Who are their parents? How was their childhood spent? Did they become murderers in a day?

Lefty Louie. Lefty Louie was born in the heart of New York's congested lower East Side. The family is one of respectable orthodox Jews. Originally well off, it is trustee of a synagogue. No suspicion of crime has ever been lodged against any other members of the family.

After an illness at the age of 6, the doctor said that Louie must have all the fresh air he could get. At that time the family was poor and the only fresh air for Louie was in the street. The stern household discipline was then broken down. The myriad sights and sounds he had wondered about, he could now investigate first hand. New friends were waiting to teach him the amusements of the dogstep and the sidewalk.

In a couple of years he became, says his father, a "street fiend." The first mischief his family knew about happened when he was 11 or 12. With another boy he tried to take some money out of a little bank in which his brother kept his savings.

All this time he was going to both the public and Hebrew schools and reciting the usual religious instruction of his race. At 12 or 13 he had become a frequenter of pool rooms, where he probably learned how to pick pockets. He was sent away to a private school for a year and after that worked both in the shipping department of a department store and in his father's office.

But his passionate longing for the street continued. His first arrest was in 1907 when Louie was 16. The charge was "disorderly conduct" and he was sent to the house of refuge. Soon after he came out he was arrested for picking a pocket and sent to the house of correction for nine months. These were his only arrests up to the murder of Rosenthal.

Whitey Lewis. Whitey Lewis came to this country with his family from Poland in 1890, when he was 12 years old. In Poland, the family says, he never got into trouble. His parents are Jews and are poor. The excitement of street life in New York City was too much for Whitey, with his rural upbringing and during his first year here he made the acquaintance of professional criminals in Chinatown. He worked for a while in a book binding shop and then started to learn something with an uncle in Jersey City.

His first arrest came when he was 16. He pleaded guilty to grand larceny in the second degree and was sent to Elmira Reformatory. He was paroled and earned his absolute release in seven months. Two other convictions for smaller offenses followed and then Whitey entered the army and went to the Philippines.

There he got into a struggle with a fellow who blamed him for being a Jew and Whitey, with a knife in his hand, cut his persecutor. He was given hard labor for three months and dishonorably discharged. He returned to this country and fell in with his old associates. Like Lefty Louie and Gyp the Blood, he declared on the witness stand that he had met Jack Zelig, the notorious gang leader, about a year before the murder.

Two of Whitey's brothers have been arrested, one for picking a pocket.

Dago Frank. Dago Frank was confirmed in a Protestant Episcopal church at the age of 16. His family attended the church regularly and it has been said that Frank sang in the choir. He began work at 13 years of age and for four years was an errand boy at \$1 a week for a news bureau. His employers never complained of his conduct.

Soon after he left this job he was convicted of carrying concealed weapons. This is the only charge except that of murdering Rosenthal ever made against him. Frank says the weapons were handed him by an ex-convict and that he was caught with them fifteen minutes later. He was sent to Elmira Reformatory and after fourteen months was paroled, earning his absolute release in seven months.

He worked a year as steamfitter's helper for a construction company and no complaint was made against his character or industry.

By what steps he came to be a member of the notorious Jack Zelig gang it is difficult to learn. The attorney who defended him and the other gunmen says that he is "the city and coroner of the four." The attorney thinks that it was the evil associations Frank formed while in the reformatory that caused his undoing. Frank was one of the few non-Jews to belong to Zelig's gang. A few had once given his mother and sister employment and helped them with their rent. Frank has ever since had a kindly feeling for Jews. When Zelig was killed a letter from Frank was found on his body reciting these facts, saying: "Although I'm a wop, I know you'll stick by me."

Gyp the Blood. Gyp the Blood was a childhood companion of Lefty Louie and the story of his entrance into law break-

ing is much the same as that of Lefty's. His father is in the tailoring business and well to do. From the ages of 8 to 13, Gyp, who is a Jew, received instruction in the Talmud and the other usual religious teachings of his race.

With Lefty he frequented pool rooms. For a while he was an errand boy for a dry goods store and it may be that his trips to all parts of the city brought him into contact with evil associates.

At 17 he was arrested for the first time, the charge being petit larceny. He was discharged. The next year for a similar offense he was sentenced to nine months in the city reformatory. He served a second term in the reformatory and then a year in the state's penitentiary. Two of Gyp's brothers have been arrested also.

Such are the histories of four young men now locked upon as desperate and hardened criminals. Yet beyond their connection with one crime, the world has shown no concern in the stages by which their criminal careers developed. None of the parents of the gunmen has ever been charged with crime. The early years of each of the four seem to have been normal and straightforward. Gradually they made the acquaintance of older boys and men who had mastered the trick of turning an easy dollar. Their own entrances into crime were gradual and began, in every case but that of Dago Frank, with attempts to get spending money easily. None of them was given the benefit of probation or a suspended sentence.

At a meeting of the school board last night the result of the election for trustees for the Wichita Falls independent school district was canvassed and A. H. Carrigan, J. L. Downing and W. J. Bullock declared elected to serve for two years.

The board was then organized, electing W. J. Bullock, president; A. H. Carrigan, vice president; W. W. Brown, secretary and by the appointment of the following standing committees:

Finance—W. J. Bullock, W. R. Ferguson, J. L. Jackson.

Teachers—W. J. Bullock, T. J. Taylor, W. W. Brown.

Rules and regulations—A. H. Carrigan, J. L. Downing, W. R. Ferguson.

Text books and course of study—T. J. Taylor, A. H. Carrigan, W. W. Brown.

School property and supplies—W. R. Ferguson, W. W. Brown, J. L. Downing.

Health and sanitation—J. L. Jackson, J. L. Downing, A. H. Carrigan. George H. Carpenter was selected superintendent for a term of two years. H. F. Robertson had heretofore been elected assessor and collector of taxes and the First State Bank and Trust Company had also been chosen as treasurer.

The schools are in good condition financially and otherwise and are prepared to take care of any increase in scholastics for next year, as they now have seven rooms in the different buildings that are not being used. The census to be taken in May is expected to show a handsome increase in school children as it always does in this district. The teaching force has to be increased every year and but few people realize the load if they had a care for the needs of schools. It now takes over \$4,500 per month to meet the pay roll, which is more than double what it was four years ago.

WICHITA FALLS RECIPE.

Recipe For Borscht of Meat.
(By Mrs. J. Mytinger)
Two cups of chopped cooked meat (beef or chicken). Mix with one cup of stock or water, three-fourths cup of bread crumbs, one-half cup of milk, salt and pepper, one-half cup of melted butter, one teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, one teaspoon mushroom or tomato catsup, salt and pepper. Bake thirty minutes in a loaf-pan individual corn water. Serve with tomato sauce. Tomato Sauce: One teaspoon butter melted in the pan, two tablespoons flour, brown in the butter. Add one tablespoon of onion chopped fine, one-half cup of strained tomato juice, one-half cup boiling water, salt and pepper. Blend well and cook till proper consistency. This is a good way to use up any leftovers of meat and makes a delicious dish.

2000 JACK RABBITS HAVE BATTEN THE DUST

Drives in Bowman Community Have Resulted in Slaughter of Large Number of the Pest

More than 2000 Jack rabbits in the vicinity of Bowman, Archer county, twelve miles south of Wichita, Falls, have been slaughtered within the past few days as a result of rabbit drives held in that section. The fourth drive is being held today and about 200 farmers and others are in attendance. Last Saturday, 700 were killed. Yesterday two drives were made on the morning, the other in the afternoon and about 1200 rabbits were slaughtered.

Moving pictures are being taken of today's drive and will probably be exhibited at one of the local play houses. Jack rabbits had become so numerous in the vicinity mentioned that they were a menace to growing crops and the drives were gotten up as a means of reducing the number. Other sections of Clay, Archer and Wichita counties are planning drives where the rabbits have become so numerous.

Of course we of Texas or the South have no kick coming in the matter of the distribution of regional reserve banks. Those in charge of locating them did the best they could, perhaps, but so long as there were so many States clamoring for one of the twelve, it does seem a little bit like some partiality was shown when one State landed two of them.

Wichita Falls has the savings fever. All the banks of the city are featuring their savings departments, the school children are saving their pennies, and a big building and loan association is getting ready for business. T-I-R-I-P-T is the motto of hundreds of homes and Wichita Falls is building for the future.

Last year \$6,200 of the public money was expended in payment of bounties given our Senators and Representatives. This was in addition to the salaries they draw, as we understand it, but if it is right to pay for their bounties how long will it be before they will expect the government to pay for their shoe shiners, shaves, hair cuts, street car fare, board bills, etc.? If the salaries that go with the offices are not large enough to pay their expenses, then why in thunder is it that it is so difficult a task to induce one of them to give up their job and seek a new field of employment? Some of them have been serving in Congress for from fifteen to thirty years, and seemingly have managed to accumulate considerable property and money. There should be an end to this extravagance.

All three of the former pro Democratic candidates for governor in former campaigns are now supporting Col. Tom Ball for governor. On the other hand, the anti-pro Democratic leaders who helped to elect Gov. Colquhoun are refusing to give their support to Candidate James E. Ferguson. Yesterday at Fort Worth Mr. Ferguson showed that he was not particularly seeking their support. In fact, he defied them, and it is now up to them as to whether they support him or Col. Tom Ball. That Ferguson was strong enough to do this is evidence that he has a strong following, and doubtless he has figured that he will gain more votes by declining and refusing the endorsement of the Constructive Democrats than he could have hoped to gain by accepting the same. The way it looks to us is that Mr. Ferguson deliberately defied Messrs. J. Sheb Williams, R. M. Johnston, Clarence Owsley and other very prominent anti-prohibition leaders, giving them to understand that they can no longer dictate as to who shall be the candidate for governor. As eliminators, they have proven a most dismal failure, and in this campaign will have to occupy back seats. For this nice piece of work, even those who are not inclined to give their support to Mr. Ferguson will thank him. While he does not claim to know the political game, those who have observed his movements can see that he is an apt student, and is learning fast.

PETTY THIEVING AND THE REMEDY FOR IT

Boys who roam the streets at all hours of the night are believed responsible for many petty thefts that have been reported recently and one of the first things that will be asked of the new administration will be the appointment of more night police so that the business district and the residence sections can be watched more closely. Perhaps the boldest of all were the boys who took some light globes at the Overland Garage and attempted to sell them back to Mr. Willis, the proprietor.

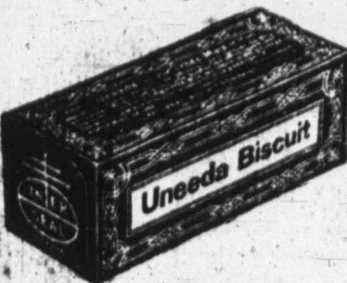

Rear Admiral Flske who brought Admiral Badger's orders was the last man to leave the flagship.

Federals Lose 2800-Killed and Wounded and Rebels Capture 700—Rebel Loss 560

By Associated Press. Juarez, April 15.—The crushing defeat of the combined federal forces by rebels at San Pedro with federal losses estimated at 2800 killed and wounded and 700 prisoners and rebel loss of 560 killed and wounded is really a culmination of the battle of Torreon which began March 21st.

When General Velasco, the federal commander evacuated Torreon he took with him practically his entire force. He joined the reinforcements sent to his aid which reached the vicinity of Torreon too late and made a stand at San Pedro.

General Villa hurled his numerically inferior forces at the government front again and again for six days of terrific fighting. His victory is believed to have practically wiped out the government forces in the vicinity of Torreon.

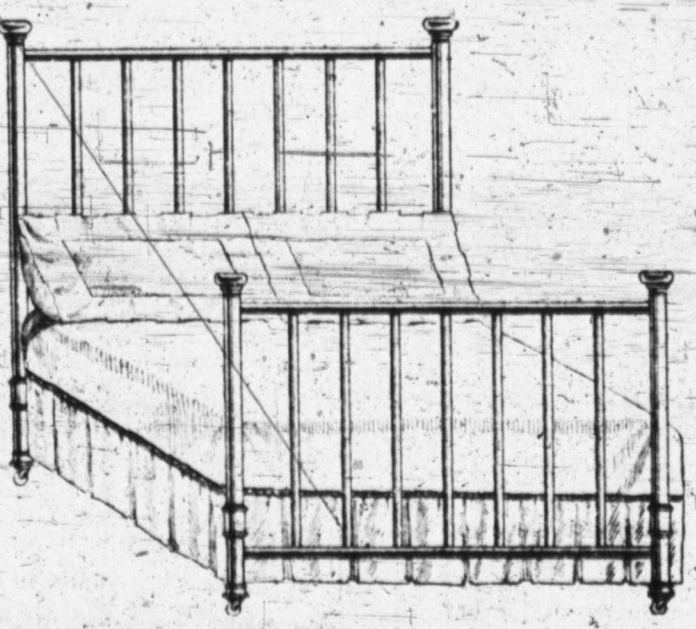
Iowa Blue Sky Law Attacked
