PRES. WILSON ASKS AUTHORITY FOR USE OF ARMED FORCES

. WILSON ADDRESSES BOTH **HOUSES IN JOINT SESSION**

Asks Use of Armed Forces of U.S. to Uphold Dignity and Rignts of the American Government.

FIRM AND PROMPT ACTION IS NECESSARY

Somber Faced Congressmen Give Roar of Cheers When President Ends Reading of Brief Message.

By Associated Press

Washington, April 20.—At three o'clock sharp President Wilson delivered his message to Congress asking for approval of the use of the armed forces of the United States in such a way and to such an extent as may be necessary to obtain from Huerta the fullest recognition of the rights and dignity of the United States.

His message reviews the incidents leading up to present situation.

"A series of incidents have occurred which cannot but create the impression that representatives of General Huerta were permitted and were willing to go out of their way to show disrespect and indignity to the American government and its representatives and felt perfectly safe in doing so leaving them free to show in many ways their disrespect and contempt for the American gov ernment."

He did not ask authority for any apropriation of money at this time or for authority to call out the National Guard.

"There can be thought of aggression or selfish interest in the steps we are about to take," he told the somber faced senators and representatives who packed the hall. "This government can, I earnestly hope under no circumstances, become involved with the people of Mexico. If armed conflict does come it will be only as the result of Huerta's contempt; we should be only fighting Huerto the people the opportunity to again take up the administration

In his message the President said:

"It is my duty to call your attention to a situation which has arisen in our dealings with General Victoriano Huerta at Mexico City, which calls for action, and to ask your advice and co-operation in acting upon it.

"On the 9th of April a paymaster of United States Steamship Dolphin landed at the Iturbiz bridge at Tampico-with-a whaleboat and boats' crew to take off certain supplies needed by his ship and while engaged in loading the boat was arrested by an officer and squad of men of the army of General Huerta. Neither the paymaster or any one of the boat's crew was armed. Two of the men were in the boat when the arrest took place and were obliged to leave it and submit to be taken into custody, notwithstanding the fact that the boats carried both at her bow and her stern, the flag of the United States. The officer who made the arrest was proceeding up one of the streets of the town with his prisoners when met by an officer of higher authority, who ordered him to return to the landing and await orders, and within an hour and a half from the time of the arrest orders were received from the commander of Huertista forces at Tampico for the release of the paymaster and his men.


"So far as I can learn, such wrongs and annoyances have been suffered to occur only against representatives of United States. I have heard no complaint from other governments of similar treatment.

"Subsequent explanations and formal apologies did not alter the popular impression which it is possible it has been the object of Huertista's authorities to create; that the United States was being singled out with impunity for slights and affronts in retaliation for its refusal to recognize the pretensions of General Huerta to be regarded as the constitutional provisional president of the Re-

• public of Mexico. · "The manifest danger of such a situation was that such of fenses might grow from bad to worse until something happens of so gross and intolerable a sort as to lead directly and inevitably to

armed conflict. "It was necessary that the apologies of General Heurta and his representatives should go much farther, that they should be such as to attract the attention of the whole population to their significance. The present situation need have none of the grave com plications of interference if we deal with it promptly, firmly and wisely."

Detachment of Fifth Brigade at Galveston Preparing to Embark for Mexican Port Tuesday.

FOREIGNERS ARE WARNED TO LEAVE TAMPICO

Ships Chartered For Refugee Service and Army Transports. Warlike Preparations at Every Hand.

Houston, Texas, April 20. Orders have been received by General Funston for 2500 men of the Fifth brigade to-embark Tuesday for Vera Cruz. The railroads have been notified so that they Lay have their equipment ready so that no delay may result.

The order came shortly before three o'clock this morning when the railroads began at once to get their equipment in readiness. It was discovered that the necessary equipment was already on

The entraining is to be done at the Grand Central Station.

The Fifth Brigade is that portion of the command which is situated at Galveston and Texas City. It will be the vanguard of the American troops to enter Mexico unless orders are given for the movement of additional troops.

Developments of the next few hours will determine whether the

troops will entrain or will return to their tents.

Issues Warning To Foreigners

Vera Cruz, April 20.-Admiral Charles E. Hughes, commander of the American fleet before Tampico today went ashore for a conference with General Maas in command of the federal forces here, and also for a conference with the commander of the port here. He instructed them to order all foreigners in Tampico to go aboard refugee ships.

The career of William Edmondson Brothers, soldier and pioneer chizen, was brought to a close Sunday afternoon when death ended his long suf-Murfreesboro or Shiloh and that suswas terminated.

Death was due largely to a stroke of paralysis last winter, although Squire Brothers had been in failing health for some time, due to Bright's disease. Since the paralytic stroke he sank steadily and it was known several weeks ago that be could not

McKee will officiate, the services being a harge of the Masons and the Confederate veterans. The former will serve as active and the latter as honrary pall-bearers.

In the death of Squire Brothers, Nichita Falls lost a man who had erved her citizenship well since the arliest days of the county and city he came to Wichita county in 1882. ettling on a farm near Red River about where Burkburnett now is lo cated. When the county was organ ized he was the first county clerk. serving in that capacity for fout terms. Later he was county commissioner and eight years ago, in 1905 he was chosen justice of the peace, which position he still held at the William Edmondson Brothers was

born and reared near Lavergne, Tenn. on July 19, 1843. Of his service in the war between the States, mention is made below; following that conflict he came to Texas and for a number of years was engaged in ranching near the present site of Stephenville Erath county, and in other parts of the western range. 



" Of that number 16,949 were of fires in dwellings apartment houses, boarding house and private outhouses and of which number 11,984 or 70.4 per cent, were preventable; 1851 or 10.9 per cent were unpreventable, and 3114 or 18.4 per cent from unknown causes.

Of the 37,000 reports received 20, 051 were of fires on all classes of mercantile risks, special hazards and other classes and of which number able; 3769 or 18.8 per cent were un-preventable and 5294 or 26.4 per cent rom unknown causes.

"With a view of putting an end to the lamentable incident which occurred on the 9th inst., at Port Tampico caused by the detention of nine marines and one American officer, considering that such marines were immediately put at Hberty by General Saragoza, commander of Port Tampico, and that said officer presented an apology to Rear Admiral Mayo, commander of the American squadron in those waters, that afterwards when the president of the Republic of Mexico became advised of the facts he expressed regret through the office of foreign relations for the incident and ordered that a full investigation be made to the end that the guilty might be punished, if they be found guilty and finally that the action in question was due to the zealousness of a subaltern which might be regarded as excusable, if it is taken into consideration that the marines had gone ashore in uniform with out permission of the military authorities, the port being at the moment not only in a state of but under attack by rebels, the Charge D'Affairs of the United States and the minister of foreign relations of Mexico, acting in their official capacity agree as

follows: "First, the Mexican government, inspired by a desire of showing the good will it feels toward the people of the United States and acting in the same manner herein as the United States has done in similar cases, binds itself that the American flag be saluted at Tampico by twenty-one guns from the Mexican shore batteries or



On April 20, 208 the United States

sent an ultimatum to Spain demanding that government "relinquish its authority and government in the land of Cuba." Spain's refusal to comply was followed on April 21 by he formal declaration of war. On-April 20, 1898 passports were ssued to Senor Bernabe, Spanish minister to the United States and

shortly thereafter the brief but de-

isive struggle for mastery in Cuba

was under way.

MEXICO CITY AWAITS

Some Americans There Say They Will Stay Others Are Leaving For Mexican Seaports

Mexico City, April 20.-The Mexican capital today awaited with inense interest the next word from Vashington in reply to the refusal of luerta to comply with the demands f the United States.

All the morning papers carried statements by Senor Portillas Rojas, Mexican minister of foreign ffairs, outlining the position Huerta had taken justifying his refusal to fire the salute as demanded. These statements were to the effect that the American flag was not flying on the boat when the blue jackets were first ishore; that the American flag had not been insulted; and that the com-pliance for an unconditional salute vould be humiliating to Mexican na onal dignity.

This statement is followed by one om Huerta advising Mexicans to re rain from any demonstration which night hinder negotiations with the American government

SAN JACINTO RECALLS DEFEAT OF MEXICANS

Seventy-Eight Years After Terrible Defeat of Mexicans It All May Have to be Done Over

Tomorrow will be San Jacinto day. he 78th anniversary of conflict which marked the end of the Texas' struggle for independence from Mexico. The battle of San Jacinto was fought few miles south of where the city of Houston stands today between the forces of General Samuel Houston, the Texas commander and those of Santa Anna, the Mexican chieftain, who appears to have been a sort of ombination of Villa and Huerta. The Texas army was out-numbered

early three to one in the battle; the Mexicans, confident of victory but not expecting a battle before April 22 were enjoying their afteroon siestas when the trouble started. The Texans charged to the tune of "Come to the Valley" which was probably some rag of that day. Be-fore the Mexicans could wake up; large numbers of them were where they couldn't wake up and the rest were not enjoying themselves.

the Alamo and at Goliad was still fresh in the Texans' minds as they harged and "Remember the Alamo," 'Remember Goliad" was their college cell as they fought. The Mexican ontingent was prompt with its alib and "Me no Alamo," . Me no Goliad was the substance of the plea of more han one darkhued soldier.

The Mexicans retreated back to vards a bridge over the bayou, afosition. "Deaf Smith," a Texan who was long on thinking but short on hearing, had thoughtfully removed the bridge beforehand. Santa Anna was captured and his army thoroughly whipped. More than three quar ers of a century later Texas may have to do the work all over again and is ready to repeat the perform ance with the trimmings and side ishes if occasion requires.
