Washington, May 5.—Admiral Dewey, head of the joint army and navy board and Secretary of State Bryan began a conference with President Wilson shortly after the cabinet adjourned. Nothing has been learned as to the nature of the conference but it was believed the Mexican situation was under consideration.

## AGED MILLIONAIRE SHOT AND KILLED BY SON

Chester Duryea Fired Magazine Rifle and Pistol into Body of Sleeping Father

By Associated Press. New York, May 5.—Hiram Duryea, aged 81 retired millionaire manufacturer and civil war veteran, was shot and killed by his son, Chester Duryea, aged 43 last night. The tragedy took place on the porch of the Duryea home where both father and son were in the habit of sleeping. About 1 o'clock the son arose and went into the house where he kept a set of rifles, pistols and shot guns for hunting. He selected an automatic pistol and a magazine rifle and returned. Standing within a few feet of his father he fired first from the rifle and then the pistol. He is to be examined for his sanity. At the police station he said he had intended to kill his father.

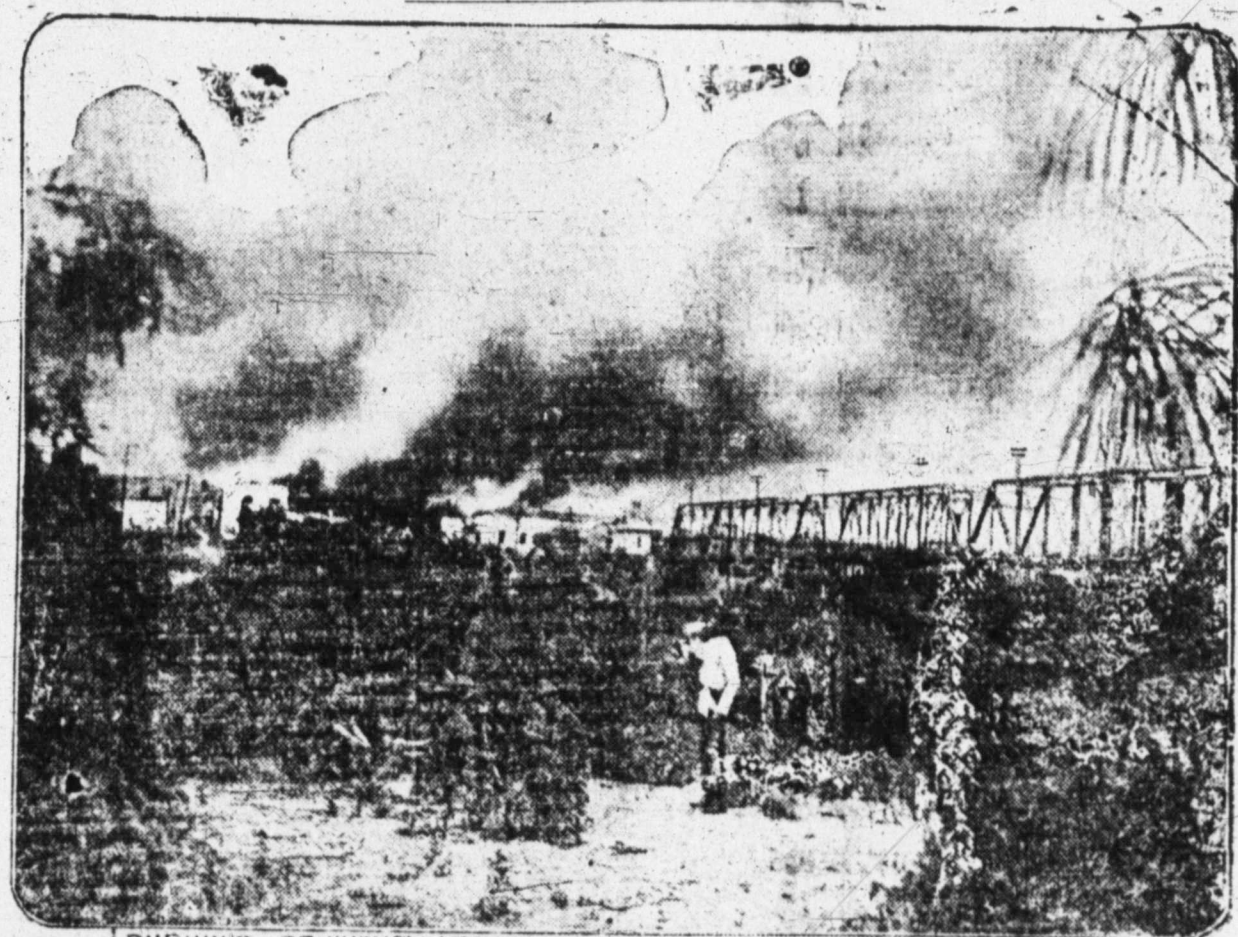

## WOULD STOP TRAFFIC WITH AMERICAN PORTS

Orders Received at Tuxpam Not to Enter or Clear Vessels to or From U. S.

By Associated Press. Washington, May 5.—Admiral Badger reported to the navy department today that the minister of customs had ordered the Tuxpam customs officials not to clear or enter any vessel from or to American ports. The order extends to all ports in the State of Vera Cruz.

A report has reached here that thirteen Americans had been detained against their will sixty miles from Tuxpam. The British consul at Puebla has requested the release of the Americans.

Firing continues daily at Tampico between constitutionalists and federalists according to a report from Admiral Badger. Heavy guns were heard yesterday morning at Tampico. Admiral Badger reports that he is forming a special service squadron under Admiral Winslow.

## RUSSIAN STUDENT GOES TO SIBERIA FOR KISS.

St. Petersburg, May 5.—Siberia will probably be the penalty of a kiss for M. Ivanhoff, student, who was today indicted for attempted murder. He made the Russian Kaiser custom of oscillating greeting of the faithful the excuse for kissing pretty Mile. Lise Albert, a fellow student. The girl, refusing to regard the salutation in its religious aspect, screamed and her brother rushing into the room knocked Ivanhoff down. The latter then drew a revolver and shot at her brother, but missed. Meanwhile the girl had summoned the police, but Ivanhoff, brandishing the revolver, escaped to the street, jumped into a taxicab and compelled the chauffeur to drive off at top speed.

## BIG CARGO OF RAW SUGAR REACHES PORT AT GALVESTON

## OIL LEASE TAX CASE ARGUMENT ON MAY 16

Local Attorneys Representing Both Sides Will Go to Austin Before Supreme Court

May 16 has been fixed as the date for the presentation of the oil lease tax case before the supreme court at Austin and local attorneys representing both sides in the litigation will go down to the capital to deliver their arguments. This is the case in which the oil companies are seeking to enjoin the county from collecting taxes on its oil leaseholds, which "were assessed for taxation by the county commissioners." The county won the case in the trial court and the appellate court certified the matter to the supreme court without passing on it. The case involves about \$20,000 for the two years and the outcome is anxiously awaited. This is the first time this question has ever been before the supreme court.

## Robert J. Kerr To Be Replaced By Army At Vera Cruz

Washington, May 5.—Robert J. Kerr's term as civil governor of Vera Cruz, during the American occupation will be very brief. Secretary of War Garrison announced that the establishment of the army in charge of the government of Vera Cruz would eliminate Mr. Kerr. It was also indicated by the secretary that army officers would take the places of the two other civilians who were appointed with Mr. Kerr to fill the functions of other offices under the civil government for martial law established by Admiral Fletcher at Vera Cruz. This would displace William F. Buckle as administrator of justice and Charles Stewart as treasurer of the newly established government. Mr. Kerr is a Chicago lawyer.

## NATIONAL PROHIBITION AND WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE

These Questions Come Before Congress in Form of Joint Resolution

Washington, May 5.—The joint resolution proposing an amendment to the constitution to extend the right of suffrage to women and for nationwide prohibition today was reported "without recommendation" to the House by the judiciary committee. This leaves both proposals up to Congress for decision without suggestion from the committee.

## MANY INJURED BY STORM AT RED WATER AND MAUD

One Killed Outright, Five Others Not Expected to Live and Others Injured

By Associated Press. Texas, May 5.—Early reports of yesterday's storm at Red Water and Maud were exaggerated as to the number killed but not as to the number injured and the property damage. When physicians and nurses returned from those towns today it was learned that one person was killed outright at Maud and that five others were not expected to live. At Red Water, Mrs. E. G. Estes and another woman are believed fatally injured. Fifteen other persons were injured there and seventeen buildings were demolished. Only one residence remaining standing in the town.

Mrs. Pearl White who was killed at Maud was talking to her aged father when the tornado struck. She was picked up and the clothing stripped from her body except her underclothing and was carried several hundred yards.

## BECKER AGAIN ON TRIAL FOR ROSENTHAL'S MURDER

New York, May 5.—Ex-Police Lieut. Charles Becker today was called for a second trial on charges of instigating the murder of Herman Rosenthal. The four men who shot Rosenthal down in the glare of Broadway's lights on Forty-second street, Whitey Lewis, Gyp the Blood, Lefty Louie and Dago Frank have paid the extreme penalty with their lives. Becker after being adjudged guilty by a jury and that judgment affirmed by the state supreme court, was granted a new trial on technical grounds by the state court of appeals, one member of which tribunal voting against another trial for the convicted policeman. District Attorney Whitman today was prepared to take personal charge of the prosecution. It was understood that he will attempt at the second trial of Becker to introduce as evidence, facts regarding an alleged conspiracy to have the summen saved by perjuring testimony, one of these witnesses, Karl Dresner, having confessed having been paid to give false witness.

## DYNAMITE MAGAZINE BLOWN UP; EIGHT KILLED

Brush Fire Causes Explosion of Plant Operated by the Panama Government

By Associated Press. Panama, May 5.—An explosion this morning at the Panama government's dynamite plant killed eight persons. Nineteen others were seriously injured. The magazine was destroyed. A brush fire caused the explosion. Six of the dead and most of the wounded were firemen who had been summoned to fight the fire. A man and a woman who were watching the blaze from a distance were torn to pieces.

Three distinct proposals are being considered. One would limit the entry of foreign lint cotton, one would prohibit the shipment of foreign lint cotton from northern manufacturing states to South and the third would restrict the importation of lint cotton from any foreign country.

## VIOLENT WINDSTORM NEAR WAXAHACHIE YESTERDAY

Several barns were destroyed and small outbuildings on farms were blown away and some residences were moved off their blocks. No one was injured. Traffic on the interurban line is suspended on account of poles being blown across the track.

## GOV. AMMONS' MEASURES FOR PEACE RESTORATION

Denver, May 5.—Five administration measures to carry out the program in the governor's call for an extra session of the legislature were ready for introduction when the legislature convened this morning.

One of the bills submits a constitutional amendment to empower the legislature to create a state board of arbitration for industrial disputes.

Another provides for a bond issue to cover the state militia indebtedness which amounts to nearly a million dollars.

Two bills give the governor authority to close saloons and to prevent the sale or purchase of firearms in strike districts.

The fifth measure proposes the establishment of a state police board.

## FEDERALS HAVE MINED RAILROADS

EXPLOSIVES PLACED EVERY HALF MILE ON LINE FROM VERA CRUZ TO MEXICO CITY

## THROW UP ENTRENCHMENTS

Federal Positions in Vicinity of Vera Cruz are Daily Being Made Stronger

By Associated Press. Washington, May 5.—Information came from Vera Cruz to the war department today that Mexican federal troops have mined the railroad from Vera Cruz to Mexico City in preparation for the destruction of the road in event the Americans attempt to march to Mexico City. No communication has been received of reports that the San Francisco bridge on the inter-oceanic railway has been damaged. The mines are reported located half a mile apart and details of Mexican soldiers have been left to touch off the fuses if hostilities begin. The federals are throwing up entrenchments which are daily making their positions stronger giving General Funston much concern. It is said that he would welcome orders to start at once to capture Mexico City.

Reports from Admiral Mayo at Tampico say that the American ships could take Tampico "without difficulty" and it is said that his dispatches have hinted more than once that it is advisable that this be done.

## SPECIAL TRAIN CARRIES BANKER TO BROTHER'S FUNERAL

A special train was run through here last night from Elk City, Okla., to Fort Worth to carry R. M. Dudley, an El Paso banker to Memphis, Tenn., to attend the funeral of his brother Mr. Dudley had been marooned at Elk City by washouts on the Rock Island. An examination of schedule showed that if he could reach Fort Worth he could make a connection that would take him to Memphis in time for the funeral. Accordingly a special train was made up on the Wichita Falls and Northwestern, transferring here to the Fort Worth and Denver. The train passed through here at 2:30 arriving at Fort Worth at 5:35.

## COL. McLEMORE INJURED IN FALL FROM HORSE

Albany, Texas, May 5.—Col. Wade McLemore was thrown from a horse Sunday and was painfully injured, sustaining a wound in his forehead. Col. McLemore is a breeder of race horses. His ranch is within a few miles of Albany.

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**JOHN BULL HAS CHRONIC INSOMNIA**

ENGLAND BECOMING DESPERATE OVER MOCKERY OF LAW BY "MALIGNANTS"

**CAT AND MOUSE ACT FAILS**

Exile of Convicted Militants Now Being Seriously Discussed By British Authorities

London, May 5.—John Bull is fast acquiring chronic insomnia trying to guess the answer to the question, "What shall we do with the wild element?" So desperate has he become over the absolute mockery of the law by the "malignants" that he is almost—but not quite—persuaded to accept the suggestion now seriously advanced by some eminent men and certain endorsed by a large section of the public, "Let them die."

The failure of the "Cat and Mouse" act as a cure for militancy has been so thoroughly demonstrated that even Home Secretary McKenna, the author has at last begun to realize that stern measures will have to be adopted. He is not at any loss for advice. Great Britain is notoriously an epistolary nation and the office of the chief of police of the Empire is nowadays the favorite target of the ever-ready letter writers. The suggestions, which are being received by the hundreds daily, prescribe punishments varying from tattooing on the chin to deportation for life.

The recent statistics of window smashing, arson dynamiting, etc., by no means indicate how sorely John Bull has been hurt in the tenderest part of his anatomy—his pocketbook. The women have destroyed more than five million dollars worth of property since they began their crusade of militancy five years ago. This represents only a fraction of the indirect loss in money. Merchants and hotel keepers are complaining bitterly of the falling off of their tourist trade, especially from America. Mary Richardson could not have selected a more opportune time, from the suffragette standpoint, for her near-ax assault upon the Rokeby Venus in the national gallery. The consequences, bitterly of practically all the famous show places of London—the galleries, museums, and palaces—coming just at the season of the year when folks in the United States were planning their summer European trips has according to the tourist agencies, been responsible for thousands either cutting out England entirely from their itineraries or curtailing their expected visits to this country to the minimum.

**Exile Plan Considered.**  
A number of prominent members of Parliament are urging as a solution Lord Robert Cecil's plan to exile convicted militants to St. Helena or to some British island nearer to England. "Deportation seems to be the only thing left," for instance says W. Ormsby Gore, himself an ardent supporter of woman suffrage. "It would doubtless be an expensive and possibly a dangerous precedent, but I consider it absolutely necessary that militancy must be stopped, not only to prevent the loss of being brought to complete contempt but to advance the cause of woman suffrage."

An interesting feature of the present anti-suffragette agitation is the attitude of the doctors. The fact that three distinguished members of the profession, medical officers and his Majesty's prisons, have been publicly horsewhipped by suffragettes because under directions from the home secretary they have been compelled to administer forcible feeding, has had its influence. The profession generally objects not only to the assumption of this sort of risks but to the other responsibilities that have been added to the already uncommensal duties of the prison doctors by reason of the "Cat and Mouse" act. As stated by Sir Victor Horsely, one of England's most eminent surgeons in the Medicinal court, a partial dispenser of unequal punishments and lastly and only occasionally a medical practitioner of the ordinary type.

**SIXTEEN HORSES NOW TRAINING AT LAKE TRACK**

Other Arrivals Expected This Week and Track Will Present Scene of Activity

Sixteen horses are now in the stables at Lake Wichita, in training for the Texas-Oklahoma Short Ship Circuit which opens next month. The track is still soft from the rains, but the first tryout will be held this afternoon if the course is in good enough condition.

Joe Ratiff of Florence and John Wilson of San Antonio, are the latest arrivals, with the following string: Flying Pearl, Fraud, Miss Ogden, Captain Bruce, California Jack and G. M. Howard.

Other new arrivals are promised within the week and the race track is beginning to take on an air of decided activity.

**6.42 INCHES RAINFALL HERE SINCE APRIL 17**

A total of 6.42 inches of rain has fallen in this city during the present rainy season, which began April 17 and which apparently is not yet over. This is almost a record for continued precipitation, though of course it does not come up to the experiences of last December.

Lake Wichita has fallen about a foot in the past few days and is now about eighteen inches below the December stage. Water is going over the spillway in a regular mill race. Big Wichita River is falling steadily after its rise of last week.

**POULTRY DEMONSTRATION CAR HERE ALL DAY MAY 14**

Specialist Will Test, Grade and Pack Eggs and Poultry For Long-Shipment

Uncle Sam's special egg and poultry refrigerating and demonstration car is due to arrive in Wichita on Thursday, May 14th. The egg shippers and producers along the road already visited by the department of agriculture poultry shipping car have expressed themselves as highly pleased with the demonstration given in their towns. At each stop, under the direction of H. C. Pierce, the specialists with the car have tested, graded, chilled and packed without charge local eggs for the local shippers.

When the car reaches Wichita-Falls it will be located on the side track near the M. K. & T. depot. The demonstrations will begin at 8:30 a. m., and continue until 4:30 p. m. The car will spend one day in this place.

The department specialists on this summer tour will give special attention to eggs and their proper preparation for shipment. They will also give demonstrations to those especially interested in the most approved methods of dressing, chilling and packing chickens and turkeys for shipment to the New York and other distant markets.

Thousands of eggs will be caulked according to the commercial standards and fresh eggs, stale eggs, blood rings, white rots, black rots and other grades will be exhibited. The demonstration in detecting white rots is said to be very important as many candlers confuse white rots with fresh eggs. The eggs will then be sorted by market standards of size, cleanliness of shell and condition of shell. These gradings will show exactly the standards now set by egg men in distant markets. Special attention will be given to showing why unfertile eggs are best for market purposes and the advantage of chilling eggs before shipping.

The demonstrators will show most successful plans of using fillers, flat and buffers, placing and number of nails and the best way of storing cases in the cars. The eggs thus packed, the local owner will know with certainty that they started right from his warehouse.

All interested are cordially invited to attend. A special invitation is extended to the producers, handlers, shippers and consumers of eggs and the older children in the schools.

The car will be accompanied this trip by W. W. Evans, agricultural agent of the industrial department of the M. K. & T.

**DEBATE DECISION IS AGAINST THE ULSTERMEN**

Young Men's Forum Discusses Merits of Irish Opposition to Home Rule

A debate on the Ulster problem featured Monday night's session of the Young Men's Forum, the judges finding for the negative which contended that the Ulstermen were wrong in taking up arms to oppose home rule. Messrs. Statton and Fuller had the affirmative, Messrs. Edleman and Gould the negative. After the debate F. E. Howard gave an interesting talk on the inner workings of the postoffice department, correcting some popular impressions of how it operates.

On next Monday night, the Forum will debate the subject, "Resolved, That the Interstate Commerce Commission should grant the request of the eastern railroads for an advance in freight rates." Messrs. Heiserman and Settle will have the affirmative, Messrs. Crowell and Loemer the negative. There will be a short talk by W. M. Fuller and an address by some outsider to be announced later.

 Only six states in the Union are now without compulsory educational laws. Texas is one of them, but she is about ready now to fall in line.

In less than sixty days Wichita county farmers will be marketing their new wheat crop, and from present indications they will get more than a million dollars for it at the present market price.

The Katy, already operating more mileage than any other road in Texas, has taken over 442.6 miles of additional lines, which it will operate under lease for a term of 99 years. This is one of the most progressive roads in the State, has done more towards developing its resources and has spent more money in improvements than any other line in the State, despite the fact that it has been made the target for attack by every political demagogue that has had a day in Texas. If let alone and permitted to work out its problems, it will grow into a splendid property and prove a valuable adjunct in the work of developing Texas.—Denison Herald.

The North Fort Worth News says that an effort is being made to have the salaries of the school teachers of Fort Worth raised. That the school teachers of Texas are underpaid there is not the slightest doubt. Not only the school teachers in Fort Worth but in nearly all towns and cities—Wichita Falls, for instance. The young women who equip themselves for stenographic and office work are better paid, as a rule, than those who prepare themselves to teach. The teacher's work is certainly as important as office work, and it is a shame they are not better paid.

An Oregon man who is rated as a millionaire, was recently forced to work five days on a rock pile. His offense was that of violating the speed law after having been repeatedly arrested and let off with a small fine. He did not care for that. Money was no object to him, and the authorities were therefore forced to use harsher measures. He will probably feel differently about it now, and be made to realize that speed laws are enacted for safety of the public generally, and that because a man is able to pay a fine for exceeding the speed limits in the driving of his automobile does not necessarily mean that he can keep it up.

Gen. Carranza has notified the Washington authorities that he will not agree to suspend war on Huerta while the South American mediators are endeavoring to adjust the differences existing between the United States and the Huerta government in Mexico. He gives as his reason the belief that the international complication was intentionally provoked by Huerta, and that by calling upon him to cease fighting Huerta would be to do exactly what Huerta wished. At the time the insult was offered this country, most Americans thought as Carranza now thinks—that it was deliberately planned and executed by Huerta's orders. He had good cause to fear that if he fell into the hands of the Constitutionalist they would not spare him, but if the United States was forced to intervene he, at least would be safe from harm.

It's a great honor to be the governor of the greatest state in the Union. The salary attached to the office is only about \$4,000 per year, yet Candidate Ferguson has no doubt, already spent at least twice that much as legitimate campaign expenses, and before the campaign closes he can get rid of that much more easily. Mr. Ferguson is a rich man, a farmer and banker, and can well afford the expense. On the other hand, Col. Ball has thrown up his law practice that was netting him anywhere from \$10,000 to \$20,000 a year, merely for the honor and the abuse that will be his after the election. Unless a man has a fat purse, or his friends who are willing to put up for him, he has no business offering as a candidate for governor of Texas. This is a big state, and it would seem that the salary of the governor should not only be raised to about double what it now is, but that the term should be made for four instead of two years. Even at that, the man elected would come out behind in the event he was not given a second term.

It is rumored that ex-Senator Joseph W. Bailey will support Colonel Ball as a gubernatorial candidate. If he does so, the fact should not cause surprise, for the two men have been long-time friends and have pulled together ere now in matters political. It was no great surprise, either, to see Hon. Clarence Owsley take a seat in the Ball band wagon, for "blest is the tie that binds" these two distinguished Texans.—Waco Tribune.

There is a bond of affinity existing between the gentlemen named, and several others that have not yet taken their seats in the Ball band wagon that nothing, apparently, can sever, but seats are being reserved for those who are still halting, and by the time July 25th rolls around Candidate Ferguson will not have more than a corporal's guard of supporters who are anti in principle, and also Bailey men, and feel that it would never do for them to vote for him for governor because he was "the man who carried Bell county against Bailey."

**BRYAN VS. ROOSEVELT IN 4916**  
 In the May American Magazine Ray Stannard Baker, the famous journalist, writes an interesting article about Woodrow Wilson in which he compares him with Roosevelt and Taft, and explains the reasons for his extraordinary success, and gives an excellent statement of the progress that he has made.

With respect to the political prospects for 1916 Mr. Baker says: "I have been talking thus far about thinking and thinkers. I wish now to descend from this rarified atmosphere and, while still speaking of Mr. Wilson, deal for a moment in that popular Washington beverage known as 'dope.' "Dope" is ending its way irresistibly into our language. I even find it set down soberly (slang, Am.) in my new Standard Dictionary. It may be used both as a noun and as a verb. It fills a long-felt want; it is a convenient word to express those viscous and gummy celebrations that stop this side of thought. "Dope" is peculiarly relished at Washington. They swallow any quantity there without blinking; they even make punches of it and serve it to the diplomatic corps. It has a somewhat gentler sporific effect than purple lemonade; it induces a slight itching at the apex of the cranium, and causes hardened drinkers to lay one thumb on the tip of the nose and wriggle the lesser digits.

"I preface the remarks which follow concerning the Presidential campaign of 1916 in this learned manner that they may not be taken too seriously.  
 "Bryan versus Roosevelt in 1916: This is the 'dope which is now being 'doped out' in Washington.  
 "Why Bryan? Mr. Wilson has shown an extraordinary loyalty in carrying out the provisions in the platform of the Baltimore Convention. That platform contains a plank favoring a single presidential term and pledging the candidate of the convention to this principle. Mr. Wilson will therefore not be a candidate in 1916. (Anyhow, his health will not permit it!) Who, then, is the only remaining candidate who can lead his party? William J. Bryan.

A large number of Wichitans who have never seen a rabbit drive are planning to attend and it promises to be one of the largest affairs ever held in this section, as the rabbits are plentiful in that section. Plans are under way for some drives near Burk Burnett and Friberg and in the country north of Iowa Park where the rabbits have been doing some damage.

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**EVERY LITTLE POOL NOW INVITES THE FISHERMAN**  
 Fishing is reported good in all the pools and streams around this city at present, and local disciples of Isaak Walton have been bringing in some handsome specimens of the finny tribe. Holiday creek is said to be especially prolific of fish just now, owing to the overflow waters from Lake Wichita, while Big Wichita river, which is falling rapidly after its recent rise, is also giving up some large catfish.  
 At the lake late yesterday F. P. St. Clair landed one of the largest channel cat fish ever caught here; it was about "that" long, "that" being the span of the fisherman's arms.

**The Majestic.**

The special feature is based on the motto of the modern efficient police department, "Let No Man Escape." John Bronson through a chain of evidence wove against him by Thorne, the real avenger, thinks he is the "murderer" although he feels in his heart that he is innocent he is afraid to face trial and flees from the country, taking with him his little daughter. **The Victoria.**  
 A Thibaudier drama in three reels, featuring Sidney Bracey is showing today at the Victoria. "The Miser's Reversion" has a rather whimsical plot for its basis. The miser is very much interested in the "Origin of the Species" and discourages the attention a poor boy heast man pays to his lovely daughter. The wrinkled old miser is taken in by the Maharajah of India, is given a small dose of the Elixir of Life, which transforms him from an old man of 75 to a hale man of 40, he greedily drinks the whole bottle of Elixir and reverts to the original type, an ape. After a series of exciting happenings he regains his human shape and in the end gives his consent to the marriage of his daughter to her youthful sweet heart.

**Interest Now Centers In Shallow Oil Discoveries**  
 The Fuel Oil Journal for May contains the following concerning developments and operations in this section: Developments in North Texas have been mostly confined to inside companies, with little, if any, additional area added to the proven pools. Lately there has been a slight decline in production, the present daily output being estimated at 23,700 bbls. Of this Electra is credited with 24,900 bbls, Petrolia 1625 bbls, and Burk Burnett 2100 bbls, the remainder being divided between Iowa Park and Fowikes. The slump of 20c in the market, bringing the price down to 85c, will no doubt soon curtail operations, especially wildcatting. For a time Electra producers were encouraged to pump until after Oklahoma was not cut until after Oklahoma was not cut several reductions. Nevertheless on both April 13 and 20 posted quotations were reduced 10c. A philosophical view of the situation is being taken as everybody recognizes that the market cannot hold steady with the present deluge of oil in almost every part of the Southwest. Further reductions are feared and nobody dares predict where price-cutting will end.  
 Interest has principally centered in the shallow discoveries in Wichita county. Several months ago the Beaver Creek Oil Co. finished a 12-in. well in the 900 ft. sand on the Waggoner brothers' ranch, 8 miles southeast of Electra, and about 3 miles south of the shallow production at Fowikes. This well has been rigged to pump with a crude oil engine and is operated at irregular intervals. While it shows some water the oil is fresh, testing almost equal in gravity to the Electra crude, and the daily production has held up to 10 or 12 bbls. Several other tests are starting. R. S. Allen secured a portion of the Waggoner land formerly leased to the Coffey Co. and is rigging up less than one-half mile west of the discovery well. The Beaver Creek Co. is down about 400 ft. in its second test, almost a mile east of No. 1. Several trades are rumored, which, if closed, will probably mean additional development.

**More Shallow Development.**  
 About three miles east of the Beaver Creek well, the Big Wichita Oil Co. recently brought in a shallow well which was estimated at 10 bbls. from depths of 20 ft. The well has shown plenty of water from the start and now makes about 5 bbls. of oil, with from 50 to 75 bbls. of water. It is on the Mitchell land several hundred feet south of the south line of the Burnett pasture. A second test is being drilled nearby with a Star machine.  
 At Burk station about midway between Electra and Wichita Falls, Burnett has subdivided a part of a section into 40 and 80-acre tracts, and three or four companies are operating on the subdivision with Star rigs. Forbes and others, lately completed a 5-bbl. well here at 800 feet. Numerous attempts have been made to lease this land dating back to the discovery of oil at Electra but development has been deferred on account of the failure to secure sufficiently liberal leases. "The Denver railroad first discovered shallow oil at this place in drilling water wells when the line was extending west from Wichita Falls, and a good many years ago refining tests were made on samples taken from these wells. The railroad at the time stated that the water was unfit for use on account of the oil.  
 Again on the Sunday lease, two miles northwest of Iowa Park, Burt Griffiths several months ago developed a small well at less than 500 feet, which is estimated at 10 bbls., though it is not regularly operated. This indicates the drilling of several tests in the vicinity on the Mills and Abernathy leases, none of which has yet been completed.

Judging from the development, it seems probable that patches of shallow oil are likely to be found almost anywhere throughout a wide area of territory lying east and southeast of Electra—possibly over a large portion of the central part of the county, but experience has shown that this does not necessarily mean the presence of deep pay sand. Deep wells have been drilled around Fowikes and Iowa Park without any deep oil showings, and, after all, it is the deep oil which is depended upon for the big money. The shallow oil is more or less an uncertain quantity, being usually accompanied by water, which is likely sooner or later to drown it out. The several shallow oil strikes have led to the organization of numerous small companies, although the combined production of all such is but an inconsequential field total.  
**Possibilities to the West**  
 There has been considerable speculation on the probable westward extension of the Electra pool, although until recently there has been little ground for forming an opinion. The Waggoner ranch, under lease to the Producers Oil Co., includes everything in that direction for five or six miles, and as that company has been under no necessity of trying to define the pool on its lease, very little drilling has been done in that quarter. The

first Waggoner deep wells just across the line in Wilbarger county were very small and the Rogers deep test was a failure. Since the Corsicana Petroleum Co. secured the mineral rights on the H. & T. C. land in this section, the Producers Co. has been forced to protect its lines, but this development extended but a short distance in the hitherto unproven territory. The Producers Co. is now drilling a deep test on the Waggoner about the middle of the east line of section 13 H. & T. C., which is two miles west of production. It is now down over 2700 feet and is well below all the productive sand of the field without any showing of importance. A half mile north of this test they have abandoned the Zeisler test at 2550 feet, also a complete failure. The Showers tests at Harrod was a 2000-foot dry hole, and the C. P. Wharton test of the Waggoner was dry at about 2200 feet. It now appears unlikely that the field will extend much farther than at present in this direction.  
 No good deep sand wells have been finished up recently on the southwest side of the pool, though several proved to be small producers in territory where good ones were expected. The Corsicana Petroleum Co. S. E. Honaker, the Miller, the Red River Bywaters, and the R. S. Allen leases have furnished the best wells of the field for several months. The good wells on the Miller and S. E. Honaker are confined to spots but the Red River lease seems to be an especially good property, on which that company is steadily increasing its production.

Nothing of any consequence has happened in either the Eodis, Breckeldt, or Hissman district for some time. Small hope is entertained now of discovering anything big in any of this territory. The Corsicana Petroleum Co.'s Schaarre well proved small, or than was expected, and is now pumping art flow at about 35 or 40 bbls. Andrew Urban's No. 3 Schults, near the Schaarre, which, according to the hope, should have been a spooce, is dry at about 2050 feet. The Corsicana Petroleum Co. has made a location on the Martin tract, offsetting the Schaarre well.  
 Several more deep holes have been added to the dry column, among them Producers No. 8 Allen, 2180 feet; Corsicana No. 8 H. & T. C., 2280 feet; Electra Home Oil & Gas Co. No. 1, (oe 2070 feet, and Corsicana No. 3 Warner, 2225 feet, the last a wildcat test in the Burk Burnett district.

All recent wells at Petrolia have been smaller than were expected. Producers No. 13 Byers is perhaps the most interesting of these. It is located over a mile south of the good wells on the Byers, north of the railroad track, and came in from 1740 feet, making about 20,000,000 feet of gas with a spray of oil sufficient to discolor the derrick. It was turned over to the Lone Star Gas Co. and it continued to make an increasing spray of oil, and was supplied with drips, later being turned into production tanks. It is now making 50 or 60 bbls. of oil and steadily getting better. The well seems to have opened up more good territory, although it is separated from the wells to the north by several dry holes. Nos. 17 and 21 Byers in the midst of good wells are shut down waiting to be drilled in with cable tools. An attempt is being made to plug No. 20 back to the gas sand after getting water at 1770 feet, this location being about a mile to the northeast. No. 22, to the southwest, is drilling. Developers No. 11 is flowing about 25 bbls. of oil and making several million feet of gas. The Williams and Williams well on the Red River lease is a 10,000,000-ft. gas well making a spray of oil from 1710 to 1723 feet. The Palmer Oil Co. No. 1 is making probably five million feet of gas and about 20 bbls. of oil. The American Oil Co. well is being drilled deeper after getting only 5 or 10 bbls. of oil at the usual depth. The Producers Webber & Smith well is fishing at 1645 feet and the two wells on the Brotherton are shut down at about 1740 feet. Both the Lone Star tests on the south side of the field are shut down also—the Skelly and Corsicana Petroleum leases. The biggest surprise of the completed wells was Wichita Oil & Gas Co. No. 3 Matlock, just south of the Cuberson well. It was dry at 1785 feet, while the original well of that company is making over 100 bbls.

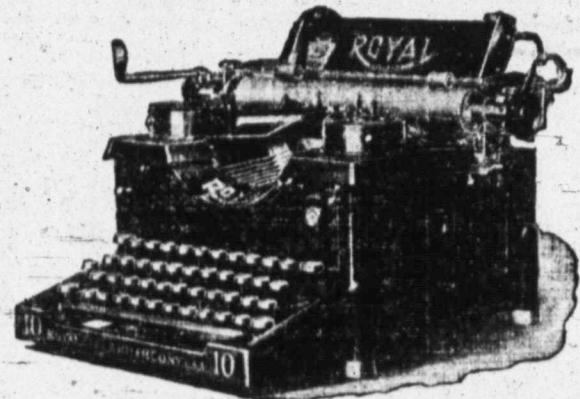

## ASK HALF MILLION FOR PLAY GROUNDS.

Cleveland, May 5.—A big fight is on in Cleveland for a half million dollars to build playgrounds for idle youngsters.

Mayor Newton D. Baker, city councilmen, the Chamber of Commerce and the city school board went on record today to fight shoulder to shoulder a \$500,000 playground bond issue to be submitted to the voters shortly after July 1. The city already has 34 playgrounds, twenty of which are under supervision of the school board.

"We need a hundred more and we are going to fight for a playground

within four blocks of every youngster in Cleveland," Director Peterson announced today. Peterson recently completed a school ground survey. He reported the following conditions: Over 41 per cent of Cleveland children are idle in their leisure time. They have no place to play. Fifty-one per cent of these are forced to play in the streets when they play at all.

"These conditions must not last," declared Peterson. Advocates of more playgrounds call themselves city recreationists. They are an organized society behind the movement.

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### Judge Lindsey Discusses Rural Credits Problem

It is possible for money to be had by Texas farmers on good land security at 6 per cent and on cotton at 5 per cent. It is only a question of arranging the security and taking down the bars which keep money from land securities.

All will agree, that there is much money in the world to be had at 4 and 5 per cent if the security is satisfactory; that there is no better security than agricultural lands and cotton, if the land is good, well improved and kept in that condition and the cotton is first class staple, well ginned, baled, wrapped and dry, securely housed in a warehouse and insured.

If evidence is required here it is all over Europe land security gets money at from 3 1/2 to 4 per cent. Money is not chained down in Europe and a difference of one per cent will bring it here provided the security is the kind that the investor is accustomed to.

In many northern and eastern states money is seeking investment in good land securities at 5 and 6 per cent. The cotton warehouse people in Memphis borrow money, all they want, at 4 per cent. I have seen apples 25 cents a bushel in Missouri and \$2 per bushel in Texas; peaches 40 cents a bushel in Texas and \$3.75 in Colorado. Why? For the same reason that money is 4 and 5 per cent in other states and countries and 8 and 10 per cent in Texas, which is that fruit growers and fruit consumers have no means of dealing directly with each other and the agencies that bring the two together take the difference.

Last summer, while discussing the subject of rural credits with Messrs. Wolfe and Cahill of London, the two best authorities in the world on the subject, one of them said: "Money is like a bird which is contented in its cage. All one has to do to get cheap money is to speak its language and go where it is. Money has no home affections. It hunts security and interest rates. The first thing one thinks of when contemplating rural credits is, where is the money to be obtained. This is an unwarranted uneasiness. Arrange the security so it speaks the language that money understands and it will come."

The Source of Cheap Money.  
Suppose one wishes to borrow \$10,000 on land security. It is not easy to find one person who has that sum to lend. When he does, he finds a man of affairs who will lend the money only on such rates as prevail in that community. It is easier to find twenty persons with \$500 or a hundred with \$100 each. In eastern states and in European countries working people and persons of small means put by their savings in savings banks which pay 3 and 4 per cent on time deposits. The savings banks assemble many hundreds of millions of dollars. The deposits in the postal savings banks of this nation already amount to \$40,000,000 although they pay only 2 per cent interest. People of small means are the greatest source of cheap money; their money builds skyscrapers, factories, ships, railroads, telegraph and telephone systems, etc., which is assembled in this wise: The enterprise is incorporated and issues mortgage bonds. A million dollars may be put into bonds of \$50 each, bearing 4, 5 or 6 per cent interest. Concerns which make a business of selling such securities furnish the money desired and sell these bonds to investors in such securities among whom will be clerks, bookkeepers, laborers, school teachers, preachers.

Our Tenant Problem.  
These land mortgage banks will not entirely enable the landless man to buy a home.

The tenant problem is less simple than the getting of cheap money on hands worth twice the amount borrowed; all that is required in that case is to arrange the security which is the best in the world, so that it is acceptable at the source of cheap money. All of this is cold blooded between the investors in securities and those selling same. The state is not interested in this and should take no further hand in it other than providing a law by which the organization for invading the cheap money market may be affected and then give the borrower such funds as the government may be able to furnish.

The problem of inducing shifting tenants who are merely in partnership with the landlord in robbing the soil of its fertility and dividing the swag, to induce them to buy, improve and build up the soil they till and

become fixed units of strength in their communities, is clearly a concern of the state. This problem is close akin, if not entirely identical, both in purpose and result, to that of general education. If the state would be strong and enduring it must educate its citizens and attach them to the soil. There is something strengthening in the possession and proprietorship of a piece of land. Drive people of this strength and they become socialists because their sense of weakness and insecurity compels them to seize at straws as do the drowning.

The Colorado Plan.  
The State of Colorado is attempting to convert tenants into land owners. Colorado has \$6,000,000 of permanent school funds. This money is being made available in this way: The counties are given the privilege of investing their proportionate part in the notes of purchases of homes. This is done through the commissioners court. The court considers each individual case. If a man is honest, intelligent, industrious and capable of paying out the land and the land is worth the money, the court buys the land for him or takes up his notes and gives him forty years at 5 per cent interest in which to pay. The county must see that the state does not lose its fund. Every proposed loan is advertised and the people knowing the county to be responsible to the state assist in preventing an unworthy or unsafe case from getting through.

One of these crooks comes into possession of a revolver silenced with a Maxim patent mute—this ingenious and terrible weapon wrecks silent havoc throughout the play and becomes an object of pivotal interest in the theme. How Mary gets her revenge and how in the end Joe Garson, the bad man—whom everyone loves—is brought to justice, how Inspector Burke closes the talons of the law around the main characters and what finally happens to Mary and her confederates, will undoubtedly excite the interest and curiosity of every theatre-goer.
