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## AMERICANS DEFEND SELVES, IN DANGER

NOW IN JAIL NEAR SAN PEDRO FOR KILLING OF MEXICAN RURAL GUARD

## SALTILLO AND ZACATECAS

Rebel Forces and Durango and Torreon Begin March—Refugee Movement Less Active

By Associated Press. Washington, May 7.—Ten members of the Smith family in jail at Tonala are in danger of execution for the killing of Mexican rural guards in the recent killing of three Mexicans at San Pedro, according to a report today from Minister Leavell in Guatemala. The Mexicans were members of a rural guard and invaded the Smith home at San Pedro to disarm the occupants.

In the fight which ensued, the Mexicans were beaten, but the Americans later were arrested.

Confirmation of the capture of the entire federal garrison at Acaponeta by constitutionalist forces reached the state department today in a report from consular agents.

The vanguard of the constitutionalist forces at Durango and Torreon has started on its march to begin the campaign for the capture of Saltillo and Zacatecas, according to a report received at the state department from Consul Ham at Durango.

American Consular Agent Montague has reopened the American consulate at Cananea, Sonora, according to a report to the state department today. Sixty American refugees have returned to Cananea and the movement of American refugees from the south of Sonora has ceased.

## Lead Pencils May Cost More.

Berlin, May 7.—There is a threatening increase in the prices of lead pencils due to the effect of the new conservation laws in the United States. Germany supplies the world with lead pencils, but obtains its cedar from America.

The devastation of the American cedar and cypress forests together with areas now set aside to which access is a great secret of this wood for lead pencils. German manufacturers are looking about for some substitute. The scarcity of hickory, also much imported into Germany from America and generally used for automobile wheels and handles for carpenters' tools likewise is causing manufacturers worry.

## SAYS PROPOSED QUART LAW IS ANTI SCHEME

Dallas, Texas, May 7.—Col. J. Sheb Williams' sealed package amendment, which is to be brought up for consideration at the May 12 meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee at Austin, is a plan to defeat State-wide submission, in the opinion of Dr. J. H. Gambrell, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League in Texas, who has charge of the State-wide submission petitions.

Apparently the pro leaders are not worried by Col. Williams' plan, because they say it will not defeat submission. At the meeting of the State Democratic Executive Committee next Tuesday Col. Williams said he will urge the committee to place upon the July primary ballot the question of submitting a constitutional amendment limiting the sale of intoxicating liquors to unbroken packages.

Dr. Gambrell said: "When I saw the call for the May 12 meeting, I believed there was some scheme afoot involving the liquor interests, and that this plan was to be brought up by the State Democratic Executive Committee. Col. Williams' sealed package proposition, about which he has given the press statements, confirms this suspicion.

"Even if the committee submits the sealed package submission, although that is clearly its purpose. Submission will not be defeated, in my opinion, although that seems to be the purpose of the call for the May 12 meeting. The extreme anti will not vote for the submission of the sealed package amendment, nor will they vote for the submission of the State-wide amendment. Neither will any pro vote for the sealed package submission, understanding it to be a scheme to defeat State-wide submission. But the pros will vote for submitting the State-wide amendment, and accordingly I believe submission will be submitted, and the Williams scheme defeated.

"Furthermore, if the State Democratic Executive Committee puts this sealed package question on the ticket without petitions therefor, it will simply reveal the fact that the State Democratic Executive Committee is a factional anti-prohibition organization, because it will not submit the State-wide amendment with conformity to the expressed requirement of the law petitions signed by 10 per cent of the Democratic voters."

## MEXICAN DELEGATES TO LEAVE VERA CRUZ SOON

Huerta's Representatives Will Sail for This Country to Attend the Conference

Vera Cruz, May 7.—Representatives of Provisional President Huerta at the mediation conference to be held at Niagara Falls, Canada, probably will leave the City of Mexico in a day or two. They will sail from Puerto Mexico, according to an official of the Mexican National Railroad, who arrived here today. The official quoted Gen. Huerta as saying:

"There is no reason for any foreigner to leave the City of Mexico, but those who desire to do so will be given every facility. Those who remain will be protected to the fullest extent of my ability."

Sir Lionel Carden, the British minister, has been tireless in attending to the interests of Americans and has been of great assistance to those leaving, according to the railroad official.

Refugees who came in expressed their conviction that special efforts were being made by Mexican officials and army officers along the route from the capital to treat them in a kindly manner.

Americans to the number of 2,000 or 2,500 will be left in the capital after the exodus of the 600 expected to depart for Puerto Mexico, according to the opinion of a prominent railroad official here. Most of those remaining in the city of Mexico have come in from outlying districts, but there is also a large percentage of permanent residents of the capital.

As far as is known no American in the City of Mexico has been killed or even injured during the trouble period, the railroad official declared. He said the capital has resumed virtually its normal aspect. Clubs and business houses, with few exceptions, have reopened their doors. Among these is the American Club, which was attacked by a mob during the first few days after the American occupation of Vera Cruz, but is now open under the protection of a police guard.

## WHITE HOUSE AGAIN SCENE OF WEDDING

YOUNGEST DAUGHTER OF PRESIDENT IS BRIDE OF SECRETARY OF TREASURY

## IS SIMPLE, YET BRILLIANT

Ceremony to be in Presence of Official Family Only—Plans of Couple Not Known

Washington, May 7.—The wedding at the White House late this afternoon, when Miss Eleanor Randolph Wilson, youngest daughter of the president, will be married to William Gibbs McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, will bring together many handsome gowns and toilettes of the bride party and the limited number of guests who are to attend chiefly the wives of the vice president and cabinet officers.

While it has been known for some time that the arrangements for the wedding were to be simple in contrast with some of the brilliant functions of the past, yet this has not affected the desire of the limited few who had reason to believe they would witness the event from making early preparations for gowns suitable to a function of this character. One troublesome question has been the hour of the ceremony, six o'clock—midway between the usual requirements of an afternoon or an evening gown and also raising the question of whether a hat was suitable to be worn at a six o'clock wedding function.

But these details have now been solved by the two "scots" or more matrons and maids who are to witness the marriage. Nearly all of them will wear gowns not seen here before this season and taffetas in light shades, with cream and white laces have been the more generally chosen materials.

Mrs. Marshall, wife of the vice president, selected a costume of white net and lace, made in the prevailing ruffled style, the skirt partly draped, with broad embroidered flounces of net and narrower ones with lace edges. The bodice has the lace and net in a soft kimono blouse effect.

Mrs. Bryan, wife of the secretary of state, will wear a very modish gown of taupe taffeta, which has a large flowered pattern of roses in white shades all over it. The draped skirt shows a petticoat in front of embroidered old rose chiffon. The chiffon is also inserted in the softly draped waist but a line of nearly white and very fine lace edged the V-shaped neck opening. Mrs. Bryan selected one of her small toques to wear with this dress—a becoming model in black tulle and jet.

Mrs. Lane, wife of the secretary of the interior, has chosen from among her new frocks, a stylish but simply made one of black flowered tissue over lavender chiffon. Both these gauzy materials form the bodice with ivory tinted lace around the V-shaped opening at the neck.

## LEGISLATORS LOOKING FOR SPECIAL CALL TO AUSTIN

Dallas, Texas, May 7.—A special session of the Legislature in Austin is looked forward to by some of that body, according to information received in Dallas. Senator J. C. Washington, May 8.—A caucus to determine the party policy on the Hobson resolution for national prohibition through a constitutional amendment was discussed generally by House democrats today. The Mondell resolution for a constitutional amendment for woman's suffrage also has a place in the congressional discussion. A democratic caucus in the present congress already has declared its attitude to be a local and not a national question.

Democrats today were inclined to think that the prohibition resolution would carry if it could be forced to a vote in caucus.

## WAR AND CONGRESS WAIT CUPIID'S PLEASURE TODAY

White House Wedding Overhauled All Other Events at the National Capital

Washington, May 7.—The cares of state and rumors of war were retired to the background at the White House today when Cupid took charge of affairs in preparation for the wedding of Miss Eleanor Randolph Wilson, youngest daughter of the president to William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury.

President Wilson cancelled all appointments and did not visit his executive offices. He spent the day with the guests who were at the White House for the wedding. The affair took on the appearance of a Wilson family reunion. A troop of decorators transformed the White House hall and rooms into masses of spring blossoms, especially the blue room, where the ceremony was to be performed.

## WORK OF AVIATOR SCOUT PLEASES NAVY DEPARTMENT

One of Aeroplanes on the Job Within Five Minutes After Battleship Anchored

By Associated Press. Washington, May 7.—The navy department today issued a report describing work accomplished by the navy aeroplanes at Vera Cruz saying: "The way in which the work was done is typical of the navy aviators. After making a record in getting away from Pensacola, the battleship Mississippi arrived at Vera Cruz and anchored at daylight Saturday morning, April 25. Five minutes after the anchor was dropped, Lieut. Bellinger was in the air in a flying boat and making a scouting trip."

By Associated Press. The senator warned his Democratic colleagues that to repeal the exemption was to violate the pledges of the Baltimore platform and to reverse the verdict of the people when they elected President Wilson last November on that platform.

Senator O'Gorman said that inasmuch as former Presidents Roosevelt and Taft and a preceding Congress agreed that coastwise vessels should be exempt, another Congress should think twice before giving its approval to the repeal bill, for it in turn might find itself reversed by a Congress yet to be elected.

"This question of tolls," said the senator, "is but an incident in a great contest now in its initial stage, which may determine the control of the Panama Canal for all time. The construction of the canal will rank among the world's wonders, but the opinion of mankind will pronounce the surrender of our sovereignty over a colossal blunder and a triumph of British diplomacy."

"I know there is a vague suspicion that diplomatic reasons require this national abasement, but by judgment maturely formed and based upon such information as is available, is that the gravity of our international relations has been grossly, though unconsciously, exaggerated. The American people want peace, but they fear no power on earth. They should not disturb a brave and intrepid people."

"No senator questions the patriotism and high purpose of the president, but if legislation is to be made dependent upon his will, such a precedent predict the mischief to which such a president will expose this government in future years. I believe that the passage of this bill comprises the dignity and honor of the country and before the deed is consummated, I enter my solemn protest against what I conceive to be a betrayal of the American people."

As To Economic Wisdom Senator O'Gorman further sought to show that exemption of American coastwise vessels is a wise economic policy; that if such vessels fall within the terms of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, exemption does not constitute a violation thereof and that the canal has been constructed on territory over which the United States is sovereign while the canal contemplated in the treaty was to be built on alien soil, and therefore the treaty is inapplicable.

Examining coastwise craft from the viewpoint of tolls," he continued, "will reduce the cost of shipping through the canal to a minimum and thereby compel competing tonnage in the United States and Canada to reduce their rates to a competitive basis. The more expensive you make water transportation the greater latitude you extend to the railroads in the fixing of their rates. Place a full on the domestic shipping and for every dollar you collect by way of toll you enable the railroads to make a corresponding increase in their rates. It was hoped by some that the exemption to the coastwise trade might be followed in the near future by a like exemption to the few American ships now engaged in the foreign trade, but deny this privilege to the coastwise vessels now and you make it forever impossible to confer it upon the ships engaged in overseas trade.

The Consumer's Interest. "I know it is said that free tolls will simply enrich the ship owner and confer no benefit on the producer and consumer. Well, if free tolls will not decrease the cost to the consumer, I suppose you will make your system uniform. Perhaps this is part of a program to impose tolls on the ship-

## O'GORMAN SPEAKS ON CANAL BILL

GIVES SENATE HIS REASONS FOR OPPOSITION TO REPEAL OF MEASURE

## SEE'S HAND OF RAILROAD

Warns Democrats Not to Go Back on Party Platform's Declaration on Subject

By Associated Press. Washington, May 7.—Senator O'Gorman, chairman of the Interocceanic Canal committee, and leader of the forces opposed to the repeal of the toll exemption clause of the Panama Canal act, gave the Senate today the legal, economic and political reasons for his opposition.

In a three hour speech, the senator discussed exhaustively every phase of the subject. He discovered no ground in international law which would forbid exemption of American coastwise ships from toll payment, saw behind the repeal movement the hands of the railroads and declared that a failure to impose a tax could not be called a subsidy.

The senator warned his Democratic colleagues that to repeal the exemption was to violate the pledges of the Baltimore platform and to reverse the verdict of the people when they elected President Wilson last November on that platform.

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### ST. LOUIS FEDERALS MAY UPSET ANCIENT TRADITION

No Team From Missouri Metropolis Has Ever Yet Been Able To Cop Rag

New York, May 7.—If Mordecai Brown's St. Louis Feders should happen to cop the Federal League pennant there would be another badly splintered bucket of dope to scoop up. Bresnane through April the former Chicago Cub pitcher carried his club along to the top of the heap, being walloped for but one out of the first nine games. That is hardly more than out from under the light shadow of the rag, but should the team hold up and continue the fight through July and August, a new line of excuses for the Browns and Cardinals may be necessary. Should Brown deliver, it will also be the first pennant ever won by St. Louis.

Turning back the pages it will be found that Cincinnati, Philadelphia and St. Louis have yet to put over a winner in the National League. New York, Cleveland, Washington and St. Louis have never won a pennant in the American League. That puts it on St. Louis twice.

Philadelphia has won the pennant in the American League five times. Chicago, Boston and Detroit have each copped three. Chicago is the big winner in the National League, having grabbed off ten flags. Boston has eight to its credit, New York seven, Pittsburgh four, Brooklyn three and in the old line up Baltimore three, Providence two and Detroit one.

It has always been more or less of a mystery why the St. Louis teams have usually been able to start the season in good shape and then die away. The Cardinals under Brown have rushed away one year as though they might chew up the entire universe. Then as the weeks wore on and the hot days arrived the Cards curled up, shriveled, cracked and split wide open as they slid down the column.

Explanations as long as the history of Babylon have been made of this annual trip down the chutes taken by St. Louis teams. The weather of St. Louis is held responsible by some dopsters. And some of the St. Louis players are said to have declared that as the thermometer climbs in their home town and the humidity humids, all pep slowly oozes away and there is nothing left but nine shells which perspire through the motions of ball playing, while the teams of northern cities are cavorting at top speed and slathering the ball to all corners of the lot.

If Brown has collected an aggregation of tropical wonders for his St. Louis Feders he may count on being among the leaders when the final bell rings. If he has just ordinary human beings who do not do their training on the equator, there will have to be a new line of done figured for the Browns and Cardinals.

It has been pretty clearly indicated that the Giants have a fan sized job on hand in beating out the Pittsburgh Pirates for the National League pennant.

In the first place, the Pirates have gotten into action from the start. Heretofore they have hesitated and stutted before striking their real battle stride. The Giants were the slow starters this year and should Fred Clark's men hold their gait, it will be a long, hard chase to the finish this year which had been a bug-a-boo for years. That is at first base.

### SUPERSTITIOUS INDIANS BURY MONTH OLD CHILD

Calcutta, May 7.—An extraordinary case of superstition was disclosed by the arrest of three men who were caught in the act of burning alive a baby a month old. The baby was born with a tooth and a few days afterwards six suckling pigs and a calf died in the neighborhood. Thereupon, a soothsayer declared that the child had a devil and undertook to exorcise it, but on the following night the father became ill. He then decided that the devil had been too strong for the soothsayer and that he must get rid of the child to escape its malignity.

### DECREE PUTS STOP TO EMIGRATION

AUSTRIA WILL NOT PERMIT MEN AND YOUTHS UNDER 34 TO LEAVE COUNTRY

### MEASURE TO AID MILITARY

Enforcement of Order Will Cause Great Suffering in Many Impoverished Districts

Vienna, May 7.—By a simple ministerial decree, without the passage of any law, or even reference to parliament, the Austrian cabinet has stopped the emigration of youths and men under the age of thirty-four. They will not be permitted to cross the frontier unless they can produce a passport and the local authorities have received strict instructions to issue such papers only to applicants who can prove that they have performed their military service, including the full term in the reserve and have been passed into the "Landsturm" the last line of reserves for home defense. This really means twelve years of service for the average man.

The decree promises to be even more sweeping in its effects than would at first sight appear. It applies not only to bona fide emigrants leaving their native land for the United States or Canada, possibly intending to remain away for many years, but it will also prevent many thousands of farm laborers from going to Germany for field work and harvest as has been the custom every summer. And further, since the decree makes no mention of any exceptions it is supposed that waiters, tailors, mechanics and other workers who want to go abroad to complete their trade education will no longer be able to do so. For at the age of thirty-four a man has usually contracted family and business ties which effectually prevent him from leaving his native land.

The new regulation apparently has been made because the military authorities recently discovered, when the recruiting levies were called up, that more and more of the young men entered on the rolls had gone to foreign parts. It was this which first led to the investigation of the steamship companies' emigration activities. What this sudden and drastic restriction of emigration will effect to some extent the whole monarchy, certain provinces will feel it more acutely than others, notably Galicia, one of the most densely populated lands in Europe, with its large peasant population eking out the barest subsistence on a barren soil. The country being entirely too poor to support this population, thousands of peasants go to work on the great farms of Saxony and the cornlands in Germany every year and thousands of others go still further afield to American and Canada. But every fall the laborers return to their homes from Germany and in the course of a few years many also come back from America to their native land. All bring money with which they buy stock and whenever possible land. In fact there are now districts in Galicia where the soil is gradually passing out of the hands of the great landed proprietors into the possession of peasants.

There are other parts of Austria where home conditions are so unfavorable that the people are forced to seek a livelihood elsewhere. In North or Meravia and Silesia, in the Bohemian forest and in the Frz mountains there are districts where the utmost poverty prevails and thousands of young men leave their homes every year to escape what is practically a state of starvation. The ministerial decree threatens to stop this most necessary outlet for labor and thereby to entail an enormous amount of unnecessary suffering and hardship. Coming just at this time it is especially severe when the whole monarchy is groaning under the heavy depression in trade and industry consequent on the recent war crisis. The social democratic party is ex-

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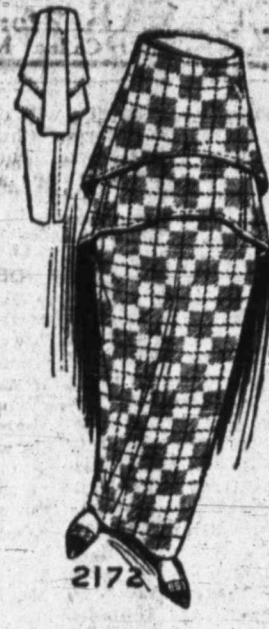
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possibly indignant at what it terms the arbitrary and illegal action of the cabinet and accuses the government of acting in the interests of the agrarians who complain that they are no longer able to get sufficient labor for their farms. The social democrats declare that such procedure is only possible in Austria whose true constitution is anarchy.

**FRESH AIR CHILDREN GAIN MORE RAPIDLY THAN OTHERS**

Washington, May 7.—That school children who are taught in fresh air class rooms advance more rapidly in their studies and make greater improvement in weight and strength than children in regular class rooms, a conclusion demonstrated by F. H. Mann of New York, before the Sociological Section of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis this afternoon. The speaker reported on a series of experiments carried on jointly by the New York committee on the Prevention of Tuberculosis and the Board of Education in which three groups of children were studied to note the effect of fresh air upon them. In one group, the children were placed in fresh air classes and were fed during school hours with milk and crackers morning and afternoon; in the second group, the children were placed in fresh air classes but were not fed and in the third group, the children were left in the ordinary class room under regular conditions. Every effort was made to eliminate or equalize in the comparison such variable factors as age, home conditions, physical condition, school conditions, nativity, etc. The two groups of children in the fresh air classes were all undernourished and anaemic at admission.

The results of this experiment, extending from September, 1912, to June, 1913, showed that all of the poorly nourished and anaemic children in the fresh air classes gained in weight, red corpuscles in the blood, general nutrition and physical tone. The gains were made for the most part independently of the amount and kind of the food factors as age, home conditions, physical condition, school conditions, nativity, etc. The two groups of children in the fresh air classes were all undernourished and anaemic at admission. The results of this experiment, extending from September, 1912, to June, 1913, showed that all of the poorly nourished and anaemic children in the fresh air classes gained in weight, red corpuscles in the blood, general nutrition and physical tone. ### ELECTION CONTEST PETITION IS FILED

EFFORT MADE TO ENJOIN ENFORCEMENT OF RESULT OF VOTE ON PROHIBITION

### SEVERAL GROUNDS SET UP

Alleged That Several Provisions of Law With Reference to Election Were Disregarded

Alleging that such a political subdivision is not named under the constitution or in the laws of the state; that the petition asking for an election was not entered as a part of the minutes of the commissioners court and that the returns of the election on April 4th were not canvassed until April 13th and therefore that the entire proceedings are void and of no effect, L. S. Rammage, William Slides, D. C. Holston, August Muller and others have filed a petition in the district court asking for an injunction to restrain C. B. Felder, county judge, et al, from further proceedings to carry into effect the order declaring prohibition in Commissioners Precinct 2, 3 and 4 in Wichita Falls. The petitioners also ask for an injunction to restrain the further publication of the notice declaring the result of said election. The notice has already been published twice in the paper at Burk Burnett, two publications yet remaining to be made. Judge Felder and Commissioners McCleskey, Smith, Jackson and Barwise are named in the petition which was filed by W. F. Weeks, attorney representing the plaintiffs.

The petition alleges that in the order on March 10 for the election on April 4th the commissioners court attempted to create a new political subdivision of the county from precincts 2, 3 and 4; that such a political subdivision is not named in the constitution and laws of the state. It is claimed therefore that the order for the election was void. Another reason alleged why the order was void is that the petition was not entered as a part of the minutes of the proceedings of the court.

The fact that the results of the election were not canvassed until the regular session of the commissioners court on April 13th is made another point of attack. It is declared no conditions existed making it impracticable to canvass the results on the eleventh day after the election; that the commissioners court was in session on or about the fifteenth day after the election and failed to canvass the returns and that therefore that prohibition cannot become effective because the results of the election were not legally declared.

The petition was filed late Wednesday afternoon. It will probably be taken before Judge Buck at Henrietta who is occupying the district court bench in the absence of Judge Edgar Scurry.



The "sociability tour" of Texas which will be made by a party of Colorado business men is now on its way to this section, having left Pueblo Wednesday. It had been planned to leave there Monday, but the start was delayed on account of washouts and bad roads.

The party was scheduled to reach Texline this morning and to arrive in Wichita Falls late Saturday; the original plan was for them to be here today.

While no plans have been made for the entertainment of the visitors during their stay here, it is probable that the Chamber of Commerce will take appropriate action before the tourists arrive.

The commercial organizations of Colorado are sending one hundred of the representative business men of that State to Texas for a social visit. The party is coming in automobiles and is scheduled to spend thirteen days in the State. Fifty Texas cities will be visited. The party, in touring Texas, passes through some of the richest farming and stock raising countries on the face of the earth. The party, traveling by the spur track, passed 50 per cent of the annual agricultural yield of Texas and contains 70 per cent of the State's population.
